On their way to the "AA" title Rowland's Raiders routed Perris (90-63), Alta Loma (70-65), El Dorado (58-39), San Marino (65-57) and then Mission Viejo (41-38). Mission Viejo, the South Coast League champion, finished the year with a 24-5 record.

High School all-star team selections have been made by Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation's All-Southern California Board of Athletics since 1937. All players named for honors by this board of Southland sports journalists receive Foundation awards and have their exploits filed in the Foundation's sports library.
