### Minutes

1. OPENING BUSINESS DISPOSITION ITEM

- A. Call to order by Carter Paysinger, President of the Council The meeting was called to order at 1:03 p.m.
- B. Pledge of Allegiance
- C. Roll Call All members were present except Todd Arrowsmith, Geniel Moon, John Norman, Mike Middlebrook and Mitch Carty.
- D. Introduction of Guests
  There were no guests present.
- E. Adopt Agenda Adopted 19-0-0
  There was a motion and a second to adopt the agenda. There was no discussion and the agenda was adopted.
- F. Approval of Minutes Approved 19-0-0

There was a motion and a second to approve the minutes of the January 14, 2017 Executive Committee meeting. There was no discussion and the minutes were approved.

### 2. PUBLIC COMMENT

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

There was no one present to address the Executive Committee.

### 3. ACTION ITEMS

#### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Budget for 2017-2018 Approved 19-0-0 STATE 540 Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding the CIF State Budget, which included a recommendation for a 5% increase in salaries for staff. The CIF State conducted a nationwide study of salaries and the results indicated a 5% increase as opposed to a 4% increase. The CIF State has not received an increase in salary for the last three years. This increase would impact the budget by only \$13,500. The CIF State Executive Committee has approved this budget. Mike West asked if there would be a raise in CIF State dues and Monica Colunga answered no. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. The motion carried 19-0-0

2. Proposed Bylaws 504; 1200; 1700; 1701; 1702 -

Approved 20-0-0 STATE 542

Competitive Cheer

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding the fulfillment of AB 949, Cheerleading as a CIF sport. This would bring Cheer into the Blue Book and would cause the renumbering of other sections of the bylaws. The CIF is working with the State Cheer Advisory Committee in writing the bylaws and moving slowly on implementation. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. Mike West asked if once approved, would Cheer fall under the Sunday practice rule. Rob Wigod answered yes, and that most of the larger competitions conducted by outside organization have already moved their Sunday competitions to Saturday competitions. The motion carried 20-0-0.

3. Proposed Revision Bylaws 1606; 2401; 2901; 2902 -

Approved 20-0-0 STATE 543

Competitive Equity Placement

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding the CIF following what the Southern Section already does in regard to competitive equity placement for CIF Regional and CIF State Championships. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion and the motion carried 20-0-0.

4. Proposed Bylaws Revisions 503.B.1 -

Approved 20-0-0 STATE 544

Uniform Administrative Penalty

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding standardizing sanctions when students are ineligible due to adult error. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion and the motion carried 20-0-0.

5. Proposed Revision Bylaws 206; 207; 510; 1100 -

Approved 20-0-0 STATE 545

Athletically Motivated Transfers

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding the removal of language related to dissatisfaction with the former school from the athletically motivated transfer language contained in CIF Bylaw 510. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion and the motion carried 20-0-0. After the vote, Rob Wigod mentioned that the southern areas of the state are voting in favor of this proposal but we do not know how the northern areas are voting and it could be a very close vote. Mark Edgemon asked what is the reason for voting no and Rob Wigod stated that they feel they are giving something up. There needs to be a consistency since there are other areas of education that allow for movement due to dissatisfaction with a former school. Terry Barnum added that athletic motivation is an arrow that does not work and dies quickly. Carter Paysinger agreed with the inconsistency and that every other area of education allows for movement except for athletics. Sandy Gahring recounted a story about a cheer girl who did not make cheer squad for next year and has transferred to another school.

6. Proposed Revision Bylaw 1206 – Standardized Number of Contests

Approved 19-1-0 STATE 546

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding standardizing the number of contests for all sports which may cut back one basketball game but adds an additional scrimmage and brings the north and south more in alignment. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. Jill Matyuch voiced her opposition to this proposal. There is an incentive to join tournaments because of the ability to play five games and only count two and this proposal takes that away. Lower levels will cut back on tournaments because of travel cost concerns. Denise Halstead stated that there was the same discussion in her league and the same costs (travel, officials) coming back to the league schools. Kristine Palle asked why schools would not continue going to tournaments as nothing has changed. It is a loss of one head to head contest rather than dropping any tournaments. Jill Matyuch used as an example her soccer schedule where they play in three tournaments, play twelve games that only count for six and pay \$300 a tournament. Without going to those tournaments, the cost of running home games becomes the burden of the school, creating an unintended consequence. Nancy Kelly asked if it was possible for booster to fund it differently. Chris Calderwood stated that he agreed with Kristine Palle. Although he understands what Jill Matyuch is saying, teams attend tournaments for more reasons than number of counted contests. Schools will still participate in tournaments for what tournaments provide and all that is involved in a tournament, the competition, the pressure, it is not just about the number of games, it is who they are competing against. Jim Perry added that we have been very specific with basketball and then asked Jill Matyuch if this is a concern for all sports or just basketball? Jill Matyuch answered that it a concern regarding the lower levels. Kristine Palle stated that coaches may not want to do more single games and prefer playing in tournaments with more games in just a couple of days instead of single games spread out over several days. Terry Barnum stated that how games are financed is different from district to district and wonders if what Jill Matyuch is stating is how it works in all districts. The purpose of this proposal is to level the playing field so when schools reach the state championships, all teams competing have a similar resume. Loren Kleinrock stated that there is a financial burden between schools that can and cannot afford to play in tournaments. Chris Calderwood remarked that coaches like tournaments as they do not have to find teams to play, that someone else is doing that work and your school is not responsible for those arrangements. Denise Halstead restated that her league is under the same thinking and that limits may need to be set on number of games teams are allowed to schedule. Rob Wigod reiterated the comment stating that leveling the state playing field the motivation behind this proposal. Also, this is all pre-season competition and a single game is a different type of preparation for league than the preparation you receive playing in a tournament. They need the pressure of the tournament rather than the "friendly" atmosphere of a single game. It was not anyone's intention to cost schools more money or to forward something that was a detriment to our schools. Dana Wilkerson stated that if basketball had gone to 29 games instead 28 games, we would not be having this problem. Rob Wigod stated that it is trading a non-league game for one more scrimmage. Monica Colunga stated that it is important to step back and see the unintended consequences. Rainer Wulf remarked that the key piece is to fill your schedule and without tournaments, scheduling would be very difficult. The motion carried - 19-1-0.

All-Star Contests

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding allowing all-star contest participants for underclassmen in addition to seniors after their season of sport. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. Dick Billingsley stated that this is going allow for recruiting. Mike West stated that the leagues in his area are not in favor of this proposal. Paul Lopez added that in football, this can be dangerous. Chris Calderwood added that this is already happening in club sports, however, that is not a reason to approve it. Dave Reid stated that this adds to the loss of the two and three sport athletes. Jim Perry said that you can go online right now and you will find the top 15 all-star games for 14 and unders. It is being done and has been done for 15 years, just under a different title. Carter Paysinger stated that we agree we do not want our lower level athletes playing in the outside competition. My question to staff is can you regulate it? Rainer Wulf answered that it happens a lot and they do not play or represent their high school. It is an all-star game with lower level students and has been happening for years. Rainer Wulf stated that this is asking to add lower level students to what the seniors can already do after the season of sport. Terry Barnum asked for clarification of what is school affiliated. Rainer Wulf and Nancy Kelly both answered with things similar to the school paying for activity, use of school uniform/equipment. Rob Wigod added what the athlete is wearing in the game. Club programs list the school name and graduation year of the students, but that does not necessarily mean they are representing school. The motion failed 2-18-0.

8. CIF Executive Committee Nominations Approved 19-0-1 STATE 541 Monica Colunga reviewed the nominations for the CIF Executive Committee. Terry Barnum and Monica Colunga are on the ballot from the Southern Section. In the past, we have voted to support the Southern Section nominees and go uninstructed for others. There was a motion and second to move the nominations forward to the next Council meeting. There was no discussion and the motion carried 19-0-1.

#### B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Proposed CIF Southern Section Budget 2017-18 Approved 20-0-0 SS 548 Carter Paysinger reviewed the budget prepared by Mitch Carty. The budget is balanced with no changes in ticket prices or dues. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion and the motion carried 20-0-0.
- 2. CIF Southern Section Executive Committee Nominations Approved 20-0-0 SS 549 Carter Paysinger reviewed the nominations. In the past, there is a motion to forward the nominations to Council. There was a motion and second and no discussion. The motion carried 20-0-0
- 3. Proposed Revision Bylaw 3013 Length of Quarters Approved 20-0-0 SS 550 Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal regarding water polo and changing the language to align with the officials' fees schedule. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion and the motion carried 20-0-0.
- 4. Proposed Bylaws 1505, 1508, 2506, 2509, 2703, 2705 Approved 18-2-0 SS 551 2906, 2908 2018-2019 Sports Calendar

Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal regarding the adjustment in the 2018-19 sports calendar. Rob Wigod continued the review by referring the Executive Committee to the agenda packet. Many sports have already moved because of the move in the CIF State Sports Calendar and now we need to bring the other sports in line. There were concerns regarding the time period between Winter sports and Spring sports and SOP dates and both of those have been addressed in this new proposal. Mark Edgemon asked if it is possible that a playoff date will be on an AP testing date. Rob Wigod answered that there are already contests on AP testing dates, for example in swimming and boys tennis and that there are many makeup dates that we publish in order for schools to get the information and to have the opportunity to make arrangements for make-up date. Mike West stated that his area is not happy with this proposal, adding that having a playoff game on graduation day is less of as issue then dealing with snow days. Jill Matyuch added that softball and soccer uses the same facility and if the soccer team makes playoffs, softball will not have a field for practice or games. Chris Calderwood stated that it depends on the school. At our school green grass if fair game and playoffs take priority. There was a motion and second to approve the proposal. The motion carried 18-2-0.

#### 4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Proposed Revision Bylaw 207.B.(5) Sit Out Period Non-Action STATE 552 Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding adjustments in the SOP dates. Rob Wigod continued the review by referring the Executive Committee to the materials in the agenda packet. We need something with the new sports calendar. Thanks to our staff for your help is getting this proposal together. The number of sit out days are over 50% in most sports as the rule stands right now. After surveying the state, looking at the number of days in seasons, there were different SOP dates. This proposal standardized all SOP dates at 50% of the season of sport. You see that some are 50% plus one day and that occurred only if the number of days in the season of sport was not an even number. That gives everyone student in every sport the same sit out time across the state and creates different SOP dates for each sport. This information would be published in the Blue Book on the sports calendar and as transfers are approved, the SOP dates will be listed, just as they are now, so there is no question regarding when a student is eligible for varsity competition. This proposal was brought to the CIF Commissioners meeting and they were very enthusiastic about it and agreed it was the right way to go. Loren Kleinrock asked for clarification regarding the number of days not the number of contests missed. Rob Wigod answered that we looked at number of games but if one school played a majority of games in the first couple of weeks, a student could be playing in two weeks where at another school played very few games in the first few weeks that could hold a student out a month or more. This system would hold students out the same amount of time, make it more equitable.
- 2. Proposed Revision Bylaw 1906.B Football Tie-Breaker Non-Action STATE 553 Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal regarding the removal of the 10-yared tiebreaker for CIF Regional and CIF State Football Championships, making the tiebreaker a 25-yard tie-breaker for those contests. Mike West asked if sections are allowed to make their own tie-breakers. Rob Wigod reiterated that this is for CIF Regionals and CIF State Championships. The CIF State has wanted the 25-yard tiebreaker but everyone in the north is using the 10-yard version, so with this change, the north can still use the 10-yard tiebreaker for their sections but will have to use the 25-yard tiebreaker for CIF Regional and CIF State Championships.

#### B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

### 5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Financial Report

Jeff Jordan went over the handouts left by Mitch Carty and will be included at the end of these minutes.

Rob Wigod discussed the CIF State sponsorship line and that we will not receive those funds until June.

Chris Calderwood asked if apparel sales in the spring are substantial and Rob Wigod answered that our best sports are cross country, wrestling, swimming, and track. Terry Barnum asked, regarding the outstanding totals for basketball, how much of that has not come in yet. Rob Wigod stated that there are many basketball games still out, including the Honda Center, which is key. Half of the \$121,000 should be coming from the Honda Center so that number will be smaller. Wrestling Masters Meet is not included in the wrestling, so that number will decrease as well.

### 5. NEW BUSINESS (Cont.)

A. Financial Report (Cont.)

Mitch Carty - 5A

Terry Barnum asked if there are any points of concern. Rob Wigod answered that last year's soccer had a game played in the area of the competing teams and that game made more money, a situation we did not have this year. We have made a good recovery and are seeing \$594,470 to the good right now and projecting being in the 50-70K in the good at the end of the year. Nancy Kelly asked if should we be looking at the TV revenue to offset the changes in ticket sales and TV making people want to stay home. Rob Wigod replied that we have to start looking at regional games as they are very successful. Rainer Wulf stated that basketball's opening round was the massive rain storm and affected our crowds. Rob Wigod echoed that we are at the mercy of the weather, crowds, etc. and we have to look for other ways to generate revenue, like more regional games. We also doubled the reimbursements for travel and meals this year, which accounts for part of the additional cost. Thom Simmons stated that TV does have an effect on the gate but if you look at our rights fees revenue, it continues to increase as well. We are going into negotiations with the NFHS Network, and the revenue from them will be larger and is paid upfront.

B. Marketing Report

First Thom Simmons went over the handout regarding the samples of what our app for smart phones is going to look like when it is launched. He thanked Wes Carty for his work on this and congratulated him about landing the Florida High School Association for HOME. Thom Simmons went through the marketing packet of handouts that he and Jackie Gibson put together. These items appear at the end of these minutes. Jackie Gibson and Thom Simmons went through all of the current sponsorship contracts to find out if everyone involved were meeting the terms of the contracts. Next, they made contact with all of our sponsors to introduce themselves and begin an outreach program with them.

Carter Paysinger called for a seven-minute break at 3:18 p.m. and then the Committee entered closed session at 3:25 p.m.

Our Champions for Character Golf Tournament registrations are coming in and usually sell out the first of May so be sure to register your foursome. We have sponsorship opportunities available as well. May 1<sup>st</sup> is the deadline for nominations for the Champions for Character Awards along with the Hall of Fame and Distinguished Service Awards. All forms are available on our website. Thanks again for all you do for us.

### D. Executive Committee Member Reports

President-Elect – Monica Colunga – Congratulations to staff on the just completed winter season. I attended CIF State Basketball Championships and it was exciting to see a variety of Southern Section teams there. The sportsmanship of our schools was remarkable and competitive equity played out as the games were very close.

Treasurer – Jeff Jordan – Congratulation to staff on the great work you do. Listening to Thom Simmons describe marketing is about relationships and was very impressed with the work he is doing.

CAPSO Representative – Terry Barnum – Thank you to the staff on another great year. I was at the Shalhevet-Milken Community Basketball Championship game for the awards presentation and it was phenomenal. It was a neighborhood battle and to see the excitement on the students faces was fantastic. It was a culturally enriching game.

CSADA Representative – Dave Reid – Thank you to Sharon Hodge and Thom Simmons for your hospitality at the Southern Section Basketball Championships and making it possible to be there while I watched two of my district teams play. The marketing presentation was great.

There is a lot of hard work in those events and I appreciate your assistance. Girls Wrestling is growing. On behalf of Santa Paula High School, Santa Paula Unified School District, and our Governing Board, we would like to formally submit an appeal regarding the decision made at the last Tri-Counties Athletic Association (TCAA) meeting (held on 4/25/17) in which the TCAA and its member schools denied our request for Multi-School Agreement proposal of allowing St. Augustine students whom reside in Santa Paula boundaries the opportunity to participate in athletic programs at Santa Paula High School. In adhering to Tri-Counties Athletic Association Constitution and CIF Bylaw 303, we have brought forth our request to TCAA and its 13-member schools on 3/28/17 and on 4/25/17. The request was denied on 3/28/17 and per the bylaws the appeal was not considered on 4/25/17.. The appeal brought forth to the TCAA on 4/25/17 has exhausted the appeals procedures established by the TCAA according to the bylaw below:

According to CIF Bylaw 303. (7) it states:

- a. If the CIF member school is unable to obtain written approval from appropriate league, then it may appeal for approval, in writing, to its section, but only after exhausting any and all appeals procedures established by the respective league.
- b. If the CIF member school and its league are unable to obtain written approval from the appropriate Section, they may appeal for approval, in writing, to the Executive Committee, but only after exhausting any and all appeals procedures established by the respective section.

Given our desire for this proposal to be reconsidered, we have submitted documentation on behalf of our School Board President Kelsey Stewart in addition to a letter on behalf of our school Principal Elizabeth Garcia outlining the benefits associated with this Multi School Agreement.

The main concern communicated by the dissenting members of the TCAA, include the competitive advantage SPHS would gain over the other 12 member schools by opening boundaries. As cited, SPHS currently has a much larger school enrollment (approximately 1547 total students) in comparison to the other member schools. Foothill Technology has approximately 1000 students with all other 11 TCAA member schools falling below an enrollment of 750.

We have outlined the benefits and feel that they outweigh the negatives. We are requesting that CIF Southern Section Executive Council Members review and reconsider the information and consider our request for allowing this Multi School Agreement to move forward. On behalf of the Santa Paula Unified School District Governing Board, I would like to express our gratitude for your consideration of the Multi School Agreement between our District and St. Augustine Academy. The request for this agreement was first brought to our attention in 2013 when a group of community members attended a board meeting on behalf of their students who wished to represent Santa Paula in our sports programs. At that time, the request was not granted as we felt more research and information was needed to fully understand how the agreement could impact our programs.

These programs enlist youth from all the neighboring school districts, the only requirement is that the participants live within the city limits. The Governing Board of the Santa Paula Unified School District supports all the youth of our community and applaud them for their interest in our high school sports program. As adults, we hope they will continue this sense of pride and represent their city accordingly.

CIF Governing Executive Council Members,

The TCAA requires a two-thirds majority to approve a Multi-School Agreement, and SPHS's proposal did not carry even a simple majority as it was defeated by a 7 to 6 margin, with one school not in attendance.

The rationale voiced by the majority of schools not in support of the agreement was the competitive advantage SPHS would gain over the other 13 member schools.

Santa Paula is by far the largest school, with an enrollment of 1547 students. The average size of the 13 other schools is 539 students. The majority of schools in the TCAA felt that Santa Paula's access to additional student athletes would place the rest of the schools at a competitive disadvantage.

#### High School Class Schedule

The high school operates on an accelerated block schedule. Contact periods are 100 minutes for each non-lab class, 240 minutes for lab classes. Students complete one academic year in one semester.

#### High School Grading System

SHA utilizes a system in which academic achievement is represented by a letter grade and a 4.0 grade point average GPA. Honors-level courses are weighted and will add an additional grade point for letter grades A, B, and C which is calculated into the final GPA. This weighted GPA is a student's official SHA grade point average, and is used to determine eligibility for academic awards and recognitions, such as Cum Laude, Valedictorian and Salutatorian; as well as other academic distinctions. Both weighted and unweighted GPAs are reported on student transcripts.

#### Homework

Students are assigned homework on a regular basis. Parents should see that there is a good environment for homework and should be actively involved to help with and check homework.

Homework is a part of our curriculum and has been tested so that the average amount of homework for each grade level has been coordinated. If your child seems to take an extralong time to do his homework, please speak to his teacher about ways to improve study habits.

Middle School (Jr. High) Promotion Requirements – 8th Grade

All Jr. High students are required to complete the following subjects: Foreign Language, Math, Science, English, Literature, History, and Bible. A student may not fail more than one of the required subjects, per semester, to qualify for promotion. Any student failing two or more subjects 2<sup>nd</sup>semester will not participate in promotion or any of the activities that students complete that week.

## ATHLETIC PROGRAM

#### Philosophy of Athletics

God's ultimate goal for His children is that they grow in the likeness of His Son, Jesus Christ. Therefore, it follows that the goal of our athletic program is to lead the athletes to a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and to teach them to be like Him.

As they participate in the athletic program, students will not only improve their physical fitness, build friendships, and grow in unity through teamwork, but will also develop Christian character which will be expressed in their attitudes, thoughts, and actions.

Christian character qualities that will be stressed are: dependability, punctuality, love, enthusiasm, faith, humility, endurance, boldness, obedience, diligence, responsibility, determination, joyfulness, confidence, and intensity.

#### **Awards**

Athletic fees are non-refundable. In order to be eligible to receive any awards, the athlete must complete the season in good standing. Any student participating in their first sport at SHA must pay fees as indicated on the sports contract. Students that continue to participate in after school sports must pay \$45.00 per sport played. Any tournament fees would be extra. This will cover the athletes' banquet costs, awards costs, referee fees and uniform fees for first time participants.

## Equipment

Sports equipment are either purchased by the students or loaned to students. Any equipment issued out by the school, must be turned in before participating in the next seasonal sport. No equipment for a new sport will be issued until the former coach has granted clearance. Students will not be eligible for extracurricular activities of any kind until all equipment has been returned.

## Guidelines for Athletic Eligibility

Student must currently have 70% or "S" per subject to be eligible to try out for any sport. To remain eligible for participation in the athletic program at South Hills Academy, a student must have a minimum of a "C" or "S" grade for every subject during the previous nine-week grading period. Any student not meeting the eligibility guidelines will be ineligible to participate in the athletic program. A weekly grade check will be made to consider reinstalling the student if the grade has improved to be up to 70%.

Any student removed from a team for reasons other than becoming academically ineligible (below 70%) or due to an injury may not participate in any other after school sport for the remainder of the school year.

#### **Guidelines for Conduct**

- 1. All student-athletes are expected to maintain a conduct in accordance with the guidelines set forth in the Student-Parent handbook.
- 2. Language is to be positive. Any improper or questionable language will not be permitted. Impropriety areas include swearing and showing disrespect to officials, coaches, and other players.
- 3. Major violations of the Code of Conduct may result in dismissal from the team and/or South Hills Academy. The possession, use, or sale of illegal drugs, alcoholic beverages, or tobacco at any time on or off campus will result in immediate dismissal from the team.
- 4. Attendance at all practices and games is mandatory. If the student is in school he/she is expected to be at practice and games. Unexcused absences will result in discipline administered by the coach of each respective team. More than one unexcused absence may result in the athlete being removed from the team.

- 6. If a student must be absent for a legitimate medical appointment on a game day, proper school procedure must be followed to clear the absence in order to permit participation.
- 7. When a student-athlete is requested by his parents to go on vacation or leave with them, this is to be accepted as a valid excused absence from practices and/or games. Coaches have the discretion to establish respective rules regarding "playing time" and "starting status" for these situations.
- 8. If an athlete is suspended from school for any reason, that athlete will not be permitted to participate in the athletic program in any way during the period of suspension. A second suspension during any one sport's season will result in the athlete being removed from the respective team for the remainder of the season.

- 9. If an athlete quits or is dropped from a team for any reason, he will not be eligible for any post-season awards. He will also not be permitted to practice for the next sport until the sport he quit, or from which he was dropped, is completely finished.
- 10. An athlete may be removed from a team by a coach, athletic director, or administrator.

Note: The Athletic Department of South Hills Academy feels that it is the parent's responsibility to aid the school in enforcing the school standards regarding conduct. Please make sure that you are familiar with these guidelines established by the school and help your student to understand and comply with them. Violations are preventable with the proper exercise of parental concern and authority. Please cooperate with us regarding this. If at any time the school believes that this cooperation is lacking in either the parents or student, the student may be required to withdraw from the athletic program at South Hills Academy.



The purpose of this letter is to update CIF on the progress of our athletic programs at Portola High School in Irvine Unified School District. As a brand new high school we opened in the Fall of 2016 with 390 freshmen only. Of this population two-thirds is male, limiting the number of females able to participate in our athletic programs. Even with this limitation, we had incredible participation by both male and female athletes. In the fall we had 28% of our student population participating in athletics. PHS had 7 freshmen level teams including: boys and girls cross country, boys water polo, football, and girls golf (no-matches), tennis, and volleyball. We also hosted a cheer squad and have actively begun integrating them into the athletic department. Our winter teams had a 27% student population participation in the following sports: boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, girls water polo and wresting. Our boys and girls basketball teams had phenomenal seasons, with our boys experiencing only one loss and our girls experiencing two total losses. During the spring season we hosted the largest number of athletes with just under two-thirds of the school's population participating in one of 11 different programs. Our largest program is boys and girls swim, followed by track and field. We were

As a coach and a formal athlete I will always like to see more and better, but looking back I can say that we have meet most of our goals and we are stepping forward to where we want to be.

Pep rallies, marketing, and implementing the sense of pride in the school helped grab the attention of many students.

Our opening sport on the fall was Cross Country, P.E teacher Mr. Garcia became the coach. Our teams were a success with 7 girls and 9 boys participating in all cylinders. We were fortunate that the athletic community helped us and thanks to many we were able to participate in the Victory League meets.



Our athletes represent about 25% of our campus, not including the participation of students that got involve with film, photography, ASB, and yearbook.

With our budget and the teams fundraising, we were able to have good uniforms for every athlete and the coaches, award ceremonies, awards, letters, T-shirts, promotional and marketing items.

We make sure we had all of the athletic packets complete with physicals for every athlete. I kept the rosters and schedules updated in the CIFSS website and took care of all of the transfers.

Dear CIF Executive Committee,

It is with great pleasure and excitement, that I write this letter chronicling The University Career and Sports Academy's first year as a member of CIF. I want to begin by thanking the Committee for granting us probationary status, and allowing us to prove our ability to field teams, and compete with other small school programs. As a result of this opportunity, our student athletes were able to use their talents to earn victories on the courts and fields as well as in the classroom.

It was a great year of firsts, and a wonderful start to what we expect to be an even more exciting future of athletic achievements for our students. The following are the sports UCSA students competed in during the 2016-17 academic year:

- 8-man varsity football
- · Girls varsity volleyball
- Girls varsity basketball
- Boys Varsity Basketball
- Girls Track & Field
- Boys Track & Field

Since last May, UCSA has expanded its weight room through the purchase of additional training equipment, added a practice field [approximately 70 yards x 30 yards, with a 1/8 th of a mile dirt track around it], and is currently working with a local construction company to enclose our outdoor basketball/volleyball court. These additions will enable the existing athletics teams at UCSA to practice on campus, and they provide a location to train the student athletes involved in the softball and baseball programs we are developing. Although it might seem a bit ambitious, the planned expansion of sports offered comes as a result of student interests, and a preliminary look at the University Careers and Sports Academy enrollment for August of 2017. Early enrollment figures indicate that UCSA will nearly double its high school enrollment; expanding from just over twenty, to forty students. In addition to these changes, on April 7th, the Agape league granted UCSA membership beginning with fall sports in 2018. UCSA competed with a number of the Agape league teams this academic year, and these schools have already scheduled contests with UCSA for next academic year.

This has been a great year for the entire University Careers and Sports Academy community, and we hope to cap it off with an upgrade to full CIF membership by the Executive Committee.
