The "Football Throw" as an event in the CIF State Track Meet

During the late 1920's and early 1930's the Principals in the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) had been concerned about the safety of the javelin and discuss events during high school track meets. From the meeting of the CIF Federated Council on November 28, 1931:

"It was decided that the Javelin Throw be eliminated after the 1932 Track and Field Event. It was decided that the Football Throw be included in the 1932 Meet, in accordance with the following regulations: 'Football Pass for distance. Ball to be passed between parallel lines five yard apart. Javelin rules of throwing shall apply. If the ball touches either parallel line the throw does not count. The football shall have regulation intercollegiate specifications.' Medals will be awarded for this event, but points will not be awarded."

On November 19, 1931, at a Federated Council Meeting it stated:

"The next State Track and Field Meet will be held in the south, May 20, 1933. At this meet there will be no discuss or javelin events. The football throw will be included as it was in the 1932 Meet, with the same regulations. 'Ball to pass between parallel lines five yards apart. Javelin rules of throwing shall apply. If the ball touches either parallel line the throw does not count. The football shall have intercollegiate specifications.' The following diagram shows the range and method of measuring. All measurements to be made at right angles to the restraining line. Ball striking the line is out. The host school will furnish two footballs." Note...the Football Throw became a scoring event in the CIF State Track meet from 1933 through 1938.


On May 25, 1935, at a Federated Council Meeting the following decision was made:

"In the Football Throw nothing shall be used on the hands of the contestants which shall in anyway interfere with others who wish to use the ball."

The first "non-scoring" Football Throw at the State CIF Track (May 21, 1932) had the following results (Modesto-Herald)...Boyd, Fresno throw of 186'8"

Exhibition football throw Woh by Boyd (Fresho); second, Back (Palo Alto); third, Kingsley (Hoaver, Glandale); fourth, Shaw (Escalon); fifth, Conice (Chico). Distance, 136 feet 6 inches.





FULLERTON TAKES MEET AT FRESNO

FRESNO STATE COLLEGE STADIUM, FRESNO, May 25.—
(AP)—Fullerton High School kept the track and field championship of California in the southland with a 14-point victory at the Fresno State College Stadium in the annual CIF championships tonight.

Raitt of Fullerton paced his school to victory with a double win in the football throw and shotput.

Hoover High School was second with 13% points.

Raitt threw the football 220 yards for a new mark in that event.

Other schools finished as follows:





<u>Initial Reason for the creation of the Football Throw</u> ("Los Angeles Times" January 17, 1932)

PREPS TO QUIT JAVELIN, DISCUS Football Throw Substituted by C.I.F. Heads Lack of Space and Danger Given as Reasons Loss Not to Affect Southland's Title Chances BY IRVING ECKHOFF California high school track and field athletes will no longer throw the discus and heave the javelin. Both events were ruled out of the State prep meet at a meeting of the C.I.F. recently. The ruling will go into effect next year.

The loss of the two events will not affect Southern California schools as much as it hurts the northern brethren. Neither the javelin nor the discus is used by the majority of the southern prep leagues, the sole major group using the discus being the Coast League while the spear-tossing event has been in bad with local preps for many years.

Southern California schools entered in the State meet have hitherto spotted their northern rivals points in these two events. Last summer at Visalia, athletes from Selma, Fairfield, Turlock and Madera placed in the javelin, while the discus saw Theodoratus of Sacramento annex top honors. Smith of Paso Robles, Carpenter of Compton and Parks of Long Beach placed in the spear event, which was more proof of the weak competition offered by the northern schools than anything else.

The chief reason for quitting the events is the one of danger. Lack of space for practice and competition is another leading argument.

The discuss throw was discontinued in the State Track Meet from 1933 through 1948 and has been held every year since then. The javelin throw was eliminated along with the discuss prior to 1933 and never returned as a State Track Meet event.

On December 10, 1938 at the CIF Federated Council Meeting the Football Throw at the State Track and Field Meet was eliminated by <u>unanimous vote</u>. It is interesting to see the feelings expressed about football in general at that meeting and it was probably felt why have an event for a sport which, "by some," was felt not serving the ends of education in the high schools. The polling results showed that the high schools still supporedt American Football (the term American football in those days was used to differentiate the sport from rugby).

It was moved and seconded that the football throw be eliminated from the State Track and Field Meet. Carried unanimously.

There seems to be doubt among some educators of the state that American football is serving the ends of education in our high schools. There are those who are not sure that the citizenship training of the students in the bleachers is all that could be desired. Some shrink from the thought of assuming responsibility for the safety of the boys and girls on the highways as they travel back and forth to football games. Others feel that the game as now played, is not safe for the players. On the other hand, the argument is presented that the high school boy needs this strenuous game to "work off steam," that the game has great value in the training of self control and team work. At any rate the attitude of the high school principals of the state will be of interest to the members of the Federated Council.

Moved seconded and carried that the high school principals be polled to see whether or not they wish American football continued as an interscholastic sport.
