No Support - Point of clarification - this proposal is a pilot program that will not go into effect until Spring of 2013 (typo in the paperwork). In addition, there will not be an adjustment in any current pitching guidelines. Again, finances were a large concern.

There was a motion and a second to support SS420. The motion failed 26-46

2. Proposal from Camino Del Rey Association regarding Rules 1647 (Basketball) and 2417 (Soccer) Coach Ejection to be presented by Dr. Merritt Hemenway - Action/Exec. Cmte. No Support

There was a motion and a second to support SS421. The motion failed.

4. NON-ACTION SESSION

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Revision of Bylaws 206-209: Transfer Eligibility—Discuss - More information is going to be forthcoming as the bylaws are under revision for consideration. There will be more to come at our February meeting.

2. Reformatting/Revision of Bylaws 200-217 – Discuss - More information is going to be forthcoming as the bylaws are under revision for consideration. There will be more to come at our February meeting.

3. Revision of Bylaw 303.D: Small Learning Communities, Small Schools, Alternative Schools and Charter Schools Housed on a Member School Campus – Discuss - Allows students to “play where they are” so to speak. This proposal came via the San Francisco Section where student travel long distance across the bay to small learning communities daily. The current Bylaws require students to get back to their residential area to play for their neighborhood school which in some cases is impossible given they use public transit to commute. The dispensation proposed will allow those students a choice to be eligible at the public high school near where they are being educated or the school where the small learning community is housed.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposal from Southwestern League regarding the State Football Bowl Game Format to be presented by Ray Moore - Discuss - Football advisory committee unanimously supports this change. The current structure doesn't allow as many schools to participate. This allows for every section to have representation in the State Bowl format while not extending the season an extra week.

2. Proposal from the Moore League regarding Bylaw 3200.2, 3200.1, 3200.1.1 to be presented by Lisa Ulmer – All Playoffs Managed by Commissioner—Discuss - This proposal is being researched further. There is a lot of consideration that needs to be given to a format change with studies being incorporated to find the correct formulation. The Southern Section staff will assist in a further study of such a change.

3. Proposal from the Trinity League regarding Bylaw 200, 206, 207, 208 and 510 and the wording “Athletically Motivated Transfer” and “Transferring for Athletic Reasons” to be presented by Michael Brennan – Discuss - This proposal would take all language referencing “athletic motivation” out of our Bylaws. Despite

being a proposal brought forth by a league comprised of private high schools, the notion exists that this affects both private and public schools. “Athletic Motivation” is a difficult thing to prove. “Undue Influence” is a more measurable entity that exists to keep coaches/others from encouraging students to make transfer decisions for athletic as opposed to academic reasons. “Athletic Motivation” is difficult to define. Motivation is difficult to show. Clarification was offered reminding council this is a CIF State Bylaw. Voting in favor or in opposition of this bylaw will allow our representatives to present this at the State level for further review.

4. Proposal from Boys and Girls Tennis Advisory Committee regarding Bylaw 2706, End of Competition to be presented by Howie Farer – Discuss - The State implemented a Regional tournament in the sport of tennis. Unfortunately there was a calendar conflict given the Southern Sections current calendar. The State tournament schedule finished long before our tennis championship tournaments. Instead of starting tennis two weeks earlier in each respective season, supporting this proposal would allow us to conduct our individual tennis championships AFTER the Team State Regional tournament commences.

5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Governance Task Force Report - Gary Smidderks - The Section is encouraged to provide leadership and innovation in the transitions that are coming forth with state issues. Instead of voting “no” for state issues with no solution, propose palatable change that can satisfy the needs of all sections. Kudos were given to Ray Moore for his league's offering of an alternative to the State Bowl proposal we are faced with currently. Their proposal satisfies the want for statewide participation without adding the extra week of play.

6. REPORT SESSION

A. President's Report - Bill Dabbs - Mr. Dabbs echoed the need for solutions to state proposals that we do not support. He also commended the San Luis Obispo area for their community support of a football player and his family after a serious injury was sustained during a game. High School athletics is a great time to personify character and the community.

B. Commissioner's Report - Rob Wigod - All Fall Workshops have been completed by staff. Directories have been completed and sent to schools. An Athletic Trainers Committee and Technology Committee have been added to the CIF's advisory list of offerings. Prep Zone has been a great way to highlight high school sport and fantastic stories of its participants. The Champions for Character Award dinner is coming up on Monday (October 24th) at the Queen Mary. We are excited to honor all who exemplify Victory with Honor in our Section.

C. Treasurer's Report - Reggie Thompkins - 2010-2011 audit is complete with the final read at the November Executive Committee Meeting. Only 14 schools have outstanding dues.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

August 18, 2011

1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to order by Bill Dabbs, President of the Council - The Executive Committee meeting was called to order at 1:06 p.m. by Bill Dabbs, President.

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call - All members were present with the exception of Dan Burch and Larry Satterfield.

D. Any Introductions

E. Adopt Agenda – Action - A motion was made to adopt the agenda with the following change. Item 3A Southern Section

Action Items were moved to be heard after Item 2 Public Hearing Section and add Item 7B, Update on Litigation. The motion was seconded and carried.

F. Approval of Minutes –

1. Minutes of the May 19, 2011 Executive Committee Meeting – Action - A motion was made to approve the minutes of the May 19, 2011 Executive Committee Meeting. The motion was seconded and carried.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

No one was present to address the Executive Committee.

3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. Bylaw 207.B (3) – Low Achieving Schools, Q & A - Discuss/Recommend - Discussion: This revision clarified that the closest school means the closest geographic public or charter school, even if outside the district. It also clarified language specific to eligibility guidelines and broadened the rules for transfers other than for low-achieving schools.

It was moved and seconded to approve this item as revised. The motion carried.

2. Proposal from CIF State Cross Country Advisory Committee Regarding the Addition of a Sixth Division of 8 teams per

Division to be Eligible for Automatic State Qualifying - Discuss/Recommend - Discussion: This item was brought forth by the SAC-Joaquin Section will create six divisions for the Cross Country State Meet with the new Division 1 minimum enrollment set at 2600+, the new Division 5 enrollment capped at 1250 and the new Division 6 capped at 500. The Sections would then be able to balance their enrollment numbers for the new Divisions 2, 3, and 4. It will allow more opportunities for participation by other Sections. This is also an issue of competitive equity and size of a school.

It was moved and seconded to approve. The motion carried.

3. Proposal from State Commissioners Committee regarding Bylaw 207B and 207C, Little Minnow Clause - Discuss/Recommend - Discussion: This item allows a seventh semester student to be eligible at the varsity level.

This item was pulled at the State meeting in April and Mr. Wigod recommended we wait to vote in September because of possible revisions to the item.

It was moved and seconded to table this item until the September 29, 2011 Executive Committee meeting. The motion carried.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

1. Approval of At-Large Representative to the Executive Committee – Action - It was moved and seconded to appoint Monica Colunga to the Executive Committee. The motion carried.

2. Redlands Adventist Academy Appeal of Softball Sanctions – Action - Discussion: Jan Rice, Athletic Director and Omar Fernandez, Softball Head Coach, were present to address the Executive Committee. They explained the senior trip was scheduled on the same day as

the playoff game. They were told there may be consequences by Scott Raftery if they did not participate. Ms. Rice did not contact the Southern Section office to advise they would not be participating but did try to contact St. Genevieve High School. Their pitcher was a senior who was informed she could not leave the senior trip and come back after the game and the coach did not want to put his younger players in a losing situation. Mr. Dabbs informed the athletic director and head coach that if they had chosen not to participate in the playoffs that is their choice. But they chose to enter playoffs. The sanctions imposed prohibit Redlands Adventist Academy from participating in playoffs for one year.

It was moved and seconded to support the Southern Section's decision to impose probation on the Redlands Adventist Academy softball team for the 2011-12 school year. The motion carried.

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

There were no State Federated Council non-action items.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

There were no Southern Section non-action items.

5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Elimination of Neutral Sites for Basketball - Discussion: The Athletic Administrators Committee recommended elimination of this requirement for basketball because it put undue pressure on the home team. It was recommended to have it at the home team site because of the convenience and cost. The Basketball Advisory Committee does not agree it would be wise to eliminate the neutral sites. Issues brought up by the athletic administrators included that the site is off campus, there is unfamiliarity with the neutral site campus and set up of the gym, staff has to be paid to work, custodians would be paid double time and there is a financial impact on the schools.

The new process to be implemented is that the schools will meet and discuss the facilities and a decision will be jointly made.

B. Regional Ticket Distribution Sites for Volleyball and Basketball - Discussion: Because basketball playoffs occur so close together, it is often difficult for schools to come to the office for tickets. Volleyball and basketball coaches would like to have regional ticket distribution sites similar to the way football does it. Santiago/Cor and San Marcos have agreed to be test sites for this year. Office staff will pre-package tickets, take them to the schools and train the site personnel in an effort to keep the work for the schools at a minimum. If this new process works well, we hope to expand to more school sites next year.

6. CLOSED SESSION

Closed session began at 3:30 p.m. and ended at 4:32 p.m.

7. REPORT SESSION

A. President's Report, Bill Dabbs - Bill Dabbs reports that this will be a very important year as we begin with new leadership and important issues. Hopefully they will be ameliorated so we may move forward. As we move into our 100th year, I hope it will be as smooth as possible.

B. Treasurer's Report, Reggie Thompkins - Reggie Thompkins read the treasurer's report. He also stated the auditors will be in attendance at the November meeting. He also reported that the Southern Section will not have any long term liability on the building as the mortgage was paid

off. The only expenses will be maintenance and upkeep.

C. Commissioner's Report, Rob Wigod - Rob Wigod reported on the Eligibility Workshops held in areas of the Section. There are a total of six trainings that will be held. He reported that we will receive over \$750,000 in sponsorship revenue and this will help keep costs from our schools. We are working with Time Warner. There will be about \$190,000 in revenue and most of this will go to the schools.

We also have 580 Ford banners that need to go up at the schools. Rob asked the Executive Committee to remind schools to hang these banners. Our next Executive Committee meeting will be held on the Fox lot. Lunch and dinner will be served as well as a video presentation highlighting the Southern Section. The January meeting will be at the Renaissance Hotel in Palm Springs.

D. Executive Committee Member Reports

Jim Monico – This year should be very exciting. He attended the NFHS meeting in Philadelphia and learned the issues in other states are very similar to ours. Concussion information was highlighted by the NFHS.

Gary Smidderks – He stated that Los Angeles Baptist will be merging with another high school at the end of this year.

Ray Moore – Congratulated Mitch Carty on the new dues structure.

Jeff Jordan – Welcomed the opportunity to be part of this committee and looks forward to learning more about the behind the scenes work of the Southern Section.

Thom Simmons – There will be a meet and greet the new Commissioner with press representatives at Legends in Long Beach on Thursday, August 25, 2011. He also stated a new technology committee is being formed in hopes of working better with the schools.

Monica Colunga – Thanked the committee for their welcome and looks forward to the new year.

San Buenrostro – Also thanked the committee for their welcome and feels fortunate to be part of a group of people with a lot of passion about what they do.

Sue Kuwabara – Welcomed the new members and Glenn Martinez. She also stated she will be part of the Legislative Action Committee for State CIF.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

September 29, 2011

1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to order by Bill Dabbs, President of the Council

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call

D. Any Introductions - Scott Donald, CIF State attorney

E. Adopt Agenda - Action It was moved to amend the Revised Agenda to bring the Closed Session, Item A forward to be heard after Item 2 Public Hearing Session. The motion was seconded and carried. It was also moved to move State Federated Non-Action Item STATE 416 Reconsideration of New Bylaw, Season of Sport, Items A and D to Action Item. The motion was seconded and carried

F. Approval of Minutes –

1. Minutes of the August 18, 2011 Executive Committee Meeting – Action - It was moved and seconded to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

There was no one present to address the Executive Committee.

3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. Reconsideration of New Bylaw, Season of Sport Items A and D only – Discussion - Discussion: The CIF Central Section requested reconsideration of the vote on the Season of Sport sections A and D under Bylaw 101 whereby six Sections out of ten voted in favor of the proposal with the four largest Sections opposing.

It was moved to support the reconsideration of items A and D as they are written. It was seconded and the motion carried.

It was moved and seconded to not support Item D. The motion carried to not support.

Further discussion: Item A would be approved if “including tryouts” was removed.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

There are no Southern Section action items at this time.

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

There were no State Federated non-action items.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposal from the Southwestern League regarding the State Football Bowl Game Format – Discussion - Explanation: This proposal would increase the revenue to the schools and Sections that are selected to participate in the football bowl games. Playing 16 games is dangerous for players. With the regular bowl game, it would be required to move their calendar one week early making some schools start in July. There are some schools that would not get their players out in July because of the heat. Coaches would also be lengthening their season and not get paid for it. All Sections would be represented in this format. This proposal shares revenues with schools, Sections and State CIF. Implementation date would be 2013.

Discussion: This would have to be a State sponsored bowl game because intersection bowl games are prohibited post-season. This

item is intended to be State approved. It was unanimously approved by the Football Advisory Committee in a straw poll. Starting date is a plus; it does not push it back.

2. Proposal from the Moore League regarding Bylaw 3200.2, 3200.1, 3200.1.1 All Playoffs Managed by Commissioner – Discussion - Explanation: There has been a concern among some of the schools that the playoff brackets are unfair to some schools. This is the same format as basketball and adjusting to how they have done in the last four years. Basketball uses CBED's enrollment figures; it would be difficult for volleyball because those numbers come in October. Girls volleyball could use numbers from the prior year and boys could use current year numbers.

Discussion: The schools sense that the basketball format works. This also falls in with competitive equity. We do not know how this manner of playoff brackets works for basketball until all four years are in. Rainer Wulf felt the way it works for basketball might work but it needs to be time studied. Scott is not sure if this model will work with ten divisions. The Section wants to find a model that will work for all sports. This works well with 40-45 schools but with larger divisions, it will not work. The volleyball coaches like the basketball model but they are not putting in the time to see if the mechanics would work before we try it. Every model will not work for everyone. There will always be someone who feels they are in the wrong place.

3. Proposal from the Trinity League regarding Bylaw 200, 206 207, 208 and 510, and the wording “Athletically Motivated Transfer” and “Transferring for Athletic Reasons” – Discussion - Explanation: This will be a Section item and if it passes, it will go to the State Federated Council for their consideration and approval. We would like to see students changing schools for academic reasons rather than for athletic reasons. By taking this wording out, we are relying on schools to determine the reasons for transferring. This was originally passed in May, 2009, once the philosophy statement was made about what we believe and this is the extension of that statement.

Discussion: The final objective is clear, getting there is where the difficulty lies and needs continuing review.

5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Screening Practice for Referees – Discussion - Explanation: This item came up at the Catholic Athletic Association meeting. The concern is that the officials are not fingerprinted.

Discussion: Glenn Martinez spoke with the Officials Associations and is waiting to hear back from them. The independent contracting association says that if they were to fingerprint, then their officials would be employees. They have their own bylaws and are not employed by schools.

B. CalPers 457 Plan – Action - Mitch Carty - Explanation: CalPers is our benefit provider and has offered the ability to employees to belong to this plan and contribute on a deferred basis. There is no financial or legal liability to CIF because it is between the staff member and CalPers but we are required to have our Executive Committee approve this participation.

It was moved and seconded to support the staff in participating in the CalPers 457 Plan.

The motion was carried.

6. CLOSED SESSION

A. Update on Litigation by Scott Donald

B. Commissioner's Goals

Closed Session began at 2:04 p.m. and ended at 2:45 p.m. No action was taken.

7. STAFF MEMBER REPORTS

A. Marketing Update, John Costello - John Costello stated we have signed \$779,000 for this year with \$752,000 in cash agreements. Of that \$610,000 is Southern Section driven and \$141,000 is from State contracts. The State sponsorship trend is toward more contacts that are State and Southern Section or State plus Southern and Los Angeles Sections only. There are fewer agreements that involve the other Sections. Under consideration is the review of the State marketing plan. The State is proposing they be entitled to sell a State “title” sponsor just for State regionals and championships.

Regarding television, the Southern Section currently has 181 regular season football games contracted for television or web broadcast. The feedback from PrepZone has been tremendous and as of this date, no Time Warner proposal has been received in writing.

Champions for Character: A plus to our partnership with Fox Sports is their assistance with other projects. Aside from aiding with our 100th Anniversary, Fox Sports has brought to us a potential scholarship donation from Farmer John in the amount of \$50,000 for the Champions for Character student award winners. This would be a great addition to the program beginning next year and Fox Sports is aiding in this effort at no benefit to them. This is a true partnership on many levels.

B. Centennial Celebration, Thom Simmons - The Centennial Committee met on August 30th and added two people from Fox Sports to the committee. Many topics were discussed and the final centennial is scheduled for April 11, 12 and 13, 2013. The minutes of the meeting are attached.

The committee has sent out questionnaires to schools about their history. They are looking to get 10-15 people to help in determining the top 100 athletes of all time. Fox Sports will film the Centennial.

A motion was made and seconded to approve April 11, 12 and 13, 2013 as the dates for the CIF Southern Section Centennial culminating celebration. The motion carried.

C. Athletic Trainers Committee, Glenn Martinez - Mike West, President, California Athletic Trainers, and ten others will meet to help provide information to trainers on timely topics for discussion. They are meeting on October 12, 2011 and Glenn will update the Executive Committee at the next meeting on the results of this meeting.

D. Audit Report, Mitch Carty - Mitch Carty presented the final auditor's report which the auditors will present at the November 3, 2011 Executive Committee meeting. (Copy attached)

8. REPORT SESSION

A. President's Report, Bill Dabbs - Bill stated he appreciates everyone's attention to all of the items discussed. A topic at the NFHS Section 7/8 Meeting centered on concussions and that it is still a nationwide issue. He also reported that Washing, Oregon, Alaska and Nevada have been sued for Title IX violations.

November 3, 2011

E. Adopt Agenda – Action - There was a motion and a second to adopt the agenda. The motion carried.

F. Approval of Minutes

1. Minutes of the September 29, 2011 Executive Committee Meeting – Action - There was a motion and a second to approve the minutes as presented. The motion carried.

G. 2010-2011 Auditor's Report – Action - Mitch Carty will be presenting the latest information. The audit report will be in January. The final report was received on Monday, however the audit committee wasn't available to meet. Some clarification will need to be made regarding new procedures implemented into the report. The organization is down \$111k, however that was a result of some decisions made last year. Bill Dabbs reminded the group that we were expecting a deficit of close to \$80k and were prepared with reserves to cover that amount. We will go into more detail in January.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

Rob attended the Federated Council Meeting where there were suggested revisions made to the 200 series of the Bylaws. He sent out a Synopsis of Changes to help bullet the major changes proposed. We will have more time in January to visit the specifics of each proposed change. The motivation behind these changes was legislative pressure and legal expenses. There is a push to calm some of the transfer issues the state is currently facing. Hardships will still exist but these guidelines would narrow the criteria to meet hardship. There was concern here. The foreign student rule would be included in 207 with some modification. Financial hardships are anticipated to be eliminated. Undue influence is intact, but athletic motivation has been modified.

1. Revision of Bylaws 206-209: Transfer Eligibility (Information will be emailed before meeting) – Discuss - There are three proposals here and we are supposed to select one of the three. There is resistance to proposal #2 (see specific language). It looks like the Southern Section will lean to one or three. In 207, the "sit out period" would most likely eliminate the need for hardship.

2. Reformatting/Revision of Bylaws 200-217 (Information will be emailed before meeting) - Discuss

3. Revision of Bylaw 303.D: Small Learning Communities, Small Schools, Alternative

Schools and Charter Schools Housed on a Member School Campus – Discuss - Currently, students that are participating via multi-school agreements must compete for their school of residence (the school that their physical home address belongs to). For student-athletes in some areas, it is difficult for them to get back to their residential school's athletic hour because of the long distances they travel to get there. This is especially the case for students in the Bay Area of San Francisco who attend small learning communities. They can't get back to their residential school in time to participate. The change in this bylaw would allow students to play at the school where the small learning community is housed or their home school of attendance.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposal from the Southwestern League regarding the State Football Bowl Game Format – Discuss - Athletic administrators are in favor of this proposal. Football advisory committee is also in favor. Gary commended the Southwestern League for their idea that joined the wish of the state to incorporate all Sections in the bowl series and the desire of the Southern Section to not add an extra week to the season. We will need support from the Southern Section Council for it to move forward to State Federated Council for review and vote.

2. Proposal from the Trinity League regarding Bylaw 200, 206 207, 208 and 510, and the wording "Athletically Motivated Transfer" and "Transferring for Athletic Reasons" – Discuss - The state left the "athletic motivation" language in the transfer revisions with the notion it could be changed at a later date. This proposal will be voted on February 2, 2012 in the Southern Section and will then go to Federated Council for review and subsequently, a vote. At this time, the Executive Committee will not take a position however, in January when this is an action item, it will.

3. Proposal from Boys and Girls Tennis Advisory Committee regarding Bylaw 2706, End of Competition – Discuss - This will add one week to the current calendar in the Bluebook. Start date would remain the same but the end date would be one week later to keep our schedule from being compressed.

5. CLOSED SESSION

A. Personnel Matters - The recommendation of the Commissioner was accepted regarding the employment reclassification.

6. REPORT SESSION

A. President's Report, Bill Dabbs - Executive Committee members were encouraged to volunteer for awards duties at the various Fall Championships. There is a great need as we have many events to cover.

STEVE SARKISIAN SPEAKS AT 36TH ANNUAL FOOTBALL PRESS CONFERENCE AND LUNCHEON

Former CIF Southern Section, college and professional standout and current head football coach for the University of Washington Huskies, Steve Sarkisian served as the keynote speaker for the CIF Southern Section Press Conference Luncheon on Monday, December 5, 2011.

The luncheon will be held at The Grand in Long Beach. This was the second time Sarkisian has spoken at the luncheon. The last time was in 2006 when he was assistant coach and offensive coordinator for the USC Trojans under Pete Carroll.

"We were thrilled to have back a fantastic speaker and good friend of the CIF Southern Section in Steve Sarkisian to make the trip from Seattle just to be a speaker at our press luncheon," said CIF-SS Commissioner of Athletics, Rob Wigod. "Steve always provides an energy and enthusiasm that our student-athletes really get excited about."

Sarkisian came to the UW with a wealth of experience as a quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator. His string of success is nearly unprecedented as, during his time at USC, he has coached two Heisman Trophy winners and overseen one of the nation's most consistent and dominant offenses. Sarkisian spent 2007 and 2008 as the Trojans' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He had also previously served as assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach (2005-06), quarterbacks coach (2002-03) and as an offensive assistant (2001) at USC, for a total of seven seasons there. During his seven seasons as a member of the Trojans' staff, the team has posted a combined 74-15 record. As offensive coordinator, his record was 22-3.

Aside from his various roles at USC, Sarkisian also spent one season as quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders in 2004 and as QBs coach at El Camino College in Torrance, Calif., in 2000, his first coaching job.

A standout quarterback at BYU, Sarkisian actually faced his current team in Husky Stadium, on Sept. 14, 1996. That day, his Cougars suffered their only loss in a 14-1 season, falling to the Huskies, 29-17. Sarkisian completed 23-of-35 passes for 279 yards, no interceptions and two touchdowns.

In 2007, USC averaged 434.9 yards per game and scored an average of 32.6 points en route to an 11-2 overall record and a 49-17 win over Illinois in the Rose Bowl. The Trojans finished with the No. 3 ranking in the final Associated Press top 25 poll. USC quarterback John David Booty, despite missing several games with injury, was drafted in the fifth round by the Minnesota Vikings in the 2008 NFL draft.

In 2006, with Sarkisian as quarterbacks

coach, Booty earned first-team All-Pac-10, leading the Pac-10 in passing efficiency and total offense. That Trojan team posted an 11-2 record and closed the season with a 32-18 victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl and a No. 4 ranking in the final AP poll.

In 2005, quarterback Matt Leinart won the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting, was a finalist for the Davey O'Brien, Maxwell and Walter Camp Awards and was a first-team All-America selection. Under Sarkisian's tutelage, Leinart set 16 USC records (including 11 Pac-10 marks and two NCAA records). The Arizona Cardinals made Leinart the 10th pick of the 2006 NFL draft. USC's 4,157 passing yards in 2005 set a school record and the Trojans finished fifth in the in passing offense with 319.8 yards per game. The 2005 USC team went 12-1, outscoring opponents 638-297 for the season. The Trojans posted a 12-1 record before falling to Texas 41-38 in a thrilling national title game in the Rose Bowl, finishing with a No. 2 final ranking.

Sarkisian spent the 2004 season as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. His quarterbacks passed for more than 4,000 yards in 2004 as Oakland ranked eighth in passing in the NFL.

In 2003 as quarterbacks coach at USC, Sarkisian helped Leinart earn first-team All-American and the Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Year Award. Leinart also finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy voting while setting Pac-10 season records for TD passes (35) and consecutive passes without an interception (212). Leinart also set a school record with the highest pass efficiency rating in USC history (163.2). USC coasted to the first of two straight national championships, going 12-1. The Trojans beat Michigan, 28-14, in the Rose Bowl. In 2002, quarterback Carson Palmer won the Heisman Trophy and Unitas Award en route to setting the Pac-10 career records for passing yards and total offense. Palmer was selected as the overall No. 1 pick in the 2003 draft, selected by the Cincinnati Bengals. That season, USC went 11-2 and capped the season with a 38-17 victory over third-ranked Iowa in the Orange Bowl to finish as the nation's No. 4-ranked team.

As an offensive assistant in 2001, in Pete Carroll's first season in charge at USC, Sarkisian helped the team to a 6-6 overall record and a trip to the Las Vegas Bowl.

Sarkisian spent the 2000 season as the quarterbacks coach at El Camino Junior College in Torrance (Calif.). Warriors quarterback Robert Hodge earned All-American honors that season and El Camino played in the CHiPs For Kids Bowl.

Sarkisian starred at the quarterback position at the prep, collegiate and pro levels. After his standout career at Brigham Young University, he was played for the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League for three seasons (1997-99).

He had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career at BYU, playing under legendary coach Lavell Edwards. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 touchdowns in his career. His 162.0 career passing efficiency rating ranked third on the all-time NCAA list. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, No. 7 all-time) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the 1997 Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996, earned second-team All-America honors and played in the East-West Shrine Game and Hula Bowl. As a junior in 1995, he earned all-conference honors and led BYU to the WAC title.

Sarkisian transferred to BYU from El Camino Junior College, where he played two seasons (1993-94). He was a first-team Junior College All-America selection as a sophomore and earned all-conference honors in 1993 as a freshman. He also played baseball at El Camino in 1993. He originally enrolled at USC as a baseball player, spending the fall of 1992 on the Trojans' roster before transferring.

Sarkisian was a standout football and baseball player at West Torrance (Calif.) High.

He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from BYU in 1997 after receiving his associate's degree in general studies from El Camino in 1994.

Steve Sarkisian was born March 8, 1974. He and his wife, Stephanie, have two daughters, Ashley and Taylor, and a son, Brady.
