## DR. REYNOLDS ASSUMES COUNCIL PRESIDENCY FOR 1969-70 TERM



### Dr. Russell Reynolds, Big Bear Principal, Assumes Council Presidency for 1969-70 Term

Dr. Russell R. Reynolds, principal of Big Bear High School, has been named the new CIF, SS, Council President for the 1969-70 school year.

Dr. Reynolds, Arrowhead League representative to the Council, will succeed Msgr. John J. Reilly of Mater Dei as Council President.

A graduate of Modesto High School and Modesto Junior College, Dr. Reynolds continued his education at Pepperdine College in Los Angeles, where he majored in English and physical education while playing basketball on coach "Duck" Dowell's 1951 and 1952 championship teams.

Following his graduation from Pepperdine in 1953, Dr. Reynolds accepted a teaching position at the college and assisted Dowell with the Wave basketball teams until 1958 when he moved to Big Bear High School to become head basketball coach and athletic director.

In 1960, Dr. Reynolds became assistant principal at Big Bear and served in that capacity until 1962, when he was named principal. In 1964, he assumed the duties as assistant superintendent of the Bear Valley Unified School District in addition to his position as principal at Big Bear.

### BILL GILL RECEIVES NATIONAL "COACH OF THE YEAR" AWARD

Bill Gill, former Centennial High track coach, was named the first annual Coach of the Year by the National High School Sports Foundation in June.

Bill, who coached at Centennial for 15 years and currently serves as supervisor for track and field for the Centinela Valley School District, was presented the award for his "overall coaching record and contribution to the sport of track and field." He received his award in a special ceremony in San Francisco.

Three of Gill's athletes in his 15-year stay at Centennial achieved national renown. Charlie Dumas set a national interscholastic high jump record of 6-9½ and went on to become the first man to clear seven feet. Preston Griffin set a national 100-yard dash mark of 9.4, and Edesel Garrison established a new State prep record of 46.7 in the 440, which was broken in 1969 by Larence Jones of Lemoore.

Gill's teams won three State championships and five CIF, SS, titles, as well as garnering eight league titles in 15 years. Bill's overall coaching record for league competition during his stay at Centennial was 83-10.

Bill started his coaching career at Caruthers High School near Fresno

**MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING, JULY 10, 1969**

The July meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich, at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 10, 1969, at the Stardust Hotel in Las Vegas. This meeting was held in conjunction with the National Federation of State High Schools annual Convention.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, vice-principal, Beverly Hills HS; Keith Lee, principal, Yucca Valley HS; Msgr. Kiefer, principal, Bishop Amat HS; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley HS; Lou Joseph, principal, Desert HS; James Faul, principal, Workman HS; Alex Alexander, Assistant Superintendent, Indio Unified District; and Commissioner of Athletics, Ken Fagans. William Russell, State CIF Commissioner was a guest at the meeting.

1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the Minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 19, 1969, as published in the April, 1969, Monthly Bulletin.

2. SCHEDULES EVALUATED—The Football schedules of Canyon and Los Angeles Baptist High Schools were evaluated for possible entry into the 1969 football playoffs. Because the teams from both of these schools were meeting both large and small schools,

it was impossible for the committee to properly evaluate their schedules. It was, therefore, moved, seconded and carried that both school's season record would be evaluated next fall by the Football Play-off Committee for possible inclusion in the 1969 CIF Football Play-offs.

3. EARLY SEASON FOOTBALL GAME—Because of scheduling difficulties El Centro High School requested permission to play a game against Kofa High School of Arizona, on Saturday, September 13, 1969. In order to comply with CIF rules, El Centro High School must complete fourteen (14) days of team practice prior to its first game. El Centro High School indicated that if they are permitted to count the five days allocated for physical conditioning, they could meet this requirement prior to September 13.

It was moved, seconded and carried to grant permission to El Centro High School to schedule Kofa High School for a football game on Saturday, September 13, 1969.

4. TWO-CAMPUS SCHOOL—Because of a lack of capital funds necessary to continue to build additional units on its present campus, Chaminade Prep requested permission to house its 9th grade students on a separate campus, and still have them participate on the high school athletic teams. Although the new campus is located four miles from the present campus, it will be an integral part of the present school, with the same principal, administration and many of the same faculty who will travel back and forth.

After reviewing the situation, it was the opinion of the Executive Committee that 9th grade students from the new campus would be eligible to participate on the athletic teams from the old campus.

5. PAIRING OF TEAMS FOR CIF PLAY-OFFS—A communication from the Sky League indicated that their league favored a change in the present policy of pairing teams for first-round play-off games. It was the Sky League's opinion that travel distance between play-off schools was of secondary importance and that teams in the same geographical area should not be paired against each other.

The committee discussed the problem and felt that it was one that should be decided by the Play-off Committee in various sports. It was, therefore,

moved, seconded and carried to refer this matter to the Football Play-Off Committee for consideration.

6. COMMISSIONER TO ATTEND MEETINGS—It was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the Commissioner to attend the following meetings, with expenses paid, as the representative of the CIF, SS: Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo) Workshop in August, 1969; National Federation Football Rules Meeting, in Chicago, in January, 1970; and the National Federation Convention in Seattle in June, 1970.

7. FALL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING—In order to speedily handle eligibility cases arising with the opening of the 1969-70 school year, it was decided to schedule an Executive Committee meeting on Thursday, September 18th, in the CIF, SS, office.

8. COUNCIL MEETINGS—The following dates and sites were established for meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Council for the 1969-70 school year:

The fall meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, September 27, at Buena Park High School.

The winter meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, January 31, 1970, at Gehr High School.

The spring Council meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 2, 1970, at Beverly Hills High School.

9. FOOTBALL SCRIMMAGE—Because of a religious holiday, Beverly Hills HS cannot schedule its interschool scrimmage on Saturday, September 13, 1969. Beverly Hills High School, therefore, requested permission to begin practice in full gear on Monday, September 1, 1969, in order that they could get in the required number of dates of practice prior to their first interscholastic scrimmage. After reviewing the problem, it was moved, seconded and carried to permit Beverly Hills and St. Anthony High School to begin practice in full equipment on Monday, September 1, so they could conduct their interschool scrimmage on Friday, September 12, 1969.

10. ARROYO GRANDE HIGH SCHOOL—A communication was read from Arroyo Grande High School which indicated that they had changed their administrative organization to provide that the Crown Hill 9th grade

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campus would have a unit principal with the authority for the campus resting with the principal of the Valley Road campus. They requested permission to permit the 9th grade students on the Crown Hill campus to compete on athletic teams with the students from the Valley Road campus.

Because Arroyo Grande High School was complying with CIF regulations, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the participation on athletic teams representing Arroyo Grande High School by students from both the Crown Hill and Valley Road campus.

**11. ELIGIBILITY CASES—**

A. It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule to permit Gerald DeWitt to be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at El Dorado High School, effective September, 1969.

B. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny the request of Dos Pueblos High School to waive our Eight Semester rule in order to permit Steve Blois to have an additional year of eligibility for athletics at Dos Pueblos High School.

C. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny the request of Alemany High School to waive our residence rule in order to permit Dave Zenk to be eligible for athletics at Alemany High School.

12. COMPETITION WITH MEXICAN HIGH SCHOOL—A request was received from Imperial High School to schedule a football game on November 8 with Mexicali High School, which is located just across the border. The game would be played at Imperial High School under existing CIF, SS, rules and regulations. It was moved, seconded and carried that because of scheduling difficulties, Imperial High School be granted permission to schedule a football game with Mexicali High School on November 8, 1969.

13. ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT—After considering over 75 applications for the position of Administrative Assistant in the Southern Section office, the Personnel Committee recommended to the Executive Committee that Mr. Lou Joseph, principal of Desert High School, be offered the position. Mr. Joseph appeared before the Committee and indicated that he would be most pleased to accept the position under the conditions outlined by the Personnel Committee.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that Mr. Lou Joseph be employed, effective August 1, 1969, as Administrative Assistant in the Southern Section office, at an annual salary of \$16,500.00. At the end of six months of employment, Mr. Joseph will meet with the Personnel Committee to initiate some mutually satisfactory type of retirement program.

14. FINANCIAL REPORT AND BUDGET PROPOSAL—Treasurer Lee informed the committee that although all of the bills for the fiscal year had not yet been paid, he was presenting a financial report showing estimated income and expenditures of the CIF, SS, for the 1968-69 school year, as compared with the budget for the same period.

The report indicated that revenues and expenses were pretty much as anticipated and the final report should show a net gain for the fiscal year, of approximately \$3,000.00.

The Treasurer then presented a proposed budget for the 1969-70 fiscal year. After discussing each item in detail, and making certain minor changes, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the financial report and adopt the revised budget for the 1969-70 fiscal year.

Upon completion of the Auditor's report, the Commissioner will prepare copies of the financial report and budget for distribution to all principals.

15. BENNY FRIEDMAN SUMMER FOOTBALL CAMP—Benny Friedman, owner and operator of the Benny Friedman Quarterback Camp, appeared before the committee to request that CIF, Southern Section, regulations be modified in order to permit boys from Southern Section high schools to attend sessions of his Quarterback camp, scheduled for the current summer vacation period.

Mr. Friedman explained the purpose of his camp and went over the type of instruction offered. Members of the committee then questioned Mr. Friedman concerning certain aspects of his Quarterback Camp.

A discussion of the problem indicated that attendance at Mr. Friedman's camp violated CIF, SS, regulations, and because they were part of our By-Laws the Executive Committee did not have the authority to set them aside. The Committee did recommend, however, that the Commissioner study our present rule in the hopes that it could be modified to permit high

school boys to attend diversified summer sports camps without jeopardizing their eligibility for interscholastic athletics.

16. ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN—It was moved, seconded and carried to cast a unanimous ballot for the reelection of Steve Miletich as Chairman of the CIF, SS, Executive Committee for the 1969-70 school year.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

**THIRD TIME A CHARM AS BISHOP AMAT TOPS ST. PAUL FOR "AAA" BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP**

After suffering two defeats at the hands of Angelus League champion St. Paul, Bishop Amat made the third match count as the Lancers came from behind to notch a 2-1 victory over the Swordsmen and annex the 1969 CIF, SS, "AAA" baseball championship at Cerritos College.

The Swordsmen, who had relied on the outstanding pitching of Greg Zail to win the Angelus League title over the Lancers, scored first in the title match and, going into the sixth inning, appeared to have the game under control.

However, the Lancers rallied in the top of the sixth and Manny Estrada punched a two-run triple to put the visitors on top. Estrada had been the leading offensive star for Bishop Amat

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all season, holding a .520 batting average.

In the bottom of the seventh, St. Paul threatened, loading the bases with none out. After a force-out at the plate, St. Paul's Rudy Ernst ripped a fly ball to center.

Gary Grouch fielded the ball and relayed it to shortstop Estrada, who fired a "strike" to catcher Paul Barthelme who tagged out the sliding Gary Anderson to end the threat and give coach Pat Holligan his second straight CIF, SS, title. The Lancers won the "AA" crown in 1968.

St. Paul, top-seeded in the "AAA" playoffs, eliminated Lompoc, Loara and Serra enroute to the title match, while Bishop Amat knocked off Northview, Neff, El Segundo and Corona del Mar to gain its championship berth.

## AUSTIN WINS TENNIS CROWN; MCGILVRAY-CLARKE CAPTURE DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

Rolling Hills ace Jeff Austin survived a semi-final round scare by Fullerton's John Andrews to emerge as the 1969 CIF, SS, tennis singles champion while Mark McGilvray and Kevin Clarke of San Marino teamed to win the doubles title in action at the Balboa Bay Club Racquet Club.

Austin, who had eliminated his previous opponents and had only lost four games enroute to the semi-finals, found himself in trouble against Andrews, who won the first set, 6-3.

But Austin came back and captured the second and third sets by 6-3 and 6-2 margins to advance to the championships against Tim Ott of Bishop Montgomery. Austin defeated Ott in 6-1 and 6-0 sets to win his title.

McGilvray and Clarke had a rather easy time of it in doubles competition as the San Marino duo was never extended to three sets in winning their championship.

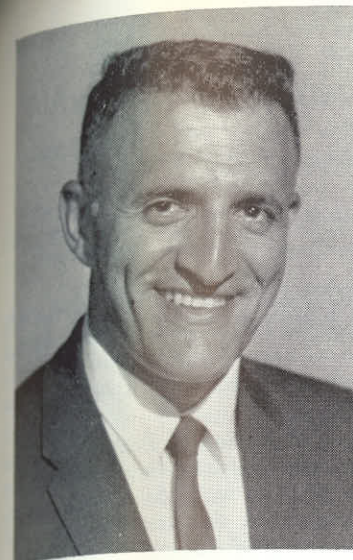
## FERREN CHRISTENSEN BEGINS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TERM

## NEW ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT EMPLOYED BY CIF, SS, OFFICE

An increasing volume of work in the CIF, SS, office brought about by rapid growth of the interscholastic athletic program in Southern California has prompted the employment of an Administrative Assistant in the CIF, SS, office, to relieve the Commissioner in his day-to-day administration of the CIF, SS, program.

When Commissioner Fagans came to the CIF, SS, there were approximately 200 schools in the Southland, and the annual budget for the CIF, SS, was less than \$30,000. In 15 years, the number of schools in the organization has risen to over 440, and the budget has increased to more than \$160,000 annually, with an accompanying increase in services to member schools.

For these reasons, the Executive Committee authorized, last spring, the employment of an Administrative Assistant, to relieve some of the burden of the Commissioner's job.

More than 70 applications were received for the position, from highly-qualified persons in every field of athletic administration. After much deliberation, the Personnel Committee recommended the employment of Lou Joseph, longtime Southland administrator.

Lou has had experience as a player, coach, athletic director, vice principal, principal, and member of the Executive Committee, and is extremely well-versed in CIF operation.

Joseph comes to the CIF, SS, office from Desert High School, where he served as principal. His career in Southland administration spans 20 years since he began teaching at St. Anthony High in Long Beach in 1949.

A graduate of Compton High, where he starred in basketball, Lou graduated from the University of Nevada. He served as a teacher, coach and administrator at Whaley Jr. High in Compton, Compton High and Dominguez High, as well as at Desert.

In addition to his service on the CIF, SS, Executive Committee during the 1968-69 school year, Lou was Coast League representative to the Council from 1960 until 1962.

Married, Lou is the father of two sons and two daughters—Mark, 9; Victoria, 8; John, 7, and Elizabeth, 2.

With his background in administration of athletics, it shouldn't be long before Mr. Joseph will be able to assist administrators and coaches with eligibility and rules interpretations as well as representing the CIF, SS, at various Southland functions.

## MILLIKAN RAMS WIN "AAAA" BASEBALL CROWN IN HISTORY-MAKING TWINBILL AT DODGER STADIUM

Millikan's Rams lived up to top-seeded expectations in the 1969 CIF, SS, "AAAA" baseball play-offs as they used a seven-run outburst in the fifth inning to turn back a determined Santa Fe bid for the title, 9-2, at Dodger Stadium.

The match, played as part of a history-making doubleheader at Dodger Stadium, was the highlight to the first-ever CIF, SS, "AAAA" division baseball play-offs.

Santa Fe, which has never won a CIF, SS, title in any sport, jumped out to a 2-0 lead after three innings when John Connelly rapped a two-run double off relief pitcher Dave Frost.

However, Frost settled down, allowing only one hit after the third stanza, and the Rams got untracked to score seven runs in the fifth inning to ice the contest, played before 7,142 fans.

Coach Bob Myers' Rams, winning their second CIF, SS, baseball title (the first was in 1967), sent 13 men to the plate in the fifth frame, parlaying four singles, four walks and a Santa Fe miscue into seven runs to break the ball game wide open.

The error turned out to be the big play of the inning as, with runners on first and second, Millikan's Steve Derian layed down a bunt. The throw to third was too hot to handle, and Ken Marshall came in to score the Rams' first run, setting the pace for the remainder of the game.

Millikan added tallies in the sixth and seventh innings but, with Frost turning back Santa Fe with nearly flawless relief pitching, the runs were merely icing on the cake.

Phil Pence took hitting honors for the champions, collecting three hits and driving in two runs.

Millikan eliminated Santa Barbara, South Torrance, Ventura and Arcadia enroute to the championship while Santa Fe knocked off Newport, Kennedy (Buena Park), Camarillo and Lakewood to gain its finals berth.
