

CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES January 20, 2000

The January meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by President Margie Godfrey at 9:01 a.m., Thursday, January 20, 2000, at the Sequoia Athletic Club in Buena Park. All leagues were present with the exception of the De Anza, Northern and Santa Fe.

1. **ADOPT AGENDA** - It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda.
2. **MINUTES** - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council Meeting of October 14, 1999. Additionally, minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meetings of November 10, 2000 and January 8, 2000, were submitted as informational items.
3. **DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD** - Margie Godfrey, President, introduced the State Distinguished Recipient, Margaret Davis, former Assistant Commissioner of the CIF-SS Office and State CIF Office.
4. **SUNBELT LEAGUE PROPOSAL** - Stan Ford, Sunbelt League Representative, reviewed a proposal which would require wrestlers to make weight at their league qualifying tournament. Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal for the 2000-2001 school year was passed by a vote of 36-17.
5. **ALMONT LEAGUE PROPOSAL** - Tim Murphy, Almont League Coordinator, reviewed a proposal to change the number of allowable contests in both boys and girls water polo from 18 to 20 contests. Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal for the 2000-2001 school year was passed.

6. **AREA PLACEMENT/RELEAGUING APPEALS PROCESS RECOMMENDATION** - Clark Stephens, President-elect reviewed the recommendations of the Releaguings Task Force Committee. Following discussion, a motion to approve the recommendations as amended was passed.

7. **STATE CIF FEBRUARY ACTION ITEMS** - Clark Stephens, President-elect, presented the following agenda items for the State Federated Council in order to give delegates voting direction:

A. **Revision of By-Law 1100 (Eligibility Appeals Procedures)** - A proposal which allows the use of a single hearing officer or hearing panel for appeal hearings. The revision also clarifies a provision of the Brown Act and Rules of Evidence - vote to support.

B. **Revision of By-Law 217 (Discipline Expulsion of Transfer for Disciplinary Reasons)** - A proposal which clarifies the implications of a suspended expulsion - vote to support.

C. **New By-Law to Address the Eligibility of Home School, Home Study Students** - A proposal which distinguishes between programs under jurisdiction of a member school's governing body and those not under that jurisdiction - vote to support with language clarification.

D. **Modify By-Law 224 (Spring Graduation)** - A proposal to allow students who graduate during a school year to complete participation only on the sports team begun prior to graduation

ETHICS AND
THE HIGH
SCHOOL
ATHLETE

For years, I have heard complaints revolving around the ethics of sports. Administrators criticize the movement of athletes from school to school; they fret about loss of academic time to games and tournaments. The papers carry stories about overeager parents who make sports the central focus of the family. Fans behave inappropriately at games, as well as some of the coaches and athletes. We often ask ourselves whether sports, in general, are a positive influence on our kids.

Well, having watched a few games and observed high school athletes, there is no question that athletic participation is valuable for the vast majority of our students. Students learn focus, concentration, teamwork, time management and, hopefully a strong competitive ethic. CIF has worked hard over the years to develop rules to govern sports in a fair and ethical manner. We're still at it, trying to see that the playing field is level for all of our kids.

This year, the state CIF office entered into a partnership with Michael Josephson who has spent years promoting ethical behavior and character development for students. His "Six Pillars of Character" are taught in several school districts in our section and throughout the country. Simply put, the six pillars are: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. These are easy words to use, but tough to practice.

Together, we have developed Victory with Honor, a set of guiding principles that support the six pillars and the development of character and responsibility in our athletes. Modeled after the Arizona Accord, a document developed by a team of prominent coaches and athletic administrators, Victory with Honor promotes high ideals for high school sports and places responsibility for application of the program on School Boards, superintendents, principals, athletic directors, coaches, students and fans. This fall, we hope to put these guiding principles in the hands of every school in the state. We will recognize schools that adopt the principles, and ath-

Football Coaches' Guide to Heat Illness and Hydration

THE RISK OF HEAT ILLNESS

Every year nearly 1.5 million athletes from junior high school to the National Football League participate in football. Although the incidence of heat related illness among football players has dropped dramatically in recent years (awareness of the problem by sports health professionals, coaches and athletes) there are still instances in which athletes become ill as a result of dehydration-related complications.

The equipment and clothing used by football players is designed to protect the athlete from broken bones, contusions, and head injuries. Unfortunately, this equipment was not designed with heat stress in mind. The football helmet substantially reduces heat loss from the head, while the uniform and padding insulate the body and impede evaporative and radiative heat loss. Additionally, because many players may not be acclimated to the heat when they report for summer two-a-day practices, the risk of heat illness is increased. It is not uncommon for a football player to lose 5 to 15 pounds of sweat during a day of summer practice.

FLUID INTAKE RECOMMENDATIONS

Health professionals generally recommend that athletes enter a practice or competition with some fluid in their stomach. Drinking on an "empty" stomach may slow down the rate that fluids leave the stomach, and lead to stomach upset. Therefore, football players should drink eight to 16 ounces of fluids prior to working out or competing.

During practice or on game day, fluids should be consumed on a regular basis. The thirst mechanism is imprecise; if a football player drinks only when he is thirsty, he may be setting himself up to become dehydrated. Drinking four to 10 ounces of fluid every 15 to 20 minutes will minimize the risk of dehydration-related symptoms.

Football players should drink fluids that will absorb quickly and then empty

quickly into their bloodstream. A fluid's composition and the volume of fluid ingested affect how quickly it's absorbed.

While water is a good fluid replacement beverage, studies show that properly formulated sports drinks (6% carbohydrate, 14gm/8 oz.) promote absorption the most efficiently during exercise.

Here's a typical day for a college football player during summer practice, and the steps that trainers and coaches follow to avoid heat and nutrition problems.

TWO-A-DAY PRACTICES

During two-a-day practices, the normal drive to drink and eat is often suppressed by an elevation in body temperature, mild dehydration, and fatigue. Most athletes tend to eat a light breakfast prior to morning practice. By lunch, the desire to sleep or rest may be stronger than the desire to eat before afternoon practice. Similarly, the dinner meal is not always well received. When the player finally regains his appetite he may attempt to consume as many calories as possible prior to going to sleep. Unfortunately, these eating patterns can result in drastic weight loss due to an insufficient intake of calories and fluids.

As a Big 12 strength coach/nutritionist responsible for feeding our team's football players during summer training camp, I will outline some of our strategies to "beat the heat".

MORNING PRACTICES

Practices are scheduled early in the morning, and breakfast might consist of a high-carbohydrate liquid supplement. Fluid intake during all practices is always emphasized; fluids are readily available throughout the practice field. As the players leave the field following drills, they are handed squeeze bottles containing a sports drink. After practice, players remove their wet clothing and record their body weights, which are compared with their pre-practice

weights in an effort to head off potential heat-related disorders. Each athlete is required to take a full bottle of fluid with him to meetings, prior to lunch.

AFTERNOON PRACTICE AND THE EVENING MEAL

During the afternoon practice, fluid intake is emphasized. The afternoon heat requires more frequent breaks. When possible, fewer pads are worn. Fluid is dispensed regularly throughout practice, and fluid bottles are handed out at the end of practice.

In an effort to promote cooling and restore appetite, players are encouraged to take cool showers or, if possible, get into an unheated swimming pool following practice. Body weights are recorded and compared with the morning pre-practice weights.

Players attend meetings in the early evening. Prior to and during the meetings, the players consume high-carbohydrate beverages, as well as fruit, frozen juice bars, and cereal. Dinner is served at about 7:30 p.m.; by this time most of the players have regained their appetites, and are more apt to eat nutritious foods.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING February 9, 2000

The February meeting of the CIF southern Section Executive Committee was called to order at 1:08 p.m. by President Margie Godfrey at the CIF-SS Office. All members were present with the exception of Dr. Tom Davis, Tony Ortega, Dr. Gary Smidderks and Dr. Richard Tucker.

1. ADOPT AGENDA - It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda as revised.
2. MINUTES - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the January 8, 2000, CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting.
3. PERSONNEL SESSION - The Executive Committee went into closed session at 1:14 p.m. At 1:16 p.m. the Executive Committee reconvened.
4. REPORT ON CLOSED SESSION - Action in closed session was to unanimously select Paul Castillo as the new Assistant Commissioner of the CIF Southern Section.
5. 2000-2001 CIF-SS MEETING DATES - Margie Godfrey, President, presented the 2000-01 proposed CIF-SS meeting dates. Following discussion, a motion to approve the meeting dates was passed.
6. CIF-SS NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT - Margie Godfrey reviewed the recommendations of the CIF-SS Nominating Committee. Following discussion a motion to fill vacancies with co-interim appointments per the nomination ballot for the parochial and superintendent vacancies was approved.
7. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL MAY ACTION ITEMS - Clark Stephens, President-elect, reviewed the State Federated Council action items that will be voted on at the April 13, 2000, meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

A. Recommendations of the Risk Management Committee - Study being conducted.

B. Determination of a procedure by which "divisions" are established for State playoffs and championships. Following discussion, it was moved and seconded to recommend that delegates go uninstructed with a support bias by the Council.

C. State CIF Budget for 2000-2001 Fiscal Year - It was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the budget.

D. Nominations of Candidates were announced for the Executive Committee and President-elect. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the delegates be sent uninstructed by the Council.

E. Recommendation to allow 14-year old student to compete in varsity football under certain conditions. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

F. Change in Article 4, Section 43 to Allow Representatives of allied organizations to serve as officers of the organization. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

G. Recommendation to Alter Terms of the President-elect and Past President (Article 4, Section 43) - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

H. Revision of Article 2, Section 20, to Include a School Board Representative on section governing boards - Following discussion it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

I. Revision of By-Law 308 that bars competition or practice on Christmas and Sunday - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

J. Proposed addition to By-law 1200 which would prohibit sections approving sport not on the list of approved sports listed in State Constitution and By-laws approved by the Federating Council - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

K. Proposal to eliminate Article 2, Section 20 and language to By-Law 303 Federated Council Voting - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

L. Track and Cross Country Advisory Committee Recommendation - Allow at-large entries for the State Track and Field meet. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

M. Track and Cross Country Advisory Committee Recommendation - Allow at-large entries for the State Cross Country meet. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

N. A Proposal from the Commissioner's Committee which allows flexible enrollment divisions in Cross Country - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

O. Volleyball Advisory Committee Proposal to allow a change in scoring pattern to provide for "Rally Scoring" in State and Regional Championships - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

P. Proposal to review state playoff enrollment ranges to be accomplished in September of odd numbered years - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend the Council support the proposal.

8. EMPLOYMENT OF FINANCIAL CONSULTANT - Jim Staunton, Commissioner, presented a request to hire Michael E. Blum as a financial consultant. Following discussion a motion to hire Mr. Blum was approved.

9. IRVINE HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL REQUEST - A request was made by Irvine High School for an early start date for the 2000-01 football season. Following discussion, a motion to approve the request was made provided opponents of week #1, week #2 and the league approve was passed on a vote of 9-1.

10. CHAMPIONSHIP PLAQUE QUALITY - Margie Godfrey, President, reviewed a concern regarding the quality of the CIF-SS championship plaques. Following discussion, a motion to appoint a committee to research all concerns was passed. Members of the committee are Jim Staunton, Donn Clickard, Sharen Caperton and CIF-SS Office staff.

11. BLUE BOOK FORMAT - Margie Godfrey, President, reviewed a concern regarding the format of the current Blue Book. Following discussion, a motion to reformat the Sport Sections into separate sections was passed.

12. PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Margie Godfrey, reported on representation on CIF-SS Council, Releaguings Task Force and meeting with super-

intendents.

13. COMMISSIONER'S REPORT - Jim Staunton reported on women coaches, Victory with Honor, football coaches, golf, Appeals Committee, Catholic Athletic Association and soccer concerns. In addition, Jim Staunton requested the retirement classification for CIF-SS Office staff be changed from 2% at 60 to 2% at 55. Following discussion a motion to approve the request was passed.

14. TREASURER'S REPORT - Dr. Jack Clement, Treasurer, reviewed all income and expenses, outstanding school dues and the proposed 2000-

2001 Southern Section budget.

15. ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' REPORT - Sharen Caperton, Girl's Athletic Directors' Representative, reported on basketball at-large entries, spring sports enrollment adjustments and officials' fees.

16. AREA REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT - Executive Committee Area Representatives discussed, area liaisons, releaguings, mouth pieces, Victory with Honor and basketball "Nike" Extravaganza.

17. POSSIBLE OFFICE CONSTRUCTION - Bill Clark, Assistant Commissioner, reviewed discussions with ABC Unified School District regarding buying the CIF-SS Office building, building onto existing structure and other negotiable options.

18. PERSONNEL SESSION - The Executive Committee went into closed session at 3:22 p.m. to discuss personnel issues. At 3:45 p.m. the Committee reconvened and returned to the agenda.

19. REPORT OF CLOSED SESSION - Action in closed session was to approve an enhanced compensation package for Assistant Commissioners and re-classification of the Sport Information Coordinator position.

20. COMMUNICATION TO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - Margie Godfrey reviewed a thank you letter from Mr. & Mrs. Diltz of Friends of Golf.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 5:05 p.m.

The March meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by Margie Godfrey at 9:01 a.m. Thursday, March 23, 2000, at the Sequoia Athletic Club. All leagues were present with the exception of Agape, Condor, De Anza, Del Rey, Desert Mountain, International, Liberty, Metro and Omega.

1. INTRODUCTIONS - Jim Staunton, Commissioner, introduced Paul Castillo, the CIF-SS new Assistant Commissioner and John Costello, the CIF-SS new Sports Marketing Coordinator.

2. ADOPT AGENDA - It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda as revised.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council Meeting of January 20, 2000. Additionally, the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee Meeting of February 9, 2000 were submitted as an informational item.

4. SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PGA FOUNDATION - Frank Talarico, Director of the Southern California PGA Foundation, presented a check to the CIF-SS for \$15,000 to support the Boys' and Girls' Golf Championships.

5. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION - Dr. Gary Smidderks, Principal, Los Angeles Baptist High School announced a State CIF coaching workshop being held on his high school campus on April 1, 2000.

6. PREP LEAGUE PROPOSAL - Ryan Katsuyama, Pasadena Poly High School, reviewed a proposal which calls for the expansion of Boys' and Girls' Swimming and Diving playoff brackets from three to four divisions. Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal for the 2000-2001 school year was passed.

7. SUNSET LEAGUE PROPOSAL - Jerry Halpin, Los Alamitos High School, reviewed a proposal which calls for the elimination of move-ups in any CIF playoff division based on C-BED enrollment figures. Following discussion, motion to approve the proposal for the 2000-2001 school year was passed.

8. SUNSET LEAGUE PROPOSAL - Al Britt, representing the Sunset League presented a proposal which calls for qualifiers for CIF-SS Track and Field Prelims to advance to their appropriate divisions based on enrollments. Following discussion, a motion to amend the proposal to pilot the proposal for one year (2000-2001) was approved. Following further discussion, a motion to approve the proposal as amended was passed.

9. SERRA LEAGUE PROPOSAL - Patrick Murphy, Principal, Mater Dei High School, reviewed a proposal which calls for a change in the football tie-breaker rules. Following discussion a motion to approve a tie-breaker system for football championship games was approved. Following further discussion, a motion to use the CIF-SS tie-breaker system, Blue Book Rule 1906, was approved.

12. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE PROPOSAL - Nancy Billinger, Blue Book Committee member, reviewed the following recommendations which will be action items at the April 13, 2000 meeting of the Council:

A. Maximum Athletic Contests in One Day (Rule 2915) - The Committee recommended that Rule 2915 read, "All interscholastic contests are to be arranged in such a way that no student shall take part in more than two athletic contests in any one day."

B. Football Scrimmage (Rule 1915.8) - The Committee recommended deletion of Rule 1915.8.

C. Football Spring Practice (Rule 1921.1) - The Committee recommended the deletion of the third sentence.

CIF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD - MARGARET DAVIS

Many individuals have made their mark on the CIF over the organizations long history. People like Kenny Fagins, Tom Byrnes, Seth Van Patten and Jim Cheffers just to name a few.

When talking about trailblazers like these and the impact they have had on the CIF, the name of Margaret Davis should be included.

Davis was a notable champion in the organizations fight for gender equity throughout her 28 year career as a teacher and athletic administrator.

Davis was at the forefront in helping to resolve many difficult gender equity issues and was a founding member of the National Federation Equity Committee.

Davis was directly responsible for the inclusion of girls in the pole vault event in track and helped to initiate and edit new State CIF Pole Vault safety regulations.

Besides being an advocate for girls sports, Davis advocated and supported a model plan for statewide coaching programs. She also assisted in the development and administered a million dollar corporate support program benefiting school sports. She also helped to design and administer the State Scholar-Athlete Program.

While as an administrator she advocated for a CIF legislative presence in the state capitol.

Davis was directly responsible for helping to create the present State CIF Championship system and was the author of a significant CIF policy on communicable disease


in sports.

Davis, who began her career in 1970 as a P.E. instructor at Poway High School, was the recipient of the Jim Echols Award for outstanding leadership by the California State Athletic Directors Association. She also received a Special Service Award for Leadership given by the State CIF Sports Advisory Committees for basketball, wrestling and track and field. Davis has also been honored with a Meritorious Service Award by the United States Volleyball Association; a Distinguished Service Award from the Orange County Athletic Directors Association as well as having the O.C.A.D.A. Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year award renamed in her honor.

Davis, who served as an Administrator for the CIF Southern Section from 1975-82 before moving on to become Associate Executive Director for the State CIF from 1982 until her retirement in 1998, has also received numerous awards from the CIF including a Lifetime Pass Award and a CIF-SS Recognition Award.

SPRING REMINDERS

As the season winds down this is as good a time as any for a few reminders.

REMINDER NO. 1: OPEN ENROLLMENT

Just a reminder that the Open Enrollment Log listing all students that are making application to attend your school is due in the CIF-SS Office by Friday, May 26 in order for students to be considered for open enrollment or inter-district transfers for the 2000-2001 school year.

REMINDER NO. 2: ALL-STAR COMPETITION

Lately, this office has been receiving a lot of calls with regard to All-Star competition. A reminder to all principals and athletic directors to review Bluebook Rule 900 that states All-Star competition is specifically restricted to graduating seniors. Rule 900 is very clear in defining All-Star competition. Additionally, basketball student-athletes are restricted to two All-Star appearances and football student-athletes are strictly prohibited from any type of All-Star activity during the school year.

REMINDER NO. 3: AUTHENTICATING MARKS AND BAT RULE

Remember that next year (2000-2001) National Federation of High School authenticating marks will be required on all balls used by CIF member schools in all competition except tennis. Additionally, the high school baseball bat rule will be in effect as well. That rule requires their be a change in the weight differential of bats used in competition from 5 to 3 (re: 33 inch, 28 ounce is now illegal).

REMINDER NO. 4: DEAD PERIOD RULE

A reminder that principals should review dead period rules in their Bluebook. Alternate dead periods will be entertained by the Commissioner if submitted in writing by the principal for any three (3) consecutive weeks during the member schools summertime period.

Hopefully, these reminders will supply all of you a good guideline on these particular subjects but, as always, should you have any further questions please do not hesitate to give the office a call. Have a great summer

SOUTHERN SECTION TEAMS CLAIM FIVE STATE BASKETBALL CROWNS

Seven CIF Southern Section member schools competed for state titles in the State CIF Basketball Championships held at the Arco Arena in Sacramento March 10-11. Five came away with wins.

In the Division II boys final, the Dominguez Dons capped their dream season with a 53-41 win over Newark Memorial of the North Coast Section. The Dons were crowned the No. 1 team in the nation for 1999-2000 in the final USA Today polls. It was Dominguez's fourth state title in the school's history and its first national title.

In the Division II girls final, Brea Olinda defeated Amador Valley of Pleasanton, 47-34 to earn the eighth girls basketball state title (a state record) in the school's history and their third consecutive crown. Chelsea Trotter scored 16 points and pulled down 13 rebounds to lead the Ladycats.

In Division III Boys action, Bishop Montgomery used a balanced attack to defeat Foothill of Pleasanton, 73-56. Four Knights players scored in double figures led by brothers Erick (16 pts.) and Derrick Craven (15 pts.). It is Bishop Montgomery's first state title in the schools' long history.


