The proposal would add Beach Volleyball to the list of CIF-approved sports. This addition would be for girls only and it would take place in the Spring sport season. The format would call for pairs to compete as a school team.

2. Proposed Bylaw 504.M Revision – Sunday Cheer Competition

This proposal would be an exception to CIF Bylaw 504.M. to allow Traditional Competitive Cheer teams to compete on a Sunday at the NHSCC event. This exception may be used one-time per school year for the above-named event only.

This proposal calls for the implementation of a mandatory Altercation Plan that would be for all sports at all levels. This Altercation Plan would be placed into the Blue Book as a new bylaw if adopted. The plan calls for the training of coaches and athletes to listen for key or code words if an altercation were to happen with the intent that an automatic response would de-escalate the situation.

Jackie Gibson

Marketing Manager Jackie Gibson reported that she is currently working on new ball contracts and that schools were sent surveys asking what ball or balls they currently use for each sport. She is contacting possible new partners and requesting RFP's from each of the companies. A plan has not been determined as of now to use one company for all our official championship balls or go with individual ball contracts for each sport.

Assistant Commissioner Thom Simmons reported that we have agreed in principle on terms with Fox Sports West for an additional three years. That full agreement will be available shortly and will begin with the current 2020-2021 school year. In addition, an agreement with the NFHS Network will be finalized soon.

Mr. West has been invited to Team Up for Sports Safety in California. The goal of the program is to focus in on 4 or 5 key areas which include trainers, air quality, strength and conditioning and cold-water immersion for student athletes. Mr. West also attended the NFHS 7/8 Section meeting that was held online September 2st and 22<sup>nd</sup>. He was pleased to be a part of the discussion and gained valuable feedback from the other states involved.

# B. Treasurer's Report

Mr. Calderwood announced that the annual audit had been completed for 2019-2020 school year. As of the date of this meeting, 298 member schools have paid their membership dues. At this time last year, 473 members had paid. Currently 94% of the member schools have created an invoice for this year so additional membership dues payments should be arriving over the next few weeks. The deadline for payment is October 1, 2020.

Commissioner Wigod reminded the Executive Committee that we have begun the Area Placement process this year in advance of Releaguing. Area Placement Requests Forms from each member school are due by October 9, 2020. Commissioner Wigod reminded everyone that our sports calendars are in place and will not be changed. The thought process was that it was set up for a December start so schools could have the maximum amount of time possible to schedule and get organized. Commissioner Wigod thanked Jackie Gibson and Thom Simmons for their hard work regarding the new ball contracts and working with each company in this task.





Type: New CIF Sanctioned Sport; Bylaw Addition and Revision

Proposal Summary: The CIF San Diego Section is proposing the addition of Girls Beach Volleyball as a CIF sanctioned spring sport to begin in 2021-2022 school year. Beach volleyball is currently sanctioned by the NCAA as a scholarship sport for women and is also sanctioned by USA Volleyball, the US Olympic and Paralympic Committee and the International Olympic Committee. The addition of Girls Beach Volleyball would allow for increased participation opportunities for high school girls.

The proposal would add Beach Volleyball to the list of approved sports in CIF Bylaw 1200, revise Article 170 and Bylaw 1700 and would renumber the remaining Articles related to CIF approved sports (see proposal).

The proposal also includes a revision to Bylaw 600.

Fiscal Impact: There is no fiscal impact to the CIF at this time as it is not being proposed as a championship event. There, of course, would be costs involved for CIF member schools choosing to offer this as a sport.

Background: Currently there are club beach volleyball programs at over 100 CIF member schools with over 1,300 girls participating in those programs.

**Talking Points:** Additional opportunity for girls to participate in education-based athletics; fairly inexpensive sport with respect to equipment and uniforms; can be expensive to build an oncampus facility but there are an increasing number of facilities that offer courts for rent; student-

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athletes would be eligible to participate in pairs tournaments in outside events during the high school season of sport (unattached to a club team)

# ARTICLE 60 **OUTSIDE COMPETITION**

#### 600.G. **Unattached Competition in Individual Sports (see also Bylaw 215)**

- An unattached athlete shall not represent any team. Points won by the athlete shall not be credited to any team. An unattached athlete shall not use a uniform which identifies a school or "outside" team. Any violation shall be considered an infraction of Bylaw 600.
- (2) Unattached competition is permissible for a student in other than school contests during the season of sport provided the student enters in the individual sports of badminton (singles and doubles), beach volleyball (pairs), cross country, golf, gymnastics, skiing, swimming and diving (including unattached entry on relays), tennis (singles and doubles), track and field (including unattached entry on relays) and wrestling.

#### **Certification of Unattached Athletes** (3)

No official recognition or certification on the part of the CIF member school or personnel of the CIF member school may be given in order that unattached athletes may participate in contests.

#### **Representation in CIF Competition** (4)

Unattached competition is not permitted in any CIF competition (See Bylaw 503.D.). Individuals or teams entered in CIF competition must represent a CIF member school. No other form of representation shall be permitted in CIF competition.

**NOTE:** Alpine, Nordic Skiing and Snowboarding are exempt for this Bylaw as the season of sport is not defined and listed under Bylaws 503.D. and 504.H.and that all competitions are done in conjunction with the Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association.

# **ARTICLE 120** APPROVED SPORTS

#### 1200. CIF-APPROVED SPORTS

The addition to, or deletion from, the list of CIF-approved sports is subject to Federated A. Council approval. - Competition Cheer (see A. and B. above) shall not be counted towards a school Title IX C. compliance unless the U.S. Department of Education Office for Civil Rights deems Competition Cheer compliant with its definition of a sport.

Each individual student on the team must have had at least 10 days of practice before being allowed to compete in a game. (The opening date of football practice may be determined by each Section.) No Sunday practice is permitted (See Bylaw 504.M. for exception).



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B. Football teams are limited to two days per week of full contact practice, with no more than 45 minutes of full contact on each of those days during the season of sport. For purposes of this Bylaw, each team's season of sport is defined as the first day of practice, as allowed by the Section, until the final contest for the team. All full contact practices are prohibited in the off-season which includes team camps. Full contact practice is defined by state statute as a practice where drills or live action is conducted that involves collisions at game speed where players execute tackles and other activity that is typical of an actual tackle football game. For the purposes of this Bylaw, refer to the definition of Live Action as defined by USA Football.

  - **PENALTY**: Failure to comply will result in the entire team being ineligible to compete and charged with forfeiture.
- Each wrestler is required to weigh in with his/her Pre-Match Weigh-In Form at all D. competitions up to and including the competition that begins the CIF State Championship qualifying series.
  - PENALTY: Failure to comply will result in the wrestler being ineligible for that competition.
- E. The use of laxatives, emetics, excessive food and liquid restriction, self-induced vomiting, hot rooms, hot boxes, saunas and steam rooms is prohibited for any purpose. The use of diuretics at any time is prohibited. Regardless of the purpose, the use of vaporimpermeable suits (e.g. rubber or rubberized nylon) or any similar devices used solely for dehydration is prohibited. Artificial means of rehydration (i.e. intravenous hydration) are also prohibited. Violators of these rules shall be suspended for the competition(s) for which the weigh-in is intended. A second violation would result in suspension for the remainder of the season.

## **OVERVIEW**

The Sand Volleyball Association (aka. San Diego HS Beach League) was formed in 2013 in an effort to bring the sport of girls' beach volleyball to the high school level. In its first year, 8 schools participated. In 2020, over 40 San Diego schools will participate with representation from every major conference in the county.

#### **GOALS**

To legitimize the sport of Girl's High School Beach Volleyball by recognizing it as a CIF sanctioned sport at the city, regional, and state levels.

#### INFORMATION

- In 2019, more than 400 female athletes participated in high school beach volleyball from San Diego schools. Across the state, more than 1000 girls participated in various high school club leagues.
- Arizona and Florida currently have high school beach volleyball approved as a State Championship sport. Washington is in the process as well.
- Collegiate beach volleyball is the fastest growing sport in the nation. Currently 83 colleges offer beach programs at the Division I, II, and III levels. 16 NAIA colleges and 38 junior colleges nation-wide have programs as well, with more being added each year.
- High school athletes now have the opportunity to earn a college scholarship for beach volleyball
- In addition to the high school league, there are year round tournaments across the nation that cater to high school athletes and culminate in national championships in July. Over 5,000 girls participate in these events each year.
- The demand for the legitimacy of our sport increases each year as the sport continues to gain popularity at all levels.

# ADDITIONAL INFORMATION TO CONSIDER

- In San Diego, 7 schools currently have sand courts on campus, and 5 more are in the process of building courts.
- The cost to build 2- 5 courts ranges from \$15,000 \$150,000 depending on
   the size of the facility and the type of sand used:
- Most schools currently practice at local beaches and the cost to run their programs is roughly \$3000 - \$4500 for the season. This covers the league fee, insurance, uniforms, equipment, and coaches' stipends.
- The league is run under CIF guidelines, so the transition from a club sport to a sanctioned sport would be seamless.
- Teams from San Diego, Los Angeles, Central California, and Northern California have competed annually in a State Championship match since 2015.

### **GOAL**

Our goal is to legitimize the sport of beach volleyball at the high school level and allow more girls the opportunity to compete for their high schools in a sanctioned sport across the State of California.

Proposal Summary: In January 2020, the Federated Council approved regional championships for the sports of softball and baseball. This proposal sets the allowable number of contacts for these two sports at 28 and also states that tournaments will be counted as one (1) contact for each game. Implementation would be for the 2021-2022 school year.

Fiscal Impact: None

Background: In January 2018, the Federated Council approved the allowable number of contacts for all sports culminating in a regional and/or state championship. Given that the Federated Council, in January 2020, approved softball and baseball as regional championship events, this proposal to add the allowable number of contacts for these two sports is being forwarded to the Federated Council.

Talking Points: Number of contacts equitable to that of basketball, soccer, volleyball and water polo; tournament contacts same as basketball, soccer and water polo

#### 1206. MAXIMUM CONTACTS

#### A. Starting Dates for Practice

Sections shall determine the first day of practice in all sports.

#### B. Scrimmages

A scrimmage is defined as:

- An activity involving teams or individual student-athletes from two or more different schools in a CIF approved sport; AND
- (2) Where no official score is kept; AND
- (3) Where regulation time is not kept; AND
- (4) Where substitute rules are set aside; AND
- (5) Where coaches may stop play for instructional purposes: AND
- (6) Where no score / results are released to the media.

#### C. Number of Scrimmages

A maximum of two (2) scrimmages per sport are permissible prior to the first interscholastic contest (league or non-league) of the season, except in Football which is limited to one (1) scrimmage. Scrimmages shall not count in the team or individual maximum number of contacts, unless it is held after the team's first interscholastic contest.

#### D. Allowable Number of Contacts

Sections shall determine the maximum number of allowable contacts. Sections, however, for sports culminating in a Regional or State Championship may not set a limit higher than:

The maximum number of allowable contacts is in effect for teams during the regular season. The maximum number of allowable contacts does not include Section Foundation or Scholarship Games, League culminating tournament, Section, Regional or State Championships.

#### **Tournaments**

Baseball One (1) contact for each game.

Basketball One (1) contact for each game.

Golf Tournaments count as one (1) contact per day.

Soccer One (1) contact for each match.

Softball One (1) contact for each game.

Tennis One (1) contact for each match.

Volleyball One (1) Day Tournament counts as two (2) contacts. Two (2) Day Tournament counts as three (3) contacts.

Water Polo One (1) contact for each game.



#### CIF Southern Section Bylaw 126 – Mandatory Altercation Plan

Every school in the CIF Southern Section must have an Altercation Plan in case a fight or altercation occurs before, during or after any athletic contest. The Altercation Plan is mandatory and must be implemented for every sport and for every level. Besides the Blue Book, the Altercation Plan will be placed in all Sports Previews.

The Mandatory Altercation Plan would include the following:

- "Red Alert, Red Alert". Coaches will immediately yell these words, so all participating athletes and substitute players are to initiate the protocols and procedures.
- All athletes will immediately get to their team bench or designated safe area.
- Any/All athletes involved should attempt to disengage and get to their team bench/safe area immediately.
- When calm and safety are restored, Game Officials and Head Coaches will meet and discuss how and when to continue the contest or not to continue the contest.
- Game Officials and Head Coaches will assess the situation and decide about players and/or coaches involved in the altercation and the appropriate sanctions on any/all involved.
- School Administrators will be notified about the Game Official's decisions, and if need be, game films may be submitted to the appropriate administrator at CIF Southern Section Office and/or CIF Southern Section Officials Area Liaison.

### **SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS**

This proposal is to have every CIF-SS school implement an Altercation Plan for all sports and all levels. There are no financial implications for schools.

This proposal is an off-shoot from the Football Advisory Committee's Altercation Plan, which has been in effect for the last three football seasons. After meeting with Commissioner Wigod and Assistant Commissioner Rich Shearon on February 12<sup>th</sup>, we all agree that when unsportsman like events occur during any athletic contest, there should be an immediate response and procedure to alleviate that action and secure safety for the athletes, officials, and all others involved with the game.

Two years ago, I introduced this proposal to the Coastal Canyon League. The Athletic Directors and Principals voted unanimously to implement the Altercation Plan for all sports and all levels.

This Altercation Plan proposal will be a new rule, Bylaw 126, found in Article 10 Southern Section rules- Duties of the Principals and Accountability. I introduced the proposal to the Executive Committee on August 13, 2020.

One thought to remember – HIGH SCHOOL AHTLETICS IS AND ALWAYS SHALL BE AN EDUCATIONIAL EXPERIENCE.

Please find the Football Altercation Plan and read through it (Football Preview) and other documents. If this proposal passes the council's vote, it will be entered into the CIF-SS Bluebook and will be mandatory. Each sport's procedure plan will differ slightly, but all plans should use the same word "Red Alert, Red Alert" to immediately set the plan into effect. Each sport's advisory committee should create a thorough plan depending upon the facility being used.

Remember – HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETICS IS AND ALWAYS SHALL BE AN EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE.

#### CIF EXECUTIVE MEETING

#### Public Comments - 3 minutes

Thank you for this opportunity to discuss my Altercation Plan. I'm still on the Football Advisory Committee, the Public/Private Committee, and a past Executive Committee member. I submitted the Altercation Plan to the Football Advisory Committee in 2017. It passed unanimously and is mandatory, and is in the Football Preview, pages 3 and 4. I met with Rob and Rich in February and we agree the plan should be moved to earlier pages and highlighted.

- The Coastal Canyon League Athletic Directors and Principals unanimously passed the plan for ALL SPORTS ALL LEVELS two years ago.
- HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETICS IS AND ALWAYS SHALL BE AN EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE
- I've seen it all in almost every sport in my 50 years of teaching
  - As a player in high school and college
  - As a coach 40 years football, 28 years head coach
     19 years soccer, 17 years head coach
  - As an Athletic Director 28 years supervising all sports and all levels
     I've seen fights, brawls, taunting, show-boating, unsportsmanlike hits and so on.
- There has been an eventual decline of sportsmanship in all sports from great, to okay, to bad over the last 25 years. This decline started at the pro-level and filtered down to college and high school.
- Over the last 25 years we have so many "Walk-On Coaches" from Club, Travel, Academy and so many young coaches (ages 20-40) that were athletes during this downward cycle of sportsmanship and many lack individual and team discipline.
- Remember, HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETICS IS AND ALWAYS SHALL BE AN EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE.
- They may not coach with this philosophy, which leads to more trouble on the fields and courts.
- Most "Walk-Ons" are not educators and they lack a key skill: accessibility. Athletes never see this coach off the field.
- With the new rules on athletes suspensions, the Altercation Plan for ALL SPORTS can reinforce the idea and importance of sportsmanship and possible change the coaching strategies of some/all coaches and reduce the number of suspended athletes.

- This can also re-emphasize the Athletes Code of Ethics stating:
   Win with Character Lose with Dignity
- I would hope this discussion and your reading of the materials will result in a formal proposal from the Football Advisory Committee and the Executive Committee – All CIF-SS Schools for all sports and all levels.

Proposal Summary: The 2021-2022 proposed budget projects income of \$6.62 million and expenses at \$6.59 million. Additionally, this budget includes two unfilled administrative assistant staff positions in the burden and salary figures. Given the likelihood that only one of these positions may be filled in the 2021-2022 school year, an additional surplus of \$80,000 may be realized. More information, including details of the proposed changes, can be found in the 2021-2022 proposed budget notes page.

# Proposed Budget Summary 2021-2022

This proposed budget for your consideration recommends changes in income and expenses in several categories which include the addition of baseball and softball, changes in marketing dollars due to contracts, and a projected 20% increase in general liability insurance costs for the organization. For the 2021-2022 year, we are estimating on the high end for general liability insurance due to potential increases nationwide for insurance from the pandemic and the unknown losses insurance carriers are facing from it. These losses may likely be passed on to policyholders through increased premium costs. The budget indicates nearly a \$30,000 end-of-year surplus and the recommended changes are detailed in the budget notes.

Additionally, this budget includes two unfilled administrative assistant staff positions in the burden and salary figures. Given the likelihood that only one of these positions may be filled in the 2021-2022 school year, an additional surplus of \$80,000 may be realized.

# **Income Overview**


Income projections are based using a conservative approach forecasting an increase (2.4%) in revenue streams to the organization, from \$6.47 million to \$6.62 million. Keeping consistent with past practice, the projected figures are based on conservative income numbers.

The major sources of income for the CIF are 1) championship events (36%), 2) marketing and corporate support (35%) and 3) legal assessment to schools (18%).

# **Expenses Overview**

Expenses to the organization are projected to increase (2.9%) based on the figures in the proposed budget, from \$6.4 million to \$6.59 million. Our projected expenses show increases in championship events, in governance for rising meeting and travel costs, for outside legal counsel and investigative costs, and PERS contribution.

The major expenses of the organization are 1) championship events (26%) with the vast majority of those funds being returned to schools to reimburse expenses for team travel and hosting fees, 2) marketing (21%) with most of these funds given directly to CIF Sections for their distribution share in state-wide marketing income, 3) salary and benefits for employees and retirees (21%), and 4) legal, liability, and insurance costs (19%).

**Proposal Summary:** As per the CIF Constitution and Bylaw 70.E. (1) the following Federated Council members were appointed to the CIF Nominating Committee to review and nominate candidates to serve for a two-year term on the CIF Executive Committee.

#### 70.E. **Nominations**

- Each year, the President shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of at least five members. (1) Members of the nominating committee shall be selected from among the Federated Council and may include no more than two current members of the Executive Committee.
- The Executive Director and the President shall be ex-officio members of the nominating committee. (2)
- (3) Nominations for the Executive Committee shall be presented to the Federated Council at the meeting prior to the election.
- Nominations for President-Elect will occur in even numbered years. (4)
- Each person nominated for an officer or other Executive Committee seat must be a current member of the (5) Federated Council at the time of nomination and election.
- The nominating committee will name at least seven (7) candidates for two (2)-year terms for the Executive (6) Committee and at least two (2) candidates for President-Elect.
- Nominations will also be accepted from the floor at the Federated Council meeting whereupon nominations (7) are presented.

#### **70**. B. **Composition of the Executive Committee**

- Federated Council Officers President, President-Elect and Past-President; AND (1)
- (2) Five additional members who are representatives of Sections/Allied Organizations with no more than one member representing the group of Allied Organizations; AND
- (3) One at-large representative from the Federated Council who shall be selected in an effort to reflect both gender and ethnic representation on the Federated Council.

#### C. **Limitations of Membership on the Committee**

- (1) No Section shall have more than one member eligible to be elected to the Executive Committee unless another committee member from the Section is an officer or at-large representative.
- (2) The group of Allied Organizations shall have no more than one member eligible to be elected to the Executive Committee unless another Allied Organization representative is an officer or at-large representative on the committee.
- No Section may have more than one representative serving as an officer at any one time. (3) [See Article 7-70.G.(2)] for exception.
- Only one person from the group of Allied Organizations may serve as an officer at any one time. **(4)**

#### **Elections** F.

- Elections will occur at the final meeting of the year of the Federated Council. (1)
- (2) Elections for Executive Committee members, other than officers and the at-large committee member will be held annually.
- (3) Should a second candidate be nominated from any Section or the group of Allied Organizations, only the candidate with the most votes from that Section/or group is eligible for election.
- (4) The nominees who receive the most votes, from among those eligible for election, will be elected.
- In the event of a tie between/among candidates whereby there is only one seat available and/or (5) remaining, a revote for the remaining position will take place only between/among the candidates that are tied.
- (6)In the event there is still a tie vote after the first revote, one more vote will take place and if the tie is not broken, a flip of a coin will determine the winner.

**Proposal Summary:** The Southern Section is proposing an exception to CIF Bylaw 504.M. to allow Traditional Competitive Cheer teams to compete on Sunday at the NHSCC event. This exception may be used one-time per school year for the above event only.

**Fiscal Impact:** There is no fiscal impact to the CIF at this time as the proposal does not impact a championship event. There, of course, would be costs involved for CIF member schools choosing to attend this event.

**Background**: In TCC, the season of sport is much longer than that of any other sport. Cheerleaders also do not participate in traditional head-to-head competition in their leagues like other sports do. National-level competitions have provided opportunities for high school athletes to compete and be seen by college recruiters. These athletes will miss the important opportunities that they have had prior to CIF inclusion. Asking these competitions to move away from their Sunday spot is difficult as they require large venues.

This proposal is being brought back as a continued first reading from the October Federated Council meeting due to the following new information. It has come to our attention that the sport of skiing/snowboarding has been allowed to practice and compete on Sundays given the unique nature of the sport and the fact that there is competition with Nevada schools which allow for Sunday competition in that sport. This provides some context to the concern that we would be allowing an exception for cheer that has not been allowed for any other sport.

**Talking Points:** TCC does not currently have a season of sport; This exemption would enable school teams to compete at the national level event; Can only be used at the NHSCC and no other "National Championship;" Adding a second exception to the Sunday rule could lead to additional requests from other sports to be permitted an opportunity to compete on Sundays.



# **CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION**

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### 504.M. Sundays

In order to provide at least one (1) day of respite from involvement in interscholastic athletics each week, no interscholastic games or practices of any kind are to be held on Sunday.

**Exception #1.** Those schools founded upon religious tenets that observe a Sabbath rest from Friday sundown until Saturday sundown may practice or play on Sundays. These schools must register each year by August 1 for the following year with their Section office and observe a day of respite from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday. No school requesting a religious exception may participate in interscholastic participation (practice and/or games) on seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.

- Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of religious belief adhering to the basis of the exception.
- Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of adherence to the rule of no interscholastic participation (practice and/or contest) within seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.

**NOTE:** Declaration of Alternate Day of Respite Form is available through your local CIF Section office.

Exception #2. Traditional Competitive Cheer teams competing in the annual National High School Competitive Cheer event. This exception may be used one-time per school year for the above event only. Schools seeking an exception for the NHSCC event should contact their local CIF Section office.

- Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of adherence to the rule of no interscholastic participation (practice and/or contest) within seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.
- (1) Violation of Bylaw 504.M. will result in the following sanctions:
  - a. **Practice:** For every practice conducted during the declared respite time, the violating school will be prohibited from conducting twice as many regularly scheduled practices (2 for 1);
  - b. **Game:** A game played during the declared respite time will result in forfeiture of the game.
- (2) In addition to the above sanctions, the Section may impose any of the following additional sanctions:
  - a. The final season record will be reduced by at least one (1) win at the conclusion of the season;
  - b. The school will be placed on probation;
  - c. The team/individual will be ineligible to advance to or in Section, Regional or State Championships;
  - d. Reduction of maximum number of contests allowed for the following year in that sport;
- e. Repeated violation may result in suspension of membership in the CIF. (May 2000 Federated Council/Revised May 2004 Federated Council/Revised April 2018 Federated Council)

ADD: Exception: In the sport of Traditional Competitive Cheer –Only those schools that participate in NHSCC may have a one-time exemption for that event once per year, provided approval from the CIF-SS office is granted.

RATIONALE: In TCC, the season of sport is much longer than that of any other sport. Cheerleaders also do not participate in traditional head-to-head competition in their leagues like other sports do. National-level competitions have provided wonderful opportunities for these high school athletes to compete and be seen by college recruiters. These athletes will miss the important opportunities that they have had prior to CIF inclusion. (Asking these competitions to move away from their Sunday spot is difficult as they require large venues.)

\*The National High School Cheerleading Championship (NHSCC) is considered by most to be the most prestigious cheerleading championship in the country. It is also the only cheerleading championship endorsed by the NFHS. An estimated eight hundred of the most advanced teams, representing about 31 states will compete at the Walt Disney Resort in Orlando, Florida. ESPN and ESPN2 are expected to televise the event in 32 countries and is expected to reach 100 million homes.
