# ALL-SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA HIGH SCHOOL FOOT-BALL TEAM FOR 1962 SEASON - LARGE SCHOOLS

To the surprise of absolutely no one, Loyola High School's sensational tailback Steve Grady who led the Cubs to their first-ever CIF Football championship in 1962, was acclaimed Southern California's grid performer of the year by vote of the Helms All-Southern California Board of Football when the annual all-star team selections were made at Helms Hall recently.

This marks the second year in a row that a Loyola player has been selected top player, as Paul Horgan was honored last year. Al Pollard, named player of the year in 1945 and 1946, is the only other Loyola gridder to be chosen for top

player acclaim from the Loyola High campus.

A 6', 203-pound power-running tailback in coach Lew Stueck's single-wing formation, Steve Grady re-wrote all the grid records at Loyola this year. He has scored more points (217), gained more yards in total offense (2,835), carried the ball more (319), scored more touchdowns (35 in 12 games), and gained more yards rushing (2,097) than any player in Loyola grid history. This includes the fabled Al Pollard, two-time player of the year in 1945-46 and last year's CIF top performer Paul Horgan.

Grady scored 152 points during the regular season and added 65 more in four playoff encounters. The Loyola Cubs defeated Bellflower (45-7), North Torrance (20-13), Glendale (7-0) and Anaheim (14-3). In the finale, it was Grady who scored all but one of the Cubs' points and was named "player of the game" for his efforts.

Steve Grady will be presented with his special medal award from All-Southern California Board of Football at the 26th annual All-Southern California Board of Football Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, Jan. 19 at 10:30 a.m. All players named for All-Southern California all-star team honors will be on hand to receive their special framed scroll awards.

Thirty southland high schools are represented on this year's honor teams, with Loyola and Glendale placing three players and Anaheim and Centennial landing two each. The champion Cubs placed player of the year Grady in the first-team backfield and tackle Tim Hornbecker in the line. Glendale, defeated by Loyola in the semifinals, 7-0, also placed a back, Paul Nyquist, and a lineman, tackle Bob Gilleran, on the first team. Anaheim placed end Ty Salness on the first team and tackle Roy Lutrull on the second unit. Centennial landed end Emmitt Littleton on the second squad and quarterback Karl Dawkins on the third team.

Only one lower classman found his way onto the 1962 all-star team selections. Santa Monica's ace guard-linebacker, Rick Bassler, is not only the smallest player on the three units, but he also has the distinction of being the only junior to be selected for honors.

Gary Walker, quarterback of the Santa Fe League champion Bishop Amat Lancers, became the only CIF all-star team repeater among large school players when his team was moved up into "AAA" Division play. Walker was a first-team "small schools" selection in 1961. The Lancers marched through "AAA" playoff competition until they reached the final game against South Pasadena. In a bitter battle, the Tigers from South Pasadena downed the determined Lancers, 27-20.

Besides the players, coaches will also be on the receiving end of awards on January 19th. Coaches Lew Stueck (Loyola) and Ray Solari (South Pasadena) will be recipients of silver tumbler awards for leading their teams to division titles.

en Martin, the pride of Hemet High School which won the De Anza League football championship for 1962, was named Southern California (small schools) High School Football Player of the Year by members of the Helms All-Southern California Board of Football when the board met at the Helms Athletic Foundation to make its annual gridiron all-star team selections. Some 26 southland high schools are represented on this year's squad — three teams of 12 players each — picked from among those schools which played in leagues bracketed in the "small schools", "A" and "AA" divisions of the C.I.F. playoffs. The Helms Board first picked "small schools" all-star teams in football in 1951.

Robert Baiz's Fermin-Lasuen Padres placed the most representatives on the three honor teams, with four players, three of them on the first team. Lasuen won the "AA" division playoffs, downing runner-up St. Monica's, 40-7. St. Monica's placed three boys on the honor teams, while Brea-Olinda, champion in "A" Division play, also placed three. Bob McCutcheon's Mustangs from Needles, "small school" division title winners over Lutheran, 13-9, placed two men. Only other teams to place as many as two players on the teams were Laguna Beach and Carlsbad, the latter winner of San Diego's Palomar League title.

Small schools player of the year honors were accorded Hemet High School halfback, Ken Martin, who led his Bulldogs teammates to a championship season in the De Anza League and ten straight victories. Hemet met Laguna in the "A" group playoffs, dropping a hard-fought 14-13 decision to the Artists, who went on to the finals. losing to Brea-Olinda, 32-7.

Martin, a 5'10", 190-pound, Jon Arnett-type runner, scored 132 points for the season and passed for eight touchdowns. He ran for over 1,000 yards, as he did last year as a first team CIF performer, and gained much additional yardage for his team through the air lanes. Over the past two seasons Ken has been a great defensive player also, performing at either the halfback or safety positions. He intercepted nine tosses this season and 21 throws over the past two years. What makes Ken's achievements so remarkable this year is the fact that he was involved in a serious auto accident last year during Christmas vacation, requiring considerable repair work to one of his legs. Ken's coach, Robert Owens, called his ace halfback better than ever this season.

Martin will be presented with his player of the year medal award at the 26th annual All-Southern California Board of Football Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, January 19, at 10:30 a.m. Ken will be joined by players and their coaches at the annual morning ceremony and luncheon, at which time other personalities from the gridiron past will be on hand to pay tribute to this season's star players.

Besides Martin, two other first-team backfield selections were honored on the all-star team last season. Tim Foley, Fermin-Lasuen fullback, was a third-team pick in '61, while Brea-Olinda's Al Davis was named to last year's second team. A third team choice this year, Steve Hovely of Villanova repeated his selection of one year ago.

Coaches of championship teams in 1962 — Loyola's Lew Stueck (AAAA), South Pasadena's Ray Solari (AAA), Fermin Lasuen's Robert Briz (AA), Brea-Olinda head coach Glen Hastings (A) and Needles' headman Bob McCutcheon (small schools) — will be on the receiving end of silver tumbler awards for having directed their respective teams to divisional titles.

All first team picks on this year's "small schools" team are seniors. Four juniors dot the second team roster, while two junior backs were honored on the third team. The Helms All-Southern California Board of Athletics program has been going on continuously since its inception in 1937.

The Toilers had five representatives on the 1962 All-City selections, three on the first team. Birmingham, the city's highest scoring team in league play with 171 points in five games, placed four of its stalwarts, with three of them gaining first team recognition.

"Player of the year" balloting was spirited during the Helms

"Player of the year" balloting was spirited during the Helms five-hour selection meeting, with San Pedro tailback, Ronnie Barber, finally winning the coveted title. Barber, an All-City choice last year, led San Pedro to a triple tie for first place in Marine League action this year and did not have the opportunity to compete in the playoffs due to a loss of the coin flip. Barber, a single-wing tailback in coach Bill Seixas' versatile Pirate attack, had a 1,161-yard total offense mark over the past season. Ron gained 843 yards running and completed 50 percent of his passes for an additional 318 yards. Last year, Barber was also named the Marine League's top performer and his two-year statistics show him accounting for 2,508 yards in total offense and 31 TDs. Of this total, 1,819 yards were gained rushing. Over a two-year span, Barber accounted for an average of 179 yards per game in total offense and a six-yard average running. Twenty Los Angeles high schools are represented on this year's All-Los Angeles City team. Schools to place more than one performer on the honor teams are Manual Arts (5), Birmingham (4)... two of them being juniors on the first team, San Pedro, Banning, Los Angeles, Fairfax, Gardena and Lincoln each with two.

Six players on this year's All-City team were picked last season also. Manual Arts tackle, Harry Wells, and Ron Barber were 1961 first team selections, while two of this year's first-team backfield -- Clayton Calhoun of Manual and Alex Sotomayor of Garfield -- were second team choices last fall. Third team end, Jerry Lewis from Manual, was second team pick last year and Sterling Mansfield, Birmingham center, was again named to the third team.

Six juniors named to the three honor teams will have the opportunity to shine on the gridiron again next season. Marv Adamo and Don McSwain, both of Birmingham, should make coach George Goff very happy as returning lettermen next year. Both second-team tackles -- Vern Loveridge and Jack O'Malley -- will be back next fall, as will third-teamers Tony Kochinas and Dann Boyd.
