### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

- A. Call to order by Dr. Monica Colunga, President of the Council called to order at 1:02 p.m.
- B. Pledge of Allegiance

All members were present except for Todd Arrowsmith, Terry Barnum, Chris Calderwood, Chelsea Heyward, and John Norman.

D. Introduction of Guests

There were no guests present.

E. Adopt Agenda

There was a motion and a second to adopt the agenda. There being no discussion, the motion was approved to adopt the agenda.

F. Approval of Minutes Approved 19-01 1F1

There was a motion and a second to approve the minutes of the January 19, 2019 Executive Committee meeting. The minutes were approved.

### 2. PUBLIC COMMENT

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

Dion Lee, Head Coach, Bonanza High School in Las Vegas, Nevada made a presentation to the Executive Committee regarding the benefits of adding Girls Flag Football to CIF Southern Section sports. Florida, Nevada and Alaska sanction Girls Flag Football. San Francisco also fields Girls'

Flag Football. It is a Winter sport in Nevada, a Fall sport in San Francisco and a Spring sport in Florida. It is his goal to uniform it throughout the country and would like to see it start out as a club sport on campuses to get started. Mr. Lee was involved in creating the playing rules and is now spending all his time promoting this sport.

### 3. ACTION ITEMS

### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed 2019-2020 CIF State BudgetApproved 20-0-0 STATE 584

Mike West reviewed the proposed budget. There is a 10% increase in PERS, steps plus 2% for staff. Overall balanced budget. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. There was no discussion. Motion carried 20-0-0.

2. CIF State Executive Committee Nominations Approved 20-0-0 STATE 585

Mike West reviewed the nominees. Traditionally, the vote is in support of candidates from our section and uninstructed for all others. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion. Motion carried 20-0-0.

3. Proposed Bylaw Revision 503.F -<br/>Coaching Staff PaymentsApproved 20-0-0 STATE 586

Mike West reviewed the proposal. The Commissioner's Committee is recommending this change. This asks to penalize the coach and not the team for violations of this bylaw. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. There was no discussion. Motion carried 20-0-0.

4. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 22.B.9 & 503.L - Approved 20-0-0 STATE 587 Emergency Action Plans and A.E.D.

Mike West reviewed the proposal. This bylaw is required due to passage of a State bill. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. Mike West reiterated a story regarding an incident at a baseball game with a baseball umpire. Jeff Williams asked if you have an A.E.D. is there more certification needed for use? Mike West stated anyone can operate an A.E.D. if they follow the instructions on the device but most have this certification. Motion carried 20-0-0.

5. Proposed Bylaw Revision 2000.B - Approved 20-0-0 STATE 588 Varsity Football Age Requirement Medical Clearance

Mike West reviewed the proposal. Sports Medicine Advisory Committee supports this update. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. Mike West continued that there was discussion at the State level, and this is only removing the one section of this bylaw. Loren Kleinrock asked if this puts the coach at a greater liability for the student. Mike West answered maybe, maybe not, as there is the same liability of any student. Paula Rodas clarified that students must get cleared to participate in athletics in general and the doctor needs to know it is for Football. Motion carried 20-0-0.

6. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 – Failed 1-19-0 STATE 568 Continuation School

Mike West reviewed the proposal. The Commissioner's Committee recommended this proposal go forward for consideration. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. Rob Wigod clarified that the Commissioner's Committee is supportive of this concept being considered and moved forward. Mike West said it was sent back asking for clarification of a semester in good standing and other issues, which have now been covered in the Q&A's. Motion failed 1-19-0.

### **B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS**

1. Proposed 2019-2020 CIF Southern Section Budget Approved 20-0-0 SS 589

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. A balanced budget was presented with a sport fees increase, no price increases in tickets, or changes to revenue splits. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion. Motion carried 20-0-0.

2. CIF Southern Section Executive Committee Nominations Approved 19-0-1 SS 590

Monica Colunga reviewed the nominations. There was a motion and a second to forward the slate of candidates to the Southern Section Council. There was no discussion. Motion carried 19-0-1.

3. Officials Fees ProposalApproved 19-1-0SS 591

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. The request is to raise fees \$1 a year for the next three years plus additional changes which are in the proposal. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. There was no discussion. Motion carried 19-1-0.

4. Proposed Bylaw Revision 504.M - Failed 2-18-0 SS 592 Sunday for Cheer Only

Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. Jill Matyuch is in full support of this proposal. Those who have written this proposal and are backing it are the only people it affects, and they will lose their most competitive events if they are unable to compete on Sundays. There is a claim that Cheer did not want to be part of this organization. Mike West clarified that as this is written, they can choose which event per year they will participate on a Sunday. Jill Matyuch reminded everyone that it included CIF Office approval. Monica Colunga added that it is unfortunate that Cheer did not ask to be a sport, but accommodations have already been made for them and that there is a larger audience that needs to be considered. Mike West commented that if the event was an NFHS approved event and this bylaw was just for that one event, he would be more likely to approve the change, but not if individual schools have the option to choose any event throughout the year, including events similar to the Sharps event that are not NFHS regulated. Jill Matyuch added that California is the only state that does not allow cheer on Sundays. This is for Traditional Competitive Cheer. Rob Wigod stated that these competitions do not allow teams to compete if they are not representing a high school. Dana Wilkerson asked if there are any other sports that want to play on Sunday? Rob Wigod answered that is has come up but mostly is the question of travel. Motion failed 2-18-0. 1F1

### 4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Additions 1501 and 2603 -<br/>Baseball and Softball State ChampionshipsNon-ActionSTATE 593

Mike West reviewed the proposal. This is a request to establish a State Regional Championship the week following the Section Championships. Not every section is on the same sports calendar. Rob Wigod mentioned this step needs to happen first in order to bring about the details of the events. This is a Central Section proposal. Dick Billingsley voiced concern as Volleyball Championships were after graduation and with schools moving their calendars earlier, it becomes a problem once students have graduated. Mike West agreed as his school's graduation is right after Memorial Day. Jim Perry stated that this proposal would be the same as Water Polo and Soccer with eight team brackets in multiple divisions. More details are needed to see what the Central Section is trying to work toward with this proposal. Carter Paysinger brought up the fact that with some schools being in session and some schools being out that this is an unlevel playing field.

### 5. NEW BUSINESS

A. 2017-2018 CIF Southern Section Audit

Monica Colunga stated that the Audit Committee met this morning and accepted the audit. Mitch Carty reviewed aspects of the audit which showed a \$115,000 profit from the 2017-2018 school year. It was a good year considering where we were with the decline in ticket sales. Staff did a good job in cutting costs. There was a motion and second to accept the audit. The motion carried 19-0-1.

B. Financial Report

Mitch Carty distributed a handout that appears at the end of these minutes. He highlighted several items. Dick Billingsley stated that the Football Advisory Committee had a discussion regarding money coming in and may make changes to bring more in next year.

C. Marketing Update

Jackie Gibson reviewed a handout that was distributed to the Executive Committee and appears at the end of these minutes. Outfront Media Sports has committed \$1.9M which is close to the revenue share threshold at \$2.0M. Tik-a-Tap cost the state an opportunity at reaching revenue share when they filed bankruptcy. Thom Simmons commended Rob Wigod for leading the section into the OMS agreement and it is paying off.

#### D. Communications Update

Thom Simmons gave the report as Chelsea Heyward was not present. The office is ahead of budget in rights fees this year. There was a deal for Basketball with KDOC and this relationship has now turned into a contract for the 2019-20 school year. Talking with Baller TV to be our number three network. In social media, Instagram is performing better than expected. The playoff brackets garnered 10,200 likes which is ahead of where we wanted to be. Soccer received twice as many views as all other Winter Sports.

### E. 2018-19 Southern Section Goals

Rob Wigod distributed the section goals and they appear at the end of these minutes. He highlighted several accomplishments to the Executive Committee. Loren Kleinrock mentioned that he appreciated the tone that the Transfer Rules Committee is taking. Rob Wigod continued that it is time to see exactly what we are looking at, for example, the SOP dates at the end of the season instead of at the beginning, a type of first-time transfer rule in an environment where valid change of residence and hardships have been tightened up. Monica Colunga requested that at the Council Meeting, Council members sit in their geographic areas to allow members to meet with their area representative from the Transfer Rules Committee and ask for input.

### C. Commissioner's Report

The new school's application deadline is Monday, April 1. Emails were sent to the Probationary schools for their evaluations of this school year and we will be asking you to revisit them. Along with staff, will be attending the CSADA Conference in San Diego next weekend with a session just for Southern Section Athletic Directors and then will be attending the CIF Federated Council Meeting the following Friday in Champions for Character, Hall of Fame, and Distinguished Service Award Burlingame. nominations are due May 1. The Champions for Character Golf Tournament is Monday, June 17, at Alta Vista Country Club in Placentia. Please be part of the day and we will have the In-N-Out truck on site for lunch.

### D. Executive Committee Member Reports

President-Elect, Mike West – AB 1592 is in legislature. For this bill, we are going to ask the schools to send their logo to be placed on one letter to show support. Roger Blake will send out the request to all schools. Glenn Martinez' primary goal was to create the Athletic Trainers Committee and has helped the community to have a voice and be able to provide feedback.

Mt. SAC Area Representative, Paul Lopez – Talked about the impact Glenn Martinez had on the section. His area is in the middle of Releaguing. Asked if 16 games are too many for high school football players.

Girls' Athletic Directors Representative, Jill Matyuch – It was great to be at the Women in Sports conference with the CIF-SS Street Team. There were excellent speakers and Nancy Kelly was great and authentic.

Foothill Area Representative, Loren Kleinrock – This is an amazing group and my time with it is coming to an end. I am grateful to have been able to a part of it and it has been a rewarding experience.

Attended the Basketball Finals at CBU and the venue was awesome for our kids. I agree with the question, is 16 games too many for these football players?

Congratulations to Rainer Wulf on the Basketball Playoffs, they were awesome. We played at Azusa Pacific and it was a great venue. The Northern Area is also in Releaguing, and they are going to do Football only leagues. 8-Man teams will not vote on the 11-Man Releaguing.

Marketing Manager, Jackie Gibson – Have enjoyed seeing you outside of this meeting. Great to see Nancy Kelly and Dana Wilkerson at the Women in Sports conferences and it was so inspiring as they touched so many lives.

Assistant Commissioner, Thom Simmons – Went to all three Women in Sports conferences and they were all great. Sandy Gahring, thank you for honoring Glenn Martinez the way you did at the Girls Got Game event.

Assistant Commissioner, Rainer Wulf – We need to work at better educating our clients. The club influence in Basketball, pulling teams from courts, parents crazy on refs, coaches in flip flops and shorts is working its way down to the high school level. Our standards are what separates us from the club system. We need to continue to educate our schools on how we are different from that culture.

Chief Financial Officer, Mitch Carty – Appreciates everyone's support.

Assistant Commissioner, Kristine Palle – Thank you for the help with the new format for Soccer and presenting awards at the various sites. Teams were excited and it was successful.

Assistant Commissioner, Mike Middlebrook – Boys Soccer had a spike in red cards and six schools are on probation for it. The revenue was positive for the Finals and we sent money back to the schools that hosted as thanks for a job well done.

CSADA Representative, David Reid – Championships were run so well. Our area is Releaguing with 29 proposals to vote down to one, with that vote taking place on April 22. Credit to Ray Plutko as he set the rules that we still follow for Releaguing and they have worked for the past 15 years. The Audit Committee and our CFO do a wonderful job and is always done very well. Auditor says we are well run.

CADA Representative, Geniel Moon – CADA Conference was held a couple weeks ago at the same site as CASSA. CSC is so great, and our coach has brought them to a great level. Activities Directors meeting here on April 11 with Todd Arrowsmith as the chair. We will be discussing leadership building.

Superintendent Representative, Nancy Kelly – Rob Wigod's eulogy for Glen Martinez was perfect. Glad to have spoken at the Women in Sports Conference. Not comfortable doing this but worth it if I can help one person. My brother was there, which was a nice surprise.

CSADA Representative, Sandy Gahring – Had 773 students at our Girls Got Game event. Baseball coaches donated \$1,000 for cheerleading mats.

Executive Assistant, Sharon Hodge – Thank you for your continued support.

Past President, Carter Paysinger – Rob Wigod did a great job at Glen Martinez' service. We need to get principals and superintendents involved. You can put rules in place, people will still figure a way to cheat. When many make transfers, need to be involved to better serve the communities and help the kids that have worked their way up.

**Proposal Summary:** The CIF Central Section is proposing the implementation of CIF Regional Baseball and Softball Championships to begin in the 2020-2021 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timelines for implementation of new events for consideration.

The event would allow the most competitive baseball and softball teams in the state an opportunity to compete at the Regional level. This championship event is proposed as a one week tournament held immediately after the section finals.

**Fiscal Impact:** Neutral. The staff has conducted an audit of section events and will be planning on using Regional Soccer as an income and expense template for a comparison.

**Background**: State CIF does not currently have a regional championship in Baseball or Softball.

#### BASEBALL

#### 1500. **PITCHING LIMITATION RULE – 30 OUTS**

Sections shall adopt the following baseball pitching limitation rule: 30 outs and/or three (3) appearances in a calendar week through the season.

- A. The calendar week begins on Monday.
- B. Innings pitched in a no game (i.e., rainout, power failure, etc.) shall count toward the total.
- If the 30th out involves a double or triple play, the team will not be penalized. C.
- D. An appearance is defined as a pitcher pitching at least one (1) pitch. If a pitcher is removed from the mound to another position or to the dugout and later returns to pitch in the same game, the pitcher will be charged with a second appearance.
- Any violation constitutes a forfeit of the contest. E.

#### **BASEBALL REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS** 1501.

A Baseball Regional Championship will be held following the completion of Section playoffs. Baseball Regional Championships entries will be place into the appropriate Regions

#### **ARTICLE 260**

#### **SOFTBALL**

#### 2600. LENGTH OF GAME

Sections are authorized to limit junior varsity softball games to seven (7) innings or a maximum of two (2) hours (no new inning shall begin after two (2) hours have expired from the start of the game), whichever comes first.

#### 2601. **OFFICIAL NATIONAL FEDERATION AUTHENTICATION MARK**

Only balls with the National Federation authentication mark shall be used in the sports of baseball, basketball, field hockey, football, lacrosse, soccer, softball, volleyball and water polo. (Revised to include lacrosse November 2000 Federated Council)

#### 2602. **PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT**

It is required that adult base coaches wear a protective helmet. Play will not continue until compliance with this rule is met. It is recommended that the helmet meet NOCSAE standards.

NOTE: NFHS rules govern use of protective equipment by a player/student. (Approved January 2015 Federated Council)







#### **The A-G College Entrance Requirements**

The A-G College Requirements are a sequence of high school courses that students must complete (with a grade of C or better) to be minimally eligible for admission to the University of California (UC) and California State University (CSU). They represent the basic level of academic preparation that high school students should achieve to undertake university work.

The following chart summarizes the A-G/College Entrance Requirements:

(E)	Foreign Language	2	Two years of the same language other than English
(F)	Visual and Performing Arts	1 ·	One year, including dance, drama/theater, music, or visual art.
(G)	College Preparatory Electives	1	One year (two semesters), chosen from additional "A-F" courses beyond those used to satisfy the requirements above, or courses that have been approved for use as "G" electives

# PURPOSE

NCS is a ministry of the Liberty Baptist Church (LBC) of Newport Beach, California. NCS was founded to support parents in the rearing of their children and to provide a Christian alternative to the education offered in most other schools, both public and private. # PHILOSOPHY

Students develop increasing comprehension skills relating to inference, sequencing, prediction, and character motivation as they explore various genres. Literature is integrated with social studies and history, taking on a humanities approach.

#### Oral Language:

Speaking skills are taught informally in class sharing and discussions. Formal instruction is taught via the use of oral book reports, project presentations, and speeches.

#### Writing/Grammar:

Students write memoirs, essays, have literature circles and reading buddies. Writing and grammar is emphasized across the curriculum. Their creative skills are honed by exposure to and practice with short stories, poetry, letters and journals.

#### Social Studies

This area of curriculum revolves around expanding social concepts as the grade level increases. Students study self, family, community, city, country and world. Social studies lends itself to integration with other curricular areas such as music, art, and language. Students are taught to question and inquire about concepts that tie into the TREE Academy social justice values, such as fairness, equality, tolerance, generosity, compassion, human rights, and sustainability. In addition, many field trips throughout the year enhance the students' experiences.

#### Science

Our Science program is a hands-on, integrated, inquiry-based science curriculum. Students will study sciences pertaining to life, earth, physical and systems design. They will also have ready access to the Leap Lab and its resources to pursue any interest that has a thread to scientific knowledge, research, or inquiry.

#### Mathematics

We have an activity-based math program that requires students to think creatively about problem-solving while becoming fluent with mathematical skills. This is a unique program

in that students not only demonstrate strategies, but also articulate their strategies in written and verbal forms. Many activities involve engaging games that reinforce students' understanding of important mathematical c

#### Spanish

Our Spanish curriculum is a full immersion program based on listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. Tutoring will involve conversational and grammar skill development. As classes progress, they incorporate sentences and verb conjugations into their speaking skills.

#### Art

Art instruction is taught utilizing methods of experience, observation, and evaluation by children. The curriculum is based on artistic perception, creative expression, historical/cultural context, and aesthetic valuing. Students will work in a variety of mediums and mixed mediums to create artistic works.

#### Physical Education

With an array of games on campus, dance, movement, and yoga programs, we will develop stamina, coordination, and body awareness. The activities will stress gross motor skills, hand-eye coordination and general fitness. Leadership, sportsmanship, cooperation, empathy and positive self-image are encouraged.

#### Life Skills

Life Skills is a cornerstone course at TREE, providing our students dedicated time to listen, discuss, share, reflect, and express their beliefs and thoughts. They can ask questions of themselves and others, and learn by sharing their stories and listening to the stories of others. Students can contemplate their identity and self-image, their values, who they are in relationship with friends, family, the larger community and as part of the ecological world.

Life Skills classes include discussions, games and Council techniques. Council is an ancient form of communication where participants sit in a circle with a talking piece and follow four intentions, including listening and speaking from the heart. This formal yet flexible structure provides a safe, supportive setting in which everyone can be heard. Ritual is a key element.

Reinforcing TREE's philosophy, Life Skills classes weave in issues related to social justice, environmental stewardship and diversity by introducing current and historic events/themes as opportunities for personal action. Students are encouraged to be reflective and grow the skills of mindful awareness of self and others. Themes are grade specific and often include topics like life choices, values, family, friendship, emotions, personal well-being and the ethical and spiritual aspects of life. At heart, Life Skills provides students an opportunity to grow in self-awareness and emotional intelligence.

Students are expected to come to class prepared to participate, and be open to new ideas and methods with which they may not be familiar. Students discover things

themselves and their classmates as they imagine, wonder, inquire and relax. We are committed to helping our students on their journey from childhood through adolescence with increased independence and responsibility, growing into insightful, sophisticated thinkers and leaders.

#### Community Service

Every student at TREE is required to perform hours of community service. 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> graders are required to perform 20 hours of community service, and 9<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> graders are required to perform 30 hours. TREE will offer various opportunities as well as on campus tasks and chores. However, students are encouraged to perform community service away from TREE and are only asked that it be verified by the foundation or organization for which our students gave community service hours. Community Service at TREE is a required activity and every student must fulfil their minimum required hours in order to be credited for the completion of that academic year.



#### **GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

- History/Social Science ("A") Two years, including one year of world history, cultural and historical geography and one year of U.S. history, or one-half year of U.S. history and one-half year of American government or civics.
- English ("B") Four years of college preparatory English that integrates reading of classic and modern literature, frequent and regular writing, and practice listening and speaking.
- Mathematics ("C") –Three years of college-preparatory math, including or integrating the topics covered in elementary and advanced algebra and two- and three-dimensional geometry.
- Laboratory Science ("D") Two years of laboratory science providing fundamental knowledge in at least two of the three disciplines of biology, chemistry and physics.
- Foreign Language ("E") Two years of the same language other than English or equivalent to the second level of high school instruction.
- Visual and performing arts ("F") One year chosen from dance, music, theater or the visual arts.
- College-preparatory elective ("G") One year chosen from the "A-F" courses beyond those used to satisfy the requirements above, or courses that have been approved solely in the elective area.

#### REPEATED COURSES

Should a transfer of student's transcripts to TREE indicate that a course they have taken at another school does not cover the prescribed course content and level expected for his/her grade and subject (based on Common Core Standards and UC A-G requirements), we will require that student to take a course at TREE that meets our standards. Our curriculum is based on the Common Core Standards, and meets all UC A-G requirements. Our diploma is therefore based on students completing appropriate coursework to meet those standards.

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# SCHOOL PHILOSOPHY

TREE Academy believes all children deserve access to education that places traditional academic pursuits in a contemporary context, engaging students' hearts and minds to explore the opportunities, and address the challenges of our ever-evolving world. Weaving together the kaleidoscope of communities that make up Los Angeles, we inspire our students to become creative thinkers, committed citizens, and compassionate human beings. Born of a felt responsibility to prepare young people for the world that awaits them, TREE Academy seeks to spark enduring curiosity, to promote personal, social, political, cultural and moral understanding. We aspire to instill respect for the life and ecology of the earth, and to foster the sensitivity to embrace life's deep joys and mysteries.

TREE Academy rests upon several fundamental commitments:

- 1. Development of a diverse community in which all differences—personal, cultural, economic, ethnic, racial—become a framework for learning and for bringing people together.
- 2. Recognition, appreciation, and encouragement of each person's full and unique human potential.

## STAYING ON CAMPUS

Students are expected and required to stay on campus from 8:45 a.m to 3:20 p.m. Unless there is a specific pre-arranged need for a student to leave campus, such as for a doctor's appointment, we do not allow students to leave and return on the same day. Faculty are likewise expected to stay on campus throughout the day and should only leave when absolutely necessary after informing our administrative staff of their departure and expected return to campus.

#### PICK-UP

For those, arriving after 3:45 p.m, please come to the TREE office to pick up your child. Should you ever need to make alternate arrangements for the pick-up of your child, we need to know in advance by written email to Julia Dillon or Storey Sheinberg or Mary Sebunya who will be picking your child up (full name of the driver and company for which they work), what kind of car they will be driving, and the color of the car. In this way, we hope to keep students safe at TREE. (<u>Storey.Sheinberg@treeacademy.org</u>; <u>Mary.Sebunya@treeacademy.org</u>; <u>Julia.Dillon@treecademy.org</u>)

#### LUNCH AND SNACK

Students may bring lunches from home. For health and safety reasons, there is no sharing or trading of lunches. Lunches should not include any candy or soft / energy drinks. Lunches should provide a selection of healthful and filling foods that will keep children going throughout the afternoon. Please also make sure that your child has a designated snack—many will eat their whole lunch at snack time and have no lunch. Every so often, we will have a celebration and supply food, but we will inform you in advance of any such event. Please join us in striving for "zero waste" by sending\_\_\_\_\_



lunches and drinks in reusable containers with reusable utensils. We suggest a stainless steel double-walled container for liquids with their name clearly identifying it as their property.

#### Energy Drinks

Students are not allowed to consume energy drinks while in school. Energy drinks are high in caffeine, sugar and calories. As most of us are already consuming too much sugar, regularly consuming energy drinks can increase your free sugar intake to above the recommended maximum. Consuming energy drinks may trigger symptoms that include: restlessness, tremors, palpitations and nervousness. Energy drinks can also cause irregular heart rhythms and other life-threatening heart-rhythm changes.

## ALL SCHOOL FRIDAY CELEBRATION

Every Friday, all of the classes get together at 8:40am for an all school community gathering. Students will share what is happening in their classes, listen to announcements, perform, sing, watch slideshows, and much more! Parents are welcome and encouraged to join the celebration. We anticipate these celebrations to last 30 minutes.

#### BIRTHDAYS

If you would like to celebrate your child's birthday, you can send in something to be shared with the other students. In preparing any foods for TREE teachers and students, we requested that you bring in low-sugar birthday treats, such as fruit kabobs, popsicles, small sandwiches, or frozen yogurt. Off-campus birthday party invitations should be mailed unless the entire class is invited. If only a few children are invited to a party, please remind children not to discuss the party at school so as to avoid hurt feelings. Also, please use your best judgment in these cases and do not exclude just a few children from the party.

## LOST AND FOUND

We keep lost and found items in the Learning Lab and in the Social Room. Please label all backpacks, jackets, sweaters, sweatshirts and lunch containers with your child's name so that they can be identified. We bring all unclaimed items to Goodwill before Christmas break, spring break and summer break.

#### MEDICATION

Please reference the TREE Academy Prescription and Non-Prescription Medication Administration Policy (Appendix 7), which all families received prior to the beginning of the school year. In short, the school cannot dispense any prescription or over-the-counter medicines including ibuprofen and acetaminophen unless parents have

- 1. completed and submitted a prescription and non-prescription authorization form and
- 2. supplied the medication to the school as instructed on the form.



Please review the Policy carefully and decide if your child requires medications readily available in the office.

# CONFERENCES & COMMUNICATION WITH SCHOOL/TEACHERS

TREE Academy welcomes communication from parents. Should you wish to confer with one of our teachers regarding your child, please make an appointment by contacting the teacher directly by email. At the beginning of the school year, we will distribute a full list of teacher emails for your use. You can also contact the school office if you need an updated list of contact emails.

Communication regarding scholastic progress in a specific class should be directed to the teacher of that course. In order to encourage increasing independence and self-advocacy, students should attend any scheduled conferences. For other concerns regarding the welfare and day-to-day experience and education of your child, please call the school counselor or email signe.grant@treeacademy.org.

Parents, please be sensitive to the tempo and fullness of the school days and weeks. Please call or email your child's teacher to schedule an appointment. Please understand that teachers are busy and cannot be in contact daily through email or phone. Know that we are committed to doing our best for the entire community. If your conference with a teacher and/or counselor has not met your needs, you may consult the Director of School.

TREE families will receive a weekly TREE newsletter by email; a fun, quick read that includes highlights and photographs, as well as information about upcoming events and important dates. Please enjoy reading the TREE Newsletter and stay in the know about what's going on at school!

The students also publish an online magazine called EVERGREEN that can be accessed through our website.

# ATTENDANCE

Consistent attendance is essential to the program. All students are required to be in assigned classes, to attend school meetings, and to participate in all curricular activities, including field trips, grade level trips and community service projects. Any student who misses a required trip or activity must make it up or arrange an acceptable alternative. Excessive absences may jeopardize class standing. Specifically, any student missing more than 20 days of the regular class meetings (excluding school trips) in a semester will not receive credit for that school academic year from TREE. Students and their parents need to arrange for appointments before and after school hours. Students who leave campus during school hours must have their parents or designated pick-up persons sign them out.

Students must sign out in the office and sign in again when they return. Parental written permission is required for this absence, but please understand: parent permission is not the same as school permission. Only the school has the authority to excuse a student's absence.

#### TIMELINESS & TARDIES

Students should arrive at school between 8:15 a.m and 8:40 a.m. every day. Students who arrive after 8:55 a.m. need to check in with the office.

Late arrivals to school and to classes shall be noted and added cumulatively to a student's overall attendance record. Students are allowed a passing period of several minutes between most classes. Late arrival is disruptive to others, cuts down on the time everyone has for learning, and diminishes the intellectual and engaged culture at school. At TREE Academy, when a student is late to a school for period one, he or she needs to sign in at the front office.

<u>Parents:</u> It is the family's responsibility to get students to school on time. Late arrival at school is a significant problem.

#### ABSENCES/ILLNESS

An important aspect of keeping students healthy is preventing the spread of illness by keeping ill children home or isolating them immediately when they become ill at school. If a student becomes ill during school hours, the teacher or office administration will determine whether or not to call you to pick up your child in a timely manner.

If your child has had a fever of 100.3 or higher, please do not bring him or her back to school until he/she has been fever free for a minimum of 24 hours. If your child has a rash, eye symptoms, a runny nose with yellow or greenish mucus, persistent coughing, earache, vomiting or diarrhea, head lice, or a skin infection, please have him/her examined by a health professional. When a child is sick, the parents should inform the school that the child will not be attending school and the reason. If your child has a communicable illness such as chicken pox, strep throat, influenza A or B or mumps, please let the school know. Extended absences for reasons other than illness should be discussed with the individual teacher prior to the intended absence.

A. To keep our records accurate and to ensure student safety, parents are required to telephone or email the school before 8:30 a.m. the morning of the absence. If an absence is not reported, the school will contact the home. Any absences not reported by parents are considered unexcused. Messages may be left during non-business hours by calling the school. Students returning to school after more than one day's absence must also bring a note from a parent or guardian



explaining the absence. Students absent more than three days for medical reasons must furnish a note from a medical doctor as to the reason for their absence as per State regulations. Students who are absent from school should get homework assignments from their teachers via email.

- B. If a student becomes ill during school hours and needs to go home, parents will be called. Students may not leave campus without permission. Please come into the office to sign your child out; do not ask your child to wait outside for you.
- C. Categories of Absences:
  - i. Excused Absences: Sickness, family deaths, emergency medical or dental appointments, or similar serious matters.
  - ii. Extended or Unexcused Absences: Any extended absences must be approved by the Director of School. Any unapproved absences are unexcused. Suspensions from school as a result of a violation of another school rule, routine medical or dental appointments, which could be made after school hours, or any absence not approved by the school are generally considered unexcused. In the event of any planned absence, families must contact the office manager as well as teachers via email prior to the absence. As stated above, parent permission is not the same as school permission. Only the school has the authority to excuse a student's absence.
  - iii. Cut: An intentional absence about which neither the family nor the school has any prior knowledge will be considered a cut. An intentional cut is a serious matter. Cutting a class results in an automatic one-day suspension.

#### \*\*\* 5 tardies or partial day absences will equal one (1) absent day \*\*\*

#### \*\*\* 20 full day absences will equal NO CREDIT for the academic school year \*\*\*

Faculty will assist students who missed work during excused absences, but are not required to assist students with work missed during unexcused absences.

# **OVERARCHING GUIDELINES**

#### GENERAL CONDUCT

TREE Academy is dedicated to the quality education of its students. This is our primary function and reason for existence. In order to achieve this, we must maintain a climate of respect. This is a condition of acceptance and continued attendance at TREE Academy. Any students who do not adhere to standards of respectful behavior, whether or not covered by specific school regulations, will be subject to disciplinary action, beginning with, but not limited to Promise Councils and Parent Teacher Confere

nces which may result in suspension or expulsion from the school. Students are expected to have the maturity and responsibility to live up to these high standards at all school functions, on or off campus. We expect the same from parents as well.

All TREE Academy students, staff and community members are expected to respect others and support teaching and learning. Prohibited behavior includes: offensive language, ignoring staff directions, threats (including verbal, written, pictures/drawings, gestures and any other form of communication), slander, sexual harassment or misconduct, lying, vandalism, assault (verbal or physical), theft, and fighting. We know of no easier way to ruin a place than to create a climate of fear. If you do this, you are not welcome at TREE Academy. We work here together. What you do affects others. If you remember that, you will help make things better. If a student displays a pattern of intimidation and aggression, whether it involves bullying, teasing, exclusion, or other mean-spirited behaviors, he or she will be expelled.

# Drugs, Alcohol, Tobacco (Vaping) and Energy Drinks

Drugs, alcohol, smoking (vaping & juuling) and energy drinks are prohibited in the school, on the campus, or at off-campus school functions. Possession and/or use of drugs or alcohol or tobacco (nicotine) at school is grounds for immediate expulsion and police involvement. Please be aware of our Zero Tolerance substance policy (Appendix 2).

#### Vandalism

Vandalism of the school building, grounds, or learning materials therein are considered to be infringements on the rights of the TREE Academy community. No one is to injure, destroy or deface school property. All community members are expected to treat the building and the grounds with care and respect. Any student who vandalizes the building, grounds, or materials therein will face severe disciplinary consequences. Parents/guardians will be responsible for paying for any damage done to the building or school property by their child.

#### Weapons

Guns, knives, explosives/firecrackers, or weapons of any type are not permitted in the school, on the campus, or anywhere on the premises. Cigarette lighters are likewise strictly prohibited. Students in possession of weapons or any prohibited items will be subject to immediate expulsion. Any student brandishing a weapon and/or threatening another student with a weapon has no place at TREE Academy and will be expelled. We will also inform the police of the student's behavior.

#### Academic Honesty

The students of TREE Academy agree to maintain and assist one another in maintaining and promoting academic honesty. Cheating and plagiarism are serious offenses and may lead to expulsion. Please refer to Appendix 4.



#### School Sanctioned Bake Sales

Apart from school approved bake sales, no student can sell or barter items on school campus or exchange money using the TREE email.

#### Cell Phone / Electronic Device Policy

Cell phones are not permitted on campus, and if brought to school, must be checked in with the office or with the teachers in charge of supervision before class. Phones, iPods, and other similar electronic devices may be used only when specifically authorized by a TREE faculty member in the classroom. At no time should headphones or any personal electronics be used when transitioning between classes or when a student excuses him or herself from a classroom. Use of cell phones/electronic devices at inappropriate times will result in the device being confiscated. TREE Academy staff and faculty who confiscate cell phones/personal electronics during class may not have the ability to deliver them to the front office until a later time. Therefore, staff cannot be responsible for the safekeeping of any confiscated items.

#### Dress Code

There is not a formal dress code at TREE and we encourage students to express themselves positively, dress comfortably and feel good. We respect creative efforts, and we understand that different people may have different sensibilities. Students are however, expected to dress appropriately for school activities, and to demonstrate respect for themselves, their teachers, and for learning.

Please note that shoes must be worn at all times during the school day. Hats, hoods, and bandanas should not be worn inside the classroom. Additionally, we ask for students not to wear flip-flops, or midriffs.

Sagging clothing and gang affectations are not permitted. Clothing with logos that depict illegal behavior or paraphernalia is not permitted. Clothing may not advertise the drug, alcohol, or tobacco culture, nor hatred or disrespect for human rights.

Inappropriately revealing clothing is not allowed. A student who arrives at school dressed in a manner deemed inappropriate may be asked to change, cover up, or turn clothing inside out. The administration retains the right to draw the line and determine what is appropriate.

Finally, we ask for you and your child to be conscious of clothing or accessories that may undermine TREE's mission of inclusion. Sometimes, wearing certain brands or designer labels (and boasting about the cost of such items) may alienate other students and make them feel "less than." Clothing with images of weaponry, violence, obscenities or any image that could be construed in the school's judgement as denigrating to others are not permitted on campus.

School Safety: Crews & Gangs



As stated earlier, we know of no easier way to ruin an environment than to create a climate of fear. If you do this, you are not welcome at TREE Academy. Association, participation or membership in a crew or gang is contrary to the most fundamental values of TREE Academy. Although we are always determined to consider each individual circumstance on its own merits, involvement in one or more of the following behaviors will run a high risk of immediate student expulsion: intimidation of students at TREE Academy or off campus; bringing crew/gang members on campus; association or run-ins with crew/gang members in school vicinity.

#### Sexual Behavior

Students who misbehave sexually at any school activity are subject to disciplinary action. Students should also be aware that sexual harassment is a violation of laws against discrimination (state law and title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964). Such harassment may range from physical assault and rape to inappropriate personal remarks, questions, jokes or innuendo. Clearly, sexual harassment is contrary to the values of the TREE Academy community. Students who have any questions about what constitutes inappropriate behavior should consult one of the school administrators.

#### Infectious Disease

TREE Academy is sensitive to issues of privacy and committed to the safety and wellbeing of all students and staff. It is extremely important that families let the school know of all medical conditions that may require adjustment of policies and/or practices to keep everyone safe. Failure to inform the school in these circumstances is a serious breach of trust and may result in terminating the family's relationship with the school. Please refer to the Policy on Infectious Disease (Appendix 3).

#### OFFICE TELEPHONE USE / ELECTRONIC DEVICES, GAMES AND TOYS

The telephones in the office area are for staff and parent use only, unless students receive explicit permission from a faculty or staff member. We do not allow students to carry around or use their cell phones during school hours. Parents will be contacted by a staff member via phone in the event of illness or emergency. Students should use email to communicate non-emergency details or information with their parents during the school day.

Electronic devices and games are not permitted at school. TREE Academy does not assume responsibility for the item(s) should they be misplaced. The same policy also applies to non-electronic toys and games from home. Students may bring educationally appropriate toys and books to the classroom with their teacher's approval.

# DISCIPLINE

TREE Academy uses a conflict resolution/discussion approach to most discipline issues that arise during the school day. Students are taught to respect the rights of others, school property, others' property, as well as the emotional responses from others. In most cases, discipline is handled by a teacher.



#### THE PROMISE COUNCIL

Promise Councils are our way at TREE of addressing students who are not turning in their work, or whose behavior has become a cause for concern. The Promise Councils will employ Restorative Justice techniques, and most often will be comprised of Alex and/or Ray, the teacher involved, and a teacher of the student's choosing. Signe and/or one of our Administrative Staff may also be in attendance. The Promise Council will first seek to understand why a student hasn't completed the work on time, then consider supportive ways to assist the student with doing their work. They are designed to support the student in addressing the issue(s) at hand.

The Council will then create an agreement with the student as to how and when the work will be completed and turned into the teacher(s). The Teacher selected by the student to join the Council meeting will then email all concerned, including the student, the student's parent(s) or guardian(s), the Teacher(s) involved, Alex, Ray and Mary to confirm the new agreement or plan.

The agreement will involve a follow-up meeting a week or two later to see if the issues have been adequately addressed by the student. In the rare event a student declines to meet his or her agreements forged in a Promise Council, the Council members will convey that to the Director of School, which may well then result in further steps, including days away from school (Days of Reflection) during which the student will be asked to write a written reflection on their behavior.

It is TREE's view that any student who declines to make a good faith effort to work with their Promise Council, are, in effect, communicating to us all that they do not feel in accord with TREE's approach. While our approach will work for most students, we also understand that no approach can, or will, work for every student. Should we discover in the course of a Promise Council process that a student is not making a good faith effort, we will work with the parents/guardians to find a more suitable environment for the student other than TREE.

#### Incomplete Class Assigned Work Promise Council

Teachers will email any student who did not complete any assigned class work for that week. The email will identify the missing or incomplete assignments, and will be copied to the student's parent(s) or guardian(s), Alex, Ray and Mary in our administration office. Should there be any special circumstances to consider as to why the student is late or behind in his or her work, the student and/or parent(s) or guardian(s) can contact and confer with the Teacher, making sure to include Alex, Ray and Mary on any emails, and noting any new understandings or plans made during those discussions regarding the student's work and when it will be completed. Should a student have missing or incomplete work due two weeks in row, a similar email will go out to all concerned, and a Promise Council will be formed. Please bear in mind that all work assigned at TREE is for the student's benefit and development, as well as in anticipation of not only the demands of High School, but also for the potential College workloads to come, grades generally, and the basic requirements at any level for receiving class credit. **Behavioral Promise Council** 

A student sent more than once to the office for any behavioral reason, including disrupting a class, will convene a Promise Council.

Within that same day, the Teacher who assigned the reflection will email all concerned a description of the behavior(s) that prompted the student to be sent to the office.

Again, the Promise Council will be comprised of Alex and/or Ray, the teacher involved, a teacher of the student's choosing, Signe, and someone from our Administrative staff.

The Promise Council will work with the student to understand the cause(s) of the behavior(s), and then seek to forge a restorative path forward with the student, including whatever additional steps the Council thinks most helpful to the student and anyone else affected.

Depending on the severity of the behavior(s), and/or the outcomes of the Promise Council process, the Council will share its decisions and/or make recommendations to the administration. Although most students will likely enter a Promise Council with understandable concerns, he/she/they may well soon discover that the Council members are all dedicated to finding a restorative path forward with the student. While certain behaviors may trigger our zero-tolerance policy (as noted our School Handbook), the emphasis of our Promise Councils will not be on rule-breaking, but rather on supporting a learning opportunity through which a student can grow, addressing any harm done, making amends and renewing our TREE Promise to each other. School administration will rely extensively on the decisions reached and/or the recommendations made by our Promise Councils. To give you a sense of how we are approaching the Promise Councils, here is an excerpt from our Council guidelines, created and developed with our faculty and staff: Role of the Promise Council at TREE is to address both homework issues as well as behavioral issues. As a general rule, their goal is to:

- Address the needs of those harmed (behavioral issues)
- Empower everyone involved to learn, grow and change
- Focus on harm done rather than solely on rule-breaking
- Invite and encourages accountability by the wrongdoer, or those behind on their work
- Seek to heal, and/or forge new agreements to move forward productively and responsibly
- Foster community building through the development of authentic relationships because we see relationships as central to building community
- Seek to recognize the root causes of behaviors in forging restorative agreements
- Uses inclusive, collaborative processes to address and restore circumstances and/or make amends

Skills and Values we seek to develop through the Promise Council

- Compassion
- Creativity
- Empathy
- Flexibility
- Honesty
- Listening



- Self-awareness
- Open-mindedness
- Patience
- Respect
- Responsibility

As the African proverb reminds us, it takes a village to raise a child. With your support we will continue to offer our best understanding and efforts to help and guide students to grow and develop their innate gifts in light of the TREE Promise.

Should a student be experiencing a particularly stressful day for any reason, we may also call his/her Parent or Guardian to come and pick them up from school as a supportive step.

#### CONSEQUENCES OF RULE BREAKING

TREE Academy honors its consequences. The school may choose to use the following consequences for breaking any of the school rules: filing a report, school service, parent conferences, loss of privileges (school trips, sports, dances, etc.), suspension, or expulsion. At the discretion of the administration, a student may be placed on behavioral probation. Behavioral probation is a serious matter. Long-term or repeated behavioral problems may result in expulsion.

#### Days of Reflection

A student may be asked to take 3 to 5 days away from school, and tasked to write an extended reflection on why. Their good faith efforts will signal their desire to return to TREE and abide by their TREE Promise.

#### Expulsion

We never take this extreme step without serious consideration. There are, however, several things that may lead to expulsion: drug/alcohol use of any kind on campus; violence, threats and/or gang affiliation on campus, or after hours; a pattern of cruelty or ridicule towards others; multiple instances of academic dishonesty, including misleading statements, or statements that are less than the whole truth. Please be aware, there is no requirement that the school proceed from milder to heavier consequences. One may not receive a warning before a Days of Reflection, or Days of Reflection before an expulsion. Final decisions regarding consequences are within the sole discretion of the school administration.

#### Academic Counseling/Probation

We make every effort to keep parents informed of their child's progress in school. If a student is having difficulty academically, we may request a parent conference. The student may be put on academic probation, requiring weekly monitoring by both teachers and parents. Individual contracts are sometimes made with students to aid them in handling their difficulties, and referrals to outside tutors may be recommended, and or required. Probationary status is reviewed at the end of each semester.

Any student who fails to earn credit in any class (for reasons of not doing the work at a minimum level for credit, or too many absences) must show satisfactory progress before advancing to the next level. A student whose failure results from a medically documented condition may be exempt from this requirement, although those decisions are also subject to minimum academic hours and course requirements for credit.

#### Extracurricular Activity

If students do not maintain satisfactory progress in their courses, they may become ineligible to participate in various extracurricular activities. Our goal is to assist each young person in his or her efforts to be successful at everything he or she does at school.

Regarding the inevitable difficulties or misunderstandings that can arise between students

Because interpersonal difficulties and misunderstandings are an inevitable part of life, we look to the Parents and Guardians involved to proactively contact each other -- independently of TREE -- in order to work together to address the situation in as positive and a mutually supportive way as possible.

Our approach at TREE will be to facilitate and/or mediate student dialogues when conflicts arise on campus, but we are no substitute for the initiative and good will of our Parents and Guardians.

Should your student experience difficulties of a kind that makes you feel uncomfortable approaching another Parent or Guardian, you may contact our School Counselor, Signe Grant. Depending on the situation, she may be able to offer you some general guidance or recommendations, or to point you to a community resource that may be of assistance. She cannot, however, provide any Parent or Guardian private counseling.

In all cases, it is ultimately the responsibility of the Parent(s) or Guardian(s) involved to forge the best possible way forward on behalf of our students' best interests and growth.

# TREE ACADEMY EDUCATION PROGRAM

TREE Academy is committed to an array of educational "best practices," teaching methodologies, pedagogy, new "progressive" approaches to learning, as well as tried and true methods. We focus on students gaining conceptual knowledge rather than repeating information or memorizing facts. We encourage students to share their thinking and opinions, and to question information and form their own ideas. We guide students towards arriving at their own understanding by evaluating information for themselves. We use several approaches for instruction. Among them:



*Inquiry Based Learning:* Instruction motivated by questions that have engaged the interest and active curiosity of the students. Teachers act as facilitators to learning rather than sources of knowledge. Students work together to investigate, solve problems, and develop understanding. (Used in science, social studies, math, and humanities.)

#### Workshop Format:

A structured and predictable setting for learning in which teachers are viewed as mentors and models. In a workshop, students (as writers or readers) learn and practice new strategies, develop understanding, and explore questions using prior and personal experience as scaffolds to creatively integrate new knowledge. Teachers confer and question as they work with whole groups, small groups, and individuals.

#### Socratic Seminar:

A discussion among students in which they are given the opportunity to make value judgments or moral decisions. The teacher acts as a facilitator who continues to pose open-ended questions, without imposing answers. This process encourages students to think critically, analyze multiple meanings in text, and express ideas with clarity and confidence. (Used in humanities, current events, social studies, etc.)

#### Information Processing Strategies:

The grouping together of facts or concepts in an organized way. Teachers use a variety of methods to help students with memorization (spelling, word study, math facts) such as graphic organizers, mind maps, story webs, and other visual representation.

#### Constructivist Approach:

Students are the makers of meaning and knowledge. This approach fosters critical thinking, and independent and motivated learning by building on prior knowledge. There is often guided discovery, where the teacher avoids most direct instruction and leads the students through questions to discover, discuss, appreciate, and verbalize knowledge. (Used in all subjects.)

SCHOOL CURRICULUM

Language Arts

#### Reading:

Students develop increasing comprehension skills relating to inference, sequencing, prediction, and character motivation as they explore various genres. Literature is integrated with social studies and history, taking on a humanities approach.

#### Oral Language:

Speaking skills are taught informally in class sharing and discussions. Formal instruction is taught via the use of oral book reports, project presentations, and speeches.

#### Writing/Grammar:



Students write memoirs, essays, have literature circles and reading buddies. Writing and grammar is emphasized across the curriculum. Their creative skills are honed by exposure to and practice with short stories, poetry, letters and journals.

# Social Studies

This area of curriculum revolves around expanding social concepts as the grade level increases. Students study self, family, community, city, country and world. Social studies lends itself to integration with other curricular areas such as music, art, and language. Students are taught to question and inquire about concepts that tie into the TREE Academy social justice values, such as fairness, equality, tolerance, generosity, compassion, human rights, and sustainability. In addition, many field trips throughout the year enhance the students' experiences.

# Science

Our Science program is a hands-on, integrated, inquiry-based science curriculum. Students will study sciences pertaining to life, earth, physical and systems design. They will also have ready access to the Leap Lab and its resources to pursue any interest that has a thread to scientific knowledge, research, or inquiry.

# Mathematics

We have an activity-based math program that requires students to think creatively about problem-solving while becoming fluent with mathematical skills. This is a unique program in that students not only demonstrate strategies, but also articulate their strategies in written and verbal forms. Many activities involve engaging games that reinforce students' understanding of important mathematical c

# Spanish

Our Spanish curriculum is a full immersion program based on listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. Tutoring will involve conversational and grammar skill development. As classes progress, they incorporate sentences and verb conjugations into their speaking skills.

## Art

Art instruction is taught utilizing methods of experience, observation, and evaluation by children. The curriculum is based on artistic perception, creative expression, historical/cultural context, and aesthetic valuing. Students will work in a variety of mediums and mixed mediums to create artistic works.

# Physical Education

With an array of games on campus, dance, movement, and yoga programs, we will develop stamina, coordination, and body awareness. The activities will stress gross motor skills, hand-eye coordination and general fitness. Leadership, sportsmanship, cooperation, empathy and positive self-image are encouraged. 589

# Life Skills

Life Skills is a cornerstone course at TREE, providing our students dedicated time to listen, discuss, share, reflect, and express their beliefs and thoughts. They can ask questions of themselves and others, and learn by sharing their stories and listening to the stories of others. Students can contemplate their identity and self-image, their values, who they are in relationship with friends, family, the larger community and as part of the ecological world.

Life Skills classes include discussions, games and Council techniques. Council is an ancient form of communication where participants sit in a circle with a talking piece and follow four intentions, including listening and speaking from the heart. This formal yet flexible structure provides a safe, supportive setting in which everyone can be heard. Ritual is a key element.

Reinforcing TREE's philosophy, Life Skills classes weave in issues related to social justice, environmental stewardship and diversity by introducing current and historic events/themes as opportunities for personal action. Students are encouraged to be reflective and grow the skills of mindful awareness of self and others. Themes are grade specific and often include topics like life choices, values, family, friendship, emotions, personal well-being and the ethical and spiritual aspects of life. At heart, Life Skills provides students an opportunity to grow in self-awareness and emotional intelligence.

Students are expected to come to class prepared to participate, and be open to new ideas and methods with which they may not be familiar. Students discover things about themselves and their classmates as they imagine, wonder, inquire and relax. We are committed to helping our students on their journey from childhood through adolescence with increased independence and responsibility, growing into insightful, sophisticated thinkers and leaders.

# Community Service

Every student at TREE is required to perform hours of community service. 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> graders are required to perform 20 hours of community service, and 9<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> graders are required to perform 30 hours. TREE will offer various opportunities as well as on campus tasks and chores. However, students are encouraged to perform community service away from TREE and are only asked that it be verified by the foundation or organization for which our students gave community service hours. Community Service at TREE is a required activity and every student must fulfil their minimum required hours in order to be credited for the completion of that academic year.

# GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

• History/Social Science ("A") – Two years, including one year of world history, cultural and historical geography and one year of U.S. history, or one-half year of U.S. history and one-half year of American government or civics.

- English ("B") Four years of college preparatory English that integrates reading of classic and modern literature, frequent and regular writing, and practice listening and speaking.
- Mathematics ("C") –Three years of college-preparatory math, including or integrating the topics covered in elementary and advanced algebra and two- and three-dimensional geometry.
- Laboratory Science ("D") Two years of laboratory science providing fundamental knowledge in at least two of the three disciplines of biology, chemistry and physics.
- Foreign Language ("E") Two years of the same language other than English or equivalent to the second level of high school instruction.
- Visual and performing arts ("F") One year chosen from dance, music, theater or the visual arts.
- College-preparatory elective ("G") One year chosen from the "A-F" courses beyond those used to satisfy the requirements above, or courses that have been approved solely in the elective area.

# REPEATED COURSES

Should a transfer of student's transcripts to TREE indicate that a course they have taken at another school does not cover the prescribed course content and level expected for his/her grade and subject (based on Common Core Standards and UC A-G requirements), we will require that student to take a course at TREE that meets our standards. Our curriculum is based on the Common Core Standards, and meets all UC A-G requirements. Our diploma is therefore based on students completing appropriate coursework to meet those standards.

# HOMEWORK

Homework is an important part of students' education at TREE. Uniquely, our homework will be assigned 4 - 6 blocks in our Learning Lab to be done during school hours. We expect that 60-90% of the students work will be completed at TREE, or at least is well within the realm of possibility, based on a student's efforts and focus. Remaining work, such as reading or research may be assigned for evening or weekends but will be limited in its scope. It is designed to reinforce skills learned in class and to prepare them for class the next day.

Students must complete all class assigned work or the agreed upon assigned work, in consultation with their teacher, administration and parents in order to get credit for a class. Should a student not complete the class assigned work within that school year (ending with the first week of June), they will receive an '**Incomplete**' for that class. They will then have until June 30th to hand in any outstanding assignments due.

Tree Academy, as an accredited school, cannot give credit for classes left as incomplete on a school record. We therefore, urge all students and families to complete coursework within the school year.

# GRADING

Grades 6-8:

We do not use standard letter (A, B, C) or number (100-65%) grading on evaluation forms at the middle school level. It is the position of the school that students in these early grades benefit from a focus on development and understanding of fundamental skills, rather than competition for grades. There is still an expectation that students will complete coursework fully. At the Middle School, students may work hard and still have difficulty with academic material; our grading system at the Middle School level seeks to make this distinction between work ethic and ability clear. Evaluations are marked with one of the following notations:

**Credit (C)**: Used for a student who meets the expectations and standards of performance of the class, including consistency and understanding of the material. "Credit" covers a broad range of performance, but refers most directly to sufficient completion of all course requirements and criteria.

**Reservations (R)**: Used for any student who does not consistently meet standards of performance, or any student about whose performance a teacher has reservations. Reservations should be understood as an expression of concern. If for some reason, a student is not performing acceptably, a final grade of "Reservations" does not necessarily mean repeating a class. At the end of the year, the school will decide whether our reservations warrant a student repeating a class or a grade level. We may feel that, despite our reservations, a student stands an acceptable chance of succeeding at the next level.

**No Credit**: Used to reflect that a student is not meeting standards of performance in the course or has not completed a majority of the required course material. No Credit is an administrative grade, given when the school cannot award credit to a student.

**Incomplete**: Given instead of awarding a grade when a specific task, or series of tasks, is stipulated by the teacher and the Director. These tasks must be completed in order to fulfill the requirements of the course within a specified time. An Incomplete that is not completed within the designated time will become a No Credit.

TREE Academy believes that elementary and middle school is too early to begin the labeling, self-labeling, and academic stratification that so often comes with conventional grades. Students and parents often attempt to translate their grades into another letter or number scale. We urge you to resist this temptation and instead focus on students' learning.

## Grades 9–12:

Grading in High School courses will be A through F, not because we believe this is a better system, but because most colleges and universities still speak this language. TREE Academy will not rank students for the purpose of application to another institution.

- A. Awarded to students whose performance has exhibited academic excellence. A grade of "A" signifies a level of performance that exceeds normal expectations.
- B. Awarded to students whose progress and achievement exceed the standards of performance of the course.
- C. Awarded to students who meet but do not exceed the standards of performance of the course.
- D. Awarded to students doing poor or below average work. Although a passing grade for the purpose of a high school diploma, it indicates inadequate achievement. The University of California, State University systems and any four-year schools do not recognize a "D" as a passing grade in courses required for freshman entrance. A grade of "D" or below earned at the end of any semester may not be accepted by a college. We urge that any student receiving a semester grade (grade of record) of "D" or below to retake the course.
- F. Indicates that a student has failed to meet minimum standards of performance of the course, and therefore will receive no credit toward graduation for that course. Required courses in which a student earns a grade of "F" must be retaken.

**Plus and Minus Grading:** Used in cases when a student has achieved slightly above or below the reported letter grade. Plus and minus grades will be recorded on transcripts and reflected in the overall Grade Point Average (GPA).

**Incomplete:** Given instead of awarding a grade when a specific task, or series of tasks, is stipulated by the teacher and the Director. These tasks must be completed in order to fulfill the requirements of the course within a specified time. An Incomplete that is not completed with the designated time will become a No Credit.

Withdrawal: Under rare circumstances, the school may deem it fair and wise to withdraw a student from a class without giving that student a grade. Although parents and students may want all records of a student's effort in a class to simply vanish, in most situations this would violate our bargain with other institutions (colleges, high schools, etc.). A withdrawal acknowledges that a student was enrolled in a class, but withdrew (for no stated reason). If a student is passing the class at the time of withdrawal, a grade of WP may be given to note this fact. Except in exceptional (usually medical) circumstances, students may only withdraw from a class within the first two months of a semester. TREE Academy uses the grade WF when the reason for a student's withdrawal is lack of diligence.

Please note that both Withdrawal and Incomplete are administrative grades. Although teachers may recommend them and parents/students may request them, the decision to award either of these grades is a decision for the administration.

# High School GPA

GPA is calculated by using the following scale:

A = 4.0	0	0	C = 2.0

Calculating GPA is more an art than a science. Different colleges and universities have their own guidelines, and these do not necessarily mesh with one another. All colleges and universities of which we are aware will recalculate GPAs according to their own guidelines. It is important to note that colleges will see all of your grades, even if you have retaken a course for a higher grade. Please understand that we do not believe that this form of evaluation is particularly meaningful, however colleges, universities, and other high schools still abide by this practice, and we believe students should know the currency by which many others will evaluate them in the future.

## Late Work Policy

It is expected that all assignments and assessments will be completed in the timeframe given by the teachers. If work is turned in late, it may earn a lower assessment/grade. No teacher will create a policy that simply refuses to accept any late work. Faculty will help students make up work missed during excused absences, and will allow a reasonable time for such work to be completed. Any pattern of illness or absence on test or major assignment due dates will be referred to the Director. A teacher may negotiate with an individual student to come up with a plan that is reasonable, equitable and helpful, in the effort to facilitate the education of the student.

Chronic delinquency in work completion damages the overall intellectual climate of the school and diminishes a student's opportunity to learn. Our goal is to help each student get back on track. Students who are behind in their work may not be eligible to participate in extracurricular activities (sports practice, drama rehearsal, etc.) until we feel that a student is current and demonstrates consistency with his/her work. If a student repeatedly falls delinquent in his or her work, the student may be misplaced at TREE Academy. Should this occur, the school may ask that the student leave the school. This policy is not intended to be punitive. Our interest is in providing every opportunity for a young person to gain the habits and skills expressed in our philosophy, but no school is right for everyone, and students needs, interests, and motivations change. Education should not be a tug-of-war, but a symphony. Nothing in this policy should be understood as preventing a teacher from modifying assignments for particular students. Of course, extenuating circumstances are always an exception.

# Standardized Testing

We ask that 9th, 10th, and 11th graders take the PSAT. In the 11th and 12th grades (and, in some cases, the 10th) students will be taking the SAT I and II examinations. Registering for the SATs is the responsibility of the student, not the school. 5B9

# CLASSROOM VISITORS AND VOLUNTEERS

TREE is proud of our vibrant community and deeply values and appreciates family participation. Yet because we are a small school by design, we do not permit classroom visitors as it may disrupt student focus.

Regarding volunteer work, please contact our Team TREE parent Association as our community thrives when we work together to go on field trips, or organize celebrations.

# Student Visitors Policy

Under certain circumstances, TREE Academy allows student visitors. The request must come from a parent and is largely connected with the admissions process. Visitors are not permitted simply because a friend at another local school has a day off. Please be aware of these guidelines:

- 1. Only one visitor per day per student.
- 2. The visit must be approved at least three days in advance by the office manager.
- 3. All of the host student's teachers must agree to have a visitor in class.
- 4. The visitor must stay with his/her host for the day or leave campus.
- 5. The host is responsible to ensure that his/her visitor behaves according to all school rules.
- 6. The host and his/her visitor must sign in with the office on the day of the requested visit.
- 7. Only pre-arranged, full-day visits are appropriate. Our goal is student safety and education. No visitors, including parents, will be permitted for only snack, lunch, or free period visits unless prior approval is given by the office manager(s).
- 8. No visits are permitted without advance permission, a completed student visitor form and the approval of the Director of school.

# GENERAL COUNSELING

Teachers, administrators, and counselors encourage students to speak with them informally and/or to schedule appointments at any time. Students and parents should feel free to bring any concerns to the school counselor.

# EMERGENCY RESPONSE

TREE Academy has a school-wide emergency plan to address procedures during a fire, earthquake or other potential disasters. Parents should be aware of the following information:



- Children will be released only to individuals listed on the Emergency Form.
- Upon school closure, parents will be informed both via phone and email if possible.
- Should weather or other circumstances necessitate the closure of TREE, we will send out an email and, if possible, text informing parents.

Where to find School Schedules/Curriculum

We work at TREE within the Google environment. Teachers will post curriculum in student accounts accessible with a unique code. Your student will have the code and be able to access the Google page for each class they attend. You can use this code and account to see what assignments are being given as well as the overall course curriculum. Each student at TREE will have a treeacademy.org email account using their first name and their last name.

# Chromebooks Policy & Acceptable Use

Chromebooks are checked out on a class-by-class basis, and, in all but a few cases, are not to be taken out of the classroom in which they are stowed or taken home. Students are expected to make use of a personal or family computer to complete any outstanding assignments from home. (see Appendix 6)

# Learning Lab

Learning Lab is a unique opportunity for students to complete most of their class assignments at school, during school hours. To make that possible, the Learning Lab requires not only a quiet atmosphere, but an understanding that it is a place for students to do their work, not to play, surf the web or chat. Students not taking full advantage the opportunity Learning Lab affords them will be asked to leave until they are able to use Learning Lab in a productive and considerate way.



## Lockers and Locks

Students are not to write on lockers or put stickers on them or put unsecured/unsealed drinks, liquids, or anything that could leak in them. Students will be issued one lock which will be returned to TREE at the end of the year.

# APPENDICES

# APPENDIX 1: EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

TREE Academy has plans and is prepared for major emergency situations. We believe that the reactions of people in emergencies depend largely upon their training. Our school staff has been trained, and drills are held regularly to make certain that students understand emergency procedures.

Emergency Regulations will be posted in the building. Students must be familiar with these and, in the event of an emergency, obey them. The school building has been designed with safety in mind, and inspections are regularly made to remove possible hazards. There are personnel who are trained in first aid. The safety and welfare of the students is our primary concern in event of an emergency. Your children should be instructed to obey the directions of their teachers, and follow the directions of any bus driver on the way to or from school if they ride the bus. If walking or riding bicycles, they should be told to continue toward their destination (either to or from school) when an emergency situation develops. We are prepared to care for your children in times of critical situations. We have stored food and water, as well as first-aid supplies. If you are not able to reach the school, we will care for your child here. We will be in communication with various local emergency services. We do ask for your help in the following areas:

Please do not call the school. We must have the lines open for emergency calls.

Following an earthquake or other emergency, do not immediately drive to the school. The school access route and street entrance must remain clear for emergency vehicles.

No child will be allowed to leave with another person, even a relative or a babysitter, unless we have written permission to that effect, or that person is listed on the student's emergency form in our files.

All parents or designated parties who come for students must have them signed out at the office or temporary Student Release Station. Signs will be posted around campus if this alternative station is required.



No communications with media or emergency personnel are to be carried out by anyone except the Director of School or person in charge.

# APPENDIX 2: DRUGS, ALCOHOL, SMOKING (VAPING & JUULING) , & BULLYING-ZERO TOLERANCE

At TREE, our policy is a zero tolerance for Drugs and Alcohol, energy drinks, cigarettes of any kind, including tobacco, marijuana, smokeless tobacco products, juuls and e-cigarettes. TREE is a smoke free campus. Additionally, we expect and encourage parents who host students at their home to respect state and federal laws regarding alcohol, tobacco and drug use.

Our interests in matters of drugs, and alcohol are: 1) to educate young people to make wise and life enhancing choices 2) to keep the school free from drugs and alcohol 3) to work with young people who have already used controlled substances and are struggling to make better choices in these matters.

TREE Academy's Zero Tolerance policy is rooted in our concern for the well-being of our students, a concern that reaches beyond the school's boundary. If we have reason to believe that a student is using drugs or alcohol, we will become involved, no matter where that use takes place.

# Guidelines of Conduct

The school strictly prohibits:

- The sale, distribution, possession or use of drugs, alcohol, any illegal substances, or drug paraphernalia.
- Being under the influence of drugs, alcohol, or any illegal substance.
- The misuse of prescribed medication. Medication should not be administered other than in accordance with the labeled use as prescribed by the physician.

These limitations apply when a student is on campus, at any off-campus school-related event or activity, or in any other context where a student acts as a representative of the school. However, as we have stated, zero tolerance means that our concern for the welfare of our young people and their community is not limited to campus boundaries or school sanctioned events.

We recognize that each family has different philosophies around substances, yet creating a safe community is our number one priority. Please talk to your children about how their actions related to these issues can affect the morale and integrity of all students.

## **Review Procedures**

If any employee, volunteer, parent, or student reports any infraction of the above guidelines of conduct to any staff member, teacher, or the Director school, the Director will investigate and evaluate the report and submit recommendations to the Director of school. If deemed warranted, the Director of school will contact the parents/guardians. Depending upon the circumstances, results may range from dismissal of the case to expulsion from school. The Director of School makes the final decision in all cases. If an infraction is determined to have occurred, no right to remain in school exists. Because of the impact of drugs and alcohol on other students and the entire school community, infractions that occur at school will likely lead to expulsion or long-term suspension from the school. At a minimum, the student will be placed on probation and may be required to agree to an assessment, counseling, rehabilitation, medical treatment and/or ongoing drug testing as conditions of remaining enrolled in the school. When appropriate, the school will refer cases to the applicable federal, state, or local agencies. Reinstatement or re-application is considered on a case-by-case basis by the Director of school.

Additionally, we have a zero tolerance policy for racial epithets, physical violence, or egregious bullying. Should you come across any incidents of the above, please immediately refer them to the school counselor, or the Director of School, and/or the administrative staff. Based on the circumstances, we may either elect to move to counseling, mediation, or a day (or more) of reflection. Although we focus on a student's behavior at TREE, we make an exception in terms of their use of the Internet. Whether it be during school hours, or after school, we will regard any form of bullying online to be as serious as any matter at TREE, and subject to all the above remedies, including expulsion.

# APPENDIX 4: ACADEMIC HONESTY

The students of TREE Academy agree to maintain and assist one another in maintaining and promoting academic honesty. Cheating and plagiarism are serious offenses and may lead to expulsion.

The following is taken entirely from *The Bedford Handbook For Writers* (5th ed.), by Diana Hacker, St. Martin's Press, 1998. pp. 477-479: Your research paper is a collaboration between you and your sources. To be fair and ethical, you must acknowledge your debt to the writers of these sources. If you do not, you are guilty of plagiarism, a serious academic offense. Universities have been known to withdraw graduate degrees from students who have plagiarized. Professional writers sue for (and often get) thousands of dollars when they discover that someone has plagiarized their work.

Academic dishonesty can take many forms. Any of the following, without full acknowledgement of the debt to the original source, counts as plagiarism:



- 1. Direct duplication by copying (or allowing to be copied) another's work, whether from a book, article, web site, another student's assignment, etc, including but not limited to duplication in any manner of another's work during an exam.
- 2. Paraphrasing of another's work closely, with minor changes but with the essential meaning, form and/or progression of ideas maintained, including but not limited to, piecing together sections of the work of others into a new whole.
- 3. Submitting one's own work which has already been submitted for assessment purposes in another subject, and/ or producing assignments in conjunction with other people (e.g. another student, a tutor) that should be your own independent work.

Consequences for academic dishonesty will result in the following progression:

1st Offense: Student receives a zero for the assignment. Teacher reserves the right to have the student recreate the assignment as intended. Parents are also notified of the offense.

2nd Offense (in same class as initial violation or any other class): Student receives a NO CREDIT for that marking period. Students who receive a fail/no credit in a course because of academic dishonesty may not return to the school prior to repeating and passing that course over the summer.

3rd Offense (in same classes or any other classes) : This is grounds for immediate dismissal. The student will be brought to a hearing with the campus Director of School.

# APPENDIX 5: FINANCIAL AID POLICIES

TREE Academy's financial aid policies are intended to aid in furthering the mission of the school to deliver an excellent and engaging college preparatory education to a diverse student population.

We look at the following to guide our financial aid decisions:

- Economic need of the requesting family.
- How a grant of aid will help the school's overall ethnic, racial, gender, and socioeconomic diversity.
- Particularly outstanding contributions a student might bring to a school program.
- Needs of employees of TREE Academy.
- Financial difficulties of continuing TREE Academy families.
- Additional factors that may be considered in financial aid decisions include, but are not limited to: Savings (even those a family may designate as



specifically "college savings", expenses for vehicles, home, vacations, club memberships, private lessons, health care expenses and other lifestyle choices.

As loans are readily available for college and university study, TREE Academy does not consider the expense of college education in financial aid decisions. TREE Academy makes every effort to be fair and consistent in all of its decisions. We labor over aid decisions, as we wish every qualified student could attend TREE Academy. This is not possible, however. Failure by the school to grant the level of aid requested is by no means a commentary on the legitimacy of the request; the financial aid committee must often choose between different and legitimate requests.

# APPENDIX 6: CHROMEBOOK / COMPUTER USE POLICY

Every student at TREE Academy has access to an assigned chromebook for the school year and will be required to look after it as well as make sure it's charged every day. Every student is also assigned a permanent charging dock station (Learning Lab or Social Room) for the school year which is indicated by the number on the chromebook. Students and parents must sign the Acceptable Use Policy.

All Chromebook users will follow the Chromebook Acceptable Use Policy and Guidelines and Information. Chromebooks will remain free of any writing, stickers or other graffiti other than labels added by TREE Academy. Chromebooks should only be used in teaching classrooms unless permission has been given by a subject teacher. Students should keep their Chromebooks in their assigned charging docks or locked in their allocated locker at break or lunch.

The guidelines below should be followed:

- Chromebooks should always be in the charging dock when not in use.
- The Chromebooks can be damaged if subjected to rough treatment. The screens are particularly sensitive to damage from excessive pressure on the screen.
- Do not lean on the top of the Chromebook.
- Do not place anything near the Chromebooks that could put pressure on the screen.
- Chromebooks are not to be taken home.

Any damage or loss of a Chromebook is the student/families responsibility, and will result in a replacement fee charge of \$330, due immediately.

Student activities strictly prohibited:

- Illegal installation or transmission of copyrighted materials.
- Any action that violates existing Exam Board policy or public law.
- Sending, accessing, uploading, downloading, or distributing offensive, profane, threatening, violent, pornographic, obscene, or sexually explicit materials.
- Use of sites selling exam papers, book reports and other forms of student work.
- Changing of Chromebook settings (exceptions include personal settings such as font size, brightness, etc...) that would stop the device from working as it was originally set up and intended to work.
- Spamming sending mass or inappropriate emails.
- Gaining access to other users' accounts, files, or data.



- Use of the school's internet/e-mail accounts for financial, commercial gain or for any illegal activity.
- Participation in credit card fraud, electronic forgery or other forms of illegal behaviour.
- Vandalism (any malicious attempt to harm or destroy hardware, software or data, including, but not limited to, the uploading or creation of computer viruses or computer programs that can infiltrate computer systems and/or damage software components) of school equipment will not be allowed.
- Transmission or accessing materials that are obscene, pornographic, offensive, threatening, violent or otherwise intended to harass or demean recipients.
- Bypassing TREE Academy web filter through a web proxy.

While we can impose controls on how students use technology, our goal as a school is to prepare students to use computers appropriately on their own, as they will do in a professional setting. We expect students to use the computers appropriately and respectfully. Violating the computer use policy will result in disciplinary actions, ranging from a verbal warning to loss of computer privileges to suspension. Consequences of violating the policy will depend on the severity and/or history of violations.

Simple Rules for not only Chromebooks but all school computers:

Any time a student is allowed to use a computer for class, it is expected that he/she will use the computer only for the task assigned and use only applications that have been specified by the teacher.

Do not damage the machines, and immediately report any problem or vandalism.

Protect your user password and do not let others log on with your account. Never use someone else's account to log in.

Do not browse inappropriate websites. Students found browsing sex or hate-related sites at school will be immediately referred to the appropriate personnel for appropriate consequence. Print responsibly, and print as little as possible to save trees.

Do not download MP3 files onto school servers

Student logins are monitored for time logged in and out. The school reserves the right to charge any student, logged on to a computer, for the repair of any malicious or excessive damage done to the machine.

All student email accounts are under Tree Academy administration and Tree reserves the right to review contents of the accounts at will.



TREE Academy recognizes that there are a variety of conditions that necessitate students taking medication during the school day and that in some cases students are adequately trained to self- administer their medication. In all cases, however, the school will take actions based upon the recommendations and directions of the physician, with the authorization of parents, and we request that the following precautions be observed for the student's safety, for the safety of others and in order for the School to comply with all applicable laws.

- 1. Only medications prescribed by a California licensed health care provider as necessary to the student, in the manner listed on the TREE Academy Prescription/Non-Prescription Authorization form, may be brought to school. Written parent and physician authorization is required.
- 2. All medication must be brought to the school front desk by an adult along with the Prescription/Non-Prescription Authorization form, which must be signed by the parent/guardian and the student's physician.
- 3. All medication brought to the school that is not authorized to be self-administered by the student will be secured in the front office and dispensed by school staff according to the provisions listed on this form. Any special instructions for storage or security measures must be written by the health care provider and given to school personnel.
- 4. The medication must be delivered in its original prescription container and must: a) be clearly labeled; b) comply with the Prescription/Non-Prescription Authorization form on file with the School; and c) include the following information: name of student, name of prescribing physician, name of the dispensing pharmacy or manufacturer, expiration date of the medication, name and strength of the medication, the times and amount to be given (dose), and method of administration (oral, inhaled, injected, topical, etc.).
- 5. Over-the-counter medication (including Tylenol, Advil, Motrin, etc.) that has been prescribed by an authorized health care provider or approved by the parent/guardian must be in its original container, labeled with student's name and accompanied by written physician instructions on the Prescription/Non-Prescription Authorization form.
- 6. Students carrying and administering their own medication must have both physician and parent/guardian written consent via the Prescription/Non-Prescription Authorization form (filed at the front office). The student will comply with the orders as written and maintain the safety of the medication at all times. Students who need medication while at school may carry medication (such as asthma inhalers, insulin, severe allergic reaction injection devices) and self-administer such medication under the supervision of school personnel, provided the following documents are provided:
- a. A signed statement from the health care provider with the following information:
  - Name of the medication



# Subjects are integrated

The unnatural boundaries between subjects, which can make academics seem abstract and irrelevant, are dissolved. Material is presented from a larger context, and students are encouraged to cross disciplines in their independent research as well as the representation of their work. They realize that inventors from many disciplines contributed to the technology that we use today. In global studies, they connect how geography, geology, technology, economics, religion and history affect current events.

Cultures are studied in the contexts of their environmental, artistic, religious, and philosophical perspectives. In mathematics, our students don't just learn about math equations, they learn about the inventors of those equations. Having the ability to discern the larger picture in any situation, using flexible thinking, having clear perception of the connections between events and subjects, possessing innate confidence in the ability to learn in any situation - these are the skills acquired by our high school students through the Waldorf approach to learning. Our students are well prepared not only for college life, but to become citizens of the world and masters of their own destinies.

# New material is presented in short and intensive units

Rather than taking a subject such as biology in grade nine for a whole year and then not experiencing this subject again, students take most subjects every year in rotating blocks of three to four weeks. This approach allows them to fully immerse themselves in a subject with freshness and enthusiasm. As students encounter subjects at different levels of maturity and from different angles, they appreciate that learning in any field is an ongoing and intriguing process.

# Education as a living organism

The art of education means that questions are as important as answers. Classes are taught by specialist teachers who facilitate active involvement in each subject. Conversations and discussions, rather than a passive experience where the teacher lectures and the student takes notes, make up a large part of our classes. ### **Main Lesson**







# **Clubs and Activities**

# **Outside the Classroom**

We recognize that learning is not limited to the classroom and encourage our students to go out into the world to learn and to give back. The high school years are rich with trips to support the curriculum and include visits to California geological formations, significant historic and architectural sites, museums, performing arts events, international travel and more. The students engage in service projects during much of their travel and are encouraged to give back to the local communities. In grade 10, students are provided the opportunity for an international exchange with other Waldorf schools.

# Where do Waldorf students go to college?

Approximately 94% of Waldorf students continue their studies in college, university, or other post-secondary education programs. 88% of Waldorf graduates not only entered college or university, but also graduated - well above the national average of 59%.

As of June 2018, WSOC has proudly graduated eight classes with a total of 88 graduates. Together, these students have earned an impressive total of over 6 million dollars in merit-based scholarships.

The Class of 2018 - 17 students - received an impressive 95 college acceptances, and a collective total of \$2,948,844.00 in merit-based scholarships over a four-year period. These figures do not include needs-based scholarships, which were also granted.

# What career paths have Waldorf students taken?

The range of career paths for our graduates is as varied as the individual students themselves. Over the years, Waldorf schools have educated some of the world's foremost leaders, thinkers and creative minds, including Kenneth Chenault, former president and CEO of American Express; Kristen Nygaard, a computer scientist whose work is the basis for all modern programming languages; David E. Blackmer, inventor of the DBX noise reduction system; Jens Stoltenberg, former Prime Minister of Norway; Sandra Bullock, Jennifer Aniston, Uma Thurman, and Julianna Margulies, award-winning actresses; Benjamin Agost, 2006 Olympic silver medalist in ice dancing and a four-time U.S. National Champion; and Thomas Sudhof, 2013 Nobel Prize Winner.

Dear CIF Southern Section Executive Committee,

It is our pleasure to complete this year-end report as we close our probationary year as a member of CIF in the South Valley League.

The 2018-2019 has been a year of firsts in the Mustang Nation at Saint Jeanne de Lestonnac Catholic High School. We began the year with a total student body of 33 students in the freshmen and sophomore classes. Our students committed to fielding teams in each of the seasons this year – Cross Country for Boys and Girls and Volleyball for Girls in the fall; Basketball for Boys and Girls in the winter; and Track and Swim for Boys and Girls, and Tennis for Boys in the spring. We are happy to report that 27 of our 33 students participated in at least one sport this year. We are extremely proud to announce that 3 students were tri-season athletes. These underclassmen competitors took on Varsity level experienced teams of junior and seniors. The learning experience and sportsmanship exhibited laid the foundations for years to come. Our student scholars competed within the "six pillars of character" – trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and good citizenship. The athletic traditions and excellence of Mustang Nation have begun!

Early in the year, our founding Athletic Director, JJ Santa Cruz, relocated to Northern California. We are blessed to have found a qualified and talented replacement in Antonio Williams-Rice. Mr. Williams-Rice picked up the gauntlet to ensure that our athletes were ready for competition. He began to implement an out of season training program which included the importance of nutrition to sustain quality athletics. He meets with athletes daily to encourage their effort in academic achievements as well as mentor them through challenges of young adulthood.

The 2019-2020 school year will bring some new opportunities. With the addition of one more class, we want to expand our athletic offerings. In fall we will again offer Cross Country for Boys and Girls, Volleyball for Girls and add a Football program for Boys. For safety reasons, this year will be a training year for Football with only 2 games in full pads and the rest of the season touch scrimmages. We feel that starting at this level allows our athletes and our program to grow holding the health and safety of our athletes as paramount. We will again offer Basketball for Boys and Girls in the winter. Spring sports will include Track, Swim and Tennis for Boys with the addition of Baseball for Boys and Softball for Girls.

Saint Jeanne de Lestonnac Catholic High School is blessed to have an amazing athletic compound. We have an indoor gym, a regulation softball field, practice track with a long jump pit, and ample field space for multiple sport training. Mr. Williams-Rice has been networking with local gyms and facilities to hold swim training, and weight conditioning

for our athletes. We will expand this network to attain a place for the baseball team as our facility does not have a regulation field. Our goal is to put in batting cages to support both the softball and baseball programs.

We will be contracting with a certified athletic trainer company to ensure that the safety of our athletes remains paramount while in training and during competitions. Eventually, it is our goal to bring on athletic trainers full-time to support curricular programs in Athletic Training but also to assist with sport-specific conditioning of our athletes in addition to their responsibilities as athletic trainers.

Overall, we are extremely satisfied with our student athletes this year. They have participated with pride to the best of their ability with dignity and respect for themselves and those they competed against. Although the competition was fierce this year, our athletes held their heads high and put forth 100% effort – every point, every mile, every lap was played to the very end.

We wish to thank all those athletes and athletic directors within the South Valley League who welcomed us to the venues, supported us in our growth, and were there to answer questions and collaborate for solutions in our probationary year. We have found true colleagues supporting the growth of student athletes in our community. We are grateful!
