# CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

## October 2, 2018

### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to order at 9:08 am by Dr. Monica Colunga, President of the Council

B. Pledge of Allegiance

E. Adopt Agenda - Motion Passed: 94-0-2

F. Approval of Minutes

1. Minutes of the March 22, 2018 Council Meeting - It was moved and seconded to accept and approve the minutes as written - Motion Passed: 94-0-2

### 2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Council - Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes. Tom White, Concordia University, announced to the Council that a new Master's Degree in Science is now available through the university. In addition, Tom announced that Concordia University now has a partnership with Clell Wade Coaches Directory.

### 3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

There are no State Federated Council Action Items at this time.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revision 3320.6 – Wrestling Divisions - It was moved and seconded to approve the proposal as written. Dual Meet Wrestling Playoff Divisions would now be formulated every two years using Masters Meet qualifiers, by leagues, over a four-year period. The current system places leagues into divisions based on geographic locations. Motion Passes: 68-6-21

### 4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 103 - Weighted Voting – Informational Only - The number of weighted votes allotted to the Southern Section will decrease from 38 to 34, due to the Sac-Joaquin Section's votes being reduced from 19 to 17. The formula for Weighted Voting ensures that the Southern Section has double the number of votes of the second largest section.

2. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 – Continuation School – The Commissioners Committee is proposing a revision to Bylaw 211, Continuation School Eligibility, and Bylaw 303, Multi-School Applications that would revise the athletic eligibility of students who attend a Continuation School. Note that students placed in Continuation Schools for disciplinary reasons are NOT eligible under this change. This proposal is an outcome and direction from the Federated Council Roundtable discussions held in January 2017, April 2017, January 2018, and April, 2018. Several additional revisions

have been made to the original proposal. Also coming is a Q and A section to better define the semester of attendance required at a Continuation School before a student could participate in a member school's athletic program. Several other questions came from the floor asking about the position of member schools that do not have a Continuation School in their district and is the proposal specific to Continuation Schools or are Alternative Education schools also included.

3. Proposed Revision of Bylaws 22.b.9 and 503.K - Coaching Education and Heat Illness - With the passage of A.B. 2800, the CIF must revise Bylaw 22.b.9.(f & i) to include a Heat Illness training and education standards. This will be required like CPR/ First Aid and concussion protocol for all coaches.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revision 2315 - Girls Lacrosse Ejection Rule - This item was pulled at the request of the Coast View Conference (author).

2. Proposed Bylaw Elimination 3105.4 - Water Polo Tournaments - In the sport of water polo, individual players are currently limited to participation in three tournaments during the season. The proposal requests that the individual stipulation on tournament restrictions be removed.

3. Proposed Revisions to Summer Dead Period Bylaws - This proposal would require all member schools to implement a 12-day consecutive dead period in all sports at all levels at the same time. Current bylaw calls for individual school programs to take a 21-day dead period. The proposed 12-day dead period would surround the July 4th holiday including one weekend. If passed, this would be implemented May 1, 2019.

### 5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Marketing Update - Thom Simmons - Assistant Commissioner Thom Simmons updated the members on the progress of Out Front Media and the funds they have generated for the section. CIF Sports Properties, has \$1.3 million in completed deals and a total of \$1.5 million in committed sponsorships. Mr. Simmons also announced several partnerships that are currently in negotiations, specifically a pending official lacrosse ball partnership to be in place for 2020 and the first CIF-SS girls and boys championships.

B. Communications Update - Chelsea Heyward - Ms. Heyward updated the membership on how the Southern Section has increased its social media presence. Ms. Heyward addressed the membership on how she needs help from each school to continue to increase the exposure of

individuals and teams by the school submitting content that can then be posted and displayed from the section office. Schools are encouraged to submit content to her directly for review and posting.

C. Online Ticketing - Mitch Carty - Mr. Carty briefly showed his online ticketing presentation to the Council which he will present in full at the Athletic Administrator's Summit on October 15, 2018.

### 6. REPORTS

A. Treasurer's Report – Jeff Jordan - Dr. Jordan announced to the Council that there was a net profit amount of \$109,446 pre-audit for 2017-2018 school year. We currently have a \$139,880 net profit for the first quarter of the 2018-2019 school year. This is based mainly on membership dues collected as of October 1, 2018. Dr. Jordan then gave a reminder to the missing 11% of member schools who have not paid their school dues to please submit these as soon as possible as of the October 1 deadline has passed. Finally, an independent auditing / accounting firm Harrington Group will be on-site at the section office in early October.

B. President's Report - Monica Colunga - Dr. Colunga reminded the membership of the importance of making families aware of the academic standards required to be a student-athlete. Dr. Colunga also stated that she receives calls regularly from parents asking about transfer bylaws. She simply refers them back to their current school, so they may counsel the family correctly. Last, Dr. Colunga spoke about the current athletic training bill before the legislature and the continuing effort at moving our member schools toward the employment of full-time athletic trainers. Consider that 30% to 40% of our students participate in after-school activities without the presence of any medical personnel.

C. Commissioner's Report - Rob Wigod - Mr. Wigod updated the membership on the results of the transfer survey that was sent out to all schools in August. As a result, a committee will be formed to begin discussions on whether the current transfer rules be amended. Mr. Wigod then thanked his staff for their service and the League Coordinators for their early arrival to attend the league coordinator training. Mr. Wigod then updated the membership on his 2017-2018 "Packthe-house" campaign. This discussion led into the current trend of the CIF-SS and that almost 50% of our current budget is dependent on revenue from the section championships. However, over the last three years, the championship revenue has declined almost \$500K and this is a growing concern. To recover this lost revenue the section office has cut costs in numerous areas while also increasing revenue in partnerships and media broadcasts. Additional revenue has also been seen based on the strength of current financial investments. A change must be made to save costs and remain solvent as an organization. Mr. Wigod addressed the importance of schools that make the playoffs being responsible in regard to ticket sales and do their best efforts

to promote playoff contests and/or championship events.

# MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

## August 16, 2018

### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to order by Dr. Monica Colunga, President of the Council - Meeting was called to order by Dr. Monica Colunga at 1:02 p.m.

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call - All members were present except for Rita Dever, Denise Halstead, Geniel Moon, and Jackie Gibson. Monica Colunga asked for the Executive Committee to introduce themselves with their name, school, position, and position on the board. Monica Colunga asked the Executive Committee to review the new Executive Committee Handbook and reminded them that they represent a constituency as well.

D. Introduction of Guests - There were no guests.

E. Adopt Agenda - Monica Colunga made a motion to move Item 5A1 and 5A2 to before Item 1F1 of the agenda in order to approve the appointment of two members to the Executive Committee. It was moved and seconded to adopt the revised agenda 19-0-0. Monica Colunga asked for a vote to appoint the following Executive Committee positions: Citrus Belt Area Representative - Ed Kearby - It was moved and seconded to approve Ed Kearby, Fontana Unified School District Athletic Director, as Citrus Belt Area Representative to the Executive Committee for the 2018-2019 school year. The motion carried 19-0-0. Desert Area Representative - Jeff Williams - It was moved and seconded to approve Jeff Williams, Palmdale High School Athletic Director, as Desert Area Representative to the Executive Committee for the 2018-2019 school year. The motion carried 19-0-0.

F. Approval of Minutes - There was a motion and a second to approve the minutes of the May 9, 2018 Executive Committee meeting. The minutes were approved 21-0-0.

### 2. PUBLIC COMMENT

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes. There was no one present to address the Executive Committee.

### 3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS - There are no State Federated Council Action Items at this time.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS - There are no Southern Section Action Items at this time.

### 4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 - Continuation School - Mike West reviewed the proposal. There will be an opportunity to discuss this again in September. There was concern regarding the definition of a continuation school. Dave Reid discussed that his area is in favor of this proposal. Mike West was in favor of the proposal having worked with these types of schools but now believes that the system might be abused and items such as grading periods will be difficult to regulate. In favor of participation at the JV level but can see abuses for the varsity level. Ed Kearby stated he agreed with Mike West. Are these students on track to graduate? Carter Paysinger added that there is a need to address comparable grading standards as this is where it will be abused. Monica Colunga disagreed stating that some students need the smaller school size and are not just there because of credit recovery. Chris Calderwood stated concerns with the students not being on his campus and accessibility with the students if there is an issue. Why would this be different than a multi-school agreement? Dave Reid talked about his multi-school agreements and those students having to take one class on the home school site. Rob Wigod added that multi-school agreements are under the member school's grading system, but continuation schools might have different standards.

2. Proposed Bylaw Revision 3320.6 - Wrestling Divisions - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal.

Glenn Martinez explained that this is moving us back to the old system with leagues placed in competitive groupings and keeps it in the competitive equity model. Geography was successful but the schools in the north leaving left holes in the geography system. Chris Calderwood asked why would schools not be used instead of leagues. Glenn Martinez stated that idea has been discussed but it would require a new structure for power rankings for this sport. We are trying to get schools to participate in the dual team championships and this is mirroring what we do with the individuals. Rainer Wulf explained that there is not enough head to head competition in this sport, which makes it difficult to rank schools individually, and to break them down divisions by schools instead of leagues.

3. Proposed Bylaw Revision 2315 - Girls Lacrosse Ejection Rule - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. Thom Simmons explained that the rule addressing two yellow cards as a game ejection for that game only is according to the NFHS rule book. There is a feeling that the CIF rules are more restrictive. NFHS lacrosse states that if a player receives a straight red card, that player MUST be at the next contest and remain on the bench which is contradictory to the CIF ejection rule. If we make this adjustment for lacrosse, soccer will be right behind. Chris Calderwood stated that there are sports you can foul out of and still be in the next game, i.e. basketball. In soccer, some officials give red cards and then tell the students they can play in the next game. Maybe officials need to delineate between fouls that result in ejections and fouls that do not.

4. Proposed Bylaw Elimination 3105.4 - Water Polo Tournaments - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. Kristine Palle stated that water polo is unique as it is the only sport that regulates then number of tournaments for individual players.

### 5. NEW BUSINESS

(5A1 and 5A2 were moved to the top of Item 1F1)

A. Appointments for 2018-2019 Executive Committee 1) Citrus Belt Area Representative - 5A1 2) Desert Area Representative - 5A2

B. 2018-19 CIF Southern Section Goals - Rob Wigod distributed the CIF Southern Section Goals for the 2018-19 school year and they appear at the end of these minutes. This is now an open session item. Rob Wigod welcomed Chelsea Heyward to her first meeting and to our staff. He pointed out that we are going to have our Street Team present at 40 events this year. We will be working on the mobile version of the CIFSSHOME system and announced we will have a new rollout of the CIFSSHOME system next year, similar to what was recently launched in North Carolina. He touched on the new Cheer Championships and the new Unified Sports Track and Field Championships. There was a review of the New Rules Changes section. We added a new track for the Athletic Administrators Summit. Financially, through Thom and Jackie, we hope to get to revenue share in year two of the CIF Marketing Plan instead of year three. There will be a big push to move our schools to online ticketing with an announcement at the October Council meeting and a workshop at the Athletic Administrators Summit. We are starting a discussion on transfer rules and are conducting a survey to seek information from our schools regarding transfer rules. We will be running the CIF State Football Championships at Cerritos College in December. Lastly, we will continue to work with the NFHS Network encouraging the installing of Pixelot cameras in our schools. Monica Colunga asked for a motion and a second to accept these goals as presented. There being no discussion, the motion carried 21-0-0.

C. Executive Committee to Visit Probationary Schools - Rob Wigod asked the Executive Committee to consider the possibility of revisiting the new member schools at the end of their first year of membership, who are requesting full membership and

have turned in their end of the year evaluation. Those responses will be due by April 1 and once we receive their evaluation, we would have the same Executive Committee member that did their new member evaluation revisit the same school. Jill Matyuch asked what the purpose of this visit is and if it was for mentorship or just to evaluate their first year of membership. We would develop a form similar to the new membership evaluation form to take on this visit. Jeff Jordan said that this gives an opportunity a year later to have a conversation with the school since the initial visit. A year later, you can have a conversation about the items discussed in the pre-membership meeting and see if goals were met throughout the year. Rainer Wulf reminded that all new schools are required to come to the office at the beginning of the school year for the new member orientation and that their administration is in attendance at that meeting. Loren Kleinrock suggested an online training that has to be completed as part of membership. Rob Wigod asked the Executive Committee to consider this idea and discuss it again at the next meeting.

D. Financial Report - Mitch Carty - Mitch Carty distributed a handout which appears at the end of these minutes and explained the different categories and what they represent. Is it time to change our breakdowns of playoff splits? Should we consider a straight entry fee with a division 1 vs division 10 entry fees scale? This would give schools incentive to get people to the games. Loren Kleinrock asked if there is a relationship between rights fees and ticket sales and more people are staying home. Mitch Carty answered that this is hard to measure and a good question. Terry Barnum suggested having lower levels host championship games on their home site rather than at a big venue. Rob Wigod stated that \$2.5 million went back to schools last year in playoff revenue shares and we are proud of that. We have to work with partners to fulfill both sides of our agreements. For example, they are able to send one crew to one site to stream the volleyball championships but do not have nine crews to send to nine sites for those same games. Thom Simmons added that football does seven games on Friday and six games on Saturday, so we can get all the games on streaming platforms. Mitch Carty is more concerned about the over 200 football games during the earlier rounds than the thirteen championship games as we receive revenue from all of them. Terry Barnum brought up the idea of building a CIF-SS championship facility. Rob Wigod stated that he will be talking to the Council and giving a report on how dependent we are on attendance. It may be time to look at a different way we are structured. There are a lot of variables involved in the success of our largest part of our budget. Sandy Gahring stated that their school sites ticket sales are down as well. Jill Matyuch asked about the possibility of lowering ticket prices. Rob Wigod stated that the last time we raised ticket prices, we saw a significant increase in attendance which resulted in returning the entire amount of membership dues to our schools. Jeff Williams asked about the possibility of a family pass that can be bought online and used at all events and if they do not use it, the money is still made. It is costly for a family to go to events. Thom Simmons mentioned that professional sports are seeing the same thing with respect to decreasing ticket sales. With so much to do and the internet, some people are staying home.

E. Communications/ Marketing Report - Thom Simmons/Chelsea Heyward - Thom Simmons made a presentation that appears at the end of these minutes. Chelsea Heyward made a presentation that appears at the end of these minutes.

# MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

## September 27, 2018

### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

A. Call to order by Dr. Monica Colunga, President of the Council Meeting was called to order by Dr. Monica Colunga at 1:15 p.m.

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call - All members were present except for Mark Edgemon, Jackie Gibson, John Norman, and Dana Wilkerson.

D. Introduction of Guests - There were no guests.

E. Adopt Agenda - There was a motion and a second to adopt the agenda. There being no discussion, the motion was approved.

F. Approval of Minutes - There was a motion and a second to approve the minutes of the August 16, 2018 Executive Committee meeting. The minutes were approved.

### 2. PUBLIC COMMENT

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes. There was no one present to address the Executive Committee.

### 3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS - There are no State Federated Council Action Items at this time.

#### B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revision 3320.6 – Wrestling Divisions - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. Glenn Martinez spoke that this is reverting to what was done in the past before the use of geography. Geography had some success but losing the northern schools made the geography more difficult. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. There was no discussion. Motion carried 20-0-0.

### 4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

#### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 103 - Weighted Voting – Informational Only - Mike West reviewed the proposal. This is informational only. Mike reviewed the formula and reviewed the changes from last year as contained in the agenda backup materials.

2. Proposed Bylaw Revisions 211 and 303 – Continuation School - Mike West reviewed and read the updated language contained in the proposal. Chris Calderwood asked what the changes from the original proposal were and what was trying to be addressed so Mike West reviewed the old language. The update now addresses grading periods and semesters. Jeff Williams asked about the ability to go back and forth from home school to continuation school and Rob Wigod stated that students have to be in residence for one semester at the continuation school before becoming eligible to compete in athletics. Discussion continued regarding being at a school for a full semester before being declared eligible to compete. The bylaw states that the regular grading period of the member school sets the standard. Is it the grades/credits or days enrolled that determine whether a student has been in residence for a semester at the continuation school? These concerns will be brought to the CIF Federated Council at their upcoming meeting next week.

3. Proposed Revision of Bylaws 22.b.9 and 503.K - Coaching Education and Heat Illness - Mike West reviewed the proposal. This is coming from a state law and must be added to our bylaws. It will fall under the coaching education portion of the Blue Book. Chris Calderwood asked if the NFHS has a course in this and was told yes. Jill Matyuch brought up that it would be nice to have NFHS offer a course in first aid, as is needed by all coaches to be updated every two years, for free. We can pose a recommendation for them to bring it to the sports medicine committee to make this course free.

#### B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Bylaw Revision 2315 – Girls Lacrosse Ejection Rule - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. The Blue Book rule contradicts the NFHS Lacrosse Rule Book in the case of two yellow cards. This sport is a club sport moving into education-based athletics and has a different definition of "ejection." Most of the time two yellow cards are similar to a red card indicating flagrant fouls. We are trying to be respectful of the sport but also protecting our student athletes. Thom Simmons discussed the ejections that were researched were more than just checking into the game late, it was dangerous conduct. It is not the same as five fouls in basketball. Chris Calderwood voiced concern that if this revision passes, why would soccer not look for the same consideration? There should be a way for a player to foul out of the game without being ejected as in water polo and basketball without sitting out the next game. Thom Simmons stated that this is really an NFHS/US Lacrosse rules problem. Kristine Palle added that NFHS rule books deal with the playing rules and the conduct rules are under the auspices of the state associations. Monica Colunga added that it appears the rules have been applied appropriately for misconduct, according to the reports and the data we have.

2. Proposed Bylaw Elimination 3105.4 - Water Polo Tournaments - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. This brings the water polo tournament rule into line with the updated wording for the rest of the sports and the Water Polo Advisory Committee supports this proposal.

3. Proposed Revisions to Summer Dead Period Bylaws - Monica Colunga reviewed the proposal. This proposal takes into account the shortening of the summer and a set schedule for dead period for all schools and all sports. Sandy Gahring

voiced concern that the suggested dead period is over the 4th of July holiday and many schools are still in summer school which would not allow for a break or families to take vacations. Terry Barnum asked if there is consideration for summer camps and the no contact with coaches rule still being applied. Rob Wigod stated that as with the current summer dead period, this would only allow a 12-day period with supervised weight lifting. Chris Calderwood stated that his area is making a counter proposal to make it 21 days, not just 12. Jeff Williams asked about the impact of this rule on summer school sports classes. Also, with the rule as it is now, the multi-sport athlete really does not get a break since the dead periods for sports are staggered and the purpose of the rule is to give the students and their families (and coaches) a break. Carter Paysinger stated that standardizing a dead period is almost impossible with the start and end of schools being different and summer schools. Chris Calderwood countered that you can do this at your school right now and have all sports set the same 21-day period. If other schools are not doing that, you might miss tournaments, but you could mandate all sports to have a dead period on your campus at the same time.

### 5. OLD BUSINESS

A. Executive Committee to Visit Probationary Schools - Rob Wigod reminded the Executive Committee of the conversation at the last meeting regarding having the Executive Committee member that submitted the new membership application for a school revisit the same school at the end of their probationary year of membership to evaluate their program and let us know if they are ready for full membership or not. We will set up an evaluation form for the January meeting for your approval. Probationary schools would submit their reports to our office by April 1. We will then send the same Executive Committee member out to that school, if possible, and then have them report back on their visit at the May meeting. We will move forward with this.

### 6. NEW BUSINESS

A. Financial Report - Mitch Carty - Mitch Carty made a presentation from our GoFan website and then from his phone showing how easy GoFan is to use in selling online tickets. We want to see more member schools adopt this as there are many benefits. Mitch Carty then walked through the mobile device from the ticket buyers' point of view. There is no cost to the school.

B. Marketing Update - Thom Simmons - Thom Simmons made a presentation that is included at the end of these minutes.

C. Communications Update - Chelsea Heyward - Chelsea Heyward gave a presentation that is included at the end of these minutes.

### 7. REPORTS

A. President's Report - Monica Colunga - Attended the NFHS Section 7/8 conference in Utah. Attended the media session which provided understanding of the relationships needing to be built with the media for the benefit of both you and the media. Listened in on some football litigation discussions from different parts of the country, one pertaining to concussions and another on no girls in tackle football. Listened to gender equity, transgender, Title IX discussion and we are far ahead on all of these subjects. There were board meetings with the other states, we are fortunate even though we are large, to have that collaborative working environment. Learned more about those areas that use free and reduced lunch as a standard and that those schools tend to have a high frequency of students that do not have access to the clubs and individual trainers that others might have. We were validated with what we do here. Congratulate the office and thanks for the Champions for Character dinner. That was a great event to celebrate those that are doing what they need to do.

B. Treasurer's Report - Jeff Jordan - The audit team will be out in October. Pre-audit, we show \$109,446 as profit for the 2017-18 school year. For the first quarter of the 2018-19 school year, which is mostly membership fees, we are up \$140,000 with only 61 members missing dues that are due on Monday, October 1. The Champions for Character dinner was an amazing event and I appreciate all the work that goes into it. Raising Canes for a year was bigger than the \$1,000 scholarship. Discussed an incident that happened at their first football game and the chaos that ensued when false rumors were spread about an active shooter at the contest. Encourage you to go back and make sure you have a plan for an active shooter at a football game.

C. Commissioner's Report - Rob Wigod - Rob Wigod made a presentation that appears at the end of these minutes which is a preview for the Southern Section Council meeting next week. Would like to form a transfer rules committee with one league representative from each area, identified by the area representatives, by November 1 to address the transfer rule discussion. They will meet prior to the Southern Section Council meeting in January with the Assistant Commissioners and get started. We want to keep the conversation going. August transfer numbers were down 7%. Thank you to all that attended the Champions for Character Dinner. It was a huge night and a great celebration. Thanked the Assistant Commissioners as they are going out to league meetings. Preparing for Southern Section Council next Tuesday and CIF Federated Council in San Diego next week.

D. Executive Committee Member Reports - Past President, Carter Paysinger - We are so much ahead of the game than the other sections and states in our nation. Told a story about heat exhaustion and a student treated right away walked away, then

later died. We need proper medical attention on our campuses. President-Elect, Mike West - Attended the 7/8 Conference for the first time and with eleven states and our ten sections represented, we were almost half of the conference. The host state determines the topics and speakers, which can make for a very interesting event. AB2009 passed requiring AEDs at all schools and emergency action plans on all campuses. This law goes into effect on January 1. Champions for Character was great, my coach was recognized. Activities Director Representative, Todd Arrowsmith - Thanks Rob Wigod for creating the new Activities Director Committee starting in November. Coast Area Representative, Dr. Paula Hart Rodas - Our district is very close to approving a twelve-month athletic trainer on all campuses that are certificated. Looking forward to joining CIF Federated Council. CSADA Representative, Dave Reid - Champions for Character dinner was marvelous, and you need to go if you can. It is worth your time. Orange County Area Representative, Denise Halstead - Thank you for lunch and to Rob Wigod. I appreciated the education piece you presented on our financial situation and how it affects schools directly. Mt. SAC Area Representative, Paul Lopez - Thanks to the office. We do not think of outside venues when making emergency plans, we always think inside and we need to plan for active shooters anywhere. Champions for Character was great. We did cardiac screening during our registration time and found out someone did have a problem. We need to do whatever we can to keep our student athletes healthy, safe, mentally prepared. Citrus Belt Area Representative, Ed Kearby - We have a group of athletic trainers that are active and passionate. Although AB2009 passed, our area has been doing these things for a while. When we see things like this coming down the pike, we like to stay out in front of it. Continuation school is a hot topic and if we do not do something about it, the state department will and then we will be forced into their plan instead of ours. Northern Area Representative, Dick Billingsley - Attended the Section 7/8 Conference in Utah. We are so far ahead of the other areas on many of the hot topics. Appreciate being able to attend. Thanks for the Champions for Character dinner. CSADA Representative, Sandy Gahring - This was the first time at the Champions for Character dinner that I just got to sit and watch. It is wonderful. Working to get a certified trainer at my school. School districts are unaware of the need and importance of full-time athletic trainers. Digital Media Coordinator, Chelsea Heyward - Excited to send out email about receiving content from our schools and to highlight them on our sites. Assistant Commissioner, Thom Simmons - Chelsea and I have been out to some schools and are available for social media presentations. Assistant Commissioner, Glenn Martinez - The Athletic Administrators Summit is coming up. We sent emails to get people interested in coming. More schools are doing the cardiac screening. There will be a League Coordinator training before the Southern Section Council meeting. Highly recommend attendance. Assistant Commissioner, Mike Middlebrook - We have been out to league meetings and some are already taking about relegating. I recently attended a sportsmanship conference and enjoyed it. We have updated our website a little bit to be more user friendly. Lisa McInerney, my Program Coordinator since August, is doing a great job. Assistant Commissioner, Rainer Wulf - Attended the 7/8 Conference and it was great. Have also been out to league meetings. The Public/Private committee meets tomorrow to look at the transfer survey results and have discussion on next steps. 542 of our 563 schools responded to the survey. Chief Financial Officer, Mitch Carty - Go Dodgers. Assistant Commissioner, Kristine Palle - All of the eligibility workshops are done, and some brought new ideas to us that we are working on. We always want better ways to get information to people, like in soccer, the home and away jerseys are switching colors this year. Desert Area Representative, Jeff Williams - I am encouraged regarding active shooter protocols. I got our people together to come up with a protocol and submitted it to our school district and they want to have a meeting with me to bring it into effect. CIF Federated Council President, Jim Perry - Attended the Section 7/8 Conference and visited campuses in the area. Champions for Character was fabulous. Our district had four winners. I will talk to a group regarding co-ops this weekend in New Mexico. Girls' Athletic Director Representative, Jill Matyuch - We need to find a way to make getting coaches certification more accessible. At the Champions for Character dinner I saw many people from different facets of my life and made me realize how lucky are we. Foothill Area Representative, Loren Kleinrock - At the Champions for Character dinner we had our first winner, thank you. Active shooter, we have done several live drills to test and learn our plan. Makes a difference if you can do live drills. I am back as the Superintendent of the district for this year. Boys' Athletic Director Representative, Chris Calderwood - Thanks to Thom Simmons and Chelsea Heyward for coming out and presenting. A side-effect of their visit was that it got our ASB's from the different district schools to network with each other.

Executive Assistant, Sharon Hodge - Thank you to those that were able to make the Champions for Character dinner on Monday. The Hall of Fame luncheon is on October 17 and I hope you all can attend. Girls Golf is rolling along, and we meet with our Cheer Advisory Committee on Monday to work out final details for our inaugural Traditional Competitive Cheer Champi-

and highlighted the need to protect our students from abuse. Then to a session on concussion and sports medicine and the more injuries that are being reported in the year-round athlete. Attended a Title IX workshop and make sure we are following through. The eSport session was interesting as this is a big emerging sport and the NFHS Network has a partnership with one company already. This would give opportunities for a different profile of student to get involved. The round tables were great to talk to these other associations and to share our competitive equity model, although there is confusion about the model and it was interesting to hear some associations actually use the free and reduced lunch standards for their divisions. Carter Paysinger stated that the highlight of the conference was visiting Wrigley Field and watching the game. Attended several sessions including conversations regarding football safety but the best one was Thom Simmons' session on social media. When something negative is posted and how do you respond to it, Thom had some great insight and gave some clarity to understanding when to interject and when not to. Jim Perry attended a session on how to be a good board member and how to bring your constituents up to speed afterwards. Then, off to a session presented by the New York Association and it was interesting to learn that New York City is separate from the New York State Association. Last was a session on competitive equity and people cannot get past the public/private aspect and continue to make it a public/private issue. There were many questions asked about how we are doing competitive equity.

A. President's Report - Monica Colunga - Monica Colunga shared her experiences in attending one of the August Eligibility Workshops. The office has a formula they use and a staff that provides professional development and she encouraged the Executive Committee to have their constituents attend these workshops to obtain the knowledge needed to best execute their positions at the schools. There is a need to foster education-based athletics in our schools and how important that is. The athletic department is a department on our campuses just like math and language and equity needs to be given to that department. That is the goal for the next two years along with making sure to provide resources to schools and districts to be able to access certified athletic trainers. The athletic trainer bill at the state level is dead so we need to regroup and reintroduce a new bill to protect our student athletes.

B. Treasurer's Report - Jeff Jordan - Jeff Jordan reported that September is when the Harrington Group will be in to do the audit and will report when completed. Membership fees for the 2018-19 school starts with fifteen fewer schools than last year, 450 dues invoices created, 202 paid to date, and 100 have not printed invoices yet. Dues are due October 1. Mitch Carty did a great job on his report with highlighting the great job and the hard work of the staff to keep expenses down. Our forecast for the 2018-19 school year welcomes Chelsea Heyward into her new position, the inaugural competitive cheer, and the encouragement of using online ticketing. This is also the year to look at potential revenue options, family passes, changes to membership fees and ticket splits.

C. Commissioner's Report - Rob Wigod - Welcome to the new year. Congratulations to Jim Perry to lead the state the next two years. Workshops still ongoing with the last one scheduled for August 21 in the Antelope Valley. The New Principal/AD Workshops are in September and the first one is full. The number of transfers for July last year was 194 and this year is 279. With the start of the new year earlier, are transfers being done earlier or are there more transfers? We will see with the August and September numbers. Thank you to Glenn Martinez for organizing the workshops and the Athletic Administrators Summit. Looking forward to a great year. This is a team with one thing in mind, serving kids and schools. Let us

know how we can help you.

D. Executive Committee Member Reports - President-Elect, Mike West – Welcome to Ed Kearby and Jeff Williams. Looking forward to seeing Chelsea Heyward will do. AB2009 regarding AED's in reach at all sporting events and an emergency action plan for those events is moving through the state capital. AB 3110 died at 2:00 today in committee. Treasurer, Jeff Jordan – Thank you for lunch and gear. CAPSO Representative, Terry Barnum – Great to see everyone. Looking forward to serving with you all again. Chelsea Heyward, your performance today was exceptional. It had layers and it was deeper than just Facebook. Coast Area Representative, Paula Hart Rodas – Welcome to the new members. Thom Simmons and Chelsea Heyward came to my district to present to 100 ASB leaders regarding marketing and social media and they are continuing to talk about them and all the ideas they have.
