CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

March 22, 2018

1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to order by Carter Paysinger, President of the Council 9:07am

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call

D. Introduction of Guests - Mrs. Karen Paysinger, Mr. Carter Paysinger, Sr., Steve Fryer – Orange Cty. Register.

E. Adopt Agenda - 1st and 2nd to adopt the agenda as written. Motion passed (73-0-0)

F. Approval of Minutes

1. Minutes of the January 24, 2018 Council Meeting - 1st and 2nd to adopt minutes as written. Motion passed (72-0-1)

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Council. - Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes. Tom Fox, President Orange County Athletic Directors Association, addressed the committee and announced that several Orange County Athletic Directors will be retiring at the end of the current school year. He wanted to thank and recognize those individuals for their service, help and guidance. Tom White, Concordia University, wished to thank the Council for their support and leadership in promoting the Master's in Coaching and Athletic Administration. Mr. White also announced that Concordia is holding a symposium/conference and would like to see school's coaching staffs attend.

3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed 2018-19 State Budget - 1st and 2nd to approve. Motion passed (72-0-1)

2. CIF President Elect and Executive Committee Nominations - 1st and 2nd to approve. The Council motion asked for Southern Section delegates to be sent uninstruacted, with the exception that they vote to support Monica Colunga as CIF President-Elect. Motion passed (73-0-0).

3. Proposed Bylaw 208.A(4) -Foreign Exchange Programs Host Family. 1st and 2nd to approve. The CIF Southern Section Council approved and has forwarded a proposed revision to modify the participation of a student who is in an approved Foreign Exchange Program. This revision would allow "limited" participation at the non-varsity level if they are hosted by a coach, paid or volunteer. Motion passed (52-16-6).

4. Proposed Bylaw Revision 504.M – Day of Respite. 1st and 2nd to approve. The proposed revision clarifies the alternate day of respite as a 24-hour period running from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday. Motion passed (71-2-1).

5. Proposed Bylaw 502 – Competition vs. Non-CIF Member School 1st and 2nd to approve. Schools outside of California must be members in good standing with their respective State association and must also be eligible to compete in that State Association's Championship Playoffs. Motion passed (62-12-0)

6. Proposed Bylaw 2001.B Revisions – Football Full Contact Allowance 1st and 2nd to approve. The time allotted for "full contact" football practice would change from a weekly total of 180 minutes to 90 minutes per week. The 90-minute total would be broken into two 45 minute sessions. Motion passed (46-25-3).

7. Proposed Bylaw Revision 201.A.4 - 1st and 2nd to approve. The proposed bylaw revision would allow schools to conduct athletic meetings with incoming 8th grade students/parents who have registered for classes at the CIF member school beginning as early as May 1st. Motion passed (69-4-1).

8. Proposed Bylaw 207.B(5).c(viii).e Move – Return to Previous School. 1st and 2nd to approve. The proposed bylaw revision for transferring students who are returning to a previous school without participation is currently filed under a Hardship Waiver. This revision would place that transfer decision to a more appropriate place in Bylaw 207. Motion passed (73-0-1).

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed 2018-19 Southern Section Budget - 1st and 2nd to approve. Motion passed (72-0-2).

2. CIF Southern Section Executive Committee Nominations - to Move Nominees Forward to Council 1st and 2nd to approve. The following nominees for the position of President-Elect received votes as follows: Nancy Kelly, Superintendent, Upland USC -28 votes –

42%; Mike West, Principal, Martin Luther King HS - 38 votes – 58%.

3. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 23.1(j) & 24.2 – New Member Application Due Date. 1st and 2nd to approve. This revision would change the application deadline for new member schools from May 1 to April 1 to allow more time for review. Motion passed (72-0-2).

4. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 70.8 – Number of Executive Committee Meetings. 1st and 2nd to approve. The revision would change the number of required regular Executive Committee meetings from six down to five. This is a result of reducing the number of Council meetings from four down to three. Motion passed (72-0-2).

5. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2003.3 - Use of Full Pads on First Day of Practice to Support 21-0-0. 1st and 2nd to approve. Discussion: question was asked "do those three days immediately proceed the start of fall practice?" Glenn Martinez commented that a Q and A will be added to the Blue Book to address when the three days must take place to help clarify for schools. Motion passed (57-1-16). Due to several electronic voting devices turning off and 16 "abstentions" being recorded a re-vote was needed to correctly record all league representatives. Motion passed (68-3-2).

6. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2021.3 and all sports sections. 1st and 2nd to approve. Discussion: Question was asked if the motion was for three separate week blocks or days? Question was answered that this is for week blocks and not individual days. Motion failed (20-53-0).

7. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 3303 – Water Polo Host Teams. 1st and 2nd to approve. This revision would allow the Division 1 water polo playoff bracket to award the "home" contest in the first round to higher seeded team regardless of league finish. Motion failed (5-60-8).

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A.STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION

ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 – Continuation School. The Commissioners Committee is proposing a revision to Bylaw 211, Continuation School Eligibility, and Bylaw 303, Multi-School Applications that would revise the athletic eligibility of students who attend a "Continuation" High School. Note that students placed in "Continuation" schools for disciplinary reasons are NOT eligible under this change. This proposal is an outcome and direction from the Federated Council Roundtable discussions held in January, 2017.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revision 3320.6 – Wrestling Divisions. The proposed revision would look to move wrestling away from a geographical playoff set up to a power ranking / competitive equity system by using the results from the Master Meet qualifiers over a four-year period. New Dual Meet divisions would be formulated every two years.

5. REPORTS

A. Treasurer's Report - Jeff Jordan - Revenue to date \$3.7 million with expenses to date of \$2.7 million. 2014 began an investment plan and so far for 2017-18 the investment plan has earned almost 60K. Since 2014, the investment plan has earned over \$200K. Sports fees have generated \$500K with broadcast rights revenue at \$325K. Playoff revenue distribution back to schools: Football \$400K, Girls Volleyball \$40K with Girls and Boys' basketball revenues to be announced later as those figures are still coming in. Thank you to Mitch Carty for preparing the budget and the council for passing and supporting the 2018-2019 budget.

B. President's Report - Carter Paysinger - Mr. Paysinger continued to express his desire to see that all high schools implement the use of a full-time athletic trainer. He then gave a brief update on the

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

March 20, 2018

1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to Order by Carter Paysinger, President of the Council - The meeting was called to order at 1:05 p.m.

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call

D. Introduction of Guests - There were no guests present.

E. Adopt Agenda - - There was a motion and a second to approve the agenda. Motion carried 20-0-0.

F. Approval of Minutes - There was a motion and a second to approve the minutes of the January 13, 2018, Executive Committee meeting. The motion carried 20-0-0.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes. There was no one present to address the Executive Committee.

3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed 2018-19 State Budget - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. There are changes in marketing and a 2% COLA adjustment for staff. There has been an increase in both income and expenses. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There being no discussion, the motion carried 20-0-0.

2. CIF President-Elect and Executive Committee Nominations. Carter Paysinger reviewed the nominees. Traditionally we vote in support of the candidate from our section and unopposed for all others. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There being no discussion, the motion carried 19-0-1.

3. Proposed Bylaw 208.A(4) - Foreign Exchange Programs Host Family - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. Limited eligibility for foreign students who are living with a host family from the school they attend. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Loren Kleinrock asked if it is possible for a student who was under a foreign exchange program to stay after he is off the program. Rob Wigod reminded that in the second year, they would have full eligibility, as it is now. Chris Calderwood clarified that the only difference is they would have limited eligibility when living with a coach or anyone at the school of attendance. The motion carried 20-0-0.

4. Proposed Bylaw Revision 504.M - Day of Respite - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. This would allow the 24-hour period of respite from sundown Friday to sundown on Saturday. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There being no discussion, the motion carried 20-0-0.

5. Proposed Bylaw 502 - Competition vs. Non-CIF Member School - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. This qualifies which schools our membership can and cannot compete against. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Dave Reid asked what is the process for tournaments out of state? Rob Wigod answered that if a tournament is inviting teams from multiple states, the CIF State Office approves those tournaments. Loren Kleinrock asked if this is applicable to all schools in the same tournament. Rob Wigod answered that states can invite whomever they like and put them in other brackets, but we would not be able to play the team not in good standing with their state association and the CIF State Office would probably not approve those tournaments. Jim Perry stated that tournament directors are good at changing things around, so our schools are able to participate with the properly sanctioned schools. Terry Barnum asked what is the penalty for playing such a team? Rob Wigod answered that it is looked at case by case but it would be a forfeit. This is for the 2019-2020 school year. The motion carried 20-0-0.

6. Proposed Bylaw 2001.B Revisions - Football Full Contact Allowance - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal reducing the total minutes of full contact from 180 minutes per week, 45 minutes maximum per day, two days a week, to 90 minutes per week, 45 minutes maximum per day, two days a week. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Loren Kleinrock asked if there is any research on the quantity of injuries in relation to reduced full contact time. Mike West stated that yes, there is a reduction in injuries. There is a concern that correct techniques cannot be taught with reduced time, however, more and more schools are going to less full contact time anyway and it is reducing concussions. Chris Calderwood asked Glenn Martinez if the Football Advisory Committee was behind this proposal and Glenn Martinez responded that they are aware, and they do not believe the schools reach 90 minutes a day now. The motion carried 21-0-0.

7. Proposed Bylaw Revision 201.A.4 - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal which would allow schools to meet with 8th grade students after May 1 for the new school year, if they have registered for classes at the school or paid registration fees at a private school. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Terry Barnum asked why the non-refundable fee for private schools is written into this Bylaw. Rob Wigod recognized that there has been no further discussion on regarding this concern and Jim Perry added that this was not an issue from any other section. The motion carried 19-2-0.

8. Proposed Bylaw 207.B(5).c(viii).e Move - Return to Previous School - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal which cleans up the language and moves it from Hardship to the proper area of the Constitution under CIF Bylaw 207. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Mark Edgemon asked for an explanation of the proposal. Monica Colunga ran through the scenario again. The motion carried 21-0-0.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed 2018-19 Southern Section Budget - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. A balanced budget was presented with no price increases in fees, tickets, or splits and there is a 2% COLA for staff. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There being no discussion, the motion carried 21-0-0.

2. CIF Southern Section President-Elect Nominations - Carter Paysinger reviewed the nominations and introduced that they were Mike West and Nancy Kelly. There was a motion and a second to forward the names to the Southern Section Council. There being no discussion, the motion carried 20-0-1.

3. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 23.1(j) & 24.2 - New Member School Application Due Date - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. This moves the new member school application due date from May 1 to April 1 to give more the office more time to review the applications. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There being no discussion, the motion carried 21-0-0.

4. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 70.8 - Number of Executive Committee Meetings - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. This reduces the number of Executive Committee meetings from six to five. When there was the reduction in Council Meetings from four to three, there is no need for a sixth Executive Committee Meeting. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There being no discussion, the motion carried 20-0-1.

5. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2003.3 - Use of Full Pads on First Day of Practice - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. This allows student-athletes to wear full pads on the first day of football practice if they have had three days of conditioning prior to practice. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Jim Perry asked if this came from the Football Advisory Committee and was it due to the change in sports calendar. Glenn Martinez stated that it was and it was to give them back some time since they were out a week in the front and the back of the season. It is a school's choice to do this and gives them flexibility in their schedule. The motion carried 21-0-0.

6. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2021.3 and all sports sections - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. This is to change the dead period language to not require the three weeks be consecutive weeks. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Dave Reid shared that their league representatives unanimously voted against this proposal as it does not allow for a break for families. They are working on an alternative. Chris Calderwood indicated that the language does not say weeks so can schools do two days, four days, etc. Monica Colunga stated that this proposal came from her league and they are still in support of it. Everyone has a different schedule and it requires administrative oversight. This is about local control and flexibility, so the multiple sports athletes can have some time off. Jim Perry asked how does this help the multi-sport athlete? Monica Colunga answered that you can work to keep everyone on dead period at the same time. Jim Perry added that this tells families you only get seven days in a row for vacation instead of 21 days. Chris Calderwood stated this is going back to the old way where everyone is off for the same three weeks instead of sports picking their dead period. The motion failed 2-19-0.

7. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 3303 - Water Polo Host Teams - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. Division 1 only, higher seed would be the home team for all playoff games. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Dave Reid stated you can't make a rule for one part of one sport. Terry Barnum stated that water polo is already different. Is it Open or Division 1? This would be a safe way to experiment with change. Carter Paysinger asked, would league champions be upset if they were on the road? Terry Barnum replied that this affects the same 8 schools anyway. Dick Billingsley asked, are we setting a precedent for all the other teams? This is how the State Tournament determines home sites. The motion failed 1-19-0.

4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 - Continuation School - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. This was pulled from an action item and will probably be a non-action item for the next meeting as there are several questions that need to be clarified regarding continuation schools.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revision 3320.6 - Wrestling Divisions - Carter Paysinger reviewed the proposal. This is for Dual Meet Wrestling Championships and the ability to create divisions every two years using Masters Meet results over a four-year period. Glenn Martinez stated that this changing from geography back to competitive equity. With losing two leagues in the north, the formula for Individual Wrestling being applied to dual wrestling makes more sense than geography. Chris Calderwood asked what percentage of dual meet teams qualify for playoffs and choose not to compete and Glenn Martinez answered 25%, as they want to focus on the individuals. Terry Barnum voiced a concern about how this proposal might affect the sports of swimming and track and field? Rob Wigod explained that when competitive equity came about, those sports were not involved, including wrestling, and that competitive equity is now explained in the Blue Book bylaws. The process for Wrestling Championships is in the Blue Book as well and must go through the same procedure as the competitive equity model did. This

is bringing wrestling from geography to the competitive equity model as swimming is already a competitive equity model.

5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Financial Report - Mitch Carty - Mitch Carty handed out a packet of information that can be found at the end of the minutes. Jim Perry asked if boys and girls volleyball are combined in the presented materials and Mitch Carty answered yes, as are boys and girls water polo, boys and girls golf, etc.

B. Communications Report - Thom Simmons - Thom Simmons handed out a packet of information that can be found at the end of the minutes. Highlights were made regarding our social media numbers and the re-signing of Ford and FoxSports. Mark Edgemon asked if we can charge more money to sponsors with the high social media numbers. Thom Simmons answered that yes, we can because we are able to show that the more eyes on anything, the more a sponsor wants to be involved and are willing to pay for it. Mike West asked about what is being done regarding YouTube videos and Thom Simmons explained his process of finding those that are breaking our copyright agreements. This has become a new line item in the budget.

C. Marketing Report - Jackie Gibson - Jackie Gibson handed out a packet of information that can be found at the end of the minutes. Highlights from the packet were our geofilters for Snapchat. Jackie Gibson discussed programs, the great deal of work to get five programs out his past Winter, and that the boys and girls soccer programs are now two programs instead of one. Programs are getting more views as a digital product then they did in hard copy. Thom Simmons pointed out how much money was saved moving between the systems from last year and this year. The Street Team went to the Orange County Women in Sports Conference and they were very well received. Carter Paysinger called for a 10 minute break and then the Executive Committee went into Closed Session at 2:45 p.m.

6. CLOSED SESSION

A. Public Employee Evaluation of Performance - (Government Code 54957):

1. Commissioner's Evaluation Process

7. REPORT OF ACTION(S) TAKEN IN CLOSED SESSION

Carter Paysinger called the meeting back to order from closed session 3:20 p.m. There was no action taken in Closed Session.

8. REPORTS

A. President's Report - Carter Paysinger - The Athletic Trainers Committee has made much progress. They are in phase one of a three phase process which is starting out with sending letters to Superintendents regarding the importance of full-time certified athletic trainers on campuses. Then, a letter to Athletic Directors and Principals, and finally a letter to parent associations. Letters have been cleared by Rob Wigod. Phase two is to work with the Chargers and Rams on public service announcements. Phase three is to make ourselves available to talk to all these groups to answer questions and help with how to finance this position. Glenn Martinez and Rob Wigod have been great with helping with this project and we have merged the two athletic trainer committees into one. Mike West stated that the Sports Medicine Advisory Committee is preparing a statement to come out at the beginning of next year endorsing the need for full-time athletic trainers on high school campuses. We need to look at spending more time educating Principals. Finally, it was great going to all of the championship events and commended the work of the office staff, it is unbelievable, and the job you do is fantastic.

B. Treasurer's Report - Dr. Jeff Jordan - Mitch Carty reviewed the Profit/Loss Statement of the current year to date. Sports fees are up because of the addition of Cheer. Broadcast rights are up and Thom Simmons has done a great job. Playoff revenue shares returned to schools is \$518,000 to date. There are several expenses that need to be looked at, the repaving of parking lot and adding more spaces, new roofing, and air conditioning repairs all of which amount to about \$100,000.

5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Northwood High School Appeal - Football Contest Contract - Refer to EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE APPEAL HEARINGS - FORMAT at the end of the minutes for the record of the appeal hearing. Hearing was completed at 1:47 p.m. and the Executive Committee took a break.

B. Consideration of the Following Schools for Membership for the 2018-2019 School Year

1. Academy of Sports Science - Presented by Jeff Jordan - Jeff Jordan presented the details of his visit. He visited this school two years ago. It is located in an industrial complex across from the men's prison in Chino and they draw students from all over. They have a new principal and athletic director. There has not been the growth they were expecting two years ago and have been recruiting to keep the doors open, not for athletics, but will be offering sports as part of the curriculum requirements. They are trying to attract students that want a different type of learning experience and want them to have the opportunity to compete. Loren Kleinrock asked about their facilities and Jeff Jordan referred him to their application. There is some travel to get to their facilities. Rob Wigod reminded the Executive Committee that this school was a probationary school two years ago and their evaluation for the 2017-18 indicated that they fielded no sports that school year. In light of that information, it was determined that they were not prepared for membership and they were not granted probationary status for a second year. They have hired the former athletic director from Don Bosco Tech, which is encouraging. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to Academy of Sports Science for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved - 19-0-0

2. Gorman Learning Charter - Presented by Todd Arrowsmith - Todd Arrowsmith presented the details of his visit. Located on a campus of a previous private school. The have a strong junior high program with numbers between 125-150 students, but will not be growing much bigger. They are offering equitable teams and facilities as they start out, the athletic director is knowledgeable and wants to get started on the right foot. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to Gorman Learning Charter for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 19-0-0

3. Harkham-GAON Academy - Presented by Dick Billingsley - Dick Billingsley presented the details of his visit. They are on the third floor of the Westside Jewish Center with an enrollment of 48. Facilities are located in the center or within walking distance. Richard Harris is the President of the Tri-County Athletic Association and brings lots of experience. Their principal had no background in athletics. They will be offering the complement of sports required for membership and demonstrated the ability to do so. They had applied for membership previously and

were denied do to noncommunication regarding their progress at that time. Rob Wigod added that this school was with us as Yeshiva Tech and when contacted at the end of that year for their evaluation, there was no response and membership was dropped. They joined the Los Angeles City Section, were a member in good standing, and now wish to return to the Southern Section. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to Harkham-GAON Academy for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Jill Matyuch asked how it will be possible to field that many sports with so few students. Dick Billingsley clarified that they will have the one male and one female sport in each season of sport that they need for membership and they expect an enrollment burst at the start of the school year. Mike West stated that having Richard Harris on board is why he is willing to give them a chance. Dick Billingsley added that the Omega League might take them. Motion was approved 19-0-0

4. Los Angeles Adventist - Presented by Terry Barnum - Terry Barnum presented the details of his visit. Met with athletic director and principal. This school was a member and had to withdraw for financial reasons. The athletic director is in his first year and the principal was reminded that the buck stops with him. Projections for next year were 80-20 to be open for the 2018-19 school year. They have a good location, have a gym, soccer field, and are located across from Magic Johnson Park. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. Monica Colunga stated that at the end of day, we are providing opportunities for students. Sometimes it is because of adults that students miss out and that is not in our best interest. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to Los Angeles Adventist for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 18-1-0.

5. PAL Charter Academy - Presented by John Norman - Rob Wigod presented the details of John Norman's visit. This was the second time John Norman has visited this school and they were denied because they lacked the boys/girls sports in each season of sport. They understand this is a minimum requirement and are prepared to fulfill this requirement this year. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A charter school in the area closed and this might help work with the more difficult students. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to PAL Charter Academy for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 19-0-0

6. Riverside County Office of Education Indio - Presented by Mike West - Mike West presented the details of his visit. This is a second school in the charter system in Riverside. The athletic director is an athletics guy. The facility sits on a former continuation school site with three school sites close by. There is a gym on site along with baseball and football fields. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to Riverside County Office of Education/Indio for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 18-0-0

7. Sage Oak Charter - Presented by Mark Edgemon - Mark Edgemon presented the details of his visit. He met with the principal and athletic director. The students are all home schoolers in the Victorville area and have taken over for UCSA. George Neos ran the program on this campus, and now one school is closing and this new one is opening. UCSA was a probationary school and this new school will have the same students, and so they have requested full membership instead of probationary membership. Rob Wigod added that George Neos started with Helendale and that now there is a changing of the name and type of school under a new state law. May want to get established in this new model as probationary again. Jim Monaco wanted to know how they are planning on going from 36 to 300 students in three years. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to Sage Oak Charter for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 18-0-0

8. South Hills Academy - Presented by Sandy Gahrning - Sandy Gahrning presented the details of her visit. Met with the principal and the athletic director. This is a well-established school and has just added the high school and an international school to bring more students. The athletic director ran the junior high program. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to South Hills Academy for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 18-0-0

9. St. Jeanne de Lestonnac - Presented by Dave Reid - Dave Reid presented the details of his visit. This was his second visit to this school. They were not able to fulfill their commitment last year due to the principal's husband passing away. The athletic director has been an athletic director for many years at a couple of sites. Enrollment is up to 30 and should increase after visitation. They plan to make the sports commitment as they currently have a strong junior high league. The principal was familiar with the Blue Book. They have a beautiful gym with a new floor and a huge field. Their coaches are in place and they have been asked to join a four-team league with California Military Institute, Nuview

Bridge, San Jacinto Valley Academy and Calvary Murrieta. It is recommended to grant probationary status for the 2018-19 school year. A motion was made and seconded to grant probationary membership to St. Jeanne de Lestonnac for one year beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion was approved 18-0-0

C. Membership Status of New Schools Admitted in 2017-2018 - Carter Paysinger suggested that a consent calendar be used for the next section of votes, except for items 5C1 and 5C2 that would be voted on separately. There was a motion and second to approve full membership for the rest of the schools on the consent calendar. Rob Wigod continued that all of the schools placed on the consent calendar sent in letters of evaluation, fulfilled the minimum number of sports per season, and met all other membership requirements. Motion passed to accept the consent calendar 18-0-0.

1. Baypoint Prep Academy - Rob Wigod presented the evaluation, pointing out that they played a coed basketball team, not a boys and girls team in each season of sport. It is up to the Executive Committee to grant full or probationary membership. Mike West stated that they may need another year to establish a Girls basketball team. There was a motion to approve a second year of probation and a second. Motion was approved 18-0-0.
