#### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

The meeting was called to order at 1:00 p.m. President Jim Perry welcomed everyone and thanked them for their attendance.

There was a motion and a second to adopt the agenda as written. The motion carried 19-0-0.

F. Approval of Minutes

There was a motion and second to approve the minutes of the January 14, 2023, Executive Committee Meeting as written. The motion carried 19-0-0.

#### 2. PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no one present for Public Comment.

#### 3. NON-ACTION ITEMS

#### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

There are no CIF State Federated Council non-action items at this time.

#### B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

There are no CIF Southern Section Council non-action items at this time.

#### 4. ACTION ITEMS

#### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Proposed 2023-24 CIF State Budget Approved STATE 647 President-Elect Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the proposal of the 2023-24 CIF State Budget. Increases in both expenses and income are indicated within the budget materials. There is an increase to legal and insurance costs. If the amendment to Article 70 passes, four new members will be added to the CIF State Executive Committee and those increased costs are indicated. From first read to the current version of the proposed budget, the salary increase from COLA was increased from 3% to 5%. There was a motion and a second to approve the CIF State Budget. The motion passed 19-0-0.
- 2. CIF State Executive Committee Nominations Approved STATE 648 President-Elect Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the list of CIF State Executive Committee nominations. There are no nominations from the Southern Section and therefore the recommendation is to send our delegates to the CIF Federated Council uninstructed. There was a motion and a second to send our delegates uninstructed. The motion passed 19-0-0.
- 3. Proposed Amendment to Bylaws 212/510 Amateur Status/Undue Influence Approved STATE 651

President-Elect Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the proposal amending CIF Bylaws 212 and 510. The proposal outlines a tiered penalty based on number of infractions of CIF Bylaw 212, related to commercial endorsements, and CIF Bylaw 510, undue influence, and is for immediate implementation. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. The motion passed 19-0-0.

4. Proposed Amendment to Bylaws 207/504 – Approved STATE 652
Transfer Eligibility/Season of Sport

President-Elect Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the proposal creating an amendment to CIF Bylaws 207 and 504 regarding academy programs. This proposal states that involvement in these types of programs would be considered participation in those sports as it relates to eligibility. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. The motion passed 19-0-0.

5. Proposed Addition of Bylaw 2901 – Approved STATE 653
CIF State Tennis Championships

President-Elect Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the proposal adding CIF State Team Tennis Championships for the Fall, 2023. This is the last sport to be added from the CIF State Championship Events timeline created ten years ago. Additional costs would be minimal, accounting for travel and awards. Rainer Wulf clarified this adds one more week to the current team tennis schedule. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. The motion passed 19-0-0.

6. Proposed Amendment to Article 70 – Executive Committee

**STATE 654** 

President-Elect Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the proposal adding additional members to the CIF State Executive Committee to reflect a balance of gender and ethnicity representation for the school populations across the state. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. The motion passed 19-0-0.

#### **B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS**

- 1. Proposed 2023-24 CIF Southern Section Budget Approved SS 649 President Jim Perry reviewed the proposed 2023-24 CIF Southern Section budget. This is a balanced budget and thank you to Chief Financial Officer, Mitch Carty for his tireless work in establishing this budget. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. There being no discussion, the motion passed 19-0-0.
- 2. CIF Southern Section Executive Committee Nominations Approved SS 650 President Jim Perry reviewed the nominations for the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee. It was reviewed that the first three positions listed in the agenda are voted on by the entire Southern Section Council and the other positions are voted on only by those leagues involved in those areas. Nominations from the floor will be taken for the Desert Area as there is only one nomination from that area. There was a motion and a second to move these nominations to the Southern Section Council for vote at their next scheduled meeting on April 18. There being no discussion, the motion passed 19-0-0.
- 3. Proposed Revision of Bylaw 1223.3 Summertime Rules Failed SS 646 President Jim Perry reviewed the proposal regarding an amendment to the current summer dead period rules. If approved, this proposal would allow schools to have different 14-day dead periods for each individual sport on campus in lieu of the entire athletics program being shut down for 14 consecutive days. Northern Area Representative, Dave Hess, supports the current rule, but his school district gets out late which compacts the time available to take multiple dead periods. Boys' Athletic Director Representative, Rich Imbriani, supports the current rule as the entire staff was able to take advantage of a break. He reminded the Executive Committee that we are here for our high schools, not clubs. President Jim Perry stated his school district ends late but feels it is important to give the multi-sport athletes 14 days off, which the current rule provides. Parents in his area have been happy with students receiving a complete break. Desert Area Representative, Jeff Williams, stated the old system was a disservice to the multi-sport athletes. With everyone off, campuses are closed and required maintenance can be completed during the time everyone is away from campus. There was a motion and a second to approve this proposal. The motion failed 1-18-0.

#### 5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Financial Report

Mitch Carty

Chief Financial Officer, Mitch Carty, handed out the status of the current budget and it appears at the end of these minutes. He highlighted the various aspects of the budget, stating the office is ahead of the projected budget and in a good place heading into Spring playoffs. The Winter disbursements to the schools are scheduled to go out before Spring playoffs.

1. 2021-2022 CIF Southern Section Audit Approved 5A1 President Jim Perry reviewed the actions of the Audit Committee that met this morning to review the 2021-22 Audit. Our auditors were very happy with the way financial matters are handled within the organization. There was a motion and a second to accept the 2021-22 Audit. The motion carried 19-0-0.

D. CIF Southern Section 2022-2023 Goals - Responses

Commissioner of Athletics, Rob Wigod, reviewed the Marketing Report stating the Academic Award winners were announced this past week and on April 24 at Angel Stadium is the date and place for the awards presentations. 1,200 tickets are sold for the event by our member schools. We will be holding our first Beach Volleyball Championships this Spring under the administration of Assistant Commissioner, Mike Middlebrook, with the assistance of Marketing Assistant, Brianna Sutrisna. He continued by reviewing the responses to the 2022-23 CIF Southern Goals which appear at the end of these minutes. He highlighted our social media numbers, website, communication, workshops, officials recruitment, CIFSS This Week, CIFSSHOME.org 2.0, new Beach Volleyball Championships, Athletic Administrators Summit, financial matters, ball contracts, public/private, and NIL. He thanked the CIF Southern Section staff for their assistance in achieving these goals.

for the Southern Section in those 110 years.





As of 2021-22, our school has transitioned its grading policy from a traditional grading scale of 0%-100% to a standards-based grading scale. Hence, students academic performance is based on the mastery of content standards using a 0-4 scale. Students will still earn a letter grade of A-F in their respective courses. Passing grades in AP classes will continue to be weighted by one point. All credit classes with a letter grade are included in the calculator of the grade point average and class rank.

### **IMPACT OF COVID-19**

During the Spring of 2020, our school transitioned to distance learning and our grading policy changed. Students received a combination of P/NP and letter grades. The "P" assumes a grade of "C" or higher for the course and does not have GPA points attributed to it. When we transitioned to distance learning, some students' classes were removed from their schedules, however A-G approved courses remained on student schedules, thus we were able to complete our year in the classes. We remained in distance learning through the end of the 2020-21 school year. In compliance with California legislation, AB 104, for the 2020-21 school year, students received a combination of P/NC and letter grades.





### READING MATERIAL

At Calvary Christian School, students are encourage to read. We believe reading is an excellent hobby. Any reading material should be in line with the values of CCS and approved by CCS staff or administration if bringing outside reading material on campus.

### MULTI-MEDIA/SOCIAL MEDIA

Students are encouraged to honor the Lord in all their media and social media choices.

The internet (including social media), although a valuable and educational tool, can pose a threat to our children both morally and physically. CCS Students are not permitted to surf or participate in websites that contain profanity, full or partial nudity, vulgar or other offensive material. Students may not give out information about CCS on the internet. The school may monitor the web including social media and discipline students who fail to comply with these guidelines.

Media or recording devices are not allowed on campus, school activities or field trips.

Cell phones may not be used during school or field trips. The CCS cell phone policy is as follows if found being used by a student on campus without permission:

- First offense: Teacher confiscates phone and returns it to the student at the end of the class hour.
- Second offense: Teacher confiscates phone and turns it in to the school office. Student may retrieve phone at the end of the day.
- Third offense: Teacher confiscates phone and turns it in to the school office. Phone will remain at the school office until a parent or legal guardian retrieves it.
- Fourth offense: Phone is confiscated and student is put on phone restriction and/or other discipline is issued. Parent may retrieve phone at the school office after school.

Elementary students who fail a semester of any subject are required to make them up in summer school before they will be considered for promotion to the next grade.

Secondary students who fail a semester of any subject are required to earn credit in summer school before they will be considered for promotion to the next grade.

### **WORK PERMITS**

Work permits are available to students that maintain a 2.0 GPA with no F's and no more than one D. The student must also maintain regular school attendance.

No high school student should plan to work in excess of twenty hours per week outside the home. A student working more hours than this would find it very difficult to accomplish school work and get adequate rest.

### BICYCLES, SKATEBOARDS, SCOOTERS, ETC...

Students may ride bicycles and scooters to school. During school hours, they must be parked, locked, and left in the designated area for the entire day. Skateboards, roller blades, Heelys, bicycles and scooters are not to be ridden on the school grounds.

### SCHOOL AND CHURCH PROPERTY

We will stress character development including courtesy, good manners, and dependability essential to any educational endeavor. If character is not developed, academics are useless.

We also ask that parents honor their end of the commitment. Although we can do a lot for our students and their families, we cannot do everything. To help us better educate the whole child, we must let parents know our limitations.

- Be a substitute for a good home where abide love, values, discipline and a challenge to grow







All students are encouraged to build strong foundational skills in their freshmen and sophomore years and then use their elective course options and summer sessions to progress at an accelerated pace for math, science, or their specific area of interest.

# **GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

At Cristo Rey OC, we recognize that our students need to go beyond what is required. Our College-Preparatory academic program focuses on our students exceeding these expectations. To that goal, we encourage all our students to:

- Take more academic classes than required. University admissions departments generally recommend an additional year of math (ideally getting to the highest level of math—Calculus), laboratory science, and a language other than English).
- Take the most challenging classes available. Students are encouraged to take honors or Advanced Placement (AP) classes. AP classes are considered college-level work and if a student passes the AP exam, he or she can receive college credit for the class.

# **BOARD GOAL 5 - COMMUNICATION**

### **GENERAL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

It shall be the policy of the Board of Trustees to acknowledge each student's successful completion of the instructional program by the awarding of a diploma. Students shall receive diplomas of graduation from high school only after completing the prescribed course of study and meeting the standards of proficiency established by the district and the state.

The minimum requirements for graduation shall be the satisfactory completion of the following:

### I. RESIDENCY AND ATTENDANCE

- A. The Oxnard Union High School District shall have no required term of student residence as a condition of graduation. (EC §51411)
- B. The Governing Board shall award the diploma of graduation at the end of the term or summer school session during which the student completed the course of study prescribed by the Governing Board. (Title 5 §1650)
- C. <u>Fall Semester Seniors</u> Students in the Fall Semester of grade 12 must be enrolled in at least five (5) courses, which may include Work Experience Education, one courses at an accredited postsecondary educational institutions, Independent Study, Special Education programs wherein the IEP establishes a different number of courses, or any other course of study authorized by the Governing Board which is equivalent to the approved high school course of study. (EC §46145)
  - 1. <u>Beginning with the class of 2024</u> any student with 'D' and 'F' grades in the previous semester must have a full class schedule with no dismissal periods unless waived by the principal or assistant principal.
- D. <u>Spring Semester Seniors</u> Students in the Spring Semester of grade 12 must be enrolled in at least four (4) courses during a 240 minute school day. These courses may include, Work Experience Education. College coursework and off site ROP courses do not count toward the four (4) course 240 minute school day.
  - 1. <u>Beginning with the class of 2024</u> any student with 'D' and 'F' grades in the previous semester must have a full class schedule with no dismissal periods unless waived by the principal or assistant principal.

- E. <u>Trimester Seniors</u> Students in the Trimester schedule must maintain an enrollment of eleven (11) courses in grade 12. This includes a minimum of four (4) courses in Fall Trimester, a minimum of four (4) courses in Winter Trimester, and a minimum of three (3) courses in Spring Trimester. Fall and Winter Trimester may include Work Experience Education, one courses at an accredited postsecondary educational institutions, Independent Study, Special Education programs wherein the IEP establishes a different number of courses or any other course of study authorized by the Governing Board which is equivalent to the approved high school course of study. (EC §46145) Students in the spring Trimester of grade 12 must be enrolled in a minimum of three (3) courses, which do not include courses at an accredited postsecondary institution.
  - 1. <u>Beginning with the class of 2024</u> any student with 'D' and 'F' grades in the previous trimester must have a full class schedule with no dismissal periods unless waived by the principal or assistant principal.
- F. <u>Quarter Seniors</u> Students in the Quarter schedule must maintain an enrollment of a minimum of twelve (12) <u>quarter</u> courses per <u>school year</u> in grade 12. This includes a minimum of three (3) courses in each <u>quarter</u> term, which do not include courses at an accredited postsecondary educational institution.
  - 1. <u>Beginning with the class of 2024</u> any student with 'D' and 'F' grades in the previous quarter must have a full class schedule with no dismissal periods unless waived by the principal or assistant principal.
- G. <u>Early Graduation</u> Students meeting the credits required to graduate prior to their eighth semester, twelfth trimester, or sixteenth quarter must show plans to access a post high school opportunity and be recommended by the Principal. The principal's recommendation must be approved by the Superintendent or their designee.

#### II. PROFICIENCIES

- A. Students must take the California Physical Fitness Test (PFT) in grade 9 demonstrating proficiency on at least five (5) of the six (6) assessments on the PFT.
  - 1. Students who do not meet the proficiency standard on at least five (5) of the six (6) assessments on the PFT in grade 9 will attempt the PFT assessments they have not passed within a grade 10 Physical Education, Marching P.E. (fall only), or ROTC course.
  - 2. Students who do not meet the proficiency standard on at least five (5) of the six (6) assessments on the PFT in grade 10 will be enrolled in a Physical Education course in grade 11, unless the student is exempted pursuant to Education Code 51241 as outlined in Administrative Regulation 6146.1.

### III. CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

The minimum number of credits required for graduation is 230.

### IV. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Each department's subject requirements are defined in the Board-adopted Curriculum Frameworks. The prescribed course of study for students in grades 9 through 12 shall include: (EC §51225.3)

- A. 40 credits English required
- B. 30 credits Mathematics required

Including 5 credits in Math 1 (second term) or Math 2 or in any higher-level math course

C. 20 credits Physical Education required

Unless the student has been exempted pursuant to CA Education Code 51241.

- D. 5 credits in Health Education required
- E. 20 credits Science;
  - 10 credits biological/life sciences are required
  - 10 credits physical sciences are required

30 credits Science, including:

- 10 credits biological/life sciences are required
- 10 credits physical sciences are required
- 10 additional credits in any science course are required
- F. 35 credits Social Science, including:
  - 10 credits World Civilizations required

  - 5 credits Geography (ending with the class of 2023)
- G. 5 credits in <u>Cultural Geography</u> (ending with the class of 2023)

- H. 20 credits of <u>Visual and Performing Arts</u> or <u>World Language</u> or <u>Career Technical Education</u> required

### V. ALTERNATE MEANS OF EARNING CREDIT

(EC §51225.3) The Board recognizes that the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students. Therefore, requirements for graduation and specific alternative means for completing the prescribed course of study shall be made available to students, parents/guardians and the public. (EC §51225.3)

### A. Summer School (EC §37252)

- 1. Credits earned in summer school may be applied toward graduation requirements. Students will be awarded five (5) credits for every course successfully completed in summer school.
- 2. A grade 12 student who has a deficiency in credits may satisfy graduation requirements in the district's summer school that follows grade 12.
- B. Work Experience Education (EC §6178.1 and CAC Title 5 §1135)
  - 1. A student may earn a maximum of 40 total credits in work experience.
  - 2. 20 of the 40 credits may be non-paid exploratory work experience.
    - A. An IEP team may determine that a student with disabilities can earn more than 40 work experience credits.

#### C. Service Courses

- 1. Service courses must have educational content including a prescribed course of study.
- 2. The total number of students enrolled in Service courses during any term at any district high school shall at no time exceed five percent (5%) of the student population of the high school from the previous year CBEDS enrollment count.
- 3. Service courses will be permitted only for eleventh (11th) and twelfth (12th) grade students.
- 4. Students enrolled in service courses must have earned a "C" grade point average (2.0) or higher for the semester preceding their enrollment.
- 5. Students who have not passed the Physical Fitness Test cannot enroll in Service Courses unless they are also enrolled in a Physical Education course.
- 6. The maximum number of credits a student may earn in service courses each term is five (5).
- 7. A maximum of twenty (20) credits in service courses will be allowed for each student, with no more than ten (10) credits in any one service course.
- 8. Teachers shall be limited to one (1) student aide per class period.

9. The Governing Board expects that students enrolled in service courses should reflect the diversity of each school's student population.

### D. Adult School (EC §52523, §52500.1)

- 1. High School students in Grade 12, enrolled full-time may enroll in required or elective courses offered within the district's Adult School program, with a limit of five (5) credits per session and a maximum of forty (40) total credits during high school.
- 2. Appropriate coursework must be recommended by the High School counselor and approved by the high school principal or designee and the Oxnard Adult School principal.

### E. Regional Occupational Program (ROP) (EC §6178)

- 1. A student may earn credits from a regional occupational program (ROP).
- F. Independent Study (OUHSD Board Policy 6158 and EC §6158)
  - 1. Students may earn credits in this self-paced program based on an Independent Study Contract, agreed upon by student and teacher.
  - Students entering an Independent Study Contract with 160 or fewer credits
    may be re-designated in their fourth year of high school to Grade 11-R and
    may be eligible for an additional year of high school instruction with the
    recommendation of the Principal.

### G. Home Hospital Instruction (OUHSD Board Policy 6183)

- 1. Home Hospital Instruction is provided by the District in cases of long-term illness verified by a physician, psychiatrist, and/or licensed mental health professional and approved by the principal, school nurse, counselor, principal, Director Student Support Services and the Assistant Superintendent Educational Services.
- 2. Home Hospital Teaching for Special Education students may be assigned by the student's Individual Education Plan (IEP) Team and approved by the Director of Special Education.

## H. Continuation High School

- 1. A student who wishes to earn a continuation high school diploma must meet the High School Graduation requirements as outlined in OUHSD Board Policy 6146.1.
- 2. Students entering Continuation High School with 160 or fewer credits may be re-designated in their fourth year of high school to Grade 11-R and may be eligible for an additional year of high school instruction with the recommendation of the Principal.
- 3. Partial credits will be granted to students transferring to District continuation and

alternative schools during the middle of a term as per the timeline in BP 6146.3.

4. A student who wishes to return to the comprehensive high school must meet the exit requirements of the continuation school as outlined by the principal of the continuation school.

## I. High School Credit for College Coursework (EC §51740, §51760)

District students who successfully complete concurrent enrollment in college-level coursework through an accredited community college, college, or university may receive high school credit, provided the following conditions are met:

- 1. A written request must be submitted to and approved by the high school principal or assistant principal prior to the student's enrollment in the college-level course. Criteria for approval will include a consideration of why the student cannot enroll in the coursework in the high school setting. (Title 5, Section 1630)
- 2. To receive credit for specific high school subject area graduation requirements, the college-level coursework must be in a subject area included in the high school curriculum and must be pre-approved to meet a specific graduation requirement by the high school principal or assistant principal. College courses not pre-approved for any subject area graduation requirement will earn only elective high school credit. (Title 5, Section 1630-1631)
- 3. The student is to provide proof of registration in the college-level course to the high school principal or assistant principal by the end of the second week of the college course.
- 4. Students dropping a college course designated for credit toward specific high school subject area or elective graduation requirements must immediately inform the high school principal or assistant principal and enroll in the equivalent high school course.
- 5. To receive high school credit upon completion of the college-level coursework, the student will provide the high school principal or assistant principal an official transcript from the college where the course was completed.
- 6. Five (5) high school credits will be granted for any college- course that is not-transferable to UC/CSU. Ten (10) high school credits will be granted for a college course that is transferable to UC/CSU upon earning a letter grade of C or better.
- 7. The maximum number of college credits permitted to fulfill high school graduation requirements is forty (40), with the exception of Oxnard Middle College High School and Condor High School.
- 8. Students enrolling in the District's Middle College/High School program will create a plan to concurrently earn the high school diploma and associate degree upon high school graduation. This plan will annually evaluate each college course in the selected Associate Degree or Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum for appropriate high school credit value. College courses in the plan will earn a minimum of Five (5) and a maximum of Ten

- (10) high school credits for high school graduation requirements dependent on the college credit requirements of the Associate Degree for transfer or Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum the student is working toward.
- 9. The student will receive the same letter grade for high school credit as granted by the college.
- J. Concurrent High School Courses
  - 1. A student may earn a maximum of forty (40) credits toward High School Graduation from courses provided by an accredited out of District high school while concurrently enrolled in Oxnard Union High School District.
- K. Foster Youth & Homeless Youth Graduation Requirement Exemption (AB 216/AB 1806)

<u>Under AB 216/AB1806 Foster Youth & Homeless Youth may be eligible to meet the California State Minimum Graduation Requirements instead of District Requirements for Graduation</u>

- 1. California State Minimum Graduation Requirements
  - i. Three courses in English (30 credits).
  - ii. Two courses in mathematics (20 credits) Including 5 credits in Math 1 (second term) or Math 2 or in any higher-level Math course (EC Section 51224.5).
  - iii. Two courses in science (20 credits), including biological and physical sciences.
  - iv. Three courses in social studies (15 credits), including United States history and geography; world history, culture, and geography; a one-semester course in American government and civics, and a one-semester course in economics.
  - v. One course (10 credits) in visual or performing arts, foreign language, or career technical education.
  - vi. Two courses in physical education (10 credits) unless the pupil has been exempted pursuant to the provisions of EC Section 51241.
- 2. Within 30 days of enrollment schools must identify foster youth, homeless/transitional, and probation involved students who transferred into the school after their second year of high school.
- 3. The school must then determine whether a student is in the third or fourth year of high school by calculating the number of credits earned up to the date of transfer to include a review of academic records to ensure all prior high school credits are identified.
- 4. If the student is confirmed in the third or fourth year of high school a reasonable determination will be made to determine if the student can complete District graduation requirements in time to graduate from high school by the end of the student's fourth year of high school.
  - a. In determining reasonableness, a transcript analysis will be completed to identify courses and credits needed to meet District graduation requirements.
- 5. If the student is eligible for the California State Minimum Graduation requirements, a

- consult will be held with the student and educational rights holder (social worker, attorney, caregiver, or anyone else familiar with the student's educational history) to review the student's school performance history and if the student wants a waiver.
- 6. The District will honor any Eligibility Exemption Plan (AB 167/AB 216/AB 1806) issued by another school or school district. The school counselor should verify with the previous school or school district that an Eligibility Exemption (AB 167/AB 216/AB 1806) was granted and request documentation in writing.

#### VI. ACCEPTANCE OF TRANSCRIPTS

### A. Official Transcripts

- 1. Official Transcripts from accredited schools will be accepted as submitted.
- 2. No credit shall be given without official transcripts, except
  - a. Non-Public Schools (NPS) serving special education students. In this case the District will accept signed report cards.
  - b. Partial credits will be granted to students transferring to District continuation and alternative schools during the middle of a term per the timeline in BP 6146.3. In this case the District will accept signed report cards
- B. International Transcripts & Foreign Exchange Students
  - 1. Official transcripts from international schools will be accepted as submitted and will be evaluated by each school site.
  - 2. International or Foreign Exchange students who fulfill all the high school graduation requirements of the Oxnard Union High School District will earn a high school diploma.
  - 3. As a final celebration with their school friends and host families, foreign exchange students attending as Seniors may participate in the June graduation ceremonies.

### C. Home Schools

- 1. Home School students will be granted credit if <u>one</u> of the following requirements has been met:
  - a. The tutor (who may be any person including a parent) must have a valid California Teaching Credential for the grade level being taught, and instruction must be in the branches of study required in the public-school course frameworks. Tutoring must be documented for at least three (3) hours per day, between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and for at least 175 days per calendar year, in the English language (EC §48224).

- b. The home school is validated by a transcript from an accredited public school, charter school, or private school.
- c. The student has taken and passed the California High School Proficiency Examination (CHSPE). In which case the credits may be validated for the District's high school graduation requirements by taking a summative assessment of the subject area course credits being requested. These credits will not be validated by the District for UC/CSU a-g requirements.

### VII. PARTICIPATION IN COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

A. A student may not participate in the June graduation ceremonies until all the district's graduation requirements have been met. (Please refer to Administrative Procedures 6146.1)

### VIII. EXCEPTIONS TO GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

A. Any exceptions to the graduation requirements of the OUHSD may be made only with the principal's recommendation and the approval of the superintendent or superintendent's designee.

### Educational Leadership Philosophy Statement

I have written various drafts of this statement over the last 20 years, making adjustments as the context of education has shifted. The core values articulated in my philosophy have never wavered, and they include: student-centered decision making, relationship-based teaching, development of the "whole child," and a focus on equity and inclusion. With these values at the center, my first edits to this statement responded to the arrival of technology and 1:1 programs in schools as new tools for living my values. My next draft pivoted to focus on curricular innovations equipped to support teaching "21st century skills." Next I adjusted to represent the evolution of my practice as I adopted assessment structures for equity and personalized learning. In 2021, this statement now celebrates the alignment of multiple national conversations around educational innovation and my enduring core values as an educator. It is a thrilling time to be an educational leader!

It is my belief that it is the responsibility of independent schools to always be questioning, learning, and continuously improving. Excellent schools are not excellent because their educators have perfected their practices, they are excellent because they embrace a culture of growth, learning, and risk-taking. Questions that I see excellent schools grappling with include:

- What does it mean to truly teach 21<sup>st</sup> century skills?
- What would it look like to "break down silos" on our campuses and teach kids to transfer their learning beyond and between the boundaries of disciplines?
- How could we help students to deeply understand their unique strengths and make them into self-directed learners who know how to create plans to improve in their growth areas?
- How can we alter our practices to combat the rise of student anxiety and stress?
- How can we better individualize instruction in our classrooms and individualize learning pathways through our schools to ensure success for every student?
- How can we make what we teach relevant on the local, national, and global scale?
- How can we be sure that students are engaged beyond the level of compliance, that we unlock the keys to intrinsic motivation, and ensure that their learning endures?
- How can we deliberately tune our practices, systems, and structures for equity, inclusion, and anti-racism?

Leading organizations for compiling research, coordinating thought partnerships, and driving innovation on these topics include: The Aurora Institute and Competency Works, Challenge Success, the Global Online Academy (GOA), and the Mastery Transcript Consortium (MTC). It is my belief that today's educational leaders need to be as tuned in to the conversations on their campuses as they are to conversations on the national stage. It has been my great privilege to immerse myself in the work of these organizations in recent years.

I am grateful for the invitation that Challenge Success provides to challenge our traditional notions of success in high achieving independent schools. My leadership philosophy is shaped by my concern for the emotional and physical health of today's students. Researchers at the Stanford Graduate School of Education describe the landscape as an "epidemic of high anxiety." The combination of ambition, competition, and the state of constant connectedness on social media has created an unhealthy reality for young people. In response, we must never lose focus that the most important work of a school is to love, nurture, and support students. The campus must be a safe place for students, a place where they feel known but also have permission to continue to discover who they are. The school community needs to be dynamic and provide a vast array of arts, sports, service, cultural, and academic enrichment activities so that students will detach from their online worlds to engage in school life with their peers.

I am particularly inspired by the combined work of the Aurora Institute, GOA, and the MTC to place focus on Competency-Based Learning (CBL) as a framework that provides answers to our collective questions as schools and potential solutions to many of our challenges. The definition of CBL is a set of seven design values, with student agency and equity at its core, that can be used to redesign curriculum, pedagogy, and assessment in schools. CBL also presents a systems-change approach to ensuring every student in our schools attain mastery of our most crucial learning outcomes via personalized timelines and pathways. CBL holds a school accountable for the success of every student, making it a crucial tool for equity and inclusion. I have observed, over two decades and four schools, that admission and enrollment strategies that succeed at diversity initiatives are outpacing schools' work to develop meaningful equity and inclusion initiatives. It is my belief that the continuing separation of curricular and DEI initiatives is a root cause for this lag. An inclusive curriculum along with pedagogies and assessment practices tuned for equity are the greatest levers towards achieving a school's DEI goals.

It is no surprise that my core values remain intact after these 20 years. Today, just as before, I want students at the center in the way educators and schools make decisions. I want every adult on campus to embrace the responsibility to build relationships inside and outside of class that make students feel welcome, known, and safe. I want the curriculum of a school to teach much more than content, developing the whole child through the intentional teaching of transferable skill sets and mindsets for engagement, empathy, and service. I want every student on the school's campus to feel a sense of belonging, with equitable access to mastering the learning outcomes that matter most. In order to live these values, the most important elements of my job as an educational leader are to sustain a community where adults care deeply for students and for each other, and to create a supportive environment that enables everyone to take risks, experience growth and set-backs, and undertake deep and meaningful learning.

#### **Academic Program**

Students are enrolled in 8 classes each academic year. They take 1 class in each of the core academic areas (History, English, Math and Science) each year, and a minimum of 2 years of World Language, 2 years of Arts and 2 years of Physical Education/ Health & Wellness. Several classes are offered at the AP level (university level) and students can choose to sit for AP exams in May. Students can take special interest elective courses throughout high school that align with their Global Pathway/ future career interest.

The Global Pathways are 3 areas of concentration:

- Global Entrepreneurs Business, Finance, Marketing
- Global Citizens International Relations, Policy & Reform, Human Rights, Community Engagement, Environmental issues
- Global Innovators S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) careers, Biomedical, Architecture, City Planning

Global Leadership is a challenge-based curriculum that allows students to work together and interact with the local community through experiential learning. Teachers use a project-based learning approach that develops specific global competencies such as inquisitiveness, developing a global mindset, valuing all people across borders and cultures, collaboration, strategic thinking, empowerment, and influence. It is also our school's commitment to work on the 17 U.N. Sustainability Development Goals. Students work together to present solutions to real world challenges. Students choose projects that align with their area of interest or Global Pathway.

The Global Leadership Program culminates in a Capstone Project in Grade 12 where students put together a portfolio of work that is presented back to the school community and aims to serve as a substantial piece of work that can be presented to the Global Leadership Summit review committee or in university entrance interviews. Students will have 25 hours of logged experiential learning, volunteer, service learning or internships each year related to their Global Leadership Pathway.

All students have Advisory (Social Emotional and Life Skills topics) each year.

At EF Academy, we value language learning as one of the most important tenets of an international education. The study of languages and cultures promotes global understanding, appreciation, and interconnectedness. It also allows students to gain a better perspective on their own language and culture. Our students body represents a global society with students coming from over 60 different countries. A student may choose to enroll in a self-study language course to continue to study their native language.

#### **Course Descriptions**

#### **History/ Social Sciences**

#### World Governments, Societies, and

**Economies:** Study the political, socio-cultural, and economic systems and their historical context that make up the world.

#### World History, Government & Culture:

Study the significant movements and events that shaped the course of history across the world. Study the origins, structure, concepts and policies of government and political systems.

**AP Human Geography:** Explore how humans have understood, used, and changed the surface of Earth. You'll use the tools and thinking processes of geographers to examine patterns of human population, migration, and land use.

#### **United States History, Government &**

**Culture:** Study the significant movements and events that shaped the course of history across the Americas. Study the origins, structure, concepts and policies of the U.S. Government and political systems.

AP United States History: Study the cultural, economic, political, and social developments that have shaped the United States from c. 1491 to the present. Analyze texts, visual sources, and other historical evidence and write essays expressing historical arguments.

#### **English**

Based on their level of English language skills (initially assessed through the EF SET and Pathway Call, then through placement tests in September) students will be placed in the appropriate class.

**English 9,10,11:** Students will develop their English language skills through reading and analysis of literary texts, as well as developing writing, speaking and listening skills. For students whose English language level is intermediate to advanced.

#### AP English Language and Composition

(CEFR= B2, C1, C2).: This is introductory college-level composition course. Students cultivate their understanding of writing and rhetorical arguments through reading, analyzing, and writing texts as they explore topics like rhetorical situation, claims and evidence, reasoning and organization, and style.

**English Language Lab:** (CEFR= A2): This class focuses on all areas of English language development and is for students whose level is below intermediate level. We recommend students in this group study English Language Lab instead of a World Language.

#### **Mathematics**

**Algebra I:** Master algebraic skills such as factoring, first degree equations and inequalities, polynomials, statistics and probability, which are essential for the study of higher mathematics.

Algebra II & Geometry: Develop mastery of algebraic techniques and a thorough knowledge of elementary functions and the graphs of these functions. Topics studied include properties of the real number system; polynomial and exponential functions, applications of geometry, probability and statistics. Learn about the nature of geometric shapes and angles and their applications to the real world.

**Pre-Calculus:** Students will study functions and graphs; lines and rates of change;

sequences and series; polynomial and rational functions; exponential and logarithmic functions; analytic geometry; linear algebra and matrices; probability and statistics

**AP Calculus AB/BC:** Explore the concepts, methods, and applications of differential and integral calculus. Work to understand the theoretical basis and solve problems by applying your knowledge and skills.

**Math Lab (after-school):** Practice additional Math skills alongside a tutor.

#### Sciences

**Chemistry:** Learn about the fundamental concepts of chemistry including structure and states of matter, intermolecular forces, and reactions. Participate in hands-on lab investigations and use chemical calculations to solve problems.

**Conceptual Physics:** Explore introductory concepts of systems, energy fields, force interactions, change, laws of motion, and waves. Participate in inquiry-based laboratory work.

**Biology/AP Biology:** Study the core scientific principles, theories, and processes that govern living organisms and biological systems. Participate in hands-on laboratory work to investigate natural phenomena.

**Environmental Science:** (can be taken as 3<sup>rd</sup> Science or Elective) Explore and investigate the interrelationships of the natural world and analyze environmental problems, both natural and human-made. Take part in laboratory investigations and field work.

#### **World Languages**

World Language & Culture: Students may choose to study a language at beginner or intermediate level.

**French I or Spanish I:** Begin to get acquainted with the language by studying the four key areas of language study: listening, speaking, reading and writing. Become aware of the cultural influences of the cultural heritage.

French II or Spanish II: Continue the study of the language by expanding knowledge and use of vocabulary and sentence structure in both speaking and writing. Participate in conversations, analyze the cultural context of language and participate in interactive activities.

#### AP Spanish Language and Culture:

(Intermediate level) Develop your Spanish language skills and learn about the cultures in Spanish-speaking parts of the world. You'll practice communicating in Spanish and study real-life materials such as newspaper articles, films, music, and books.

**Self-Study Native Language:** Alongside a tutor, study the literary works of your mother tongue language. A language teacher supervises the daily work of students and a tutor, who meets weekly with students, assesses the work.

#### The Arts

**Art & Design:** Create a portfolio of work that demonstrates inquiry and development of ideas through the exploration of materials and processes. Communicate your ideas about art and design through written reflection and visual expression.

**Drama:** Study important woks through a hands-on approach. Participate in the process of bringing drama productions to life as creators, stage and costume designers, and performers. Develop voice, and performance

techniques. Explore meaning through movement and expression. Work individually and collaboratively as part of an ensemble.

Music: (After-school club) Study aspects of composition, musical elements and structure. Analyze and reflect on music from a variety of historical and socio-cultural contexts. Participate in individual and ensemble performance. Create individual pieces.

**Film:** Develop an appreciation for the world of filmmaking by studying and analyzing characterization and techniques from different countries and cultures over time. Become aware of perspectives and bias and develop a further appreciation for cultural diversity. Develop technical skills working individually and collaboratively to create a short film.

#### Physical Education + Health & Wellness

Physical Education: Achieve and maintain a level of physical fitness by establishing and following personal fitness goals and participating in team sports. Demonstrate knowledge of fitness concepts, principles, and strategies. Discuss the relationship between nutrition and physical fitness.

**Health and Wellness:** Explore age-appropriate topics surrounding physical, social and emotional health. Using a case study approach, dialogue about responsible actions, reactions and decision-making and building healthy relationships using the CASEL framework.

#### **Electives**

**Business:** (Can be taken once History requirements have been met or as an elective) Learn about the structure of business, as well as the socio-economic contexts in which different organizations operate. Analyze, discuss and evaluate business activities by reviewing case studies. Gain an understanding of ethical concerns from both a local and global level. Finalize the course with a business plan.

**Computer Science:** Get familiar with the concepts and tools of computer science by exploring programming language, doing handson work to design, write, and test computer programs that solve problems or accomplish tasks.

**Psychology:** Explore the ideas, theories, and methods of the scientific study of behavior and mental processes period examine the concepts of psychology and analyze data from psychological research studies.

#### Global Leadership + Experiential Learning

**Global Leadership:** Participate in project-based learning to develop leadership and collaboration skills. Become familiar with the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals and uncover what you are most passionate about. Use your skills to present solutions to real world challenges.

**Experiential Learning:** Connect with the local community to gain real world experience on projects of your interest that align with your Global Leadership Project. Work with a mentor while taking part in internships, volunteer work or service-learning. Reflect on 25 hours of experiential learning over the academic year.

#### Advisory

Advisory: Work in small groups or individually with an Advisor who ensures you are achieving success in all academic areas and balance in school life in general. Reflect on one's own strengths and defining skills to further improve. Share experiences in small group discussions about boarding school life and current events. Discuss important themes surrounding digital citizenship. Reflect on the CASEL core competencies in connection with Health class. Participate in discussions around diversity, equity, and inclusion.


### **University of California - A-G Course List**

While academic admission requirements are not the same for all colleges and universities, the year-by-year course recommendations (on the table below), are based on the admission requirements of the (UC) University of California, and the (CSU) California State University. These requirements are known as the "A-G" requirements. If students follow this pattern, they will also be eligible for most major colleges and universities in the country.

The University of California is the institution responsible for reviewing high school courses in the state of California to certify that they meet the college preparatory standard. To satisfy the UC subject requirements, students must complete 15 units of UC-approved high school coursework.

A unit is equal to an academic year, or two semesters, of a study – which would be a total of 30 semesters or 150 credits in the Legacy Christian system. At least 7 of the 15 units must be taken in the last two years of high school. To learn more about these requirements, as well as to view the list of courses at Legacy Christian Academy High School that fulfill them, please contact the high school guidance couselor or academic dean.

### EARLY RELEASE

Seniors may qualify for Early Release and take one fewer class during senior year. Seniors on the Early Release program will leave earlier than the general release time. To qualify, seniors must maintain academic and attendance eligibility:

- 1. Need no more than 30 credits to graduate
- 2. Have an overall and last semester GPA of 2.50 and continue to maintain a 2.50 GPA
- 3. Owe no more than 20 Community Service hours
- 4. Accrue no more than 10 tardies during 2<sup>nd</sup> semester 11<sup>th</sup> grade

### **ANIMAL DISSECTIONS**

Students at the Charter School may perform animal dissections as part of the science curriculum. Any student who provides their teacher with a written statement, signed by their parent/guardian, specifying the student's moral objection to dissecting or otherwise harming or destroying animals, or any parts thereof, may be excused from such activities if the teacher believes that an adequate alternative education project is possible. The alternative education project shall require a comparable time and effort investment by the student. It shall not, as a means of penalizing the student, be more arduous than the original education project. The student shall not be discriminated against based upon their moral objection to dissecting or otherwise harming or destroying animals, or any parts thereof.

The NOVA Academy Early College High School Senior Exit Portfolio is an additional requirement for NOVA Academy ECHS students. Students are required to present and defend the work submitted in their portfolios to a review team made up of community leaders. The Exit Portfolio is a student-selected collection of work which represents his/her reflections and achievements in academic studies, personal growth, and extracurricular activities. As the student completes his/her high school years and continues working towards future goals, this portfolio provides an authentic assessment tool for the students to evaluate their learning, for the staff to review programs/projects from the student perspective, and for the school community to witness the demonstration of the Student Learning Outcomes (SLO).

### **SENIOR EXIT INTERVIEWS**

All seniors are required to present their Senior Exit Portfolio at a set exit interview.

### SENIOR ACTIVITIES

  - Based on your annual earnings, you may be eligible to receive the Earned Income Tax Credit from the Federal Government (Federal EITC). The Federal EITC is a refundable federal income tax credit for low-income working individuals and families. The Federal EITC has no effect on certain welfare benefits. In most cases, Federal EITC payments will not be used to determine eligibility for Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income, food stamps, low-income housing, or most Temporary Assistance For Needy Families payments. Even if you do not owe federal taxes, you must file a federal tax return to receive the Federal EITC. Be sure to fill out the Federal EITC form in the Federal Income Tax Return Booklet. For information regarding your eligibility to receive the Federal EITC, including information on how to obtain the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Notice 797 or any other necessary forms and instructions, contact the IRS by calling 1-800-829-3676 or through its website at www.irs.gov.

You may also be eligible to receive the California Earned Income Tax Credit (California EITC) starting with the calendar year 2015 tax year. The California EITC is a refundable state income tax credit for low-income working individuals and families. The California EITC is treated in the same manner as the Federal EITC and generally will not be used to determine eligibility for welfare benefits under California law. To claim the California EITC, even if you do not owe California taxes, you must file a California income tax return and complete and attach the California EITC Form (FTB 3514). The Academy plans to be fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges ("WASC"). The Academy's high school courses will be approved by the University of California and California State University Systems as meeting the A-G admissions requirements. The Academy's courses that meet the A-G requirements will be listed in the high school curriculum catalog. All scholars and parents will be encouraged to complete an orientation session prior to enrollment, which includes a review of the parent/scholar handbook. In addition to A-G approved courses being listed in the curriculum catalog, a statement regarding the transferability of courses to other high schools will be included in the parent/scholar handbook. Both the A-G list and the information on transferability of classes will be updated on a yearly basis. The Academy recognizes that as a WASC-accredited school, its courses are transferable to other public schools and A-G courses are considered to meet college entrance requirements.

### G. SCHOLARS TO BE SERVED

The Academy will be authorized as a K-12 program that operates a classroom-based program. The Academy will likely begin its first year of operations with grades K-5, but reserves the right to expand this to include additional grades as scholar demand and facilities allow. The Academy expects to expand a grade level each year to include all of grades K-12 by year eight (7) of the charter term, adding K in year two (2). The Academy has developed a realistic enrollment projection for the first 7 years of operation. It is anticipated that it will serve approximately 360 scholars in the first year growing to 810 scholars for all grades K-12 by the end of the eighth year of operation. These numbers are based on a reasonable projection of anticipated enrollment. Below is a chart demonstrating the projected enrollment:

### **H.** Target Scholar Population:

The Academy's target scholar population includes scholars of all achievement levels in Orange County. The Academy seeks to recruit a diverse cross section of the community who share our belief that:

1. A classical education designed to educate good citizens is a valuable alternative to the traditional methods of teaching State Standards.

- 2. More instructional time improves growth in scholar achievement. This instructional time is used to add foreign language as a requirement in grades 2-12, as well as to add courses in technology, art, classical languages, public speaking, advanced group projects/simulations, and study skills.
- 3. Scholars who are not mastering the content being taught at their respective grade level have the opportunity to extend their school day by participating in before school or after school tutoring until such time as assessments reflect that they are performing at or above grade level and, in the case of English Learners, that they have been re-designated as proficient in English. Our Academy is genuinely committed to excellent instruction that will enable any scholar to exceed State Standards.

Because our target scholar population reflects a cross section of the community, it is anticipated that the racial, ethnic, socioeconomic, English Learner and special education populations will closely track that of Orange Unified School District's scholar population. They are, as it were, thoughts about thoughts. Classics, by contrast, are much closer to common experience in its fullness; they raise questions and pursue inquiries, which arise directly from a wonder about things themselves. On





Lakeview Leadership Academy CIF Evaluation 2022-23 School Year

My name is Brian Scarpace. I am the Athletic Director for Lakeview Leadership Academy and reporting on its behalf for this 2022-23 CIF Evaluation. Overall, this was the best high school sports year that Lakeview has had. We fielded one boys and girls sport for each season. We competed in several contests as a freelance school. No year goes off without some hitches. We were unable to convince the Agape or Cross Valley Leagues to accept us as a league school. This caused us to once again to freelance for the 22-23 school year, and will do the same for the 23-24 school year. We would like some oversight or clarity so that we will be accepted into a league so that our students can continue to compete and be recognized.

Girls Volleyball we had nine (9) girls on the team. They played in seven (7) non-league varsity level matches under Coach Scarpace. Unfortunately, they lost all of them, but were able to win their first set ever in school history. The girls were competitive; but we had two starters transfer after the season so hopefully they can be replaced next season.

XC boys and girls had six (6) boys and one (1) girl join the team this year. Coach Cook had them race in (3 plus the finals) meets with the larger high schools (Desert Sky League). New uniforms came in after the season ended so next year the players will be looking sharp. The program took some baby steps forward and we did have a female participant which was good to see.

Boys Soccer team had sixteen (16) boys that made the team. Unfortunately, due to grades, four students were removed from the team. Another player moved, leaving Coach Alfonso Hernandez with eleven (11) players the bare minimum to field a team. I did not want to cancel their season, but after their first game a few players got hurt and it was obvious that the lack of depth was going to make completing the season impossible, so the call was made to cancel the rest of their season. I was not able to round up many games for them prior to the season. This might be because last year they beat all the schools in the Agape League easily and perhaps those schools did not want it to look bad on their records? Another issue with being a freelance team I suppose?

**Girls Basketball** had eight (8) players on it. They went 0-5 in the five games that they played in. They had two games canceled by their opponents, so that shortened the season a lot unfortunately. The girls are improving but are very young, all 9th or 10th graders, most with no prior playing experience. Coach Trujillo is already getting the girls ready for better results in the 2023-24 season.

Boys Basketball is the pride of our growing sports program at LLA. The team of eleven (11) boys under the guidance of Coach Washington once again battled against opposing teams and ended up with a record of 5-6, but three of those games were against Desert Sky league competition of schools with 2000 student populations. They defeated all teams in the Agape League that played against us, and with another year under their belt are expected to

Competitive and Non-Competitive Cheer round out the rest of the sports offered during the 2022-23 school year. Coach Thomas had (14) participants throughout the year. Two (2) boys and twelve (12) girls. Team uniforms arrived and students fundraised for warmups, so the team looked amazing at the home games as they cheered on and performed at halftime. The team had some delays in purchasing music for competitions, and paying for competitions, so it does not look like they will be entering a competition this year. That will be the goal for the 2023/24 school year.

In conclusion, As the current AD (Brian Scarpace) I think focusing on these same sports for the 2023-24 school year with the hopes of entering the Agape league at the conclusion of 2024 would be the best course of action moving forward. Despite the challenges as evident from the wins and losses, our student-athletes were competitive in every game and were afforded a meaningful and enriching athletic experience.

#### **Athletic Facilities**

MSA SA is equipped with an indoor gym where basketball and volleyball practice takes place. The size of the gym is limited to allow only the hosting of volleyball games during the CIF season. MSA SA has partnered with and secured the Jerome Center in Santa Ana for hosting basketball games for the upcoming season. Additionally, MSA SA has partnered with Centennial Park in Santa Ana for sporting events that will take place now and in the future. The facilities have provided our soccer teams with great practice facilities and the ability to host games.

Track and cross country has been practiced in the open space on the trails nearby with competitions being hosted by other schools such as Webb at Mile Square Park.

Our facilities have changed quite a bit this year. Last year we received a grant from DICK'S Sporting Goods which allowed us to build a CIF official volleyball court inside our gym. This year we really needed more practice space for all of our sports programs which range from first grade all the way to 12th. This improvement in our facilities included two basketball courts which have modular volleyball poles supplied by Sports Imports. One of the courts is fenced in and provides a space for futsal. We continue to explore opportunities to renovate the campus to ensure our student body is afforded an experience to remember.

#### Overview of the school's experience

In my second year as Athletic Director, becoming a full member of the CIF-SS has been our overarching goal. My passion has been to bring athletic opportunities to all boys and girls.

During my career, I have witnessed limited opportunities and barriers for girls, such as societal

expectations around gender roles, lack of access, etc. It has been my passion to address the gender gap and provide opportunities that will support participation for girls. Furthermore, school athletics is a great driver for positive student outcomes, especially academics. Several studies have found this to be true, and my hope is that students here at MSA SA are provided with opportunities and experiences that will develop youth to be well-rounded individuals.

Our coaching staff has also grown quite a bit this year. We now have a wonderfully dedicated group of coaches who are taking their roles very seriously by becoming certified in their respective sports and completing the NFHS Fundamentals of Coaching course. This year, while being a full-time Athletic Director, I have been going to Concordia for my Masters in Coaching and Leadership. We are all doing our best to create a sports program that is transformative and will be everlasting. Our coaches are beginning to measure up to the third dimension of coaching, showing many transformational qualities.

The parents of our student-athletes have also been integral to our success. They have supported our sports program through fundraising at every home game as well as bringing snacks to away games. This program is still new for the kids and very new for the parents, but their support has been immense. In addition to parents being involved for their children, the student body has shown much excitement in attending all of our home games making the gym feel electric. We may be small, but we are loud!

Lastly, the CIF experience for our students has generated excitement and support from school leadership. School leadership is committed to expanding the opportunities for students at MSA SA to be competitive and acquire the resources necessary to expand.

Overall this year's experience has been a successful one for MSA SA. We were able to field teams, acquire through partnerships athletic facilities, improve our athletic facilities, and

Thank you for allowing Palmdale Academy Charter School (PACS) to participate in the CIF SS. When PACS started our school in the 2021-22 school year, we started with seven (7) sports. As we come to the completion of the 2022-23 school year, we now have a total of twelve (12) sports teams competing in CIF. These sports include:

Baseball
Boys and Girls Basketball
Boys and Girls Cross Country
Boys and Girls Soccer
Softball
Boys and Girls Volleyball
Boys and Girls Track and Field

As PACS has grown in student population so has our facilities. In the past two years we have begun construction on facilities for our soccer and track teams. The all-weather track and turf infield were completed in the fall of 2022. This allowed PACS to host our first sporting event on-campus when our soccer teams hosted Lucerne Valley High School on December 6, 2022. The facilities are not completed as of yet, as we have more phases coming in order to add bleachers, a scoreboard, and snack bar facilities to the area, but we are still moving forward with plans to host a Heritage League Track and Field meet next school year. The Palmdale School District (PSD) and PACS also secured funding in a referendum this past November for our gymnasium and locker room facilities. Though construction has not started, the process of planning has.

CIF sports was a new process for PSD, however their knowledge of this program has grown exponentially in these past two years and is growing every season. Our relationship with the Heritage League has improved and they have graciously accepted us into their league for Cross Country and Track and Field. Though we do not have on-site facilities for most sports, we have found homes at neighboring schools, including Innovations Academy that allowed us the use of their outdoor field and Buena Vista Elementary, Cactus Middle, and Golden Poppy Elementary Schools who are allowing us to use their gymnasiums. This has also allowed our student-athletes to become more visible in the community.

Athletics has made a positive impact on our students as well and has been a staple component for our school culture and motivation. The students and student-athletes feel more engaged and have a more positive outlook on coming to the school. The culture being set around our athletic teams has begun to emanate through the rest of the population. We have also grown in our participation and now have expectations of having both Junior Varsity and Varsity teams in multiple sports.

Again, I want to thank CIF for allowing an emerging high school to be a part of this program. Please know we acknowledge the impact sports has on school culture, wellness, and academic achievement for all our students.











Dear CIFSS,

In the 2022-2023 Athletic Year, TREE Academy continued to grow and make incremental improvements athletically. After last year's return to sports, we were excited to build upon the positive trajectory that we saw. Throughout the school year we were once again able to field a Girls Volleyball team, a Boys Volleyball team, and a Boys Basketball team.

Having our school year start September 1st creates a difficult challenge in fielding Fall sports. Once the school year began we were able to gather enough interest to once again field a Girl's Volleyball Team. Having the team not be put together until early September created challenges for scheduling, but I was able to get us 3 non-league games as well as an invitation to one tournament. In total, our Girl's Volleyball team played 7 games, a big step up from last year's one game. Though they did not win any of those games, it was an extremely positive experience for our girls, most of whom had not experienced playing a team sport before.

During the Winter season, we were once again able to field a competitive Boys Basketball team. This time, however, we managed to play 10 non-league games. This was the first time in our school history that one of our high school sports teams played in at least 10 games. During this time we were also fortunate enough to be approved by the newly renovated West Hollywood Park to use their facilities for practices. Our basketball team worked hard this season and finished with a 6-4 record across our 10 games, including our very first home game in school history! I would say this was a monumental season for our team and a major stepping stone for what our future could look like. I am hopeful to get us into a league next year for more competition.

As we moved into Spring season, we found our Boys Volleyball team in a transitional year after many of our players from last year moved on. We managed to get enough players to field a team and with a newly revamped squad of mostly freshmen. Having a small team of new players was certainly a challenge both on and off the court, and after having to cancel a few games due to injuries and scheduling conflicts, we managed to get our boys a total of 4 non-league games on the season. The team went 0-4 in those games, but we saw a significant improvement in the players' skill and ability as the year progressed.

As previously mentioned, we have been fortunate enough to find a new home for our athletics in the West Hollywood Park ARC. Going from one outdoor court to being able to host a home game in one year was a great success for our school. We will always have challenges with our size and population here, but I continue to have hope that we can grow to eventually become a full status school in CIF as I continue to learn and grow in my role as AD.

I am writing this letter on behalf of The University Career and Sports Academy to inform the Executive Committee, of the desire of the UCSA community to be given Full Membership in the CIF-SS. Every year provides academic and athletic challenges; however, through the 2022-2023 academic year, the UCSA student athletes have overcome many obstacles to successfully compete in boys and girls sports during the fall, winter and spring seasons.

As a member of the Cross Valley and Agape Leagues, UCSA student athletes have competed in the following sports:

- Girls VB
- 8-man varsity football
- Girls Soccer
- Boys Soccer
- Girls Track & Field
- Boys Track & Field

This year UCSA again expanded its weight room through the purchase of additional training equipment, and has made further improvements on its practice field [approximately 70 yards x 30 yards, with a 1/8 th of a mile dirt track around it].
