THREAT TO GAME IS REAL

Take a well deserved sigh of relief . . . however, better keep glancin' over your shoulder, just in case they mount a second frontal attack.

It's not often we comment on our collegiate counterpart – the NCAA – but times are changing.

Just a few decades back, the traditional fall football weekend was as predictable as the time of day. It kicked off with high school contests Friday evening, the colleges on Saturday and the pros followed on Sunday.

Then, along came television.

The medium has not only drastically altered the market place, but it may now threaten the survival of interscholastic football on Friday evening.

The initial expansionist was the NFL. Granted, it has remained clear of Friday, but it has cornered virtually every other day of the week.

Then came the University of Oklahoma test case.

In rapid fashion, the Sooners' bid to create their own television package from under the umbrella of the NCAA has swayed the foundation of the intercollegiate organization itself.

The formation of the CFA – comprising the major Division 1-A and 1-AA schools – fanned the flames while an ensuing Supreme Court ruling recently upheld Oklahoma's posture that individual institutions had the right to negotiate their own football contracts.

The shock waves are still being felt.

Just a few weeks back, a meeting of Division 1-A and 1-AA schools rejected an NCAA television plan restricting Friday night telecasts!

However, thanks to pressure from the National Federation of State High School Associations, a resolution was accepted which "prevents" any live telecasts on Friday evening for this year.

Is this the proverbial finger in the dike?

It may well be if our high school associations and respective communities throughout the United States fail to make a stand over the next several months.

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MINUTES OF THE CIF SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MEETING

May 10, 1984

The general meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by Dr. Robert Packer at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 10, 1984 at the Saddleback Inn, Norwalk. All leagues were present with the exceptions of the Liberty, Sunshine and All Girls.

1. **MINUTES** – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of March 22, 1984 as mailed; and minutes of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee meeting of April 27, 1984 as distributed to the Council.

2. **PRESIDENT'S REPORT** – Dr. Robert Packer extended his appreciation to the Council for its courtesies extended during his term of office as CIF-SS President.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** – Ray Plutko, Commissioner, expressed his appreciation to the representatives and league coordinators for their time, effort and contributions during this past school year. In addition, Commissioner Plutko

highlighted activities of the past year which included the Principal and A.D. Orientation; the A.D. Symposium; positive response relative to the eligibility cards; corporate involvement; the TV contract with Sports Productions; and the Hall of Fame Recognition awards.

As an update for next year, information was released relative to new Principal and A.D. Orientation meetings; the regional coaches workshops; Athletic Administrators Symposium; upcoming academic and athletic surveys; the new combined Blue Book/Directory; and a TV manual for member schools.

4. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL** –

(a) **VOLLEYBALL PROPOSAL**: The proposal relative to travel for State CIF Volleyball Championships was approved by the State Federated Council, providing for a maximum of four cars at the rate of 20¢ per mile.

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BLUE BOOK CHANGES

The following is a synopsis of changes which have been designed as part of the new blue book format for the benefit and convenience of athletic administrators and coaches. This is a capsule summary of the State CIF and CIF Southern Section Constitution and By-Law changes enacted during the 1983-84 school year.

The changes are listed by topic. The first parenthesis indicates the article and/or Section Rule as it appeared last year. The second parenthesis keys the change in the 1984-85 edition for easy reference.

Internal Revenue Code Requirement (CIF Constitution Article 1, Section 12): Constitution amended to meet legal language as required by the Internal Revenue Code in that the organization is a non-profit corporation.

California Youth Authority and Probation Schools (CIF Constitution Article 1, Section 12): Amends CIF Southern Section Constitution and By-Laws effective September, 1986, with reference to releguing, league placement and site of playoff contests for schools falling into the category of California Youth Authority and Probationary Schools. (CIF Constitution Article 1, Section 12; CIF-SS By-Law 137.5; and CIF-SS By-Law 2903.3).

Hall of Fame Recognition Awards (CIF Constitution Article 1, Section 166): Amends CIF Southern Section Constitution by adding the Hall of Fame Recognition Program to existing CIF Southern Section achievement honors. (CIF Constitution Article 1, Section 166-166.70).

Scholastic Eligibility (CIF By-Law 205): By-Law previously amended effective July, 1984 adding the requirement that a student must be successfully progressing toward graduation and maintain the GPA as set forth by the local school board. An additional provision now stipulates that member schools shall file with the State CIF Office a copy of its district policy statement delineating the academic eligibility standards for implementing the provisions of State Rule 205 (CIF By-Law 205).

Foreign Exchange Programs (CIF By-Law 212 [c]): Adds the Academic Year in America and Interschola Exchange Program to the list of approved foreign exchange programs. (CIF By-Law 212 [c]).

Transfer Eligibility (CIF By-Law 214): By-Law amended to clarify previous competition by adding the words "any level of." (CIF By-Law 214).

Outside Activities (CIF By-Law 404): Revises by-law to stipulate

that a student will become ineligible for CIF competition in the respective sport if the student or his family receive direct financial benefit. (CIF By-Law 404).

Sanctioned Event Procedures (CIF By-Law 701, 702 and 703): By-Law amendment details new procedures dealing with inter-sectional competition, interstate competition, and interstate competition over 500 miles. (CIF By-Law 701, 702 and 703).

Value of Award (CIF By-Law 802): Amended to increase dollar amounts from \$20.00 to \$50.00 for athletic awards received for league championships. Individual tournament award may not exceed \$20.00 in value. (CIF By-Law 802).

Gymnastics (CIF By-Law 1201): Amendment provides that where rules are written for girls' sports by the National Federation, those rules shall be official. Additionally, Sections are authorized to use U.S.G.F. rules for compulsory routines. (CIF By-Law 1201 and Article 21).

Spring Practice Restriction (CIF By-Law 1404): By-Law amended to allow for multi-campus exception as provided for in rule 303. (CIF By-Law 1404 and 303).

Track Body Suits (CIF By-Law 1501): Amendment allows the CIF to continue the optional use of body suits without requiring the student to wear school issued shorts or tops over the body suit. (CIF By-Law 1501).

Maximum Team Contests – Track and Field (CIF-SS By-Law 1505 and 1506): By-Law amendment which allows individual athletes to enter and participate in no more than a total of 13 dual, triangular or invitational meets during the season in track and field. The team aspect of the by-law has been deleted. (CIF-SS By-Law 1505, 1506 and 1527).

Wrestling Weigh-In (CIF By-Law 1702 [b]): Amendment of by-law provides for second day weigh-in procedures for two-day qualifying and California State Wrestling tournaments. (CIF By-Law 1702 [b]).

(b) **STATE TRACK MEET:** The State Federated Council approved a proposal for return to the two-day state track meet format in lieu of the present regional format effective the 1984-85 school year.

(c) **SAC JOAQUIN PROPOSAL:** A proposal from the Sac Joaquin Section was reviewed, which stipulates that in order to be eligible to participate in State championship events, Sections must enter all championship activities offered by the State CIF.

(d) **SECTION RELATIONS:** Dr. Packer reviewed with the Council the latest proposal at the State level relative to the Section Relations proposals and the vote of the Southern Section to maintain status quo.

(e) **STATE BUDGET:** It was reported by Tony Balsamo that the State budget was passed reflecting no increase in fees to member schools.

5. **GOLF LIFE PASS COMMITTEE REPORT** — Lon Hardgrave, chairman of the Life Pass Committee, introduced recipients of the Gold Life Pass in recognition of their long-standing service to the CIF Southern Section. Recipients for the 1984-85 year were: Mary Frank, Ken Dudge, Ted Smith, and Carl Fisher.

6. **SEASON OF SPORT COMMITTEE** — Mr. Pat Mauch, chairman of the Season of Sport Committee, presented a proposal on the adjustment of the football calendar effective with the 1985 season. The calendar reflects a later starting date for those schools anticipating playing 10 contests and additionally, an optional later starting date and more creative scheduling of time for those schools maintaining the program of a scrimmage and nine contests. This will be an action item at the September, 1984 meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council.

Additionally, a conceptual calendar for the 1985-86 school term was presented for input only and is not a proposal at this juncture.

7. **GARDEN GROVE LEAGUE FIELD HOCKEY PROPOSAL** — Mr. Ray Arroyo, principal of Santiago High School, presented a proposal on behalf of the Garden Grove League for the addition of two allowable contests for the sport of field hockey beginning with the 1984-85 school year to provide for a post-season tournament. This item will be referred back to the leagues and will be voted on at the September, 1984 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

8. **CROSS LEAGUING PROPOSAL** — Mr. Bob Paisola, CIF-SS Executive Com-

mittee member, presented a proposal relative to establishing specific guidelines in order to assist schools without league membership for specific sports. This item will be referred back to the leagues and will be voted on at the September, 1984 meeting of the Council.

9. **SOCCER REPORT AND PROPOSAL** — Dr. Warren Stephenson, member of the Executive Committee, reviewed with the Council background information relative to a proposal to constructively and effectively work with the sport of soccer in order to promulgate not only its growth but to provide a positive reinforcement in all areas concerned.

(a) **ORIENTATION** — The varsity soccer coach at each member school be required to attend the orientation workshop in the sport of soccer to be initiated by the CIF-SS Office staff prior to the 1984-85 season of sport.

(b) **SUPERVISION** — Administrators be urged to review their supervisory procedures for the sport of soccer at both home and away contests. Where necessary, additional guidelines are to be established.

(c) **COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION** — The principal conduct an orientation with parents and players, as well as other support personnel, such as school booster clubs, in a general meeting prior to the start of competition on the 1984-85 school year. It is the intent that this meeting will provide the community sector with the proper background as to the concerns in this sport and seek its cooperation in the proper protocol as it relates to competition and sportsmanship guidelines of the CIF-SS.

(d) **OFFICIALS** — The CIF-SS Office staff will work with official associations in providing additional information and/or suggestions relative to the sport of soccer in an effort to maintain proper control of contests and suggested procedures in working with school administrators, coaches and spectators.

(e) **RULES** — That the CIF-SS Office communicate with the National Federation, through proper protocol, its recommendation that the playing rules be re-evaluated with respect to the need for additional guidelines in an effort to assist officials and prevent forfeitures.

(f) **PROBATION** — The sport of soccer be placed on probation for the 1984-85 school term and that the CIF-SS Office monitor same in an effort to ascertain if constructive measures are in evidence. Further, that a report be made to the Executive Committee and Council of its findings at the conclusion of the season.

10. **PUBLIC/PRIVATE SCHOOL REPORT** — Mr. Tom Jacobson, chairperson of

the Public/Private Schools Committee provided an update of work currently being done by the Committee and reviewed a questionnaire that has recently been distributed by the CIF-SS Office. It was reported that the Committee is planning to continue its work through the summer, with a final report due during the 1984-85 term of the CIF-SS Council.

11. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS** — Mr. Bruce Kitchen presented the report of the Nominating Committee as it relates to vacancies on the Executive Committee. Following a vote by the Council, the persons elected were: President-Elect, Mr. Pat Mauch, Los Altos HS; Boys' A.D. Representative, Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Santa Barbara HS; Superintendent Representative, Ms. Cynthia Grennan, Anaheim District; Private Area #1 Representative, Fr. Charles Motosko, Servite HS; Orange County Representative, Mr. Tom Jacobson, Newport Harbor HS; Bay Area Representative, Dr. Warren Stephenson, Long Beach Poly HS.

12. **CIF-SS 1984-85 BUDGET** — Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, presented the CIF-SS 1984-85 proposed budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the budget as presented.

13. **SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP PROPOSAL** — Mr. Lon Hardgrave, CIF-SS Executive Committee member, reviewed with the Council a proposal dealing with schools falling into the category of California Youth Authority and Probation Schools. The proposal, to take effect in September, 1986, would grant schools in this category the opportunity to apply for membership under current screening procedures now in existence. If schools are approved for membership, they will be relegated to a free lance status and not be assigned to any geographical area for relegating purposes. If the school applies to a specific league for cross-leaguering membership, it must receive the unanimous approval of all Principals in that league and final approval from the CIF-SS Office. This approval must be granted on an annual basis. If any of the schools so mentioned would qualify for the post-season playoffs, the contest would be played at an alternate site other than the facility where the school is located. Additionally, the CIF-SS would conduct an orientation program with the administration from each of the member schools as it relates to their commitment and understanding of all the rules and regulations as noted in the CIF-SS constitution and by-laws. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

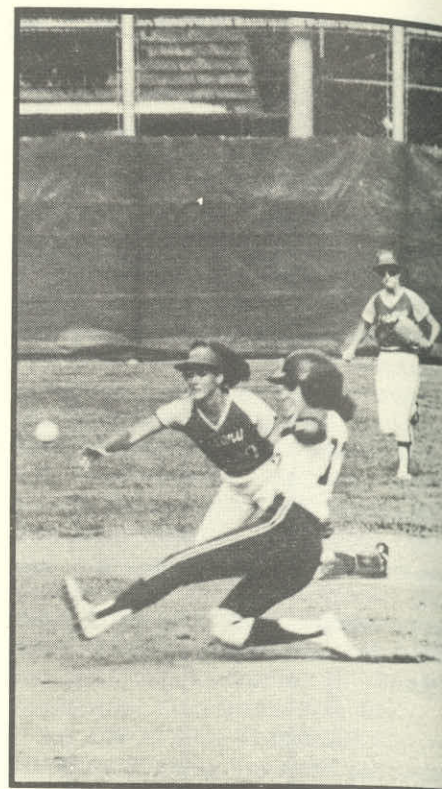

It should be noted the current NCAA legislation does not apply to Division II or III institutions, which may strike a Friday night contract.

Granted, it's doubtful any colleges in these two categories would affect high school game attendance with a live telecast...

... but, it may well create another fissure in the dike and one too large to halt the flow of Friday telecasts.

There is one major question still unanswered. What would the NCAA do if one of its major institutions decided to televise live on Friday evening?

Sanctions are the first to come to mind, but in light of the recent Supreme Court ruling and as further indicated by the "lifting of TV sanctions" on USC, anything can happen.

And, just in case you've forgotten what a major television event can do to your gate attendance, think back to the

World Series games staged on Friday night.

What is your contributing role?

Initially, to provide data on the attendance at your home football games this season.

This data will be extremely beneficial in the event live telecasts are sprung upon us. The statistics from throughout the entire CIF Southern Section could then be used in an attempt to draw a direct correlation between the telecast and attendance and hopefully, be the catalyst in the event federal legislation is required.

Each principal will receive a single page data sheet on attendance the beginning of September and we ask that it be returned at the conclusion of the 1984 football season.

Further, should the dike give way unexpectedly, we trust you will be available to provide whatever personal and professional assistance needed.

In the meantime, make certain to keep glancin' over that shoulder.

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MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

June 16, 1984

The meeting of the Executive Committee of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, was called to order on Saturday, June 16, 1984, by Dr. Robert Packer at 8:20 a.m. in Palm Springs. All members were present with the exception of Pat Mauch.

1. **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE** — Dr. Robert Packer read to the Executive Committee a letter from the State CIF commending the outstanding service rendered to the State organization by the Southern Section Commissioner of Athletics, Mr. Ray Plutko. Dr. Packer also expressed his appreciation to the Executive Committee for its professional support in his three years as President.

2. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** — Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee the positive letters and publicity on the Hall of Fame Recognition Award program, Dodger Stadium Sportsmanship Awards Program, corporate support, summer activities and promotions for next year, cable TV manual for member schools, and the office computers. The Commissioner extended special thanks to the Executive Committee from the entire Southern Section staff for its continued support.

3. **BOYS' A.D. REPRESENTATIVE REPORT** — Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Boys' A.D. Representative, reported on the positive response received relative to the report from the Executive Committee to the Council and the action recommended relative to the sport of soccer.

4. **GIRLS' A.D. REPRESENTATIVE REPORT** — Sheila Burrud, Girls' A.D. Representative, apprised the Committee regarding the successful sportsmanship awards program held at Dodger Stadium. In addition, Ms. Burrud commented on the well-run and well-organized CIF Southern Section Track and Field Championships held at Cerritos College.

5. **SUPERINTENDENTS' UPDATE** — Cynthia Grennan reviewed with the Committee the one-year extension of the walk-on coach legislation, with part of the package calling for a series of regional meetings set up by the State Department of Education.

6. **TREASURER'S REPORT** — Mr. Bruce Keuning, treasurer, provided an update of the 1983-84 working budget and the spring playoff incomes.

7. **STATE REPORT** —

(A) **SECTION RELATIONS:** Tony Balsamo reviewed with the Committee the Section Relations proposals which will be voted on at the October meeting of the State Federated Council.

(B) Mr. Moe Chavez reviewed concerns relative to the Southern Section's position regarding Sections participating in CIF State

playoff competition in all sports in which State playoffs are conducted. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend reconsideration for the Southern Section participating in the State Basketball playoffs on a non-mandatory basis as currently exists from leagues to the Southern Section, and that further, the entire area of State playoffs be re-evaluated by the State Federated Council.

(C) **BASKETBALL TRAVEL ALLOWANCE:** Bruce Keuning reviewed a proposal relative to travel for State basketball competition. The proposal calls for a reimbursement at a rate of 20¢ per mile per car with a maximum of four cars. It was the decision of the CIF-SS Executive Committee to abstain from voting on this issue due to the fact that the Southern Section will not be participating in the State Basketball Championships.

(D) **STATE RULE 215 (b):** Sheila Burrud reviewed with the Committee a change in State By-Law 215 (b) with reference to students changing schools as the result of disciplinary action. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the CIF-SS delegates to the State Federated Council to support this change in the State Constitution.

8. **LEGAL UPDATE** — Attorney Andy Patterson reviewed with the Committee the recent opinion of the State Supreme Court overturning the Santa Barbara sports participation fee. It was further advised by Mr. Patterson that schools requiring student body cards for participation and the charging of transportation fees for extracurricular activities should consult their local County Counsel or school district legal department for an interpretation relative to these two questions. Additionally, Mr. Patterson updated the Committee relative to a current football injury case being litigated.

9. **SANTA MONICA / EL TORO VOLLEYBALL REQUEST** — Commissioner Plutko reviewed a request from Santa Monica and El Toro High Schools to allow students from their schools to participate in a volleyball activity that will be held prior to the close of their respective schools. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the request.

10. **NEW SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP** — It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the membership of Pioneer Baptist School of Norwalk, effective with the 1984-85 school term.

11. **HI-LO LEAGUE FOOTBALL REQUEST** — Bill Clark, administrator, reviewed a request from the Hi-Lo League relative to the participation of 14-year-olds in varsity football. Following discussion, the request was denied in that the CIF Southern Section has no jurisdiction in the specific request for waiver. Additionally, the request for a constitutional

change will be forwarded to the State Federated Council.

12. **STATE RULE 600 NATIONAL SURVEY** — Commissioner Ray Plutko updated the Committee on a recent survey from the National Federation relative to outside competition.

13. **JUNIOR OLYMPICS BASKETBALL REQUEST** — Mr. Dean Crowley, administrator, reviewed with the Committee a request on behalf of the Junior Olympic Basketball program for a waiver of CIF Southern Section Blue Book rule 1813.1 relative to outside team competition allowing no more than two players from the same school participating on the same team outside the season of sport. Following discussion, the request was denied.

14. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL REPRESENTATION** — Due to a recent change in the State reimbursement for State Federated Council delegates to attend State meetings, the following State Federated Council representation from the Southern Section was approved:

1984-85 — Those to attend State Federated Council meetings will be the CIF-SS President, Moe Chavez; Past-president Dr. Robert Packer; and the female representative, Sheila Burrud.

In the 1985-86 term, State Federated Council representation will be the CIF-SS President; the President-elect; and the female representative.

15. **STADIUM USE 1984-85** — Commissioner Plutko updated the Committee concerning problem areas with future playoff facilities and possible conflicts with dates of securing same. Additionally it was announced that the CIF Southern Section is negotiating with the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum for the Section Football Championships to be conducted on Saturday, December 8, 1984. It was announced that a contract has been signed for the 1985 Southern Section Basketball Championships at the Long Beach Arena.

16. **PASSING OF THE GAVEL** — Dr. Robert Packer, President, relinquished his duties to President-elect Moe Chavez for the 1984-86 term of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

14. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE PROPOSAL – Mr. Stan Thomas, Principal of Foothill High School and a member of the Committee, provided background information as it relates to two proposals by way of the Blue Book Committee.

The first proposal would bring track and field in line with the wording and intent of the contests being allowed in the sport of cross country.

1505. MAXIMUM TEAM CONTESTS (delete)

Amend 1506. to read:

MAXIMUM CONTESTS – An individual of a track and field team will be permitted to enter and participate in no more than a total of 13 dual, triangular or invitational (sanctioned) meets during the season, not including all league or CIF-SS championships.

1527. MAXIMUM CONTESTS - CROSS COUNTRY

Team - (delete)

Individual - (leave as is)

Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to adopt this proposal.

Further, a second proposal was reviewed which dealt with a by-law amendment which would require individuals who are employed at a junior high school and who also serve as a coach at the high school level to receive prior approval through the appropriate levels when employed. Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal failed to carry the necessary majority.

15. PLAYOFF GROUPINGS, 1984-86 PROPOSALS – Appeals by the Sunset League in basketball, the Empire League in Girls' volleyball and basketball; and the Foothill League in softball, boys and girls track and field, and girls' volleyball failed to carry the necessary majority. An additional appeal was heard by the Council from the Los Padres League relative to its placement in football. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the playoff groupings as recommended by the Playoff Grouping Committee, with the exception of football which will be referred back to committee for review.

16. PASSING OF THE GAVEL – Dr. Robert Packer, chairman, relinquished his duties to President-elect Moe Chavez for the 1984-86 term of the CIF Southern Section Council.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:40 p.m.
