

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



**Taking
Care of
Our
Officials**

CIF-SS Executive Committee**

It's time to recognize we need to take care of our officials. Without successful officials we don't have successful athletic programs. On the other hand, with successful officials we are all winners.

Officials tell me they want three things. Obviously, some individuals may want other things, but, in general, most say they would appreciate three. Personally, I think they are reasonable, and we should do our best to do make them happen.

One. Officials want someone from the school to serve as the game manager who takes responsibility for the arrangements of the game. They want to meet that person when they arrive at the game site and they want to be able to depend on that person throughout the contest.

Two. Officials want a reasonable level of respect from the coaches. Frankly, they should not have to ask for that, because we all talk the talk about how we promote sportsmanship. Unfortunately, we don't all walk the walk when we come to modeling good sportsmanship through showing respect for officials. Don't say you promote good sportsmanship if you give the officials a bad time.

Three. Officials want some protection from aggressive fans after the game. The game manager needs to see that the officials are able to exit the game site without having to be accosted by unhappy people.

I don't think those things are too much to ask.

As a high school principal who cares deeply about our athletic program, I depend on a lot of people for our success in accomplishing our goals. There's one group of individuals who are essential to our school, and that is the good men and women who officiate our games. There are some things I need from them, and, I must say, it is my experience that I usually get them.

One. I want my officials to show up on time trained and ready to work after calling the school to make sure my staff can

CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES January 25, 2001

The January meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by President Clark Stephens at 9:08 a.m. at the Grand in Long Beach, CA. All leagues were present with the exception of the Academy, Agape, Arrowhead, Heritage, International, Metro and Valley.

1. ADOPT AGENDA – It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda.

2. MINUTES – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of October 19, 2000. Additionally, minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of November 15, 2000, were submitted as an informational item.

3. FRIENDS OF GOLF – Jim Staunton, Commissioner, reported for David Diltz, President of the Friends of golf, on their continued support for the Southern Section schools' golf programs in the same amount as the 1999-2000 school year.

4. SUBURBAN LEAGUE PROPOSAL – A Proposal which would eliminate the 20 game maximum allowed contests and establish a 28 game limit in the sport of baseball. A motion to approve the proposal was denied.

5. STATE CIF FEBRUARY ACTION ITEM – Paul Breit, President-Elect, presented the following agenda items for the State Federated Council in order to give delegates voting direction:

A. Modify By-Law 500 - A proposal

which would clarify authorized participation in all athletic activities – vote to support.

B. Revision of Gender Equity Complaint - A proposal to revise the gender equity complaint and appeal procedure to include a provision which would provide for a process to register a complaint regarding a decision on practice made or implemented at the state level – vote to support.

C. Revision of All Star Competition (Rule 900) – vote to support.

D. Adopt Lacrosse – A proposal which would add the sport of lacrosse to the current list of the State CIF approved sports – vote to support.

E. Century League Proposal - Joe Gonzales, Foothill High School Softball Coach, presented a proposal which would change the number of allowable contests in softball. This will be clarified and brought back to the March 22, 2001, Council meeting for a first reading.

F. Baseline League Proposal - Rich Ede, Cross Country Coach at Claremont High School, presented a proposal which would change the maximum distance in all non-league, league and invitational cross country competition to 5000 meters (3.1 miles). This will be an action item at the March 22, 2001, meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

that particular sport. For a specific example, please consult the "Bluebook" and rule 311.0 for the highlighted case. Make your new coaches very aware of this rule so that you and they may avoid unnecessary hardship.

- Another important reminder is with regard to summer rules and specifically as they deal with camps. In the "Bluebook", summertime rules are listed as they deal with each specific sport. They should be referred to frequently when any question comes up as it may pertain to a certain sport. One notable exception would be in the sport of football where doing the last (April 26) CIF-SS Council Meeting; a clarification was added in regards to football camps. High school players and their high school coaches can no longer participate in team contact camps where pads and helmets are used during the camps.

CALVARY CHAPEL CLAIMS RECORD SEVENTH STATE WRESTLING TITLE

For the seventh time in the past eight years, Calvary Chapel of Santa Ana came home from the Spanos Center in Stockton with a State CIF Team Wrestling Championship. In 1997, the Eagles set the record for most points tallying 136.5 points. This year, Calvary Chapel shattered that record by scoring 170 points. That was 41 points better than second place Bakersfield (Central Section) and 85 points better than the third place team (Rancho Buena Vista with 85).

Calvary Chapel took the team title on the strength of individual titles by Anthony Rodriguez (112), Steve Esparza (130) and Conan Will-

iams (189). Mario Estrada, finished fifth at 103 pounds, John Jackson finished fifth at 125, Joe Williams finished fifth at 160, and Willie Parks finished second at 171. The section's other champions were, Tommy Vargas of Pacific (125), Lionel Apeniru of Barstow (275) and Allen Kennett, of Mayfair (215). Calvary Chapel's seventh state championship is also the seventh for coach John Azevedo. Calvary Chapel's title is now tops in numbers with Clovis (Central Section) claiming six.

There were no repeat champions from last years tournament for the Southern Section.

Now in it's eighth year and a long time partner of CIF-SS athletics, the TEAM TO WIN program is dedicated to reducing the incidence of athletic injuries in local high schools and to treat injuries on-site in order to return the student athlete to competition. Created by Orthopedic Surgeon, Dr. Keith S. Feder, MD and Athletic Trainer, Jill Sleight, ATC, they have created a series of programs and continue to lead the effort to improve medical service levels for high school athletics.

Significant barriers exist for student participation in high school athletics. California law mandates that high school athletes must have minimal medical insurance prior to participation. Unfortunately, financial and insurance constraints prevent many athletes from accessing quality care and sports training. Additionally, most California school districts do not provide athletic trainers.

In response, Team to Win at Centinela Hospital provides insurance for student athletes allowing any student to participate in interscholastic athletics regardless of family income. Team to Win additionally provides:

- Athletic trainers to each high school that participates in the Team to Win program. The athletic trainer works 10 hours a week at the school, covering games providing injury screenings. Due to the success of the program, many schools contract with the trainers to work more than the 10 hours that is provided through Team to Win.

- Student Training Mentoring Program creates a training opportunity for those students interested in the field of sports medicine. Interested high school students from participating schools enroll in a free summer course involving basic sports medicine training, such as CPR, first aid, basic athletic training, injury care and taping techniques. After completion of the courses, students can become a student trainer at their high school.

Victory
With
Honor

In the last year, section leadership has embraced and supported Victory with Honor, our program to improve the conduct of our contests as well as sportsmanship on and off the field. Our Ethics in Sports Committee, working with the Orange County Human Relations Commission, has created a Sportsmanship Seminar template that will be piloted this spring with students from the Moore League. School district Superintendents have expressed interest in promoting this type of program. The section is prepared to help any league or district that wants to hold a conference to advance awareness of our program. Bit by bit we are making progress.

One problem we face is the general level of bad behavior that is now tolerated in athletic events. Many people in our stands treat our athletic events as an occasion to scream abuse and obscenities to our referees and opposing fans. More and more we tolerate this behavior rather than condemn it. Recently, I had the opportunity to attend a professional Rugby game in Sydney, Australia. I really thought tht if ever there was an occasion to see raucous behavior, this was it. I was wrong.

During the entire evening, I did not hear a swear word, nor did I see obnoxious behavior. Did the fans have fun? You bet. There was cheering, screaming, and all the joy and disappointment one would expect at a professional match. The two teams were rivals along the same lines as the Dodgers and Giants.

Why then wasn't there more profanity? No fights? No one tossed out of the stadium? I observed that when someone became overly loud, or began to chant or threaten a referee the crowd turned on the offender.

The fans attending this game policed the behavior themselves. If someone began to shout negative, "over the top" statements, folks around him actually insisted that he calm down and stop. It worked.

Muscle Cramps: Causes and Cures

During a hard practice, game or match, an athlete might experience muscle tightness and cramping. If severe enough, a muscle cramp can finish you from competition. What causes the cramps? Is there a cure?

What Causes Muscle Cramps?

FLUID AND SODIUM FACTOR

Although there are many causes of muscle cramps, large losses of sodium and fluid can be key factors that predispose athletes to run-of-the-mill muscle cramps. Sodium is an important mineral in initiating signals from nerves and actions that lead to movement in the muscles, so a deficit of this element and fluid may make muscles "irritable." Under such conditions, a slight stress, such as a subsequent movement may cause the muscle to contract and twitch uncontrollably.

After checking with a physician to rule out serious causes (see: "Other Potential Causes"), an athlete who experiences muscle cramps after a workout might want to add sodium to meals. Given the popularity of low sodium diets, a sodium deficit is not out of the question when an athlete is sweating at high rates, particularly in the hot months of the year. Salty snacks or an extra tap of the saltshaker will help replenish the mineral. Consuming sports drinks that contain an adequate amount of sodium is also a subtle way to replace sodium.

Gatorade contains 110 mg of sodium per eight ounces, the same amount of sodium in a glass of milk or slice of bread. This is an amount which helps replace lost sodium yet still meets FDA standards for being a low-sodium food.

Minding Your Minerals

For many years, players have attributed cramping to the depletion of potassium or other minerals like calcium and magnesium from the body. However, research indicates that these minerals are less likely to cause cramping.

The amounts of potassium, calcium and magnesium in sweat are low compared to those of sodium and chloride. In addition, potassium, magnesium and calcium are easily replaced by the diet, so a deficit of any of these is rare.

Other Potential Causes

Diabetes, neurological disorders or vascular problems could be a factor in cramping episodes. Also, anecdotal reports indicate that the use of certain dietary supplements such as creatine might increase the risk of muscle cramps. If cramps suddenly occur without a prior history, consult a physician to rule out more serious causes. Players have attributed cramping to the depletion of potassium or other minerals such as calcium or magnesium. The current medical thinking doesn't support this. Muscles tend to hoard potassium, calcium, and magnesium such that they are lost at minor levels in sweat, compared to sodium and chloride losses. The diet usually supplies adequate amounts to prevent deficits that would contribute to cramping episodes. But further research may tell us otherwise.

Preventing Cramps

Stave off cramps before they start by recommending athletes to follow these simple guidelines:

1. **Drink plenty of fluids** to stay hydrated during exercise;
2. **Replenish sodium levels** during times of heavy exercise and profuse sweating with a sports drink like Gatorade;
3. **Ensure adequate nutritional recovery** (particularly for salt) and rest for muscles after hard training.

Quick Fixes for Cramps

When cramps strike during a workout or competition, take immediate action with the following:

1. Stretch. Because cramps are often related to a change in weight bearing, stretching and non weight-bearing exercises are effective treatments.

2. Massage the area. Rubbing the cramped muscle may help alleviate pain as well as help stimulate blood flow and fluid movement into the area.

3. Stimulate recovery. Rest and adequate dehydration with fluids containing electrolytes, particularly sodium, will quickly bring improvement.

- In an effort to standardize the ball used in every playoff game/match, the CIF-SS shall implement a new policy requiring schools to provide ONLY the official ball of each sport beginning with the CIF-SS playoff games of Fall 2002. So that your school has ample time to expend your current inventory of balls, you have more than 15 months to plan accordingly and begin purchasing the correct "official" ball.
- Open enrollment dates need to be remembered for the 2001-2002 sports year.
 - Students must make application to their new school by May 15.
 - Schools must send in their list of open enrollment students to the CIF-SS Office by May 31.
 - Families must provide proper paperwork by the first day of school in September.
 - Proper paperwork must be approved before the student is eligible for competition.
 - The student must attend the new school within the first 15 days of the new academic school year.
- A reminder that when hiring new coaches for the 2001-2002 school year that administrators keep in mind the association rule. Club coaches are more and more being considered for coaching positions for CIF-SS member schools. They must be reminded that prior to the established date for authorized before and after-school practice in a particular sport and following an individual's or team's last authorized competition, a student may receive athletic instruction in a CIF Southern Section approved sport **only** during one regularly scheduled physical education period in which the student is enrolled and earning credit for
