Minutes

1. OPENING BUSINESS	DISPOSITION	ITEM
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A. Call to order by Jim Perry, President of the Council

The meeting was called to order at 1:08 pm.

B. Pledge of Allegiance

C. Roll Call

All Executive Committee members were present.

D. Introduction of Guests

Assistant Commissioner Thom Simmons introduced the newest team member, Taylor Martinez, Communications Assistant, to the Committee. Commissioner of Athletics, Mike West, introduced there were members of the Fullerton Union High School District present and formal introductions would occur during the time of the hearing.

E. Adopt Agenda

Adopted

There was a motion and a second to adopt the agenda. The motion carried 20-0-0.

F. Approval of Minutes

Approved

There was a motion and second to approve the minutes of the August 10, 2023 Executive Committee Meeting. The motion carried 19-0-1.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Executive Committee. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

There was no one present for Public Comment.

3. ACTION ITEMS

A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS

1. State CIF Executive Committee Vacancy Approved STATE 658

President-Elect Dr. Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the nominations for the State CIF Executive Committee vacancy due to reassignment. There are three nominations, and their resumes can be found in the posted agenda. There was a motion and a second to support Dr. Paula Hart Rodas to the State CIF Executive Committee. The motion carried 19-0-1.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTION ITEMS

1. Releaguings Appeals - Orange County Area

President Jim Perry began the proceedings with introductions of those in attendance and a review of the process. The following were in attendance:

From Troy High School: Principal, Mr. Will Mynster; Athletic Director, Mr. Chris Blume

From Fullerton Union High School: Principal, Ms. Laura Rubio; Athletic Director, Mr. Joseph Olivas

From La Habra High School: Principal, Mr. Steve Garcia; Athletic Director, Mr. Paul Caffery

From Sunny Hills High School: Principal, Mr. Craig Weinreich; Athletic Director, Mr. Paul Jones

From Sonora High School: Principal, Mr. Steven Cazarez; Athletic Director, Mr. Arlie Kearney

From the Fullerton Union High School District Office: Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Karl Zener

From Buena Park High School: Principal, Ms. Sonje Berg

Once the overview of the proceedings was read, Mr. Jim Perry asked for the appellants to begin their presentations.

Mr. Craig Weinreich, Principal at Sunny Hills High School, was first to speak and presented on behalf of all five schools. He distributed a presentation that can be found at the end of these minutes. Mr. Weinreich's presentation was based on the following five criteria:

1. Bylaws 24.0 and 40.0, mandating that the releaguings proposals must affect the least amount of member schools as reasonably possible
2. Bylaw 40.0, mandating that Principals of schools requesting relief begin the meeting with a five-minute presentation that may include their school information and one (1) new 2024-2026 releaguings proposal
3. Bylaw 22.0, mandating that all "Releaguings Proposals must be written on the Orange County Area Releaguings Proposal Form"
4. The introductory section of the Releaguings Bylaws also states that "Releaguings Proposals protocols and procedures will not discriminate against one or more member schools"
5. Bylaws 23.0 and 40.0, mandating that releaguings proposals must provide reasonable and equal application of the following three criteria: competitive equity (strength of program), geography (travel time), and enrollment (school population)

1. Releaguings Appeals - Orange County Area (Cont.)

He reviewed each slide, highlighting various points contained within the document. He reiterated that this appeal is regarding the all other sports portion of the releaguings, not the football only portion.

After Mr. Weinreich's presentation, each school was then given time to make a statement.

Will Mynster, Principal, Troy High School presented their position and agreed and supported what was stated in the presentation by Mr. Weinreich. He stated that trying to make sense of the data presented at the releaguings meetings was confusing and felt Troy had been called out by the other schools in the area.

Next Laura Rubio, Principal, Fullerton High School presented their case. The feeling of this group of school is that they were not part of the conversations taking place during the meetings and therefore it was a violation of process stated in the bylaws.

Steve Garcia, Principal, La Habra High School was the next to speak. He stated that every school should have appealed based on process. The process was not clear. He felt that being a 2nd year principal, his school was an outsider and was not included in the meeting decisions.

Last to present was Steven Cazarez, Principal, Sonora High School. This was his first year being involved in the releaguings process. The policies and processes that were to be in place were not followed and if something is not done, this will continue to occur.

Next, Michael Brennan, President, Mater Dei High School and Chairperson of the Orange County Releaguings process presented via Zoom. Mr. Brennan has been the Orange County Releaguings Chairperson for the three cycles alongside Joel Hartman, Athletic Director, Mater Dei High School, Secretary, Dr. John Dahlem, CIF-SS Historian, Parliamentarian, Sharon Hodge, Executive Assistant, CIF-SS, voting process. He stated several meetings have taken place prior to this appeal discussing processes and procedures that took place during the Orange County releaguings process. The Fullerton Union High School District schools were encouraged to build relationships and begin communications with the other schools in the area. Dr Dahlem participated in the first two meetings, and he insured that bylaws were followed along with Robert's Rules of Order. At the last meeting, Mr. Jim Perry and Dr. Monica Colunga were present. At no time was a concern brought up that a procedural step was missed or that the bylaws were not being followed in their numerical order. As they moved through the process, the development of the football only league conferences necessitated the change in some of the forms. Those forms were updated and published on the website for all to access. They also followed the procedures to make sure every school has a voice, as this is very important to the process. Next there was dissertation regarding the votes, Fullerton Union High Schools District voting against the final proposal but voting for the football only proposal. The votes indicate that both approved proposals impacted the fewest number of schools possible.

In rebuttal, Mr. Weinreich stated that schools asking for relief were not given their appropriate time to explain why they wanted relief, which made those requests unclear, and that the focus of this year's releaguings was on developing the football only conferences.

Mr. Mynster stated that when you are in the moment, it is very difficult to point out that a procedural step has been missed and we could not see all the pieces of the puzzle. Did schools still need relief after the football only came to be?

Next there was a rebuttal discussion regarding the votes and how much closer the earlier votes were. Also, there are many other schools in the area that feel as the Fullerton Union schools feel but were not willing to come forward to these proceedings.

Mr. Brennan's response was that the meetings were held in a democratic manner and in contact with CIF-SS office. There was no discrimination within the process, just frustration with it. The private schools moved, and they did not feel as if they were discriminated against. The meetings were held according to the bylaws, and we are only here because the FUSHD schools wish to stay together as a league.

Questions:

Mr. Jim Perry asked for any questions from the Executive Committee to the appellants. Questions included the changes in the forms used and notification of all parties regarding the updated forms; the following of bylaw 40.0 in requesting relief; and if the relief requests were on the agenda. Responses stated the forms were updated on the website for all to see, the schools seeking relief made their cases known at the first athletic director meeting and no one raised a hand saying we missed something. The question was asked if anyone present at the principals meeting asked for relief. Mrs. Brennan was unsure, but the answer was in the minutes. The relief comes in the counter proposal presentations.

Discussion:

Next was the open discussion by the Executive Committee. There was a clarifying question as to what was being appealed. If the appeal is supported, process would begin again from the start. A statement was made that if there were all these issues, why are there not more schools here appealing the process? It was discussed that if an item was not agenized, how would a principal know that they were able to speak to the need for relief. There was discussion regarding asking for relief and a member in the Orange County area stated they were allowed their time at the athletic directors meeting, however at the principals meeting we rolled right into the proposals and the Principal of that Orange High School did not get a chance to speak. Schools can ask for relief on a google doc that all schools have access to ahead of the meetings. Dr. Colunga clarified that she was in attendance but was not fulfilling an official CIF role. When a proposal is submitted, it must address all 77 schools and not a singular school desire to move. When proposals are presented, anyone supporting have the opportunity to speak as well as anyone opposed to a proposal. All schools appealing took the opportunity to speak against the final proposal. A yes vote would support the appeal and mean that the non-football releaguing would go back to the Orange County releaguing committee to start over.

There being no further discussion, President Perry moved on to the voting on each proposal.

A. Troy High School Approved SS 655 A

There was a motion and second to approve the appeal of Troy High School. The motion carried 11-8-1.

B. Fullerton Union High School Approved SS 655 B

There was a motion and second to approve the appeal of Fullerton High School. The motion carried 11-8-1.

C. La Habra High School Approved SS 655 C

There was a motion and second to approve the appeal of La Habra High School. The motion carried 11-8-1.

D. Sunny Hills High School Approved SS 655 D

There was a motion and second to approve the appeal of Sunny Hills High School. The motion carried 11-8-1.

E. Sonora High School Approved SS 655 E

There was a motion and second to approve the appeal of Sonora High School. The motion carried 10-9-1.

There was a 10-minute break to reset the room and excuse the guests at 2:33 p.m.

Meeting reconvened at 2:45. Superintendent Representative, Reggie Thompkins had to leave the meeting.

1. Weighted Voting Revision 2023-24 Informational Only 4A1

President-Elect Dr. Paula Hart Rodas presented the weighted voting revisions that are listed in the agenda. This is for your information only based on number of schools. Mr. Perry explained why the voting is done in this manner.

B. SOUTHERN SECTION NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1904 - Non-Action SS 656
Cross County Start Date

President Jim Perry presented the proposed revision to Bylaw 1904 asking for a change in the start date for cross country to move up two weeks. This would move the start of the season from August 31 to August 19 to line up with the rest of the state. This would add two weeks to the season and keep in mind that the SOP date would move up a week as well.

2. Proposed Revision to Bylaws 3519.1-3519.7, 3520.2 - Non-Action SS 657
Competitive Equity Playoffs

President Jim Perry presented the proposal revision of Bylaws 3519.1-3519.7, 3520.2 that would move all team sports to competitive equity playoff divisions based on current season data. Commissioner Mike West went into more detail explaining that football has been doing this for two years. Schools would still qualify from their league and league schools are then ranked based on current year data. A data hub is being created to help with score collection and each sport will have their own ranking system. There will still be room in each division for at large teams however, the new system may eliminate wild card games.

- A. President's Report Jim Perry

Just returned from the NFHS Section 7/8 meeting in Alaska. We are concerned about busses. Alaska has to fly teams around the state to get to games. Had the opportunity to visit many schools over the summer. Highly recommend a visit to Del Sol. Looks like a college campus.

- B. Treasurer's Report Rich Imbriani

Treasurer, Rich Imbriani, presented the treasurer's report and it appears at the end of these minutes.

We are excited to bring Taylor Martinez on board as our Communications Assistant, replacing the recently retired Anita Fopma who was Thom Simmons' partner for over 25 years. We have the hardest working staff, working even when they don't need to, clearing transfers as fast as they can to get the students on the playing field. He is very impressed and happy to be a part of this incredible staff. No one in the country has a TV deal like we do. A lot of passion went into making the TV deal. The Champions for Character Dinner is Monday. Please let us know if you are planning to attend. Also the Athletic Administrator's Summit is October 9. Again let us know if you are coming. This staff is family and we acknowledged the loss of Mitch Carty's father and Sharon Hodge's husband over the past few weeks.

D. Executive Committee Member Reports

Orange County Area Representative, Mary Jane Hibbard commented on the Section 7/8 meeting. She attended a breakout session on mental health and the role of the coaches in the mental health of our student-athletes. Very informative.

President-Elect Dr. Paula Hart Rodas added that the mental health session of the Section 7/8 meeting also emphasized that we need to take care of each other (colleagues, etc.). Ron Nocetti, State CIF Executive Director, did a session about sportsmanship and the STAR incentive, looking at fan behavior and protecting our coaches, athletes, and officials.

Appeal Based on Procedural Violations

1. Bylaws 24.0 and 40.0, mandating that the releaguings proposals must **affect the least amount of member schools** as reasonably possible
2. Bylaw 40.0, mandating that the Principals of **schools requesting relief begin the meeting with a five-minute presentation** that may include their school information and one (1) new 2024-2026 releaguings proposal
3. Bylaw 22.0, mandating that all “Releaguings Proposals must be **written on the Orange County Area Releaguings Proposal Form**”
4. The introductory section of the Releaguings Bylaws also states that “Releaguings Proposals **protocols and procedures will not discriminate against one or more member schools**”
5. Bylaws 23.0 and 40.0, mandating that releaguings proposals must provide **reasonable and equal application of the following three criteria: competitive equity (strength of program), geography (travel time), and enrollment (school population)**



1. Bylaws 24.0 and 40.0

- Mandate that the relegating proposals must **affect the least amount of member schools** as reasonably possible
- The final relegating proposal accepted affected 100% of the Orange County member schools without consent
- Counterproposal affected less while still solving other issues including relief schools and conferences for those that wanted them

IMPACTS:

- Conference creation overshadowed the process
- Schools not requesting relief or to be in a conference affected adversely



2. Bylaw 40.0

- Mandates that the Principals of schools requesting relief begin the meeting with a five-minute presentation
- May 15, 2023 Meeting Agenda and Minutes clearly show this step was neglected

IMPACTS:

- No clear indication of what schools wanted relief or how they advocated obtaining relief
- No indication if they still needed relief after football-only was agreed upon
- Incomplete, incorrect, and unconfirmed information for considering all proposals and counterproposals



3. Bylaw 22.0

- Mandates that all “Releaguining Proposals must be written on the Orange County Area Releaguining Proposal Form”
- Proposals and counter proposals on different forms
- Some forms used a “ranking system” that was unclear as to its origin or authenticity

IMPACTS:

- Incomplete information for considering proposals
- Unclear ranking system caused confusion



4. Bylaw Introduction

- States that “Releaguings Proposals protocols and procedures will not discriminate against one or more member schools”
- Initial meetings called out each of the schools represented here collectively
- Multiple references throughout meetings made about “schools without borders” (i.e. private schools)

IMPACTS:

- Impression given that schools represented here were open to change of placement
- Proposals including “schools without borders” unacceptable to certain conferences/leagues
- Limited proposals that could be agreed upon
- Two leagues broken up to satisfy not having privates



5. Bylaws 23.0 and 40.0

- Mandate that relegating proposals must provide **reasonable and equal application of the three criteria**
- Not included in criteria:
 - Conference creation
 - Keeping private schools out of one's league or conference

IMPACTS:

- Conference creation superseded and limited the process
- Feasibility (finance, facilities, safety, etc.) not considered
- Student academic concerns and learning loss ignored
- Demographics not fully considered

Conclusion

- **We are each appealing the OCAP relegating decision for non-football sports based on procedural shortcomings discussed**
- **It is clear from the process that the focus and priority was placed on:**
 - **Conference creation at any cost**
 - **Keeping “schools without borders” out of one’s respective conference**
- **Instead of focusing on:**
 - **Following procedures outlined in the Bylaws**
 - **Helping only the schools who requested relief**
 - **Affecting the least number of schools possible**
 - **Proper consideration of the three accepted criteria**





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70.B. Composition of the Executive Committee

- (1) Federated Council Officers — President, President-Elect and Past-President; AND
- (2) Six (6) additional members who are representatives of Sections/Allied Organizations with no more than one (1) member representing the group of Allied Organizations; AND
- (3) Four (4) at-large representatives who are directly accountable to, or a voting member of, a local board of education or school(s) governing body shall be selected in an effort to reflect both gender and ethnic representation of the state's student population.

C. Limitations of Membership on the Executive Committee

- (1) No Section shall have more than one (1) member eligible to be elected to the Executive Committee unless another committee member from the Section is an officer or at-large representative.
- (2) The group of Allied Organizations shall have no more than one (1) member eligible to be elected to the Executive Committee unless another Allied Organization representative is an officer or at-large representative on the Executive Committee.
- (3) No Section may have more than one (1) representative serving as an officer at any one time.
[See Article 7-70.G.(2)] for exception.
- (4) Only one (1) person from the group of Allied Organizations may serve as an officer at any one (1) time.

D. Terms of Office

- (1) The President-Elect will serve two (2) years before assuming the presidency. The President-Elect shall assume the office of President immediately following service in the office of President-Elect.
(Revised May 2002 Federated Council)
- (2) The President shall serve a two (2)-year term.
- (3) The Past-President shall serve a two (2)-year term immediately following service as President.
- (4) Other Executive Committee members shall be elected annually by the Federated Council to serve a two (2)-year term. An Executive Committee member may serve for two (2) consecutive terms of two (2) years each.
- (5) If there is a break of one (1) year in the service of an Executive Committee member, as a member of the committee, that member may be eligible for nomination, election and service for one (1) additional term of office as an Executive Committee member but no one shall be eligible to serve more than a total of six (6) years. on the committee.
- (6) Four (4) at-large representatives, in an effort to reflect both gender and ethnic representation of the state's student population, shall be appointed for a two (2)-year term. (See Note after G. below)
- (7) If in the second year of their term, an elected [see 70.B.(2)] Executive Committee member ceases to be a representative of their Section to the Federated Council, that Executive Committee member may remain as an additional representative of their Section until the end of that representative's prescribed term.
(Approved February 2022 Federated Council)

E. Nominations

- (1) Each year, the President shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of at least five (5) members. Members of the Nominating Committee shall be selected from among the Federated Council and may include no more than two (2) current members of the Executive Committee.
- (2) The Executive Director and the President shall be ex-officio members of the Nominating Committee.
- (3) Nominations for the Executive Committee shall be presented to the Federated Council at the meeting prior to the election.
- (4) Nominations for President-Elect will occur in even numbered years.
- (5) Each person nominated for an officer or other elected [see 70.B.(2)] Executive Committee seat must be a current member of the Federated Council at the time of nomination and election.
- (6) The Nominating Committee will name at least five (5) candidates for two (2)-year terms for the Executive Committee and at least two (2) candidates for President-Elect.
(Approved January 2020 Federated Council/Approved February 2022 Federated Council)
- (7) Nominations will also be accepted from the floor at the Federated Council meeting whereupon nominations are presented.
- (8) Nominations for the four (4) at-large representatives will be made by Executive Staff, in consultation with Sections and Allied Organizations, after the election of Executive Committee members. The Executive Committee, at its June meeting, will select four (4) candidates from among those nominations to serve as at-large representatives.



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F. **Elections**

- (1) Elections will occur at the final meeting of the year of the Federated Council.
- (2) Elections for Executive Committee members, other than officers and the four (4) at-large committee members, will be held annually.
(Approved January 2020 Federated Council)
- (3) Should a second candidate be nominated from any Section or the group of Allied Organizations, only the candidate with the most votes (more votes) from that Section/or group is eligible for election.
- (4) The nominees who receive the most votes, from among those eligible for election, will be elected.
- (5) In the event of a tie between/among candidates whereby there is only one (1) seat available and/or remaining, a revote for the remaining position will take place only between/among the candidates that are tied.
- (6) In the event there is still a tie vote after the first revote, one (1) more vote will take place and if the tie is not broken, a flip of a coin will determine the winner.

Summary: The council will discuss proposed amendments to the Bylaw which would require schools to postpone or cancel practices and/or competitions due to extreme heat. The changes to the heat illness protocol are due in part to the new requirements of California state law (AB 1653 - Sanchez).

Fiscal Impact: Member schools may incur costs to purchase a Wet Bulb Globe Temperature device and/or additional body temperature cooling mechanisms.

Background: When State statutes are added and/or amended, the CIF has developed corresponding Bylaws to ensure that its member schools are aware of the legislation and comply with its requirements.

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503.K. Heat Illness/**Air Quality Index Protocol**

(1) **Heat Illness**

- a. A student-athlete who exhibits signs of heat illness while participating in, or immediately following, an athletic activity must be removed immediately from participating in a practice or game for the remainder of the day. A student-athlete who has been removed from play after displaying signs and symptoms associated with heat illness may not return to play until the athlete is evaluated by a licensed health care provider and receives written clearance to return to play from that health care provider. On a yearly basis, a Heat Illness information sheet shall be signed and returned by all athletes and the athlete's parent(s)/guardian(s)/caregiver before the athlete's initial practice or competition.
- b. **All CIF member schools must adhere to the CIF Heat Illness Prevention and Heat Acclimatization Policies (see pages - TBD).**

HEAT ILLNESS PREVENTION POLICY FOR THE CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION

As per CA State Law AB 1653 and CIF Bylaw 503 K.1. - Heat Illness Protocol, all CIF member schools must adhere to the CIF Heat Illness Prevention Policy as outlined below.

Extreme Heat Procedures:

The WetBulb Globe Temperature (WBGT) is a measure of the heat stress in direct sunlight, which takes into account: temperature, humidity, wind speed, sun angle, and cloud cover (solar radiation). This differs from the Heat Index, which takes into consideration temperature and humidity and is calculated for shady areas. The WBGT is especially valuable in environments where people are physically active, such as sports, as it provides a better assessment of the risk of heat-related conditions during physical exertion. The CIF requires that schools use the WBGT for the most accurate measurement.

Depending on your Category Region (see map below), it is mandated for the benefit of the health and safety of our student-athletes that practice/games be canceled, or delayed until cooler when WBGT exceeds these levels:


- Region Category 1 >86.2°F
- Region Category 2 >89.9°F
- Region Category 3 >92.0°F

Based on the following map, schools should select the category that best fits their region to follow the required guidelines shown below.

The majority of states fall under just one category or two at the most. However, due to its diverse climate across the state, California encompasses all three categories: light gray - Category 1 / medium gray - Category 2 / dark gray - Category 3. (See image below).

CIF Fall Outdoor Sports Acclimatization Policy

Given the extreme heat issues typically experienced at the start of the Fall sports season, heat acclimatization is crucial for high school athletes to help them adapt to hot weather conditions and reduce the risk of heat-related illnesses. The following is a four-step plan for heat acclimatization in outdoor high school sports:

1. Gradual Increase in Activity:

- Start with light workouts in cooler conditions to prepare athletes for increased heat exposure.
- Gradually increase the intensity and duration of practice sessions over 10-14 days.

2. Hydration Education:

- Teach athletes the importance of staying hydrated and recognizing signs of dehydration.
- Encourage regular water breaks during practice and games and always provide access to water.

3. Modify Practice Schedules:

- Schedule outdoor practices during cooler times, like early morning or late evening.
- Allow frequent breaks and shade to help athletes cool down and recover.

4. Monitor Athlete Health:

- Educate coaches, trainers, and athletes on the signs of heat-related illnesses (heat exhaustion and heat stroke).
- The school will have available a method to institute whole-body cooling to treat a student-athlete with exertional heat illness, especially heat stroke (e.g., ice tub, “taco tarp”, ice towels) which is easily accessible at all practice and contest venues.

Safety should always be the top priority when acclimating high school athletes to hot weather conditions. This plan helps athletes adapt while minimizing the risk of heat-related issues.

For All Outdoor Fall Sports:

Five-Day Acclimatization Period. Preseason practice shall begin with a five-day acclimatization period for all fall outdoor student-athletes. All fall outdoor student-athletes, including those who arrive at preseason practice after the first day of practice, are required to undergo a five-day acclimatization period. The five-day acclimatization period shall be conducted as follows:

- (a) Participants shall not engage in more than one on-field practice per day during the five-day acclimatization period. On-field practices shall last no longer than two hours.

For Football Only

- (b) During the first three days of practice or testing activity, helmets shall be the only protective equipment student-athletes may wear. During the next two days of practice or testing activity, helmets, and shoulder pads shall be the only protective equipment student-athletes may wear. Student-athletes may practice in full pads on the sixth day of practice or testing activity.

Summary: The council will discuss the proposed addition of this Bylaw which would require schools to postpone or cancel practices and/or competitions due to an unhealthy air quality level of 151 or higher.

Fiscal Impact: The only fiscal impact would be if schools choose to purchase an Air Quality Index measurement device for their campus. This is not a requirement for this Bylaw.

Background: Even healthy athletes are at increased risk for inhaling pollutants in the air. Physical activity increases ventilation and the number of pollutants that are inhaled is increased compared to periods of rest. These risks are increased if an athlete has a pre-existing medical condition such as asthma or a cardiac condition.



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503.K.(2) Air Quality Index Protocol

- a. All CIF member schools must refrain from outdoor practice and/or competition when the Air Quality Index is 151 or higher. Schools may use readings for their local area obtained through www.airnow.gov or a measurement device located outdoors on their physical campus.

Q: One of my student-athletes sometimes experiences leg cramps during practices and/or games but then they go away with rest and stretching. Do I have to hold her out from the rest of that practice or game? Does she need to see her physician before she can return to play?

A: Muscle cramps may be an early sign of heat illness and can be evaluated and managed with rest, stretching and oral fluids including electrolyte drinks. If the cramps are not associated with any other signs and symptoms of heat illness and resolved promptly, then the athlete could return to practice or competition and would not require clearance from a licensed healthcare provider. BUT, if any signs and symptoms of heat illness exist alongside heat cramps, then yes, she would need to be cleared by her physician before returning to play. AND, if she continues to experience recurrent muscle cramps, have her see your school's athletic trainer who can evaluate further. If there's no athletic trainer available at your school, your athlete should get a medical evaluation from her physician. Q: Is there more information available about precautions related to Air Quality Index (AQI)?

A: Yes. Go to the Sports Medicine – Air Quality page at www.cifstate.org for other resources and best practices related to AQI.

Q: What is meant by licensed health care provider?

A: The scope of practice for licensed health care providers and medical professionals is defined by California state statutes. This scope of practice will limit the evaluation to a medical doctor (MD) or doctor of osteopathy (DO).

Q: May nurse practitioners (NP) or physician assistants (PA) provide written clearance to return to play?

A: Yes, a nurse practitioner (NP) or physician assistant (PA) working under the direct supervision of a medical doctor (MD) or doctor of osteopathy (DO) may provide clearance for return to play. (Editorial May 2020)

Summary: The council will discuss proposed amendments to the Bylaw which would require schools to review and rehearse their Emergency Action Plans due to the new requirements of California state law (AB 245 - McKinnor). Other amendments related to requirements of the EAP and the location of an AED are detailed in the proposed Bylaw amendment.

Fiscal Impact: It may be necessary for schools to purchase an additional AED or AEDs to meet device location requirements.

Background: When State statutes are added and/or amended, the CIF has developed corresponding Bylaws to ensure that its member schools are aware of the legislation and comply with its requirements.

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503.L. Emergency Action Plans and AED Protocols

- (1) A school shall ensure that there is a **venue specific** written ~~athletic~~ emergency action plan (**EAP**) for athletics in place that describes the ~~locations and procedures to be followed~~ **steps to be taken** in the event of ~~Sudden Cardiac Arrest and other medical emergencies related to the athletic program's activities or events~~ an emergency **related to sudden cardiac arrest and other medical emergencies, including concussion and heat illness**. The school's EAP shall (should) be reviewed annually by pertinent school staff and local EMS providers and be distributed to all athletic department members and healthcare professionals who will provide medical coverage during games, practices, or other events. Each school team (coaches, players, athletic director, etc.) shall rehearse the EAP at least once per season.
- (2) Each school's emergency action plan (EAP) shall:
 - a. list and provide the location of all on-site emergency equipment that may be needed in an emergency situation
 - b. identify personnel and their responsibilities to carry out the plan of action
 - c. include appropriate contact information for EMS
 - d. specify documentation actions that need to be taken post emergency
- (3) The school shall have at least one automated external defibrillator (AED) for the purpose of rendering emergency care or treatment. **The AED(s) should be available for use at each athletic venue within three (3) minutes of a Sudden Cardiac Arrest**. The school shall ensure that the AED(s) are available to **certified** athletic trainers, **healthcare professionals**, coaches and authorized personnel at these activities or events.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Staff is proposing replacing the current regional invitational with the implementation of a CIF Traditional Competitive Cheer State Championship to begin in the 2024-2025 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timeline for implementation of new events for consideration. This championship event is proposed as a two-day event (based on registration numbers) held in late January.

Fiscal Impact: The staff has conducted a review of regional traditional competitive cheer events and calculated the budget estimates for State Championship events. This information is included in this proposal (Page 2, #4).

Background: State CIF does not currently have a state championship in Traditional Competitive Cheer. This event would bring teams from all over California to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section championships. It's another opportunity for boys and girls to have "state" level competition in the sport of Traditional Competitive Cheer as other sports currently do (Swim and Dive, Wrestling, Cross Country, etc). The event would allow traditional competitive cheer teams an opportunity to compete at the State level.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Staff is proposing the implementation of a CIF State Boys Volleyball Championship to begin in the 2024-2025 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timeline for implementation of new events for consideration.

Fiscal Impact: The staff has conducted a review of regional boys volleyball events and calculated the budget estimates for State Championship events. This information is included in this proposal (Page 2, #4).

Background: The CIF does not currently have a state championship in Boys Volleyball. This event would bring the top teams from each region to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section and regional championships. It's another opportunity for boys to have state level competition in the sport of volleyball as currently afforded to many other CIF sports participants. This championship event is proposed as a one-day event held one week after the Regional Championship.

- b. **Renewal Applications**
- (i) All renewal applications must be submitted to the CIF State Office by May 31 of the current school year to continue multi-school status for the following year.
 - (ii) All fees for multi-school dues will be reflected on the invoice sent from the CIF State Office for the school's annual school dues and legal assessment.
 - (iii) Any late applications will be assessed a late fee of \$200; the fee must be attached or the application will not be considered. If an application for renewal is not received by September 1 of the current school year, the school must also submit a statement as to the reason for the late application. This statement must accompany the late application. **All late applications must be received by the CIF State Office by the last Friday in September to be considered for that school year.**

3. An earlier start date will not impact the End of Competition date (Bylaw 1906) for Southern Section teams.

5. Expanded season will allow early meets to be distributed over 3 weekends instead of only one. In 2022 there were 10 meets in the CIF Southern Section the first weekend of competition.

6. Expanded season will allow schools more meet choices early in the season as well as allow programs to adjust training which will be more beneficial for each individual program.
7. Many high schools start school earlier now either the 2nd or 3rd week of August.
8. An earlier start could open the possibility of prelims/finals a week earlier, so CIF Southern Section could get a week off between Finals and/or State.

~~3519.1 Individual~~ Schools will be evaluated and placed into divisions on a yearly basis for the sports listed above utilizing a formula based entirely on current regular season results. Final rankings and divisional placements will be determined and released at the end of the current regular season. Seeding in each division will follow the final rankings, regardless of league affiliation or league finish. For example, in a sixteen-team bracket, the #1 seed, determined by the final rankings for that division, will play #16, the #2 seed will play #15, etc. The higher seeded team will host the first-round contest and then CIF Southern Section Bylaw 3504, Host Team After the First Round, will be followed for all subsequent contests. which includes the following factors: regular season record, strength of schedule and Southern Section playoff performance over a two-year period. (For example, in Baseball and Softball, the data from the 2019 and 2020 seasons will be used to formulate divisions for the 2021 season. After the 2020 season is concluded, the data from the 2019 season will be removed and the data from the 2020 and 2021 seasons will be used to formulate divisions for the 2022 season.) ~~3519.2~~ Once individual school power rankings for each sport are completed, after the conclusion of each sport season, playoff divisions will be created. Playoff divisions will be published in the Sport Preview for each sport, along with an explanation of the formula utilized in creating playoff divisions for that sport.

~~3519.3—2~~ It is MANDATORY that all Southern Section member schools enter the results of ALL regular season contests and Southern Section playoff contests into the CIFSSHome system immediately following each game. (www.cifsshhome.org) within 2 weeks of your team's last contest

~~3519.4—3~~ Member schools who fail to accurately enter full and complete regular season results and/or Southern Section playoff results into the CIFSSHome system, in any of the sports listed above, will not be placed into a playoff division for the upcoming season and will be ineligible to participate in the Southern Section Championships in that sport for that year.
