New Football Motion Picture "Know Your Football" Is Now Available to CIF Schools

Production of a new official football rules film, "Know Your Football" has been completed by Official Sports Film Service and four copies of the new film have been leased by the CIF, SS, for showing by member schools at no cost to the schools.

"Know Your Football" was filmed last spring at Glendale High School in Glendale, Arizona, and contains up-to-date rules interpretations. It gives a visual approach to the written rules as they apply to the game. Play situations chosen for the film cover requests from officials and coaches forwarded to the National Federation of State High School Athletic Assn.

The film is 16mm, sound, and the CIF, SS, has one color copy and three black and white copies available. It runs 27 minutes in length.

Also available from the CIF office at no cost to member schools are films "This is Basketball," "Official Baseball," "This is Track and Field," and championship CIF track meets. Contact Don Andersen, P. O. Box 488, Artesia, for booking information.

Chester R. Shirk, Anaheim Principal, Heads CIF, SS, Council

Chester R. Shirk, Principal of Anaheim High School and Representative of the Sunset League, has been named President of the CIF, Southern Section Council for the 1966-67 school year.

Active in athletics in high school and at La Verne College, where he received his B.A. degree, he went on to a year's graduate work at Stanford University. Coaching football under "Pop" Warner was one of his interesting courses.

Chet started his teaching career as Athletic Director and coach of football, basketball and baseball at Lompoc Union High School in 1930, and also taught mathematics. At midyear in 1937-38, he accepted a similar position at Anaheim High School, and except for three and a half years in military service as a Naval officer, has remained in the Anaheim Secondary system. He remained very active in coaching and officiating, and served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Orange County Officials Association for many years.

An interest in counseling and guidance led to being assigned in this expanding school program. Success here created an interest in administration and Shirk went to Claremont Graduate School for his M.A. in that field. Leaving Anaheim High School in 1954, when the local area started its tremendous change in population growth, Chet moved into administrative duties at Western Junior High School, opened Brookhurst Junior High School as its first Principal, organized and opened Western High School and remained five years before returning to Anaheim High School in 1962.

Mr. Shirk and his wife, Alberta, have two children, Marshall, who was active in football at Anaheim High School and U.C.L.A., now playing in Canada, and Margaret, presently a student at Redlands University.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

WHERE ARE WE GOING?

"The CIF, Southern Section, since its inception in 1914, has believed that the individual development is the primary goal of interscholastic athletics, and that all athletic activities must foster the growth and well-being of the individual student.

"School athletics are a potential educative force of tremendous power in meeting many of the needs of youth. Competition and co-operation are prized in our California culture, and both are fostered in well-conducted athletic games under competent leadership.

"All CIF, SS, high schools should conduct a well-organized program of athletic competition as a logical sequence to regular instruction in physical education. An extensive and well-balanced program of intra-mural sports should be offered to all interested in games while interscholastic athletics should be provided for the physically gifted.

"Much has been done during the past 50 years towards fitting interscholastic athletics harmoniously into the total school program. Real strides have been made in adapting athletics to meet the characteristics and health needs of youth at appropriate grade levels.

"California believes in the value of competition in athletics as a part of the education experience of all youth. We are dedicated to pursue this principle by directing and encouraging a state-

wide program which will give our youth the best possible chance to benefit in full measure from their participation in athletics."

The above five paragraphs are taken from the general philosophy statement of the CIF, prepared by C. Carson Conrad, state department of education. Mr. Conrad's views, we feel, serve as a fitting introductory editorial as we begin another year of interscholastic athletics.

It is with these thoughts in mind that we at the CIF, SS, office welcome new administrators and coaches into our midst and wish them every success in their endeavors with the youth of the Nation in the field of educational athletic activities.

MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING-JUNE 19, 1966

The June meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Robert D. Ashton at 9 a.m. on Sunday, June 19, 1966 at Palm Springs.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Ashton, administrator, secondary personnel, Norwalk-La Mirada SD; Marion C. Hays, vice principal, Harvard School; Arthur North, assistant superintendent, Arusa USD; Harry Bigger, principal, Fillmore HS; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley HS; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona HS; Charles M. Ronin, vice principal, Redlands HS; Steve Miletich, vice principal, Beverly Hills HS; Richard Spaulding, principal, Buena Park HS; Roger Weeks, principal, Sierra HS; Winston Nelson, superintendent, Pomona USD; Claud Hardesty, principal, Santa Barbara HS; Chet Shirk, principal, Anaheim HS; Alex Alexander, principal, Indio HS; Art Hobson, assistant superintendent, Whittier HSD; Keith Lee, principal, Dominguez HS; and Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans.

1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 25 as published in the May Monthly Bulletin.

2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Smedley Junior High and McFadden Junior High, both of Santa Ana, be admitted to associate membership in the CIF, Southern Section.

3. FOOTBALL REQUESTS—

a. It was moved, seconded and carried that for Eagle Mountain to qualify as a free lance entrant for the 1966 CIF, SS, Small Schools football play-offs Eagle Mountain may not lose more than two of the following seven games: Sept. 23, California School for the Deaf, Riverside; Sept. 30, Twin Pines; Oct. 14, Calipatria; Oct. 22, Ft. Irwin; Oct. 29, Imperial Valley; Nov. 4, Coachella Valley JV; and Nov. 12, Bailey School.

b. After reviewing the 1966 football schedule of Pater Noster HS, it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the 1966 CIF, SS, football play-offs, Pater Noster HS may not lose more than two of the following seven games on its schedule: Sept. 23, St. John Bosco; Sept. 29, Salesian; Oct. 7, Brawley; Oct. 14, Elsinore; Oct. 22, Burroughs of Ridgecrest; Nov. 5, Agoura; and Nov. 10, Glenn HS.

c. After reviewing the 1966 football schedule of Needles HS, it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to qualify for the 1966 CIF, SS, football play-offs, Needles HS may not lose more than two of the following seven games on its schedule: Sept. 30, Kennedy HS of Barstow; Oct. 7, Palo Verde; Oct. 14, Boulder City, Oct. 21, Calipatria; Oct. 29, Yucaipa; Nov. 4, Holtville; and Nov. 11, Twentynine Palms HS.

d. It was moved, seconded and carried to permit Big Pine HS to begin fall football practice on August 29, in order that they might play Tonopah, Nevada on September 17, without being in violation of CIF, SS, regulations. Permission was granted in order to assist Big Pine HS in completing a representative football schedule.

4. GYMNASICS PROGRAM—The Commissioner reported on the rapid development of the sport of gymnastics which has caused problems in leaguings schools fielding gymnastics teams. It was moved, seconded and carried to give the Commissioner authority to assist in the establishment of gymnastics leagues in the SS by combining schools from presently established leagues into specific gymnastic leagues.

5. ELIGIBILITY CASES—a. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny a request for waiver of the transfer rule in the case of Don Fell, a student at El Rancho HS.

b. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny a request for additional eligibility for Ralph Pichardo, a student at Santa Monica HS.

c. After reviewing supporting documents it was moved, seconded and carried to permit Arroyo HS to change the official birthdate of Carlos Ramirez, a Mexican citizen attending Arroyo HS, from August 4, 1947, to September 4, 1947. This would allow the boy one additional year of high school eligibility.

6. RELEAGUING—Chairman Ashton reported that his committee is currently working on relegating for the 1967-68 school year and would have a progress report to send to all schools during the opening week of school in the fall. The final determination of relegating will be done at the next Council meeting scheduled for Anaheim HS on September 24, 1966.

7. COMMISSIONER TO ATTEND MEETINGS—It was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the Commissioner to attend the following

meetings, with expenses paid, as the representative of the CIF, SS: Cal Poly workshop in August, 1966; National Federation Football Rules Meeting in Des Moines in January, 1967; and the National Federation Annual Meeting in June, 1967.

8. STATE CIF REPORT—State CIF Council member Keith Gunn reported on the June 4 meeting of the State Federated Council in Berkeley. Gunn noted that the State CIF had modified its 15-year old football age rule to permit boys under fifteen years to play on the regular high school team in new schools that are activated with only one or two grades. He also reported that the State Council had turned down the Southern Section's request to permit each section to determine the type of baseball rules a section would follow. He further stated that the Committee studying girls sports activities was recommending that the CIF assume the responsibility of providing leadership to girls interscholastic competition which is underway in many sections of California.

9. ELIGIBILITY RULES COMMITTEE REPORT—Commissioner Fagans reported that the committee on the revision of our present eligibility rules had met for the purpose of reviewing all proposed changes authorized by the Council to see that they are properly stated. A question arose concerning the eight semester rule and after studying the matter the committee found that our present rule permitting a graduate of the ninth grade of a junior HS to enjoy six semesters of competition in a senior HS, was unfair to the boy who repeated the ninth grade in a four year high school. To correct this inquiry it was recommended that a boy be limited to one year of athletic competition in the ninth grade of a junior HS. This change would mean all boys would have eight semesters of competition after completing the eighth grade.

10. JUNIOR HIGH MEMBERSHIP AND ATHLETIC PROGRAM—At the present time there are 76 junior high schools enjoying Associate membership in the CIF, SS. It was pointed out that most of these schools were leagued together in district leagues and in many cases were conducting their athletic programs in violation of existing CIF rules. There was also a question as to whether or not the \$15.00 fee established for annual dues for junior high schools was insufficient in line with the services they were receiving.

After discussing the matter the Executive Committee directed the Commissioner to call a meeting early this fall of representatives of our junior high school leagues for the purpose of reviewing with them all CIF regulations and policies relating to membership in the SS.

11. GOLF REGULATIONS — The Commissioner reported that after studying all phases of the problems relating to the competition of high school boys in amateur golf tournaments, that some revision should be made in our present rules to permit high school golfers to compete as unattached individuals in outside golf tournaments during the school year. At the present time they may compete in outside tournaments if the awards given are not in violation of our high school award rule. Unfortunately prizes offered in amateur golf tournaments generally violate our ten dollar award rule which means that our golfers may not compete in any outside amateur competition during the school year.

After considerable discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the following regulation be added to our Blue Book: "During the school year a high school golfer may compete in outside amateur competition where awards are in excess of the CIF awards rule if the boy has on file in the CIF office a signed statement indicating that he will not accept any award in violation of the CIF awards rule even if he should qualify for same." Such a statement must be signed and submitted for each individual competition the boy enters.

12. FALL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING — It was decided that the next meeting of the Executive Committee would be held at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, September 16, in the CIF office.

13. MAYFAIR HS REQUESTS INTERPRETATION OF CIF POLICY — Mayfair HS of the Suburban League sought an interpretation from the committee as to whether or not a league may take action which would deprive certain schools of that league from enjoying privileges granted by the CIF. After a thorough discussion of the matter the Executive Committee reaffirmed that leagues may adopt rules which are more restrictive than those of the CIF, Southern Section.

14. FINANCIAL REPORT — Treasurer Nelson informed the committee that although the fiscal year would not close until June 30, he was presenting a financial report showing estimated

income and expenditures of the CIF, SS, for the 1965-66 school year, as compared with the budget for the same period.

The treasurer then presented a proposed budget for the 1966-67 fiscal year. After discussing each item in detail and making certain minor changes, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the financial report and adopt the revised budget for the 1966-67 fiscal year. The Commissioner was directed to prepare copies of the Financial Report and Budget for distribution to all members of the Council at the September meeting.

Because of the tremendous growth of the Southern Section and the great increase in the number of employees, budget and financial matters are becoming more complex and difficult each year. In order to better solve these problems it was moved, seconded and carried to direct the Council president to appoint a standing committee, which would include the treasurer and Commissioner, whose responsibility would be to make recommendations to the Council and Executive Committee on insurance, retirement and other financial matters.

15. MINIMUM DUES — Because of increased services being provided by the Southern Section office it was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the minimum dues for all schools, Associate and Regular members, be increased from \$15.00 to \$25.00, effective with the 1966-67 school year.

16. DISTRIBUTION OF INCOME FROM CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES — Each year the CIF office expands its services to member schools. In keeping with this policy the SS beginning with the next school year will fully reimburse all commissioners in all outlying areas for the service they perform in assigning athletic officials for all interscholastic contests. In the past the CIF has only assisted in the paying of these men, which meant that leagues were required to pay the costs above and beyond the financial assistance provided by the CIF.

With services increasing and costs rising the committee was faced with the problem of finding additional revenue to meet the budget for next year. Not wishing to further burden the athletic budgets of our member schools it was the opinion of the committee that additional funds could be raised through a redistribution of the next receipts from the five championship football games and the basketball contests played at Long Beach.

At the present time the CIF receives one third of the net from all play-off games. It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that effective with the 1966-67 school year the CIF office would receive one half of the net profit from the championship game in each division of the football play-offs, with each participating school to receive 25%. In addition the CIF would receive one half of the net profit from the basketball games conducted in the Long Beach Arena on March 10, 11, 1967, with the balance being divided equally among the competing schools.

17. TERMS EXPIRE — With the conclusion of this meeting the Executive Committee terms of Charles Ronin, Roger Weeks, Claud Hardesty and Winston Nelson expire. On behalf of the CIF, SS, Chairman Ashton commended each man for his many contributions to the organization over the years. He also welcomed new members Chet Shirk, Alex Alexander, Art Hobson and Keith Lee to the committee.

18. ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN — It was moved, seconded and carried to cast a unanimous ballot for the election of Marion C. Hays as chairman of the CIF, SS, Executive Committee for the 1966-67 school year.

Chairman Hays praised Ashton for his committee leadership during his years as chairman.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 2 p.m.

Loara Dethrones San Marino for Small Schools Net Title

San Marino's bid for a fifth straight CIF Small Schools Tennis Championship was derailed by Anaheim's Loara High, 17 1/4 to 10 3/4, on the Loara courts on Friday, May 27.

Mike Cereseto, Loara's number two man, swept to four straight wins in his singles matches; Dick Harding and Dennis Kelly each won three of four for the Saxons and Scott Nagle captured two.

In doubles competition, Bob Simon and Craig Ruscult won three and tied one to clinch the title for Loara while Tom Normington and Jeff Franz played second doubles for the winners.

Loara captured 14 consecutive Invitational League matches during the 1966 season and was 28-0 during the past two years. Its JV team has a 55 match winning streak going into the 1967 season.

Thousand Oaks Sophomore, Fritz Naumetz, Fires 72 to Win Golf Championship

Fifteen-year-old sophomore Fritz Naumetz of Thousand Oaks High reigns as kingpin of CIF, SS, prep golfers for the 1966 season after firing a one-over-par 72 on the rugged and hilly Virginia Country Club in Long Beach on June 6 to capture the individual low-medal championship by a single-stroke.

Naumetz put together nines of 37-35 for his 72 total which included three birdies on the back nine and a scrambling par five on the last hole after his second shot hit a tree and rested some 210 yards from the green. Naumetz, a transfer from Arizona, rapped a four wood to the fringe of the green, rolled his 45-foot approach putt to within a foot and made the tap-in for the win.

A total of 95 golfers competed in the championship, low-medal, event managed by Sam Dimas, golf coach at Long Beach Poly and hosted by Monty Blodgett, professional at Virginia CC.

Greg Castleman of Montebello (also a sophomore) and Gary McCord of Ramona tied for second place with 73s and Rich Ziegler of Montebello, Steve Weakley of Claremont and Steve Cook of Wilson tied for fourth with 74s. In subsequent sudden death play-offs, Castleman three putted the first extra hole and lost second place to McCord's par.

Cook bogied the first hole and was eliminated, leaving Ziegler and Weakley to battle on for fourth place. Ziegler made short work of that task when he rapped in a 40-foot birdie putt on the second extra hole.

Long Beach Wilson, second place finisher in the team tournament, had five individuals in the first 11. Besides Cook, at 75 were Rich Rumbaugh, Steve Rohrer and Fred Good and at 76 was Paul Mattson.

Steve Bogan of Montebello, team tournament medalist at 69, slipped to a 79 in the individual event.
