

#### COMMISSIONER'S CORNER



The Responsibility Is Ours

The CIF-Southern Section Blue Book does not include all aspects of those good practices, codes of ethics, etc., that should be adhered to in the conduct of our programs.

There appears to be among some, the idea that if CIF, Southern Section or National Federation rules, do not specifically prohibit a course of action, that such action is therefore legitimate. This simplified attitude is particularly dangerous in the opinion of this office when it involves the health and safety of the young people committed to our

For example, nowhere in the Blue Book is there a specific rule indicating that youngsters should not be intimidated into playing when serious illness should preclude same; nowhere specifically in our rules is there a restriction that would prohibit a youngster from pitching three full baseball games on consecutive days; or nowhere specifically is there in our bylaws a rule which would prohibit a 98 pound, 13 year old freshman from engaging in head on tackling practice at 30 yards with a 230 pound, 18 year old all-CIF

I point out these admittedly crude examples to stress the point that principals, administrators of athletic programs and coaches have a very real responsibility which transcends any set of regulations constructed by the league, the Southern Section, the State, or National governing bodies, and that is to exercise the most careful judgment in limiting those actions which most reasonable people would agree are dangerous to the health and safety of young people.

Those individuals who would plead such excuses as "Well, other people are doing it.", or "I didn't see anything in the Blue Book against it.", are missing the entire point of this article, and that is the over-riding consideration that we as educators must maintain is for the health and safety of those young people given to our care.

# MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING JUNE 20, 1977

The Executive Committee meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman Lou Joseph at 8:00 a.m., Monday, June 20, 1977, in the Costa Mesa Room of the Registry Hotel, Irvine. All members were present with the exceptions of Mr. Steve Miletich and Mr. Gene Hartley. Also in attendance were new members Mr. Bob Packer and Mr. Moe Chavez.

1. **MINUTES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 21, 1977, as published in the May/June issue of the Monthly Bulletin.

2. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR REPORT: Mr. Clare Van Hoorebeke, representative to the Executive Committee, gave a brief report from the respective areas with a major concern centering on the season of sport calendar.

3. SUPERINTENDENTS' RE-PORT: Dr. Lowell Jackson, representative to the Executive Committee, and Commissioner Thomas A. Byrnes presented a capsule preview on the planned superintendent's symposium designed as an orientation to the CIF-SS, scheduled for October, 1977.

4. **COMMUNICATIONS:** Chairman Lou Joseph provided background information and read a communique from the Kalos Kagathos Foundation and its chairman, Mr. Bruce Hopping, expressing a sincere note of thanks to the CIF-SS for its continued support in working with the Foundation and its programs.

5. **MEETING DATES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the calendar for Council and Executive Committee meetings on the 1977-78 school year as amended.

6. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR REPORT: Mrs. Barbara Wilson, representative to the Executive Committee, reported on the successful spring playoffs in the Girls' sports of swimming, gymnastics, badminton, track and field, softball and participation by member schools at the All-CIF awards presentations.

7. SAN ANTONIO LEAGUE RE-PORT: Mr. Joe Deal presented a review of the due process appeal by Chino High School, relative to one of its soccer players and the outside competition rule during the season of sport. This was an informational item with the San Antonio League sustaining its original findings.

8. **FOOTBALL CONFLICT:** It was moved, seconded and passed that the second round of the 1977 football play-

offs be conducted on Saturday, November 26 due to a conflict with the nationally televised game between USC and UCLA on Friday, November 25

9. **VIOLATIONS:** The Commissioner apprised the Executive Committee of the possibility of levying fines as another alternative in the penalty phase for violations of the CIF-SS rules and provided background information on current implementation in some leagues and in other state associations. Following discussion, the Chair was directed to appoint a committee to develop a recommendation for submittal to the Council.

10. GIRLS' PRIVATE SCHOOL RELEAGUING: It was moved, seconded and passed that the Commissioner develop specific guidelines for Girls' private school releaguing procedures and that the guidelines be presented at the September meeting of the Executive Committee.

11. **TOURNAMENT PRIORITIES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to amend Article XXI, Section 5B of the CIF-SS Blue Book to read: "Sanction may be denied for new events which interfere with, or conflict with, established events or CIF-SS playoffs."

12. SAFETY REVIEW COMMITTEE: Mr. Ferren Christensen, chairman of the Safety Review Committee, provided background information on work currently being done at the State level in this area and asked the Executive Committee members to develop a suggested format for a published mandated safety review committee on each member schools' campus, the plan of which will be submitted to the Council for further discussion and input.

13. AREA REPRESENTATION: It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the area representation by Ex-(Continued on Page 15)


# PRINCIPALS NOTE. . .

# SAN GORGONIO, EDGEWOOD, SAN MARINO, FILLMORE **CROWNED 1977 BASEBALL CHAMPS**

San Gorgonio High, which tied for second place in the Citrus Belt League, got excellent pitching from Tim Miner, who allowed only two hits, to capture the 4A championship with a 1-0 victory over Lakewood before 7,723 at Anaheim Stadium.

The Spartans scored the game's only run in the first inning when Ted Rozzi hit a leadoff double and Larry Kelly doubled off the left field fence.

In the 3A final, pitcher Mike Pill closed a brilliant three-year career with a two-hitter, as Edgewood nipped Magnolia 3-1. Pill finished the year with a 14-0 record and his career with a 33-3

San Marino won its first CIF-SS 2A title downing Glenn 4-1 before a standing room only crowd at Quigley Park in City of Commerce. It was the first appearance in a championship game for both teams.

Designated hitter Bill Decker supplied all the runs the Rio Hondo League champions needed with a tworun double in the second inning. San Marino finished with a 25-3 record.

Fillmore pitcher Rick Steward capped a brilliant four-year career pitching a no-hitter in a 5-0 win over Webb as the Flashes won their third straight CIF-SS 1A baseball champion-



We would urge all member schools to stage some sort of program to acknowledge "NATIONAL COACHES DAY" in recognition of their respective coaching staffs. Perhaps your plans can be made to include your student body, administration and community.

# OF BEING ORGANIZED FOR NEW SCHOOL YEAR

Don't risk the chance of overlooking a few key items to the start of a new school term . . .

Often times the initial week of a new school year is a hectic one, with faculty meetings, practice sessions for the fall sports and a rash of paperwork the usual order of the day.

Possibly one method of making certain no item is bypassed is one of developing a checklist, with the following areas among those to be considered:

1 — Make certain all transfer students are approved in terms of residence and scholastic eligibility before being permitted to participate in practice.

2 — Call an early meeting of the entire coaching staff and discuss carefully the 1977-78 CIF-SS Blue Book Rules and Regulations.

3—Compile an accurate eligibility list for each sport and give a copy to each member of the faculty and administration.

4 — Develop a set of plans with all the coaches to keep accurate records of player participation by specific sport.

5 — Check all athletic contracts. Send a form letter with time, place and date of games to all schools on your sched-

ule with request that you be notified immediately if opponent's record differs from yours. This may seem like double work, but many schools change coaches, athletic directors and administrations each year and at times, contracts are misplaced.

6 — Make certain to contact your local Media (newspaper and radio), giving them updated copy of all your schedules, rosters and names of coaches and their home phone numbers. Remember, they sell your athletic program FREE!

7 — Consider scheduling one or two good assembly programs built around the theme of good sportsmanship. You might even consider an exchange assembly with a neighboring school.

8 — Designate one person from your school to contact the CIF Southern Section Office when questions occur. Many times a duplication in calls are made.

9 — Take extra measures that a planned program is established for the care and prevention of athletic injuries. Post a list of all emergency numbers and the steps to follow if a situation does arise.

Start the new year off by being prepared!

# TETANUS PROTECTION IMPORTANT

(A comment by the Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports of the American Medical Association and the National Endoration)

tional Federation.) Routine active immunization against tetanus is now recommended for all persons, but is especially important for the athlete. Tetanus, also called "lockjaw", is caused by a germ which usually invades the body through wounds. The athlete, particularly in body contact sports, has greater exposure to injury and consequently a greater wound potential. Once within the body, the tetanus germ multiples and produces a potent toxin that affects the nervous system to produce muscle spasm, especially of the jaws, neck and back muscles. When severe, generalized convulsions are common. The incubation period, or the time interval for the germs to produce the toxin, and its subsequent attack on the nervous system to cause "lockjaw", averages approximately one to three weeks. Though excellent preventive treatment is readily available, the death rate of unprotected persons who are unfortunate enough to contact this dread disease is still approximately 50 percent.

In active immunization, a series of two (primary series) preferably three (basic series) injections of toxoid stimulates the body to produce antibodies to counteract the toxin. The basic series consists of two injections at monthly intervals with a reinforcement booster after 6 months. Should injury then occur, the body has a built-in protection against any poisonous toxin produced by tetanus germs that may invade the wound. The primary immunization with tetanus toxin, when properly administered, has been shown to produce highly effective, safe, longlasting protection.

At the time of injury, the body's defenses may be stepped up by a strengthening dose of the toxoid. Under normal conditions, authorities are suggesting longer intervals between routine booster (Continued on Page 15)
