PRINCIPAL AND ATHLETIC DIRECTOR ORIENTATION PROGRAM BEGINS ITS THIRD YEAR

This annual workshop was presented for the first time three years ago and the reaction has been extremely positive.

Over the final months of the past school year, we believe we saw that plan come to fruition from the standpoint that many of these same administrators commented that a major segment of their positive transition was directly related to the various suggestions and direction of that initial meeting," said Commissioner Ray Plutko.

"Hopefully, this has created a domino effect and we will be addressing at least 80 additional administrators at the upcoming sessions. Coupled with those in previous years, this will have nothing less than a positive affect on everyone from the CIF-SS Office, to the school administration, down to the student-athletes themselves," he added.

The Athletic Director Orientation will be held Tuesday, October 1, with the Principals getting together Thursday, October 3.

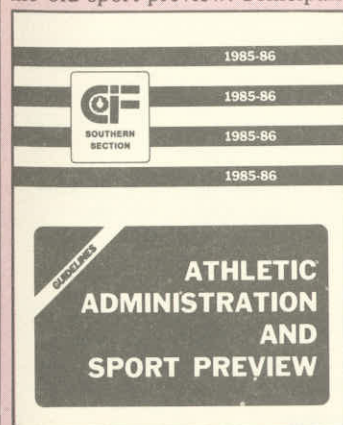
The program is set for approximately 2½ hours, with an overview by the Commissioner, helpful suggestions by the administrative staff, and a brief tour of the CIF Southern Section Office.

Both programs will start at 9:00 a.m. Principals and Athletic Directors should complete and return the RSVP cards which will be sent out so that an accurate count and proper facility arrangements can be made.

PRE-SEASON PREVIEW TAKES ON NEW LOOK

As we move into the 1985-86 school year, athletic administrators will find waiting for them at school this year, the new Fall Administrative Preview replacing the old sport preview. Principals and Athletic Directors have indicated over the

years the desire to be directly involved with the beginning of each sport season in regards to staff accountability - an area further compounded by the growing number of walk-on coaches. With this in mind, a single preview has been prepared for each season. One copy will be sent to principals, with duplicated copies going to boys' and girls' athletic directors which will also contain the sport rule books for their coaches and recommended guidelines for the upcoming season. The dramatic change in format include such items as: coach and student orientation, due process, accountability, risk management and other administrative forms which can be of further assistance in operating the interscholastic athletic programs on each high school campus.

KEEPING PACE WITH TRENDS

There's one unique trait I noticed about Kentuckians this past summer. They don't have ulcers.

Needless to say, they couldn't have selected a more perfect setting than the meandering Bluegrass State for the annual National Federation Conference.

The conditions were ideal – even the noticeable absence of humidity – but there were points of commonality among the executive officers and their governing boards from the 50 states in attendance.

One in particular was eligibility standards and the current trends influencing its application at the interscholastic level.

An increase in single parent households, dual custody, influx of foreign students and involvement of coaches with youth and summer programs head the list.

It goes without saying, an on-going and effective evaluation process is essential, not only in keeping pace with trends, but to assume the leadership role of setting the appropriate standards for its members.

It was to this end I addressed the CIF-SS Council at its most recent meeting and plans are already in place for an overall assessment this fall.

Four avenues of input will provide the data base from which we will draw – superintendents, principals by way of their respective leagues, independent research by the CIF-SS Staff and review and compilation of salient points from other state associations.

The Blue Book Committee will then be responsible for reviewing all data and developing possible proposals for consideration by the CIF-SS Council.

It's anticipated any proposals will be part of the January agenda, with voting to take place in March and implementation of any passage to be in place July 1 of 1986.

Keeping pace with trends and setting the appropriate standards is paramount with any undertaking and in particular, this assignment.

It would appear then, the lone task remaining is to somehow emulate that outstanding trait common only to Kentuckians.

MINUTES OF THE CIF SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MEETING May 9, 1985

The May meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by Mr. Moe Chavez at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 9, 1985 at the Ramada Inn in Norwalk. All leagues were present with the exception of the Hi-Lo, Pinon, and All Girls' Representative.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of March 21, 1985 and minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of April 23, 1985 as mailed to the Council.

2. **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:** Mr. Moe Chavez, president of the CIF-SS Council, commented on the positive working relationship with the various corporate sponsors supporting Southern Section activities. Additionally, the Council was updated on action by the CIF-SS Administrative and Executive Committees.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE:** Commissioner Ray Plutko provided an update on the Hall of Fame Awards, Olympic funds, problems with securing major facilities for CIF-SS championship events, growth of boys' volleyball, decline of girls' gymnastics and the Sportsmanship Awards program at

Dodger Stadium. In addition, Commissioner Plutko reported that during 1984-85 the greatest gain in the area of student's transferring under the provisions of Rule 214 was from private to private schools with all other areas remaining status quo. It was also noted, with the exception of baseball, incident reports were down from the previous year.

Commissioner Plutko reported to the Council his concern with improving CIF-SS eligibility standards and encouraged all administrators to strongly consider the following five major points:

(1) Each school conduct an orientation for the athletic staff prior to the close of school, with the major focus on summer rules and undue influence.

(2) School use of eligibility cards and a greater emphasis on residence verification of student athletes at the incoming freshman level.

(3) Development of an in-service program for the athletic staff at the school site level at the beginning of each new season of sport.

(4) Administrative orientation of the

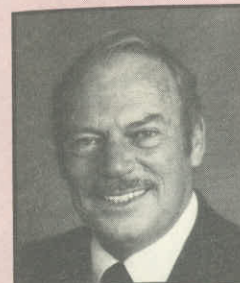
MEET THE NEW EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERS

We are pleased to introduce two educators who are new additions to the roster of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee.

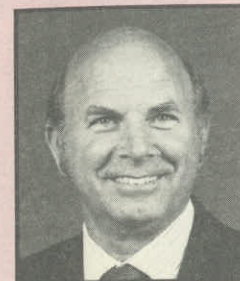

BLUE BOOK CHANGES

The following is a synopsis of changes which have been designed as part of the new blue book format for the benefit and convenience of athletic administrators and coaches. This is a capsule summary of the State CIF and CIF Southern Section Constitution and By-law changes enacted during the 1984-85 school year.

The changes are listed by topic. The first parenthesis indicates the article and/or Section Rule as it appeared last year. The second parenthesis keys the change in the 1985-86 edition for easy reference.

Releaguig Procedures (CIF Southern Section By-Laws, Article 3): By-law amended refining and streamlining Southern Section releaguig procedures (CIF Southern Section By-Law 32.54, 32.55, 32.56, 32.58, and 32.60).

League Assistance Placement (Cross-Leaguig) (CIF Southern Section By-Law 137.1, 137.2, and 137.3): By-law amended establishing guidelines to assist school without regular league membership for specific sports (CIF Southern Section By-Law 137).

Financial Policy (CIF-SS By-Law 140): By-law amended to reflect new financial policy adopted by the Southern Section Council (CIF-SS By-Law 140).

State Delegates to National Federation (Article 1, Section 101): By-laws amended deleting this section from the State Constitution pertaining to State delegates to National Federation summer meetings (CIF By-Laws, Article L, Section 101).

Foreign Exchange Programs (CIF By-Law 212 (C) and 212.1): Add the Oratrix ProAmicitia, California Homestay Institute, Educational Foundation for Foreign Study, and American Intercultural Exchange Inc. to the State list of approved programs. Added to the Southern Section list were American Intercultural Student Exchange, Sweden-California Program and Spanish Heritage Association (CIF By-Law 212.1).

Transfer Eligibility (CIF By-Law 214): By-law amended to include students transferring, without a change of residence, from Canada which is a member of the National Federation (CIF By-Law 214).

Transfer Eligibility (CIF By-Law 215 (b)): By-law amended to clarify the status of a student changing schools due to board action. Under this provision, student will have continuing eligibility, provided the change of schools is not the result of disciplinary action (CIF By-Law 215 (b)).

Hardship Definition (CIF By-Law 224): By-law amended defining hardship (CIF By-Law 224).

Outside Competition (CIF By-Law 603-609): By-laws amended relating to outside competition on national teams and other Olympic-type programs at the national and international levels (CIF By-Law 603-607 and Southern Section By-Law 608-611).

Interstate Competition – 500 Miles Travel (CIF By-Law 703): By-law deleted from the State Constitution (CIF By-Law 703 and Southern Section By-Law 703:1 through 703.5).

Officials' Fees – Volleyball (CIF-SS By-Law 1218): By-law amended deleting j,k,l in that the varsity level conducts 3 out of 5 contests and all other levels are governed to 2 out of 3 (CIF-SS By-Law 218 Volleyball).

Length of Quarters, Doubleheader Contest – Football (CIF-SS By-Law 1411.1): By-law amended to add new section to provide consistency with other sports which have doubleheaders (CIF-SS By-Law 1411).

Maximum Team Contests – Swimming (CIF-SS By-Law 1605): By-law amended to provide clarity to the rule with regard to the status of invitationals (CIF-SS By-Law 1605).

Maximum Matches/Day – Wrestling (CIF-SS By-Law 1716): By-law deleted in that it is now covered in National Federation rules for the sport of wrestling (CIF-SS By-Law 1716).

Failure to Take Court After Set Time (CIF-SS By-Law 1818 and 2216): By-law deleted in order to keep consistency throughout the Constitution and By-laws (CIF-SS By-Law 1818 Basketball and 2216 Volleyball).

Outside Individual's Season Of Sport During School Year (CIF-SS By-Law 1813.1; 1912.1; 2212.1 and 2411.1): By-law amended to clarify wording (CIF-SS By-Law 1813.1 Basketball, 1912.1 Softball, 2212.1 Volleyball and 2411.1 Baseball).

Number Of Contests Charged (CIF Southern Section By-Law 707): Any team entering an invitational tournament will be charged

DODGERS, ADOHR FARMS HONOR SPORTSMANSHIP WINNERS

A total of 58 CIF Southern Section schools were honored in the third renewal of the popular CIF-SS "Shake For Sportsmanship" program, sponsored by the Los Angeles Dodgers and Adohr Farms. A representative of each winning school was honored at Dodger Stadium prior to the Dodger-New York Mets game on Monday, June 3.

The recipient schools, representing each of the CIF-SS leagues, had distinguished themselves in the principles of positive sportsmanship.

The "Shake For Sportsmanship" program, which first honored schools representing each league of the CIF-SS in the 1982-83 school year, was expanded to include the seven leagues of the Los Angeles City Section last year. "Shake For Sportsmanship" now encompasses some 520 southland high schools.

The Dodgers, who have assisted with the design and printing of the official "Shake For Sportsmanship" logo and poster, also provided the services of outfielder Terry Whitfield as spokesman for the event.

Adohr Farms has underwritten the cost of commemorative plaques for each of the schools awarded, in addition to two large perpetual plaques, which are displayed at both the CIF-SS and L.A. City offices.

High schools singled out for the award were selected by committee at the league level. Each league determines criteria for selection, but the general premise of the award includes school spirit, enthusiasm and general sportsmanship toward opponents at athletic contests.

CIF-SS SALUTES MUIR'S "GOLDEN GIRLS"

Considered by track and field experts as one of the finest girls high school track teams of all time, the "Golden Girls" of Pasadena's John Muir High School ended their prep careers in style last spring, collecting the Pacific League, CIF-SS 4A Division and State team championships in addition to setting three national relay records.

The "Golden Girls" are Lana Cantrell, Linetta Wilson, Nikky Caddell and Carrie Franklin, all of whom are among the Mustang Graduating Class of 1985. A fifth team member, senior Michelle Miller, joined the talented quadruplet on the All-American High School Track Team, chosen by the National High School Coaches Athletic Association.

Cantrell, Wilson, Caddell and Franklin teamed to set a new national mark in the 640-yard relay (indoor) at the Sunkist Invitational with a clocking of 1:13.47. At the CIF-SS Divisional Championships at Mt. San Antonio College in May, they blazed to a national record of 3:37.69 in the 1600-meter relay. After winning the girls' state title in Sacramento, the team closed out its high school career by shattering the National 400-meter shuttle relay record with a 56.78 at the Pegasus Invitational in Las Vegas.

As one might expect, the Mustang ladies garnered outstanding achievements as individuals also. Franklin won CIF-SS 4A and Masters' titles in both the 100-meters and 100-meter low hurdles, and holds CIF-SS records in each event, sharing the 100-meters with Ganesha's Gervaise McGraw at 11.61 and holding her own in the 100 lows at 13.49. Cantrell was the CIF-SS 300-meter low hurdle-champ (43.09) and stole the state 100-meter low title from Franklin with a time of 13.57. Miller placed in



both the 100 and 200-meter dashes at the state meet.

The Golden Girls pulled off another unprecedented achievement when each of the five team members signed national letters-of-intent to major universities. Nebraska reaped the biggest harvest, as Cantrell, Wilson, Caddell and Miller all signed with the Cornhuskers. Franklin will enroll at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas this fall.

The signings were a tribute to Mustang coach Jim Brownfield, who will have a

tough task in replacing the departing champions next year. "We all had goals set for the team," noted Brownfield. "Mine was to see our girls all receive full scholarships to major universities."

"I'm so proud of our young ladies," he continued. "They were a class act. Not only did they reach every goal they had set in the beginning of the season, but most of all they were perfect ambassadors of John Muir High School and the community they represented. A beautiful group of young ladies."

athletic booster organizations in relation to CIF-SS rules and regulations.

(5) During the upcoming 1985-86 year, all phases of the organization review eligibility rules to determine where the Constitution and By-Laws can be strengthened.

4. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** Mr. Bruce Keuning, treasurer, reviewed with the Council the financial report of the winter playoffs and an update on the current 1984-85 working budget.

5. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL REPORT:** Dr. Robert Packer, representative to the State Federated Council reported that the proposal to delete the Outside Competition Rule (600) was defeated. By-Law 703 (Interstate competition - 500 miles) was deleted and a definition of hardship as part of Rule 224 in the By-Laws was approved. Additionally the amended format for the State Volleyball championships was adopted.

6. **GOLD LIFE PASS COMMITTEE REPORT:** Mr. Lon Hardgrave, chairman of the Life Pass committee, introduced recipients of the Gold Life Pass in recognition of their long-standing service to the CIF Southern Section. Recipients for the 1984-85 year were: Vern Chick, Jim Faul and Larry Rossi.

7. **BAY LEAGUE SOCCER PROPOSAL:** Mr. Roger Bryant, President of the Southern California Soccer Coaches Association and representing the Bay League, presented a proposal calling for the following revisions in the rules governing the sport of soccer:

(1) A player who receives a red card in any game (non-league, tournaments, league or playoff) may not play in the team's next game.

(2) A player who receives a yellow card in any game (non-league, tournament or playoff) must be substituted for. The player may re-enter the game at any subsequent time that a legal substitution may be made.

(3) Prior to any game (non-league, tournament, league, playoff) each coach must submit completed line-up cards to the referee and opposing coach.

This is a non-action item and will be voted upon at the September 26, 1986 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

8. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS:** Mr. Bruce Kitchen presented the report of the Nominating Committee as it relates to vacancies on the Executive Committee. Following a vote by the Council, the following were elected:

9. **STATE PLAYOFF CONSIDERATION:** Dr. Robert Packer, Past President of the Council, presented a proposal as it pertains to the Southern Section's volunteer

participation in the State Basketball Championships due to adjustments in the State calendar. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal by a 46-12 vote.

10. **BUDGET PROPOSAL FOR 1985-86:** Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, presented the 1985-86 proposed budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve option number one by a 54-4 vote.

11. **BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE PROPOSAL:** Mr. Tom Jackson of the Blue Book Committee, reviewed items pertaining to amendments and deletions in the Constitution and By-Laws effective with the 1985-86 school term. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the following amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws: Rule 1818 - basketball (56-2 vote); Rule 2216 - volleyball (56-2 vote); Rule 1716 - wrestling (56-2 vote); Rule 1605 - swimming (57-1 vote); Rule 1218 - volleyball officials' fees (58-0 vote); Rule 1411.1 with the following amendment: "When doubleheader football games are conducted, the second game will be played at the regularly scheduled time, or there shall not be more than 45 minutes elapsed time between the conclusion of the first game and the start of the second game," (58-0 vote). Rule 212.1 - foreign exchange programs (56-2 vote); Rule 1912.1 - softball (57-1 vote); Rule 2414.1 - baseball (57-1 vote); Rule 1813.1 - basketball (57-1 vote); Rule 2212.1 - volleyball (57-1 vote).

The Sunset League withdrew 609 - assistance to athletes/outside competition - from consideration.

12. **SEAVIEW LEAGUE CONTEST CHARGED PROPOSAL:** Dr. Dennis Evans, representative of the Seaview League, reviewed a proposal calling for a revision to Article 708 of the By-Laws as it pertains to the number of charged contests and bringing consistency to the championship and consolation brackets for the teams participating. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal by a 36-19 vote.

13. **SOCCER PROPOSAL:** Mr. Joe Rotcher, representative of the Executive Committee, reviewed a proposal that the soccer probation be lifted effective with next season, along with the four following areas of continued concentration:

(1) **Orientation Programs** - The CIF-SS Office repeat the Coaches Orientation Workshops in the sport of soccer on the 1985-86 school year in an effort to stress and communicate the need for a viable public image. It is recommended these meetings be non-mandatory but that attendance be strongly urged by the respective principals.

(2) **Supervision** - The CIF-SS Office continue to update and publish the Administrators Soccer Handbook and that school personnel continue to review its supervisory procedures for the sport at both home and away contests.

MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING June 22, 1985

The June meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Moe Chavez at 8:20 a.m. in Palm Springs. All members were present with the exception of Gerald Harer.

1. **PRESIDENT'S UPDATE** - President Moe Chavez extended his appreciation to the Executive Committee for its professional support in his first year as president. Additionally he highlighted important issues facing the CIF Southern Section which included eligibility rules, legal liability, Senate Bill 19, and walk-on coach legislation.

2. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** - Commissioner Ray Plutko highlighted the recent staff in-service planning meeting and current office plans for the 1985-86 year. He also reported there were no legal problems involving the playoffs in 1984-85; his concern relative to a need for strengthening the eligibility rules; and extended a special thanks to the Executive Committee from the entire Southern Section staff for its continued support.

3. **BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS UPDATE** - Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Boys' A.D. Representative, reported on concerns relative to GPA and eligibility standards, and recruitment of officials through publicity at local colleges and universities.

4. **GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS UPDATE** - Ms. Sheila Burrud, Girls' A.D. Representative, reported on the successful league sportsmanship awards program sponsored by the Dodgers and Adohr Farms; extended congratulations to Hawthorne High School and Muir High School on winning the Boys' and Girls' State Track Championships respectively; and further commented on the excellent work being done by CIF Southern Section Sports and Public Relations Director, Scott Cathcart.

5. **SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE** - Ms. Cynthia Grennan reviewed with the Committee the Anaheim Community survey dealing with grades in relation to school activity programs, legislation being proposed by State Senator Montoya, walk-on coach certification, CPR certification, and the positive support received from State Senator Seymour. Additionally Ms. Grennan commented on the need to continue efforts in the area of substance abuse, the values of utilizing sports

figures and other dignitaries in promoting positive ideals, and the importance of setting expectations for those involved in extra-curricular activities by way of a school code of ethics.

6. **TREASURER'S UPDATE** - Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, provided an update of the 1984-85 working budget and the spring playoff incomes.

7. **STATE REPORT - (A) STATE COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE:** Mr. Tom Byrnes, State CIF Commissioner, expressed his appreciation for the continued support of the CIF-SS and its delegates to the State Federated Council and the excellent leadership shown by the CIF-SS staff.

Commissioner Byrnes commented on changing conditions in the State relative to the numerous bills introduced by the legislature, the recent outside competition hearings, relegating problems faced by other Sections, women on local governing boards, officials and liability.

(B) **FEDERATED COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP PROPOSAL:** Dr. Robert Packer reviewed a State proposal dealing with sections of the State CIF Constitution and By-laws relating to membership on the State Federated Council:

Added to ARTICLE 3, SECTION 31 would be the phrase "consistent with the education code"

In ARTICLE 2, SECTION 20, delete the final two sentences of Section 20

In ARTICLE 3, SECTION 31, delete concluding phrase of first sentence in Section 31

In ARTICLE 8, SECTION 80, delete the fifth sentence in Section 80

Following discussion it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the CIF-SS delegates to the State Federated Council to support this change in the State Constitution.

(C) **LIABILITY INSURANCE CONCERNS:** Tony Balsamo reviewed with the Committee efforts at the State level to review the entire issue of State liability insurance and the assessment of same to the Sections.

8. **LEGAL UPDATE** - Mr. Andy Patterson, attorney, provided an overview of cases and legal trends throughout the State.

9. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL REPRESENTATION** - It was moved, seconded and passed to appoint

Ms. Cynthia Grennan to the two-year term as a voting delegate from the CIF-SS to the State Federated Council.

10. **TUSTIN HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL REQUEST** - Mr. Bill Clark, Administrator, reviewed with the Committee a request from Tustin High School to conduct three days of early football practice to meet a contractual obligation with Kapaa High School in Hawaii. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the request, limiting the three-day early start to the varsity level only.

11. **BASKETBALL FACILITIES - 1986 FINALS** - Commissioner Plutko reviewed with the Committee problems associated with conflicting dates at the L.A. Sports Arena for CIF Southern Section 1986 Basketball Championship activities and adjustments which will be made.

12. **OCEAN VIEW HIGH SCHOOL REVIEW** - Commissioner Plutko updated the Committee regarding the Ocean View High School case. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to invite the Principal, the District Athletic Administrator and the District Superintendent to appear before the Executive Committee for an administrative review.

13. **NEW SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP** - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the membership of South Bay Lutheran High School (Inglewood), effective with the 1985-86 school term.

14. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP** - It was moved, seconded and passed to appoint Mr. Jim Carmichael, Principal of Palmdale High School, to fill the one-year term on the Executive Committee due to the retirement of Blinn Tenney.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 11:45 a.m.

(3) **Community Organizations** - It is strongly urged the principal continue the orientation meetings with parents, players, booster clubs and other support community groups prior to the start of the season in an effort to provide the proper background as it relates to the sport while at the same time seeking their cooperation in working within the framework and goals of the CIF Southern Section.

(4) **Officials** - The CIF-SS Office continue to work with officials associations in the area of recruitment of new personnel and the need for a continued review of the training and evaluation procedures for officials.

Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal by a 46-11 vote.

14. **MARMONTE LEAGUE FOOTBALL PROPOSAL:** Mr. Ron Barney representative from the Marmonte League, reviewed a proposal pertaining to the areas of conditioning and rules for spring football. Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal failed to carry the necessary majority (26-28 vote).

15. **OCEAN LEAGUE FOOTBALL PROPOSAL:** Mrs. Helen Montgomery, representative of the Ocean League, reviewed a proposal calling for a revision in the allowable number of football contests, incorporating an option as it pertains to scrimmages. Following discussion, a motion to approve the request failed to carry the necessary majority (16-42 vote).

16. **LOS PADRES LEAGUE FOOTBALL PROPOSAL:** Mr. Don Clickard, representative from the Los Padres League, reviewed a proposal relative to the minimum and maximum number of days of practice prior to the first scheduled interscholastic football contest. It was moved, seconded and passed to remove the proposal from the table. After further discussion, a motion to approve the request failed to carry the necessary majority (18-40 vote).

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m.

two games toward the allowable maximum number of contests per season in that particular sport. The maximum number of contests allowed any team in a tournament whether participating in the championship or consolation will be identical for all teams. In addition, the sports of baseball, basketball, field hockey, soccer, softball, volleyball and water polo would be limited to three tournaments (CIF-SS By-Law 707 - Sanctioned Events).
