PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Survey Says!

This spring, the Southern Section office conducted a survey of attitudes and beliefs about transfers, paperwork and hardships among our member athletic directors and principals. The feedback was encouraging, with over 355 responses received on-line and 40 responses received in writing. While surveys cannot be used to as substitutes for the type of feedback we receive from Council and the Executive Committee, they can be used to make generalizations about Section policies and the beliefs of our constituents.

Some results were equivocal: the responses were not clear-cut enough determine the actual strength of a response. For instance, when asked if a student transfer should not displace an athlete who is at his/her home school, the responses broke down into roughly 1/3rd increments: agree, disagree and no opinion, with a slight majority to those that agreed with the statement: hardly overwhelming. One reason for this, however is that many of the respondents had only a few years experience on the job. One-third of the respondents had 1-3 years experience on the job and may not yet have formed opinions on the guestions asked.

Some responses however were remarkable for their strength with almost 90% agreement on certain issues. Below is a summary of what the survey found.

Responses and Observations:

Hardships and Parents:

Perhaps the most overwhelming response from our athletic administrators was in response to the statement: "A parent who dislikes a coach should be allowed to take his athlete to another school and be eligible immediately." 87% of the respondents disagreed; only 7.6% agreed that students should be permitted to transfer because of differences with a coach. The strength of that response speaks to our core beliefs. 82% of respondents say parents are more demanding than in years past and expect immediate eligibility for their students. Do families resort to falsification of information to gain hardship eligibility? According to 55% of the respondents, they do; only 14% disagreed with that statement. Similarly, 58% of the responses indicated that families often claim financial hardship to gain immediate eligibility; only 14% disagreed. While our administrators did not believe they should have to assist families in preparing paperwork for hardships, they also believe the paperwork is about right in terms of volume.

Transparency Is This Information Age

The latest term to hit the news recently seems to be "transparency." Seemingly, the public is interested in viewing the workings of government and agencies whose decisions may affect their lives. Fair enough. It is good to know that a city council is adhering to law and looking after the interests of the community. That is one reason California enacted the Brown Act, which requires disclosure of public meetings by public agencies.

CIF - both the State and Southern Section - conducts its business according to the Brown Act. Agenda may be found on the web site at least 36 hours before the conduct of a meeting. All Council meetings are advertised, dates published and they are open to the public. Public comment is available at every meeting. The same is true for meetings of the Executive Committee, the administrative body of the Southern Section. Minutes of meetings are similarly posted.

So, what is the concern about transparency? Is the public interested in the financial status of the Section? If so, the yearly audit is available and is announced every fall at Council. How about procedures for determining placement in championship bracket? The information is available through our Playoff Handbook, Dues, rules, transfer policies: all viewable in the Bluebook which can be downloaded to any computer through the website. Southern Section issues weekly media releases listing the activities of all commissioners, their movement, and committee meetings. We've posted transfer statistics as well as short essays on topical items.

Much has been made of the application of "athletic motivation" in limiting student eligibility. At least one blogger has made this phrase a target of derision purportedly because it is a vague term. The CIF Bylaws provide a pretty specific definition right in Bylaw 206.

"Based on the CIF philosophy that the 'student attend school to receive an education first: athletic participation is secondary' (Bylaw 200B), individual Section Offices may limit eligibility for a student when there is evidence the transfer, or move is made to acquire athletic participation at "School B." Such evidence of an athletically motivated move may be, but is not limited to: Evidence of parental or student dissatisfaction with a coach or a coaching decision at the former school.

- Evidence the student's move would result in the assurance the student would gain varsity participation at the new school or result in more playing time.
- Amove to a school by the student that is believed (objectively or subjectively) to be more competitive or athletically "visible."
- A demonstrated move to transfer that is prompted by association with club programs or outside agencies that use the facilities of the new school.
- Ademonstrated move or transfer to a school with which the student has had an athletic association.
- A move or transfer to a school by a student who is associated with outside agencies that use the facilities or personnel at the new school of attendance.
- The preponderance of credible evidence the move was not made in god faith to secure greater educational advantage for the student.


Students are not limited because they ask for eligibility, they may be limited because the move or transfer can be linked, through credible evidence, to one or more of the situations listed above.

One thing CIF may not be transparent about is confidential student information. Federal Law as well as State Education Code protects the privacy of families petitioning for eligibility. This is as it should be. Families often appear at appeal hearings bearing financial, medical and personal information that should not be made public. Public policy protects that information.

Every week the CIF produces documents, updates, media releases and email "blasts" to keep our member schools as well as the public informed of Section activities. The purpose is to keep everyone informed of the activities of this dynamic organization. Our methods and decisions are explained to anyone willing to spend the time to read them.











MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING - July 9, 2010

OPENING BUSINESS

- A. This meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order at 2:25 p.m. by President Bill Dabbs.
- B. The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance
- C. Roll call was taken by Pat Schmidt. All members were present with the exception of Janet Berardi, Wendy Doty, Steve Miller, Sr. Cheryl Milner, Gary Smidderks and Debi Weiss.
- D. Any Introductions Dan Burch was introduced as the new representative to the Executive Committee for Orange County.
- E. Adopt Agenda It was moved, seconded and approved to adopt the agenda.
- F. Approval of Minutes It was moved and seconded to approve the minutes of the April 20, 2010 Executive Committee meeting. The minutes were approved.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

There were no members of the public wishing to address the Executive Committee present at this meeting.

3. ACTION ITEMS

- A. State Federated Council Action Items
- 1. STATE393-Proposal from State Football Advisory Committee Regarding a Football Mercy Rule.

Discussion: Rob Wigod and Larry Satterfield discussed this item stating the Football Advisory Committee was not in favor of the change. The rule may be adopted at State level however, individual Sections may choose to adopt.

Decision: It was moved and seconded to support. The motion was approved.

 STATE396 – Proposal from State Governance Task Force regarding Season of Sport/Maximum Number of Contests.

Discussion: Rainer Wulf stated because the schools play 20-25 games during the summer, scrimmages are almost obsolete. Some teams play 26-28 games and they would have to cut off a non-league game.

Scott Raftery stated this would be a big change for volleyball. Removed from this is the number of games played per day. Ray Moore stated there is not need for scrimmages other than football because there is no association rule anymore. Bill Dabbs asked the staff to create wording for objections in each sport and forward to the State Governance Task Force.

Decision: It was moved to send this item back for study and amendment. There being no second, the motion was rescinded. It was moved to table this item to the September 30, 2010 Executive Committee meeting. It was seconded and approved.

Other Sections feel a fine for neglecting to submit paperwork is necessary. In reading this item, it was felt that having a Blue Book training for school administrators after a first offense would be more beneficial than a training after the third offense.

Decision: It was moved and seconded to support changing the consequences of item 3A to the forfeit of one game and attendance at a Blue Book training after the first offense. This item was approved.

 $STATE 399-Revision\ of\ Bylaws\ 801,\\802\ and\ 803\ Award\ and\ Contribution\ Limitations$

Discussion: This revision of this item brings the award amounts more relevant to the current economy.

Decision: It was moved and seconded to support. The motion was approved to support.

B. Southern Section Action Items. There were no Southern Section action items.

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

- A. State Federated Council Non-Action Items were discussed. There were no State Federated Council non-action items.
- B. Southern Section Non-Action items SS400 – Proposal from Cross Country Committee regarding Bylaw 1704 Starting Date for Individual Competition

Discussion: Cross Country coaches want to move the start date to the Thursday before Labor Day. Many schools start as early as August 11 and this would allow an extra week for contests without adding contests. This proposal would take effect during the 2011-2012 school year.

NEW BUSINESS

A. Hope Centre Academy Appeal of Sanctions on Baseball Program

Discussion: When the baseball brackets were released last year we received a call from

Hope Centre Academy stating that they would not participate. During the 2010 baseball season, they represented their league in the preliminaries but because they lost players during the season they felt they were unable to participate in the playoffs.

The sanctions imposed would bar them from entering playoffs next Spring (2011). Hope Centre Academy did not come to this Executive Committee meeting even though they requested to be heard.

Decision: It was moved and seconded to support the sanctions imposed on Hope Centre Academy after the baseball playoffs in 2010. This motion was approved.

B. NFHS Leadership Academy Report
Kristine Palle and Scott Raftery reported
they took 7 Leadership Council students from the
Southern Section and one student from another
Section to the NFHS Leadership Academy in
Indiana this past summer. They heard some very
good speakers and did some community service
at a local schools. There is consideration for a
state leadership camp to teach leadership skills
and to bring the students into their communities.

This year they will do a video with the help of a USC film student to be placed on our website. They currently have 26 students participating on this committee and hope to add more this year. Jim Staunton stated he would like to have these students attend Council meetings with their league coordinators and representatives to learn how Council operates.

C. Proposal for Additional Banking Relationship

Discussion: Mitch Carty would like to open an account with US Bank to accomplish our cash transactions for events. This bank is located next to our office and utilizing them for our event cash advances would be a test to see how well it would work. The bank is small and would have a more personal relationship. This account will be free of charge.

Decision: It was moved and seconded to support opening a new account with US Bank. Motion passed to support.

D. Change in First Allowable Contact Date

Discussion: We are looking to move the first allowable contact up a few days. This will also help the State add regional playoffs. It will align us with the NFHS calendar week and allow two scrimmages in pertinent sports. This item will be added to the Council agenda to effect all sports.

OFFICIALS' WHISTLE



Technical Difficulties

The world of officiating exists at many levels. This column will attempt to clarify the standards of that world as it relates to those men and women who officiate at the high school level.

Recent focus has been on major league baseball and its reluctance to accept the available technology to 'get calls right'. The NFL, NHL, NBA and even the NCAA have extensive rules and regulations that govern replay and making sure that plays can be confirmed or corrected. So what does this have to do with officials at your local high school game? More than you might think.

As in other areas of work and our personal lives, technology has been both a blessing and a curse. Officials are not exempt from this. It can be easily shown how our currentday official, in all sports, is better trained and has access to better methods of training, including the use of video, camps and on-line communications. Long gone, for the best of our officials and their Units, is the paper heavy and narrative style training of previous years. Meetings now include extensive video reviews and on a daily basis officials can access on line testing, play situations and videos of specific play situations. Unit leadership throughout the Southern Section has demonstrated a desire to maintain consistency in game administration.

One huge difference that exists in our games is the on-field technology. Nobody can predict if it will ever come to pass, but in the meantime we continue to rely on the first and available look of the official. While officials are right on a +90% ratio, there will always be the difficulty of dealing with the times when incorrect judgments occur.

It is important to know that advances in training are happening. That training carries over to the field and to the performance of officials. Maybe we will never know if the ball crossed the goal line or a tag at third base was missed. That day may come, but in the meantime, we have great games to officiate and true student athletes to provide opportunities for.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING November 4, 2010

OPENING BUSINESS

- E. Adopt Agenda There was a motion and second to approve the agenda without the adoption of the minutes from the previous meeting as some revisions need to take place. The motion was carried.
- F. Approval of Minutes Minutes of the September 30, 2010 Executive Committee Meeting Minutes from the September 2010 meeting will be revised.
- G. 2009-2010 Auditors Report Sean King from the Harrington group will present the audit. There was a motion and a second to approve the audit as presented. The motion carried.

Look into the cost of having an actuarial for the Southern Section aside from CalPers. We are unable to get an approximation of our liabilities (Southern Section only) away from the other organizations associated with CalPers.

There was a motion and second to accept the audit as reported. The motion carried.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Penalty for Lack of Administrative Oversight Affecting Student Ineligibility At Federated Council it was pointed out steps 2 and 3 of the current proposal need editing. Marie Ishida pulled the item for further revisions by the Sections' Commissioners. It was mentioned that education should be the first step in the corrective process. Once revised, this proposal will be revisited.
- 2. Revision of Bylaws 801, 802 and 803 Award and Contribution Limitations There was a motion and a second to support STATE399. The motion carried.
- 3. Eligibility: Transfers from List of Lowest Performing Schools A student at any grade level may transfer from an underperforming school to the closest public or charter school to the residence of the student (see handout language in Bylaw 207.B(3)-Underperforming Schools). Under this provision, a student can choose any public or charter school in any district but for the purpose of athletic eligibility, it must be the school closest to their residence.

There was a motion and a second to support STATE406. The motion was carried.

4. Legal Flow Chart Revision - The Commissioners are not in support of this because some of the smaller Sections do not want to be caught in the legal fees resulting from some rules that are more restrictive in certain Sections. They don't want to finance the more restrictive policy that doesn't apply to them.

There was a motion and a second to support STATE407. The motion carried.

5. National Championships - The NFHS anticipates getting corporate sponsorship to support this event. The Midwestern states have expressed concern and a feeling that we should not encourage National Championships. There is a feeling from the California Executive Director

that we should support.

There was a motion and a second to support STATE408. The motion carried.

6. Bylaw 201 Revisions: Standards of Eligibility - This bylaw supports the notion that a student can not transfer in order to escape ineligibility. We would support another state association's declaration if a student had lost eligibility there.

There was a motion and a second to support STATE409. The motion carried.

7. CIF Regional Championship Football Bowl Proposal - There would be a conflict in the current Southern Section schedule if we were to support this. This would put a strain on what we have in place currently and could affect our playoff system. We've tentatively worked out a proposal to plan if this is passed at the state level. We are planning to start competition a week earlier to account for schools that start early (not for the sake of this proposal). We can "opt out" of playing in the bowl games. In addition, if we don't adjust our schedule, logistically we wouldn't be able to participate anyway (described as "passive resistance"). Dr. Staunton's feeling is that we could not opt out because we are conducting our championship the same weekend. If the state does pass this, we will adjust our calendar as there is no way we can conduct an event that directly competes with attendance at a state bowl game.

There was a motion and a second to <u>not support</u> STATE410. The motion to <u>not support</u> carried.

- B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS
- 1. Proposal from Golf Advisory Committee regarding Rule 2004, Maximum Team Contests There was a request to not take action as this may be in direct conflict with a State Proposal that is coming forward.

There was a motion and a second to take <u>no action</u> on SS392 at this time. The motion carried.

2. Proposal from Area Placement/Releaguing Committee on Releaguing - This would not take effect until the next cycle. There was resistance and concern regarding re-leaguing every two years but the area placement portion was widely supported.

There was a motion and a second to approve the "area placement" portion of the proposal only (eliminating consideration of a 2 year cycle). The motion was carried.

3. Proposal from Cross Country Advisory Committee regarding Bylaw 1704 Starting Date for Individual Competition –

We received this from Cross Country but realize that this proposal would be supported if SS402 is carried.

There was a motion and a second to approve SS400. The motion was carried.

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

There are no State Federated Council non-action items at this time

B. SOUTHERNSECTIONNON-ACTION ITEMS

Proposal from Football Advisory Committee regarding Bylaw 3214 and 3214.1, Number of Team Entries into Playoffs - This would alter

entries by league. There is a "fixed" situation in football as there are no opportunities for wild card games. This proposal would support automatic entries as well as teams gaining entries on merit rather than automatic placement (compromising the strength of the representatives). The .500 criteria would be eliminated as some very strong programs in strong leagues with competitive preseason schedules may not have .500 records but may be playoff worthy (over an automatic entry).

2. Proposal from Executive Committee regarding Start Date of Contests for All Sports - With the exception of football, this would standardize the start dates for all sports per season getting us closer to the desired uniformity we're working toward.

2. Proposal from Area Placement/Releaguing Committee – Action - This item was pulled in the preliminary amendment/adoption of the agenda. See 1.D.

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

- A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS
- Penalty for Lack of Administrative Oversight Affecting Student Ineligibility - Discuss - There is a concern regarding the financial implications of this proposal. One thought is that forfeitures affect students for the mistakes of adults; therefore a fine would seem more appropriate than something affecting a team of student athletes. Imposing a fine should act as a deterrent. There is also a concern that some schools will find a \$1000 fine is worth not forfeiting and abuse the policy. Note: this sanction/fine would only be for schools where the student/s would have otherwise had eligibility IF PAPERWORK HAD BEEN FILED (not for an ineligible player that wouldn't otherwise have eligibility, playing in contests).
- 2. Revision of Bylaws 801, 802 and 803 Award and Contribution Limitations Discuss This has been adjusted to reflect the current value of awards.
- 3. Eligibility: Transfers from List of Lowest Performing Schools Discuss The California Department of Education has allowed for students to transfer freely if they are in a school that has been designated "low performing". This Bylaw would allow for students to maintain eligibility when transferring to a new school. There are details to be discussed such as what choices are available. It is thought that for the purpose of athletic eligibility, it will be the next closest public school to a student's residence.
 - 4. Legal Flow Chart Revision Discuss
 - 5. National Championships Discuss
- 6. Bylaw 201 Revisions: Standards of Eligibility Discuss This would affect students coming from another state whereby if a student is considered "ineligible" by their previous state association's bylaws, that ineligibility would follow them to the state of California. It aligns itself with our current philosophy (within the state) that a student cannot move and/or transfer to escape ineligibility.
- CIF Regional Championship Football Bowl Proposal - Discuss - A team playing for a state championship would be playing a 16th game. At the end of our section championships, there would be a round following with the winners advancing. This proposal would also affect the start date of football moving it a week earlier in order to finish the season prior to the proposed play date. Concern was made for multi sport athletes as this carries well into the winter season. Regional games would be determined by the 10 section commissioners across the state. The South consists of San Diego, LA, Central and Southern? The Southern Section Football Advisory Committee is against this. The other sections are in support because they haven't had representation in the state bowl. The regional would allow that. A comment was made that the profits from this endeavor would be used for Coaches' Education training (which is budgeted for). Many were in support of this

series prior because of the assumption that this would financially support Coaches' Ed.

- B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS
- 1. Proposal from Cross Country Advisory Committee regarding Bylaw 1704 Starting Date for Individual Competition to be presented by Janice Kelley Discuss Cross Country would like to move their start date 1 week earlier. There are 4 rational that support this. 1) Most schools are starting school this early so it makes sense that competition could begin. 2) Allows an additional week in the competitive season without increasing the maximum number of contest. 3) and 4) It moves us in line with other sections allowing for cross section competition.
- Proposal from Football Advisory Committee regarding Bylaw 3214 and 3214.1 Number of Team Entries into

Playoffs to be presented by

Bob Burt – Discuss - Proposal from Football Advisory Committee regarding team entries into the playoffs – In the sport of football only, the team entry formula for each league into the playoffs is as follows: 4-5 team leagues get 2 entries; 6-8 team leagues get 3 entries; 9 or more team leagues get 4 entries.

This would not require a .500 record or better to account for strong teams in strong leagues that may not reach that threshold, yet be deserving of a berth.

There was a concern that this is taking place in the middle of a re-leaguing cycle.

3. Proposal from Executive Committee regarding Start Date for Contests for All Sports to be presented by Bill Dabbs – Discuss - The proposal will get us aligned with the rest of the state since the legislature is looking for more commonality among the 10 California sections. This would accommodate Cross Country's proposal. Schools may still have an interscholastic scrimmage. End dates are not affected.

5. NEW BUSINESS

- A. Governance Task Force Report to be presented by Gary Smidderks - Governance Task Force - Every 5 to 7 years the CIF is reauthorized to govern interscholastic athletics in the state of California. The goal at hand is to align the various sections creating parody such that our association makes sense to the state legislators. We need this unity to avoid a different system breaking up the current and very functional operations we have as an organization. The Governance Task force recognizes the "jeopardy" that is out there. The more we can work cooperatively and collaboratively, the better chance we have at retaining and preserving our sovereignty as an organization. We are trying to help the organization from a big picture standpoint.
- B. LRG Marketing to be presented by John Costello Trademark your school logo with the state of California such that no one can make money off of your school logo (ie: your school letters, with the mascot/picture that represents your school). There is a fee involved, however it is minimal. This protects you from unauthorized businesses profiting from your property. The NFHS has a licensing program you can opt into that will potentially generate licensing revenue. Information is available on the CIF State website at www.cifstate.org.

The Southern Section office requests items "C" through "H" be placed on a consent calendar: There was a motion and second to put items C through H on a consent calendar. The motion carried.

Maintenance and/or gains were realized in some sports, new sport fee structure and publication (Rule Books) sales.

Final audit report will be presented to the Executive Committee on November 4.

New in 10-11: CIF-SS has withheld the distribution of Courtesy Cards until member dues are paid. As a result, nearly 90% are in (last year we were at 75%).

Mark Rose thanked everyone for the Champions for Character Golf Tournament on June 22. He would like to see the many wonderful students in our Section recognized in some way.

Dan Burch thanked everyone and stated he looks forward to representing Orange County.

Kristine Palle and Scott Raftery will be attending the national leadership conference in Indianapolis with eight students from our State. Seven are from the Southern Section and one is from the northern part of the state.

Scott Raftery thanked the Executive Committee for the gift the staff received. He also stated AB347 was signed by the governor today.

Transfers:

63% of our athletic administrators believe the new transfer rule is a good idea; only 17% disagree with the rule. Do students transfer for athletic reasons? A huge majority of administrators agree: 81% believe the reasons for transfer are athletic in nature. 64% of the respondents stated they personally knew of a family who transferred for athletic reasons. Are families motivated because of athletics? 78% of the respondents agreed, "sports participation has become so competitive that families transfer for athletic advantage." This seems to be the nature of our challenge: give a clear message that high school sports are secondary to athletics in a time when the pursuit of athletic advantage is overwhelming.

Should CIF regulate transfers and rule on eligibility? 83% of the respondents agreed that CIF should have that regulatory role. In a similar question, 67% of the respondents stated CIF should attempt to keep a "level playing field" by monitoring and ruling on transfers. Given the results from the hardship and transfer questions, it is surprising that only 46% of the respondents believe that transfers are disruptive to the educational

process. 35% believed it is not disruptive.

Office Policies:

Several questions were designed to ask whether the Section Office procedures are acceptable. Two questions dealt with whether the office was too permissive in hardship approvals. 48% of the respondents had no opinion; 45% believed the Office was not too permissive. To validate the first question, respondents were asked if the Office was too restrictive with hardships and 56% said no (30% had no opinion).

Priority Issues:

The last section of the survey asked our administrators to rank order, from a list, their top five issues facing CIF today. Here are the top vote getters:

- Club coaches who seemingly dictate where a student should attend school
- 2. Schools that always receive large numbers of transfers.
- 3. Parents with resources who move to gain eligibility.
- Student who transfer after a disagreement with a coach.
- Club sports in general.

Narratives:

Every respondent was given the chance to make a comment to end the survey. Many took advantage of the opportunity. The comments were generally favorable to the Section, its personnel and level of service to member schools. Some vented their frustration over transfers in general and "powerhouse" programs in particular. Some, however, saw student movement for athletic reasons as an outgrowth of our social emphasis on competition and the influence of club programs. Those respondents question why a student shouldn't receive eligibility after a transfer using the logic that a band member does not face limitations if he/she transfers.

Some of our issues can be polarizing as in the case of athletic transfers. The Section Office is confident that the membership has voiced its support for limits on eligibility to stem the tide of rampant student movement. It is safe to say that athletic administrators want their school to start each year with the opportunity to compete for league honors in a fair, structured atmosphere that imposes standards on academics and respect for rules.

following the 1983 baseball season.

In 1984 he was drafted by the Washington Redskins, where he played three seasons (1984-87). Schroeder was pressed into service during his rookie campaign after starting quarterback Joe Theismann suffered a career ending leg injury. Schroeder gained the starting spot on the Redskins in his second NFL season, and led them to a 12-4 record while throwing for a franchise record 4,109 passing yards and making the Pro Bowl. He managed to lead Washington all the way to the NFC title game, where his team was defeated 17-0 by the New York Giants.

The following season, Schroeder suffered a separated shoulder in the first game against the Philadelphia Eagles. The Redskins went on to a championship victory that year in Super Bowl XXII. Schroeder was traded the following season (1988) for Raiders tackle Jim Lachey, who went on to be a perennial Pro Bowl player for the Redskins.

He spent several seasons as the Raiders starting quarterback. He led the Raiders all the way to the AFC championship game as a starter in the 1990 season. However, the Raiders were defeated by the Buffalo Bills 51-3, in that game.

Schroeder also did stints with the Cincinnati Bengals (1993) and the Arizona Cardinals (1994).

Schroeder retired in 1995 with 1,426 of 2,808 completions for 20,063 yards and 114 touchdowns, with 108 interceptions, while also rushing for 761 yards and five touchdowns.

Jay was on staff with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in San Diego for 4 years. He coached football and baseball at Christian High for 6 years and has been involved with many Christian and/ or charitable organizations including Pro-Athletes Outreach and Focus on The Family. He speaks regularly at schools, churches and FCA related events.

Jay and his wife Debbie have been married 23 years. They have thee children; Brian, (who plays baseball in the minor leagues), Christopher and Katelyn Joy.
