Reverend Lawrence Dunphy, a naof the Southland, has taken over uses as president of the CIF, SS, suncil, representing the Camino Real ague and St. Bernard High school Playa del Rey.

Reverend Dunphy grew up in the Angeles area and following graduton from high school he entered St. ha's College and Major Seminary in marillo. He was ordained a Catholic test in 1955.

After a year at a Los Angeles parish, was appointed to St. Paul High

School in Santa Fe Springs.

In January of 1957 Reverend Dunphy was named assistant principal and athletic director at St. Paul and served in that capacity for 10 years. In 1967, Reverend Dunphy became assistant principal at St. Bernard and was moved up to the principalship two years later.

Along with his duties as CIF council president and council representative for the Camino Real League, he also serves as an officer in the Catholic Athletic Association.

During his time at St. Paul he was active in both the old Parochial League and the Angelus League, having served as president of both leagues for a number of years.

Rev. Dunphy received his M.A. degree from Immaculate Heart College and holds California state credentials for both teaching and administrative duties.

Rev. Dunphy succeeds Don Cogswell, Mira Costa HS vice-principal, as council president, the position having rotated according to alphabetical listing of leagues as stipulated in the CIF, SS constitution. He'll preside at the first of the year's three meetings, Saturday Sept. 25 at Arcadia HS.

MAKE ROOM FOR THE LADIES!

The CIF, SS is well on its way toward organizing the girls athletic program in Southland high schools, with the formation of the Girls Interscholastic Advisory Board, (GIAB) chaired by Alex Alexander.

Mr. Alexander, principal of Desert Sands High School in the Indio district, has been a member of the CIF Executive Committee for five years and is also one of four Southern Section representatives to the state federated council, where he serves on the state-level committee on girls interscholastic athletics.

Other members of the GIAB include Phyllis Blatz of Chaffey High School (Ontario), Bobbie Diehl, Rio Mesa High School (Oxnard), Eloise Longwell, South High School (Torrance), and Betty Staley, Lowell High School (La Habra). Male members include Roy Lockwood, Burbank High School, Joe Merlo, Sonora High School (La Habra) and Bill O'Rourke, Rolling Hills High School.

On hand at the June organizational meeting also was Genevieve Dexter of the state department of education.

The GIAB, as outlined by commissioner Ken Fagans, will serve the girls interscholastic program in a similar capacity to the Executive Committee on the boys side. The Girls' Athletic Commission would be made up of a representative from each member league and be similar to the SS Council in function.

Four important points were listed by Administrative Assistant Tom Morgan regarding the formative period for girls interscholastic athletics. Firstly, all schools within the Southern Section, including all-girl schools, will be invited by letter this month to join the Girls Interscholastic Division of the CIF, SS. No cost will be involved for the 1971-72 school year and schools may join either as members of existing leagues or as free lance teams.

Morgan emphasized that there are no plans of any kind to reorganize any existing girls leagues. He also said that there is no anticipation of proposals to structure girls leagues along same alignments as boys leagues.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF CIF, SS, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE June 19, 1971

The June meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 19, 1971, at the Riviera Hotel in Palm Springs, California.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, Vice-Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Rev. Lawrence Dunphy, President of Southern Section Council, Principal, St. Bernard High School; Keith Lee, Treasurer of Southern Section Council, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Alex Alexander, Principal, Desert Sands High School; Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; Richard Cordano, Principal, Arcadia High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Msgr. 1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of March 27, 1971, as published in the April Monthly Bulletin.

2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve applications for regular membership in the CIF, Southern Section, for Mountain View High School of El Monte, and for associate membership for St. Vincent's Seminary of Montebello, effective with the beginning of the 1971-72 school year.

3. EVALUATION OF SCHED-ULES, LOS ANGELES BAPTIST HIGH SCHOOL. The 1971-72 football and basketball schedules of Los Angeles Baptist High School were evaluated for possible entry into the CIF, SS, post-season championship playoffs. It was moved, seconded, and passed that the football team must win at least five of its last seven scheduled games and that the basketball team must win at least eight of its last 11 scheduled games in order to qualify for free lance entry into the playoffs.

4. ELIGIBILITY CASES. After careful consideration of each case, it was moved, seconded, and passed to waive the Residence or Transfer Rule to permit the following students to be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics:

athletics at other than the varsity level 5. REQUEST FOR CHANGE IN PLAYOFF GROUPINGS, SKY LEAGUE. The Commissioner in formed the Executive Committee that he had received a formal request from the Sky League to be reassigned from the AAA to the AAAA division in playoff groupings for the sports of baseball and basketball for the 1971-72 school year. Since these groupings were originally announced on April 19 and approved by the CIF, SS, Council at its meeting of May 1, 1971, it was the opinion of the Executive Committee that this request for change from the Sky League was received too late and would create inequities in the alignments of leagues for these sports if adjustments were to be made at this time. It was moved, seconded, and passed to deny this request, and to inform the Sky League that the matter would be reconsidered for the following 1972-73 school year if the request

were received in time for action by the

Council at its May meeting.

6. REQUEST TO PARTICIPATE IN ARKANSAS BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT, LOS ANGELES BAPTIST HIGH SCHOOL. The Executive Committee received a request from Los Angeles Baptist High School for permission to participate in the first annual National Christian High School Holiday Basketball Tournament to be held in January, 1972, at John Brown University, Siloam Springs, Arkansas. At the present time, State CIF rules would prohibit the scheduling of an athletic activity if a school's opponent is located at a dist ance of greater than 300 miles. Dis cussion was held concerning the matter, and while it was noted that the State Federated Council is currently considering a change in this travel limitation, the Committee felt that it could not properly authorize the rec-

FOOTBALL TEAM, ARROW-EAD LEAGUE. The Arrowhead ague, through a letter submitted by representative, Mr. Russell Reyn-(Principal, Big Bear High (hool), requested permission to field B football teams for league comention during the 1971-72 school This would be contrary to the licy adopted by the CIF, SS, Council May 1, 1971, which stipulated that shall teams below the Varsity-JV must be classified according to de level on a one-year experimental is for the 1971 season. The Arrow-League listed several factors hich it felt were unique to its particusituation and would justify such a quest. The Executive Committee rewed the situation in detail, and conded that the league should comply the Council's ruling and field a mior varsity or grade level team other than a Class B team. The Comtree recognized the league's probems, but was of the opinion that these ald be resolved within the framework existing rules and regulations. It s further stated that exceptions of s type would not be in the best intests of the intent of the new policy, was to provide necessary inforaution and experience with the operaon of the grade level system for all thools and leagues in order to propby evaluate the matter of exponents grade level competition.

8. AREA COMMISSIONERS OF OFFICIALS. The Commissioner remed that he had recently conducted annual meeting with the CIF, SS, trea Commissioners of Officials. From the meeting, the following recommentations were presented for consideration by the Executive Committee:

in by the Executive Committee: a) Travel Pay - Problems have developed in some outlying areas where officials have not been reimbursed for excessive travel expense a connection with their assigned games. It was recommended that Paragraph 6 of Article XXXIII Officials' Fees) of the CIF, SS, Blue Book be amended to read as follows: In outlying areas of the CIF, Southern Section, where offitals must travel more than 50 miles ound-trip, an amount not to exceed Per mile, round-trip, shall be paid or one car. The Committee moved, econded, and passed to adopt this mendment.

b) Time Limit, JV and Frosh-

Soph Baseball Games-Baseball officials in all areas have experienced difficulties with JV and Frosh-Soph games lasting an excessively long time because of reasons attributable mainly to the variable calibres of competition at these levels. It was suggested that a two-hour time limit be placed on all baseball games other than varsity, so that no inning shall begin after two hours from the start of the contest has elapsed. The Committee moved, seconded, and passed to refer this matter to the Council with the recommendation that the leagues be encouraged to adopt this rule for their baseball competition at other than the varsity level.

c) Officials for Sanctioned Events - Attention was called to the fact that many sanctioned events are being conducted without qualified officials being assigned by the Area Commissioner, as required in paragraph 6(A) of Article XXXI (Area Commissioners of Officials) of the Blue Book. Sponsoring schools have instead secured officials on their own for these activities, and in some cases the officials have not been qualified or acceptable according to CIF, SS, standards. The Committee moved, seconded, and passed to make the policy uniform for all CIF, SS, assigning agencies to be responsible for the coordination of assignments of officials for sanctioned events (i.e., all tournaments, and invitational swim and track meets). The Committee further authorized that this policy be included in the Blue Book and placed on the sanctioned event application form when a new form is printed; in the meantime, the CIF, SS, Office should notify all sponsoring schools of this policy at the time their applications are approved.

9. SPORTS SCHEDULES, PIO-NEER LEAGUE. The Executive Committee was informed of requests made recently by the Pioneer League to the athletic councils of the Ocean and Sky Leagues inquiring about possible inclusion in competition during the 1971-72 school year for the sports of swimming, tennis, water polo, and wrestling. Because of the fact that all member schools in the Pioneer League do not field teams in these four sports, there are at the present time just three schools with swimming and water polo teams and four schools with tennis and wrestling teams. The Ocean and Sky Leagues had denied these requests, however, based on the fact that schedules in these sports had already been adopted for next year and it would create a hardship to adjust them at this time. The Committee discussed

the matter, and reaffirmed that it was the responsibility of the CIF, SS, to attempt to provide, whenever possible, league competition for member schools in those sports in which all schools in leagues do not participate; however, it was also felt that since the requests from the Pioneer League were not made until May, that consideration should be given to the schedules which have already been established by the Ocean and Sky Leagues. The Committee then moved, seconded, and passed to make the following recommendations: 1) That the Pioneer League schools free lance in water polo for the 1971 season because of the difficulty of adjusting schedules at this date; 2) That Ocean and Sky League representatives meet during the fall, 1971, and include the Pioneer League schools in their swimming schedules for league competition for the 1972 season; 3) That the Pioneer League conduct its own competition during the 1971-72 school year in the sports of tennis and wrestling since there are four schools which participate in these sports; and 4) That for the 1972-73 school year, the Bay, Ocean, and Sky Leagues would be obligated to provide Pioneer League schools with league opportunities in the sports of swimming, tennis, water polo, and wrestling, according to procedures agreed upon by the four affected leagues.

10. COACHES' CERTIFICATION. A request was made to the Executive Committee to have the position of teacher's aid added to the list of qualified assistant coaches in paragraph 2 of Article XXXVI (Coaches' Certification) of the Blue Book. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded, and passed to table the matter in order to obtain additional information and to review the California Education Code for verification of the positions which are included in each category as itemized in paragraph 2.

11. WRESTLING TAKEDOWN TOURNAMENTS. The Executive Committee was advised of the need for some type of control to be established governing the conduct of wrestling takedown tournaments. These tournaments have received special classification in the past because of their different type of competition format, and as such have not been counted against the allowable number of team wrestling matches. However, because so many of these takedown tournaments are now being conducted, it has become necessary to develop guidelines for participation by member schools. The Committee discussed the matter, and moved, seconded, and passed to limit each school to partici-

pation in one wrestling takedown tournament each season. It was further suggested that a committee be formed to study the impact and reaction to this new rule as a basis for making future recommendations regarding these tour-

12. SUMMER SCHOOL FOOT-BALL ACTIVITY. The Commissioner advised the Executive Committee that the CIF, SS, Office had received numerous requests for interpretations of the recent rule passed by the Council which now permits a unit of football activity, for the purpose of teaching fundamentals, skills, and techniques for the sport, to be included as part of a regular summer school physical education class. Member schools had inquired as to clarification of the intent of this rule as applied to summer school physical education class activities which they had planned. The Committee discussed this matter at length, and issued the following official clarification as a guideline for the conduct of football activity in summer school classes:

"It is the opinion of the Executive Committee that this rule was modified in order to provide an opportunity for the basic skills and techniques of the sport of football to be offered as a unit or part of the instruction during a regular summer school physical education class; it was in no way designed to permit or devise an opportunity for football teams to conduct practice during the

"With this purpose in mind, and with the intent of protecting the concept of the total physical education program during summer school instruction, the following additional points of clarification are outlined to aid member schools in planning and developing their particular programs:

- 1. A physical education class involving football activity must be held within the schedule of the school's regular summer school program, providing that no class of this type shall begin later than 2:00 p.m. Any class held after 2:00 p.m. may include physical conditioning and/or weight lifting, but it may not include football activity;
- 2. No equipment other than foot-balls and football shoes will be allowed at any time;
- 3. No more than one half of the allotted class time may be spent on football activity (This is based upon the normal physical education sum-

mer school class which has an allotted time of 60 hours for which a maximum of five units of credit are given, which means that only 30 hours of this class may be used for football activity);

4. Because this class is to be taught as part of the summer school curriculum, regular credential rules will apply for all assigned instructors."

Other than the rule for summer school physical education classes explained above, all existing CIF, SS, regulations pertaining to summer football activity remain in effect as listed in paragraph 33 of Article XXXXIII (Football Regulations) on page 69 of the Blue Book.

The Committee further advised that the experience of conducting football activity in summer school classes this year should be considered as an evaluative program to be reviewed and studied for the purpose of making recommendations for the future to the Council at its September meeting. The Commissioner was directed to prepare a questionnaire to be sent to all member schools in order to solicit reaction to this new rule from physical education instructors and administrators.

13. CLARIFICATION OF ACA-DEMIC REQUIREMENTS. The Executive Committee was asked to interpret the effect of CIF, SS, interscholastic athletic eligibility requirements as applied to an innovative curriculum adopted by the Maricopa Unified School District in which students are allowed to work at their own pace and may complete a course in less than or more than a semester and no grade lower than "C" is ever given for any course. The Committee was of the opinion that interscholastic athletic eligibility standards should be maintained separate from the school's other academic standards in cases such as this, and that it should be the responsibility of the Principal involved to determine whether or not a boy would be declared eligible according to the scholastic requirements defined in Article X of the Blue Book. It was moved, seconded, and passed to request Maricopa to design a method consistent with current CIF, SS, scholastic requirements by which athletic eligibility might be determined for students involved in its curriculum, and to submit this recommendation for approval to the Executive Committee at the earliest possible date.

It was also moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the Council that a section be added to Article X of the Blue Book to require that all schools employing innovative curriculum patterns or philosophies of grading (i.e., modular, flexible, daily demand) submit suggested requirements for athletic eligibility for their particular lar systems, based on current established lished standards, to the Executive Committee for approval. It was further passed that a committee be formed to study this matter for the purpose of revising CIF, SS, eligibility requirements in order to encompass these types of special curriculum patterns.

14. GOLF TOURNAMENTS RANEY JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL AND SAN GABRIEL HIGH SCHOOL. Special permission was requested from the Executive Committee to begin the following golf tournaments at earlier than the normal 3:00 p.m. starting time for sanctioned events held on school days:

a) Raney Junior High School Invitational Golf Tournament, April 24 or May 1 (exact date to be determined), 1972, starting time: 12 Noon;

b) Alhambra City Golf Tourna. ment, sponsored by San Gabriel High School, March 1, 2, and 3 1972, starting time: 2:00 p.m.

It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve these requests in order to assure completion of these tournaments prior to darkness.

15. AUTHORIZATION TO AT-TEND MEETINGS. It was moved. seconded, and passed to approve travel expenses for the Commissioner to attend the following meetings as a representative of the CIF, Southern Section: 1) Cal Poly Workshop, August. 1971; 2) National Football Rules Meeting, January, 1972; and 3) National Federation Meeting, July, 1972.

16. SUMMER COACHING AC TIVITIES. The Commissioner informed the Executive Committee of problems which have developed because of unofficial scrimmages and other activities being conducted by member schools in sports other than football between June 1 and the close of school. Current CIF, SS, rules state that from June 1 until the opening day of school in the fall semester, there shall be no restriction on high school coaches working with high school boys in these sports. However, because activities such as inter-school scrimmages are being held prior to the close of school, questions are raised with regard to the liability and responsibility of the schools involved. Member schools may not, acording to CIF, SS, regulations, be responsible for teams entering or competing in summer competition such as this outside of the season of the sport. This includes payment of entry fees, use of equipment, transportation, insurance, etc. In order to attempt to avoid the recurrance of (Continued on Page 5)

FOOTBALL RULES CHANGES NOTED

Two rules changes involving the goalposts highlight the list of 13 rule differences from the 1970 football rules listed in the 1971 National Federation rule

The decorating of crossbars or uprights above the crossbar with any material is prohibited. Also the goal is near five and a half feet wider (23 feet, 4 inches) at the crossbar, with the distance between the outside edges of the uprights not to exceed 24 feet.

Rule differences:

1-2-7: Specifies the length of the crossbar and where height is to be measured. 1-2-8: Prohibits the use of decorative material on the crossbar and uprights above the crossbar.

2-1-2: Correlates definition of player possession with definition of catch. 2-3-1: Defines a catch as the act of establishing player possession of a live ball in flight and includes definitions of interception and recovery.

2-3-2: Specifies that a fair catch must be made beyond K's line and between the goal lines.

2-3-4: Defines a simultaneous catch or recovery as one in which there is joint control of a live ball by opposing players inbounds.

2-28: Defines spearing as deliberately and maliciously driving the helmet into a player after his forward progress has been stopped. 3-1-2: Provides for shortening a period or periods in any emergency at any

time by agreement of the opposing captains and the referee. 3-1-4: Authorizes the crew of officials to suspend a game when weather conditions are construed to be hazardous to life or limb of the participants.

9-1-3: Prohibits a defensive player from adding momentum to the charge of a teammate who is on the line of scrimmage by shoving him.

9-3-1i: Provides that whenever the ball becomes dead in possession of a runner, it is unsportsmanlike conduct for him to intentionally kick it, spike it into the ground, or throw it into the air or from the field of play, or fail to place the ball on the ground or return it to a nearby official.

9-6-1b: Permits coach-player conferences during the intermission between the 1st and 2nd, and 3rd and 4th periods.

10-2-4: Provides that when a dead ball foul follows a down during which there was a double foul, penalty for dead ball foul is separately administered.
