### **WHY ONLY “8” - 1983 State Wrestling Tournament**

The first California State Wrestling Championship was held in 1973 with twenty-four (24) wrestlers in each bracket representing the ten different Sections of the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF). In 1983 there were only eight (8) *wrestlers* in each bracket who were able to qualify for the finals at Selland Arena in Bakersfield. What happened?

#### **WHY?**

The new format was voted upon by the CIF Federated Council with the belief that competition would now allow for more local control and more spectators to follow their athletes. The finals would be only one day cutting down on school expenses and interestingly, “some capable but not State Meet quality athletes would not qualify because of the weakness of wrestling in that particular section.” This move applied also to track, volleyball, basketball and wrestling. The State was divided into two areas... the Northern and Southern Regions. State qualifying wrestling tournaments were held at Cal State Hayward and Mira Mesa High School in the South.

*The wrestling community was opposed and outraged by this move.* The coaches were never included in this decision, nor any other wrestling officials consulted in either the Northern or the Southern areas. The coaches in the South were very vocal as their area contained almost 70% of the high school wrestlers in the State. *Fortunately,* the Federated Council of the CIF realized they made a serious mistake and the following year (1984) returned to the normal format. One very positive outcome from this “chaos” was the establishment of *Sport Advisory Committees* to better inform the Federated Council of the nuances of each sport.



The C.I.F. Federated Council voted in June, 1981, to stage Northern and Southern California C.I.F. Championships in track, wrestling, volleyball and basketball.

The basketball and volleyball NorCal Championships were implemented in the past season while the NorCal wrestling and track event was delayed pending the format proposal that the Federated Council approved in early May.

"This new format will keep competition local as long as possible and allow for more spectators to follow their local athletes," North Coast Section Commissioner Paul Gaddini said. "It amounts to having the trials of the State Meet held in the NorCal area, with the added benefit of a Northern California Championship title."

Such a title is more prestigious from a competitive standpoint than are the state championships of 44 states in the nation. NorCal champions come from a pool of 479 schools and 464,263 students — numbers that only Illinois, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas surpass. Iowa, Minnesota and Missouri are comprised of more schools than the NorCal championship area, but their enrollment figures are in some cases half of NorCal's size.

In the past, section qualifiers in both wrestling and track went straight to the two-day State Meet. In track, that meant 27 entries per event with 108 athletes in-

involved in each relay race. Since transportation costs were borne by the schools, it was a costly financial burden for schools to handle — particularly those schools which had thoroughly tapped their community resources at the beginning of the athletic budget year.

"By the very nature of the proximity of the schools, it will now cost less to send athletes on," Gaddini said. "It will also limit the State Meet to the truly outstanding competitor. It makes the State Meet in track a one-day, finals only meet. All the competitors will be capable of participating at that level and it will give the spectators and the media a chance to focus on the eight or nine preps in each event or weight class."

Under the old format, Gaddini noted that "some capable but not State Meet quality athletes would qualify because of the weakness of an event in that particular section."

This year, section qualifiers from wrestling advanced to the NorCal Championships at Cal State Hayward while qualifiers from track will move on to the May 27-28 NorCal meet at Edwards Stadium on the University of California-Berkeley campus.

The four top finishers in each weight class or event advance to the State Meet. If the State Meet in track is on a nine-lane oval, the extra qualifier will come from the more densely populated Southern California area.

### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the Minutes of the February 6-7, 1981 Federated Council meeting as printed and distributed to all schools.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS

#### CIF ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

John Sanders, CIF president, reported on the meeting of the CIF Administrative Committee held with the State Department of Education on May 19, 1981. He reviewed the status of the five recommendations of the State Department of Education taken from the Athletic Study Committee for implementation by the State CIF.

It was moved, seconded and carried by two-thirds vote to amend Article 3 of the State CIF Constitution to add the following as voting representatives to the State CIF Federated Council: one representative from the California School Boards Association, one from the Association of California School Administrators, one from the California Superintendents Liaison Committee, each of the above representatives to have one vote. In addition, two representatives (one male and one female) from the

State Athletic Directors Association with one vote. The California Coaches Association vote be split between a female representative and a male representative.

The Federated Council took action to consider an addition to the Federated Council of a representative of the California Association of Private School Organizations. The Federated Council will vote on this proposed Constitutional amendment at the October meeting of the Federated Council.

### CIF SECTION COMMISSIONERS

Jim Cheffers, chairperson, reported on the Commissioners' meetings held June 4 and 5, 1981.

Larry Rice, chairperson of the Commissioners' Competition Committee reviewed certain recommendations of the commissioners regarding modifications of State CIF By-Laws. It was moved, seconded and carried to amend By-Laws 701, 702 and 703 to read as follows:

701. All competition in CIF approved sports involving four or more schools from more than one league requires sanction approval in the manner and form approved by the State CIF Office.
702. All interstate competition in CIF approved sports requires sanction and approval in the form required by the State CIF Office.
703. All interstate competition in CIF approved sports involving 500 miles or more one way requires sanction approval in the manner and form required by the State CIF Office and Board of Education.
  - (a) A school may take only one such trip each year.
  - (b) "One trip" could include more than one sport if it is in the same official season of the sport. Application must be filed with the State CIF Office at least six months prior to the event.

It was moved, seconded and carried to delete the following By-Laws in their entirety: 1402, 1403, 1404, 1405, 1406, 1408, 1410, 1411, 1501 and 1600 (d).

It was moved, seconded and carried to refer to the CIF Sections, for consideration at the October meeting, the deletion of the following By-Laws: 804, 1307, 1400, 1401, 1500 and 1602.

It was moved, seconded and carried to refer the following proposed amendment to By-Law 1700 to the Sections for consideration at the October meeting:

1700. The National Federation Basketball Rules shall be modified for girls basketball to require the use of a 30-second clock and elimination of back court and lack of sufficient action rules.

Delete remainder of current wording of By-Law.

It was moved, seconded and carried to refer the following recommendations back to the Sections for consideration at the October Federated Council meeting:

1. State tournaments in track, volleyball and wrestling should be preceded by regional tournaments beginning in 1982-83.
2. A multiple classification of schools should be established in state and regional championship events involving team sports.
3. Golf be eliminated as a state play-off activity for boys and girls, with the regional concept to remain in effect.



# NCS commissioner Gaddini leaves an exemplary legacy

Longtime North Coast Section commissioner Paul Gaddini announced his retirement at the recent spring meeting of the section's board of managers, ending an illustrious 28 years at the helm.

"Two-and-a-half years ago I was making plans for retirement and I felt there were still some young years in front of me to enjoy some personal things I would like to do," said Gaddini, who became commissioner in 1972 at the age of 32 after a stint as commissioner of the Catholic Athletic League.

Gaddini was the youngest section commissioner ever when he succeeded Phil Hempler.

Gaddini, 60, began his coaching career at St. Mary's High of Berkeley, where from 1964-66 he was track coach and football assistant coach. He took over as track coach at Salesian of Richmond in 1967. During tenures at the two schools, he served as director of athletics for the Oakland CYO, where he began learning the ropes as an administrator.

"He never backed away from what he thought was right," said former Castro Valley School District superintendent Bob Hagler.

"The job has changed so much," Gaddini said. "I was young enough to be invaluable. If I was 32 now I would not get past the paperwork."

Gaddini had the best interest of the student-athlete in mind in 1978 when he realigned the section's leagues to make competition among schools more equitable. The face lift saw the end of the Catholic Athletic League as parochial schools joined the public-school leagues.

"He dedicated himself to the kids with the vision to focus education with athletics," former De Anza principal and former El Cerrito football coach John Nules said. "When Paul became commissioner we became the 'young rebels' whenever the NCS proposed some new ideas. Now those proposals are used as models throughout the state."

Gaddini's innovations included applications for participation in playoffs, at-large playoff berths, site coordinators and athletic trainers at host schools and certification of officials. &lt;

## CIF Changes In Post Season **Wrestling**

The California Interscholastic Federation announced changes in this year's road to the **State Wrestling** Championships

For the first time CIF Northern and Southern Championships will be held March 4-5, leading to the **State** CIF Championships on March 12. The Sac-Joaquin Section, which Napa and Vintage are members of, will qualify four individuals from each weight class to the CIF Northern Championships at Cal **State** University, Hayward, with the top four finishers advancing to the CIF **State** Meet at **Selland Arena** in Fresno.

The CIF Northern Championships will be conducted with section representatives from the Central Coast, North Coast, Northern, Oakland, San Francisco and Sac-Joaquin.

In order for Napa and Vintage wrestlers to reach the CIF they must get past MFL, Sac-Joaquin Sub Section and Section tournaments successfully.

**THE CALIFORNIA Interscholastic Federation** has changed the format of post-season tournaments, much to the chagrin of coaches and wrestlers. Instead of three wrestlers in each division from the Sac-Joaquin Section qualifying for the state meet, a north and south regional tournament will pare the field of each section's top wrestlers.

Sixteen wrestlers will vie at each regional for four berths at the state meet, thus cutting the state field in half. Last year, 16 grapplers in each division competed at the state meet.

Area coaches opposed the change, saying it would hurt the sport and extend the season a week. Administrators who pushed for the change cited saving money as a reason.

The road to the state meet becomes longer and more arduous.

For **wrestling**, the new Southern Regional concept will begin March 4-5 at Mira Mesa High School in San Diego, with 16 entries battling for four spots to the **state** finals, which will be a one-day affair on Saturday, March 12, at **Selland Arena** in Fresno.

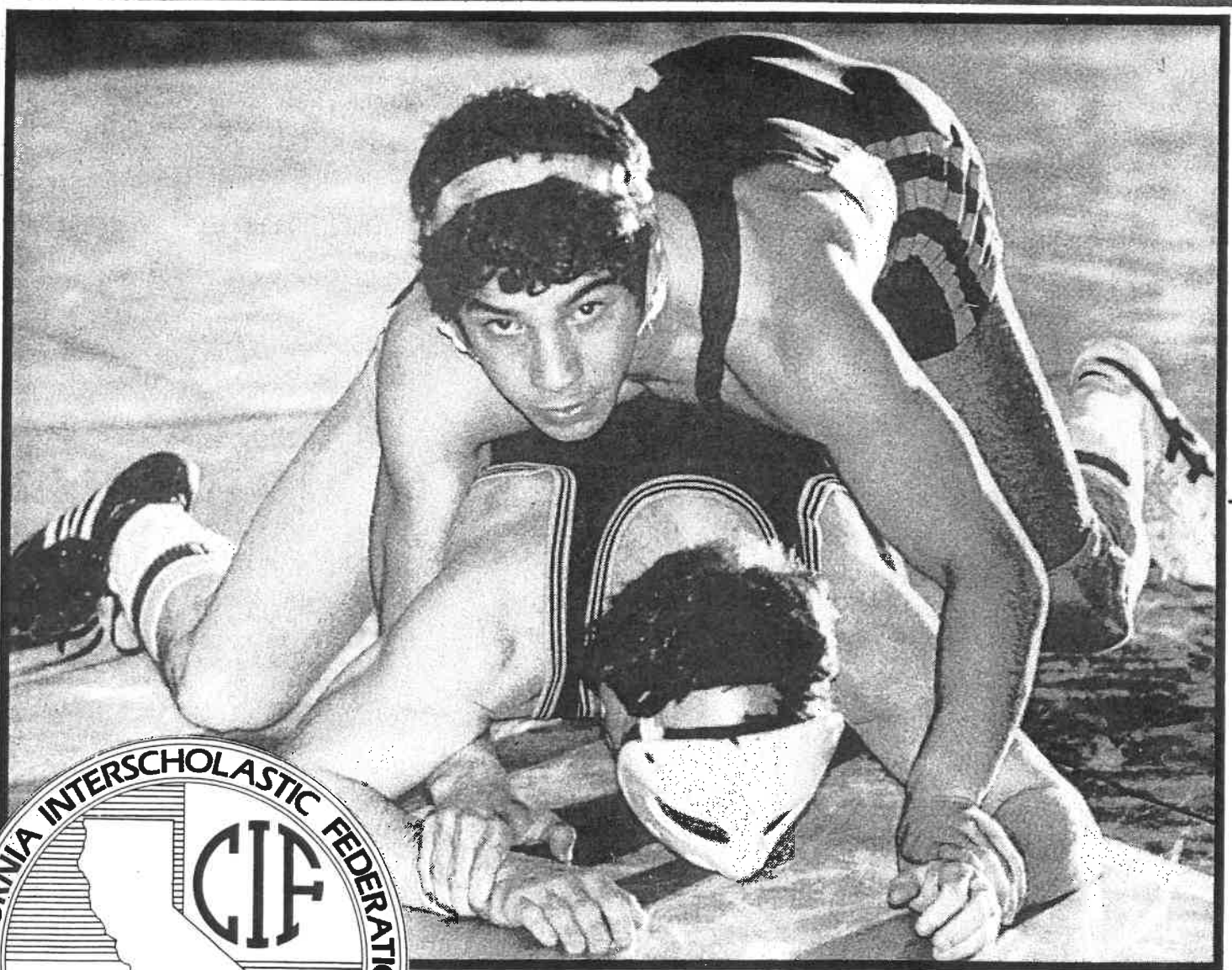
For both basketball and **wrestling**, the following CIF sections will be involved in the Southern Regionals: Los Angeles, San Diego, Central and Southern.

## Welcome

## THE CIF: Doing the Job for Prep Sports Since 1914

In 1914, as high school athletic teams began crossing district lines to compete with neighboring schools, the CIF was established to provide consistency in sports rules and a safe, rewarding environment for young California athletes. Since that beginning, with fewer than 20,000 athletes, the organization has grown to become the largest youth agency in the state, serving over 320,000 young student-athletes each year.

During dynamic growth years, the CIF saw participation in high school sports double (for both boys and girls) between 1965-1975, and, although since 1978 some leveling-off has occurred in numbers of students participating, indications are that such a trend is due more to a lack of available school programs rather than to a lack of interest or desire on the students' part.

Athletic programs conducted in all 1200 secondary-schools in the state do not exist simply because students desire to participate in sports. The CIF utilizes the volunteer services of over 10,000 persons who are charged with the task of ensuring effective athletic programs for all of the public, private, and parochial high schools of the state.

As a result of effective planning, sound program administration, and a determination to support the philosophy that all student-athletes in our state should be provided with equal participation opportunities, the CIF has propelled California into uncontested leadership in the nurturing of outstanding athletes. Former and current California high school athletes hold more national records than do students from any other state — and our youngsters continue to be highly recruited by top-notch universities across the country. Many of the names are legend — Amy Alcott, Rick Monday, Bill Walton, Pat Haden, John McKay, Scott McGregor, Ron Cuccia, Jill Sterkel, Sherri Howard; all former CIF athletes, all outstanding men and women of whom Californians can be proud.

Although the CIF has been serving California youth for nearly 70 years and can boast of having over four million "alumni," many are unaware of the diversity of CIF administrative responsibility. Day-to-day activities of the CIF state office in Fullerton include enforcing regulations, establishing state calendars of events, arranging and supervising state championships in four sports, maintaining individual and team sports records, providing publicity to the media, publishing the *State News*, and maintaining legal and insurance services which ensure the very existence of prep sports. In addition, 10 section commissioners throughout the state maintain full-time schedules to ensure that prep athletic events in their areas are operated effectively, safely, and consistently.

The support of the California public has been responsible for the success and expansion of California athletic programs for 68 years. With the continued cooperation and dedication of school superintendents, principals, and athletic directors, as well as the keen interest of over one-half million students and their families each year, the future of prep sports would appear to be bright and healthy. The CIF urges you to lend your support to our young student-athletes by attending high school sporting events in your community on a regular basis. The CIF welcomes you to this championship event; a showcase of some of our finest young California athletes — our nation's future leaders.

# Building a winner

## How some coaches do it every year

Of all so-called "individual" high school sports, wrestling may be the most "individual." Any wrestler, any coach, any wrestling parent can inform you of the introspection, sacrifice and self-motivation involved in the sport.

Yet as any other prep sport, wrestling is conducted on a team basis, and again like any other, there are certain teams which are successful year after year, and others which struggle.

Just how is a group of individuals molded into a superb wrestling team?

It starts, of course, with solid coaching. It's no coincidence that some coaches have been able to build programs from the ground up into powerhouses not once, but twice.

Just as obviously, talent is a major factor. Upsets are much rarer in wrestling than in most other sports. A good wrestler will beat a mediocre one not 90 percent of the time, but 100.

Then, there's the special ingredient that separates raw talent from possible greatness.

"Probably the first thing a (coach) needs is he has to get kids out that are dedicated to the program," says Bill Smith, one of a few Northern California coaches who turned two different high schools — first Pacifica in West Pittsburg, then Clayton Valley in Concord — into wrestling powers. "I've seen coaches get kids who are very talented athletes, but they're not dedicated enough. You gotta weed those kids out and bring kids in who want to dedicate themselves, even if they're not quite as talented. In wrestling, it's too easy for guys to quit. They start rationalizing and come up with more reasons to quit.

"A lot of people say it takes a nut to stay out for wrestling. In a lot of ways that's true. You not only have to stay in tremendous shape, but you have to maintain good body weight."

Tradition and community interest have become important factors as well. Successful wrestling programs self-perpetuate partly because of the recognition they receive.

"The first thing is to get dignity," says Steve Sanchez, now in his second year at Antioch High School — where he graduated from 17 years ago — after nine exceptional years at Merced High. "You have to have a place where you work out all the time. That's what we had in Merced and we're trying to get here (at Antioch).

You gotta get the numbers out by drawing interest."

Sanchez received plenty of interest right from the beginning at Merced. In his first season, Merced — riding the shoulders of two eventual state place-winners — won the Central Section championship and finished in the top five at the first CIF State Championship. The team went on to take the 1980 state title and place in the top 10 in seven of Sanchez' nine years, while Sanchez produced nine individual state champions, more than any other

coach in California.

"They had a good coach (before)," recalled Sanchez. "He'd been there about four years. When he got there, it was nothing. He'd just started getting things going, then he left. The kids that stuck with me were good kids; they were wrestlers.

"What got us going was that (first) state tournament. We hit that just perfect. We did well in that tournament, and everything just fell into place after that."

Now, Sanchez is trying to accomplish the same thing at his alma mater, and it appears he soon will. After finishing second in the Diablo Valley Athletic League dual meet race, Antioch recently upset perennial champion Clayton Valley in the league meet and is regarded as a future North Coast Section power.

Sanchez' accomplishments at Merced and Antioch can be attributed partly to something which is becoming more and more a sign of the future in high school wrestling — local clubs. More often than not, wrestlers on the top teams in Northern California have learned their sport in places such as the Golden State Wrestling Club, which Sanchez helps run in Antioch.

Like Sanchez, Monterey High School coach Bill Grant — whose team won the Central Coast Section championship last year — has built two programs with the aid of local clubs, and both enjoyed success. He coached for four years at Oakland High, then accepted a job as special education instructor and wrestling coach at Monterey.

While in Oakland, Grant and Oakland Technical High coach Ashley Sherman started a city-wide freestyle club largely funded by the Oakland Police Department. The club gave Oakland kids a chance to travel to competitive meets, and paid off for the Oakland High program as well with a fourth-place finish in the 1976 state meet.

"I would attribute that to the experience the kids got in the club," says Grant. "We took a lot of kids down to the national 'open' tournament. The kids got a lot of exposure and they got to be very tough. The state meet was kind of a highlight for us."

Undoubtedly the best club in Northern California in recent years was the Sacramento Superstars, run by veteran Bella Vista High coach Charles Lee. The Superstars consisted of a maximum of 20 of the best age group wrestlers in the Sacramento area, and selected those 20 in extensive tryouts. The Superstars traveled to highly competitive tournaments all over the country and abroad as well.

"The aim of the Superstars was to

be a world schoolboy champion," says Lee, now in his 21st year at Bella Vista. "It was probably the best kids' club in the United States in many, many years."

Not surprisingly, Lee's Bella Vista program benefited from the existence of the club. Bella Vista is an annual contender for the state title and placed second at the state meet in each of the last two years.

Unfortunately, the Sacramento Superstars passed into history after seven years, mainly from lack of parental interest once their kids had grown out of the program. There is now a more informal club of some 25 participants in the state capital.

In any form, it appears that in the future the presence of wrestling clubs may mark the difference between high school programs which enjoy long-term success and those which just do their best to field a competitive team.

It also appears that because of school budget cuts, prep wrestling programs are going to have to least partially pay their own way. Some are already doing that.

"We try to use the community as a resource," says Monterey's Grant. "We have a big calamari feed each year, we have demonstrations at Rotary and Kiwanis (clubs) and we started a clinic in November to start the

season; we try to get different college and well-known coaches to come (Antioch's Sanchez was a visitor last year). We got volunteers from the Naval Postgraduate School in Fort Ord to come and work with the kids. We have a parents' group that's having a rummage sale. These things help pay for kids to go to wrestling camp."

"Some people say wrestling is dying, but I don't think that," says Sanchez. "What's happening is we're getting a split. Some schools have a lot

of money and clubs behind them, and they're better than they've ever been, and others have just their high school programs. You've got (schools) with nine-month programs and some with three-month programs."

However long the season lasts, most successful coaches follow the same philosophy once they reach the practice mat.

"You worry about *how* you wrestle," says Sanchez. "Not so much whether you win, but how you go about it. Wrestling is a sport of skill, not horsepower. You don't want kids to carry that heavy burden of winning and losing."

After all, the individual is what wrestling is all about.

## Whys of NorCal meet

The C.I.F. Federated Council voted in June, 1981, to stage Northern and Southern California C.I.F. Championships in track, wrestling, volleyball and basketball.

The basketball and volleyball NorCal Championships were implemented in the past season while the NorCal wrestling and track event was delayed pending the format proposal that the Federated Council approved in early May.

"This new format will keep competition local as long as possible and allow for more spectators to follow their local athletes," North Coast Section Commissioner Paul Gaddini said. "It amounts to having the trials of the State Meet held in the NorCal area, with the added benefit of a Northern California Championship title."

Such a title is more prestigious from a competitive standpoint than are the state championships of 44 states in the nation. NorCal champions come from a pool of 479 schools and 464,263 students — numbers that only Illinois, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas surpass. Iowa, Minnesota and Missouri are comprised of more schools than the NorCal championship area, but their enrollment figures are in some cases half of NorCal's size.

In the past, section qualifiers in both wrestling and track went straight to the two-day State Meet. In track, that meant 27 entries per event with 108 athletes in-

involved in each relay race. Since transportation costs were borne by the schools, it was a costly financial burden for schools to handle — particularly those schools which had thoroughly tapped their community resources at the beginning of the athletic budget year.

"By the very nature of the proximity of the schools, it will now cost less to send athletes on," Gaddini said. "It will also limit the State Meet to the truly outstanding competitor. It makes the State Meet in track a one-day, finals only meet. All the competitors will be capable of participating at that level and it will give the spectators and the media a chance to focus on the eight or nine preps in each event or weight class."

Under the old format, Gaddini noted that "some capable but not State Meet quality athletes would qualify because of the weakness of an event in that particular section."

This year, section qualifiers from wrestling advanced to the NorCal Championships at Cal State Hayward while qualifiers from track will move on to the May 27-28 NorCal meet at Edwards Stadium on the University of California-Berkeley campus.

The four top finishers in each weight class or event advance to the State Meet. If the State Meet in track is on a nine-lane oval, the extra qualifier will come from the more densely populated Southern California area.

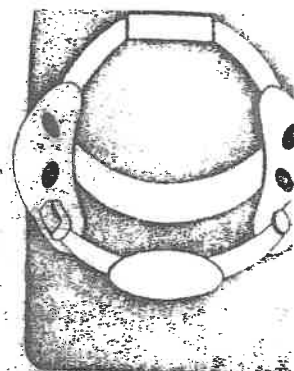

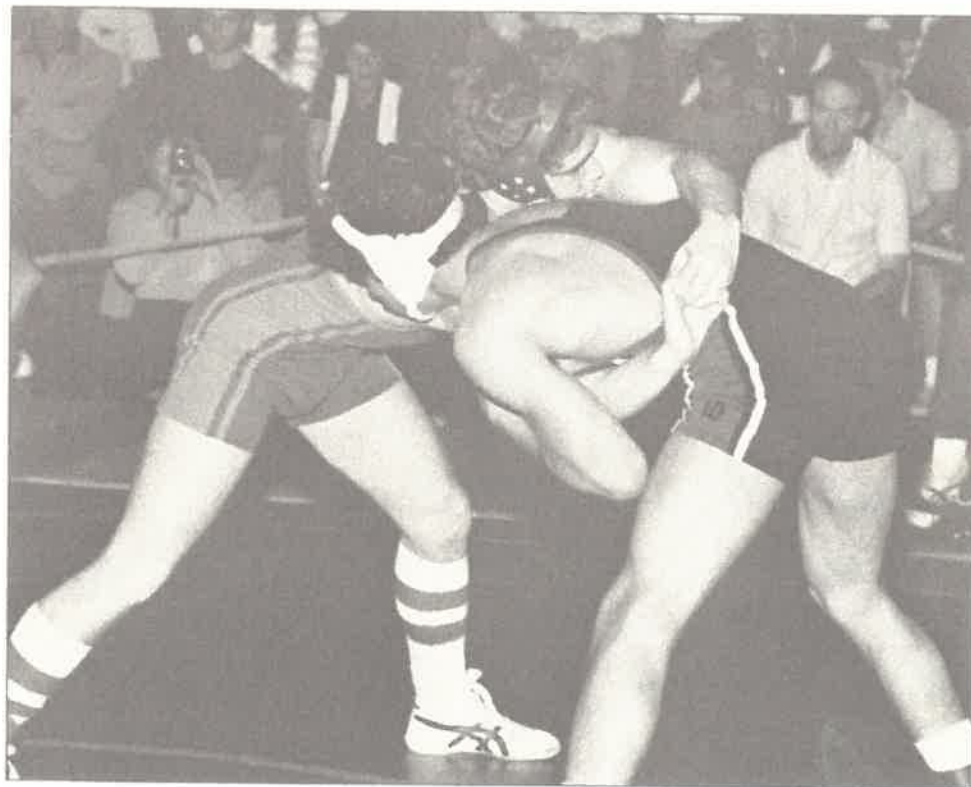
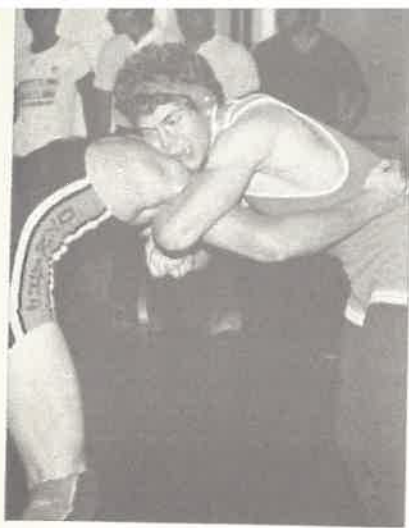

# Saints' Silva wins wrestling title; Righetti places 10th in team race

**WESTMINSTER** — Vince Silva gave Santa Maria High School an individual title at 141 pounds Saturday at the CIF Southern Section wrestling finals, and Righetti's duo of Curt Simmons and Dan Nunez gave the Warriors a 10th-place team finish among 550 schools.

Silva won the 141-pound class with an 8-5 championship match decision over Kennedy's Brian Folsom, giving the school its first individual title since Ernie Del Rio won at 114 pounds in 1971.

The Saints' senior won all four matches, the first by a pin. Silva trailed Folsom 4-1 at the end of the first period. But Folsom, who had defeated Silva in their five previous meetings, lost two penalty points for stalling, and Silva had a key takedown for the winning margin.

Silva, Simmons and Nunez all advanced to the CIF state championships to be held Friday and Saturday.

Simmons took third at heavyweight. The

Warrior junior dropped a 6-3 decision to Russ Silver of Irvine in the second round, but avenged that loss with a 4-2 decision over Silver in the third place match.

Nunez took fourth at 126 pounds. After winning his first two matches on 10-3 and 12-1 decisions, Nunez lost a 6-3 decision to Bellflower's Abel Saenz in the semifinals.

The top five in each weight class advanced to the state finals at Independence High School in San Jose.

The Saints' Ernie Garcia lost two matches at 121 pounds and failed to place.

"It was a remarkable feat," said Saints coach Raul Castillo of Silva's title. "I've been coaching for a long time and I've never had a champion before. It's a lot of fun."

"It's really neat to see. He saw something he wanted to achieve, and he worked to get it. Thousands of kids dream about it, but they never even come close."

"We made history," said Righetti coach Greg Manosar. "That's the highest we've ever placed as a team. That was my goal as coach, to place in the top 10. That was a lofty goal — I'm a little surprised we did it."

El Dorado won the team title with 101½ points. Dos Pueblos was second at 79½, followed by Hemet (67½), South Hills (55), Villa Park (50½), Nogales (44), Santa Ana Valley (44), Irvine (35), Bloomington (34) and Righetti (32½).

"The kids put out a great effort," said Manosar. "They wrestled their best matches of the year. They reached their goals as athletes, and they have a good shot at placing in the state."

Cabrillo's Pancho Segura won the 135-pound division and was named the tourney's Most Valuable Wrestler.

# Players Ready, Their Coach Isn't

**Just When You Thought It Was All Over:** For years, the big goal in Southern California prep basketball was to win a CIF, or City, title. But now that California has caught up with the rest of the country in that it hosts a statewide tournament, such titles have lost their luster.

This fact doesn't seem to bother the players at Mater Dei High School, who Saturday night on the CIF 4-A Southern Section championship by defeating Long Beach Poly, 62-44.

By winning the title, the Monarchs automatically advanced to the second Southern California Regionals against Los Angeles City Section 3-A champ Reseda Wednesday night at the Long Beach Arena. The regionals are a preliminary leading to the second California State Championships at the L.A. Sports Arena.

Though the Monarchs won't have time to savor their CIF title, the first major division championship won by an Orange County school since Tustin beat Whittier, 34-24, in 1937, the players welcome the challenge of the state tournament.

Mater Dei (28-2) is only one of three county teams to ever win the major division title. Orange, in 1920, defeated Colton, 28-16, for the only other county triumph.

"I'd just like to go home and relish this," Mater Dei Coach Gary McKnight said Sunday. "The state tournament is nice for high school basketball and the CIF. But to be perfectly honest, I'd like to kick back on my patio and enjoy this. I'm just mentally fatigued. The kids can't wait to go back to the arena to play again. But the coach has to get himself put back together."

Whatever the outcome at the state championships, Mater Dei has strung together one of the finest seasons ever by an Orange County school. The Monarchs are blessed with height and talent, not to mention the fact that all five starters (6-8 sophomore Tom Lewis, 6-6 junior Matt Beeuwsaert, 6-5 junior Chris Jackson, 6-5 sophomore Mike Mitchell and 6-4 junior Mike Fielder), will be back next year.

Though Mater Dei's domination during the regular season was quite apparent, some followers of prep basketball thought next year would be the Monarchs' best chance at winning the CIF title. Mater Dei was seeded second entering the 4-A playoffs behind St. Bernard, but they weren't expected to win the title without any seniors starting.

"Everyone's been saying that all season," McKnight said. "I told the kids this week that St. Bernard was supposed to win it this year. But they got beat by Bosco Tech in the quarterfinals. We're here now, so, let's make the most of it."

And indeed they did.

Although Mater Dei won by 18 points, it was not an easy victory. Long Beach Poly, the CIF's champion of champions with a record 11 titles in a record 22 appearances in the finals, played a perfect first quarter, hitting all eight field goal attempts and its lone free throw to take a 17-13 lead after one period.

The Jackrabbits cooled off in the second quarter as Mater Dei closed the gap to 23-21 at halftime. Although the Monarchs were in the game with Long Beach Poly, which had defeated Mater Dei, 46-45, in the San Dimas Tournament of Champions in December, they weren't playing well.

The Jackrabbit fullcourt press was troubling Mater

Dei. The press wasn't forcing turnovers, but it made Beeuwsaert work hard in bringing the ball into the front court. And once on their side, the Monarch offense sputtered as they settled for passing the ball around the perimeter looking for an open shot instead of scoring.

But in the second half, Mater Dei made an adjustment. Instead of holding the ball after breaking the Long Beach Poly press, the Monarchs began pushing the ball to the basket, taking advantage of Lewis, who was limited to two points in the first half.

As a result, Mater Dei began beating the Jackrabbits inside almost routinely and forged out to a 37-33 lead entering the final period before reeling off 13 straight points to wrap up the win.

In addition to finally getting the offense rolling, Mater Dei also did a superb job in its man-to-man defense, passed the ball extremely well, repeatedly pounded the boards and employed smart shot selection. In short, the Monarchs second half was executed as well as any 16 minutes of basketball they've ever played.

## Harrison still undefeated

When Alonzo Harrison took Edison High School's Arnold Alpert down with five seconds left to win the 126-pound CIF Southern Section wrestling championship last Saturday at the Masters, he was picking up where he left off a year ago.

In the 1982 tournament the Lompoc High wrestler was battling illness and missed a trip to the state meet when he lost to Alpert, who ended up with fifth place. But this year, riding a perfect 36-0 mark Harrison never faltered in his quest for the top.

"I thought I wrestled well," Harrison said, evaluating his performance on Saturday. "I wrestled about the same guys (ability-wise), but all those guys were good."

"I was sick last year when I lost (to Alpert)," Harrison pointed out. "He was tough, but I could have beat him. I just had a bad day. That's what happens. I've wrestled tougher guys and beat them. I wrestled Nunez (Danny Nunez of Righetti) who placed third in state (last year)

and beat him.

Harrison began wrestling his freshman year in high school after playing football, basketball, and baseball in junior high. He played freshman football at Lompoc, but the last three years has devoted himself to wrestling.

His older brother, Howard Harrison Jr., wrestled for Lompoc in the past, and their father Howard Harrison Sr. said that that is probably one reason Alonzo started wrestling in the first place.

Whatever the reason, the sport has taken Harrison to faraway places. He went to Australia and New Zealand two summers ago with a cultural exchange program and last summer he visited West Germany.

Winning is what it's all about, as far as Harrison is concerned. And nobody was really surprised that he came up with the victory Saturday.

"He's a very dedicated wrestler," said Lompoc coach Jerry Thompson. "He's very intense. His competitiveness is tuned. He has a strong desire to win."

Howard Harrison Sr. wasn't

particularly surprised either, when his son won the section championship.

"I kind of expected it this year," the softspoken senior Harrison said. "He had a pretty good year last year, and he's kind of been progressing every year."

But for Harrison's mother Dorothy, victory wasn't that inevitable.

"I really didn't think he'd get this far," she said.

But Dorothy Harrison is sure of one thing — Alonzo's desire.

"He's dedicated," she said. "He's up in the morning running, and he's running at night."

Harrison isn't going to let up now, with the state meet in sight.

"My goal now is to place in the state tournament," he said. "If I'm healthy, I should place. I just have to keep training hard, be mentally prepared, and let God be with me."

Mental toughness is the key to Harrison's game.

"I'm not a pinner," he said. "I'm a technician. I only pinned three guys out of the 37 guys I beat this season, although I've won a lot of matches by prestigious scores."

For the present, Harrison is concentrating on toughening up for the regional meet in San Diego this weekend.

"These guys in San Diego are going to want my number," he said. "I think if I train hard, I'll go down and win it."

"I don't even think about my record when I'm wrestling," he added. "I just think about winning."

So what's on his agenda after high school? Bigger and better things, says Harrison.

"I'm going to college," he said. "If I don't get hurt, I'm going for the '84 or '88 Olympics."

Harrison said he has heard from Fresno and Ventura (junior) colleges, but has made no decisions as to where he plans to go.

But he can be sure of one thing, if he wins the state meet, he'll be hearing from some college coaches. The high school mentors already know about him. Like Dave Long, of cross-town rival Cabrillo.

"I think," Long said, "that Alonzo has been in an area above everyone else."

# Clovis West bright jewel in Clovis wrestling fest

Clovis West High School, a **state** wrestling power, will be favored in a **state**-class tournament — the sixth annual Clovis Invitational — to be held today and Saturday in the Cougar gymnasium.

The 37-team event, considered by many as a preview to the **state** meet, will run from 3 to 10 p.m. today. Preliminary action will run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, with the finals set for 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students and children.

Coach Lennis Cowell's unbeaten Golden Eagles of Clovis West are coming off a season in which they placed first in the valley and fifth in the **state** without a senior among their starters.

Clovis West, which has gone 8-0 in duals this season to extend its winning streak under Cowell to 43, could battle Sacramento heavyweight Bella Vista for the team title.

Bella Vista placed second in the **state** last year and returned home with the last two Clovis Invitational crowns. It returns a **state** champion in 157-pound junior David Lee. He won the **state** at 138 pounds.

Clovis West will counter with six unbeaten matmen, including including 185-pound Todd Young (8-0), who placed third in the **state** last year, and heavyweight Barry Estes (8-0), who placed fifth in the **state**.

Both of the Eagles are top-ranked in the valley in their respective weights, along with 145-pound Allen Richburg (8-0) and 167-pound Eric Campbell (8-0). CW will also exhibit unbeaten in 105-pound Danny Hollander (8-0) and 138-pound Todd Barnes (8-0).

Clovis West and 9-0 Clovis are ranked 1-2 in the valley. The Cougars will showcase an undefeated wrestler in 9-0 107-pounder Joe Quiroz.

The top seven team finishers in last year's valley meet will be among

"The kids Mike wrestled did better than he did...on that day," said Tustin coach Charles Meyerett. The coach continued about how some deserving people missed out on the state finals because of the new regional format.

"There are kids who definitely belong at the state finals, but aren't going. You watch and see that our regional will have more people in the finals than in the Northern Regional."

In the three years previous, Jackman was a league champion at three different intervals. Last season Jackman qualified for the state championships, finishing seventh in the 148-pound division.

# Two wrestlers advance in CIF-SS competition

A couple of years of go, a rock group pondered the problems of "too much time on my hands."

But at the CIF-SS Masters **wrestling** meet on Saturday, it was a question of "too much Tim" on the hands of five different opponents as both Tim Atkinson of Newbury Park High and Tim Lajcik of Thousand Oaks High advanced up the ladder leading to the state championship.

Atkinson, **wrestling** at 115 pounds, posted a 3-2 record and finished fourth while the 200-pound Lajcik went 2-3 and placed sixth at the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section Masters competition.

Those showings qualified the two Conejo athletes for the Southern California Championships, which will be held Friday and Saturday at Mira Mesa High School in San Diego.

The top six finishers in each Masters weight class advanced to the Southern Cal tournament. The top four finishers in each division of the San Diego meet will qualify for the state championships in Fresno on March 11-12.

Atkinson, 30-4 on the year, began the day with a come-from-behind victory over Torrance's Dave Uyematsu. Atkinson was trailing 3-2 when he pulled a reversal and

then pinned Uyematsu at the 3:14 mark.

Atkinson then notched a 17-1 superior decision over John Trommold of Long Beach Millikan, before dropping a narrow 6-4 decision to Western High's Greg Gascon — the eventual 115-pound champion.

Atkinson got his third win of the day when Villa Park's Tim Campbell forfeited in the consolation semifinals, but then lost a rematch, 2-0, to Uyematsu in the third-place bout when the Torrance wrestler pulled a reverse in the final 20 seconds of the six-minute match.

Lajcik, 41-4, may have had his chances at the **Southern Cal championships** hindered when he suffered a shoulder injury and forfeited his final match of the day.

At the San Diego meet, Lajcik and Atkinson will test their skills against wrestlers from the Los Angeles City, San Diego and Central sections of the CIF.

A third wrestler who competed at the Masters meet, Newbury Park's Kevin Harvey, dropped his first two matches of the day and was eliminated from post-season competition. The 101-pound Harvey dropped a 12-5 decision to Bellflower's Orlando Bustos before losing 9-5 to top-seeded Troy Martinez of Santa Maria.

# Clovis West sweeps field in mat meet

SAN DIEGO — The Golden Eagles of Clovis West High School have flown south and, still, nobody can bring them down.

Maintaining an incredible pace of domination in major tournaments, the Eagles of Coach Lennis Cowell nearly doubled their nearest challenger in team points in the opening rounds of the Southern California Regional wrestling tournament Friday at San Diego's Mira Mesa High School.

Clovis West, which hadn't been touched in seven previous quality events, advanced five wrestlers to the semifinals and also had two more alive in the consolation bracket in rolling up 32 points.

Mt. Carmel of the San Diego Section was a distant second with 17 points. And, in a clear reflection of wrestling prowess in the Clovis Unified School District, the Eagles' neighbors of their east — the Clovis Cougars — were third with 16 1/2 points.

Another North Yosemite League representative — Madera — was tied with Foothill of Bakersfield for sixth with 13 points.

The tourney will conclude tonight, with the top four finishers in each weight bracket qualifying for the one-day state championships next Saturday in Seland Arena.

Clovis West was being pointed to as a strong candidate for the state title before the season even began and it has done nothing but solidify that projection since.

It was their middle- and upper-weight seniors, along with 123-pound junior John Martin, that mounted the big points for the Golden Eagles by advancing into the semis.

Clovis West's seniors winning both their matches were Allen Richburg at 149 pounds, Eric Campbell (171), Todd Young (189) and Barry Estes (249).

Still competing in the consolation bracket for the Eagles will be junior Brian Lewis (136) and senior Brad Zimmer (159).

Clovis exhibited its power in the lower weights by advancing Greg Montoya (102) and Joe Cuero (109) into the semis. Todd Howe (204) was also alive for the Cougars in the consolation bracket.

Madera still had hopes with consolation competitors Pat Rangel (123), David Rosario (149) and Ricky Salas (249).

It was definitely a superb showing by the valley (Central Section), particularly at 123 pounds, where Kingsburg's Danny Erebia and Foothill's Darrell Nerove joined Clovis West's Martin in the semis.

Nerove, the valley champion, will tangle with Erebia at noon. Martin will go up against Coachella Valley's Alfred Castro, a titlist out of the massive Southern Section.

Other valley representatives advancing to the semis were East Bakersfield's Tony Morales (130), Monache's Bret Davis (142) and Bakersfield High's Lenny Moore (189).

# Clovis West seeks state mat crown

The numbers are right. The site could hardly be better. All that remains to be seen is whether the time is right for Clovis West High School to capture its first state wrestling title.

The Golden Eagles of Coach Lennis Cowell have demolished every team that has stood between them and the victory stand this season. The totals are impressive: 17-0 in dual meets, four valley champions and eight tournament titles, including the valley and southern regional meets.

But the biggest and best number of all is a seven. That is how many wrestlers Clovis West will bring "home" to Saturday's state meet at Selland Arena. The closest anyone comes to that is northern regional champion Oceana, which will send four wrestlers.

The first round of the one-day event is set for 10 a.m. Wrestling will continue throughout the day, with the fifth-place matches at 4:30 p.m. and those for third place at 5:15. A separate admission (\$6 for adults, \$4 for students and children under 12) will be charged for the finals at 7 p.m.

Last year, without a senior on the squad, the Golden Eagles took the valley title and placed fifth at state with six wrestlers competing. But this year the state-qualifying format was altered so that Cowell's crew had to place in last week's southern regional to make the state tourney.

Getting seven wrestlers past that added test has solidified the Golden Eagles' position as the overwhelming tournament favorite. Taking the state title plaque home, Cowell said, will hinge on the Golden Eagles' ability to use their depth to advantage.

"We're just hoping that we have so much depth with the number of placers that we can win," he said. "I think we're in a good position."

All five of Clovis West's seniors, with a combined season record of 216-15, qualified for state. Allen Richburg (149) won the valley and southern regional. Todd Young (189) swept the southern regional and was third in the state a year ago.

Barry Estes (249) was fifth at state last year and was this year's runner-up in the southern regional. Brad Zimmer (159) and Eric Campbell (171) each placed third in the regional meet.

Also representing the Golden Eagles will be juniors John Martin (123) and Brian Lewis (136). Lewis scored a major upset last week by edging defending state champion Alfred Castro of Coachella Valley, 12-9.

The weight of the Golden Eagles' numbers alone, however, won't win it. Cowell said that just getting two wrestlers in the finals would make any team a contender.

From the south, runner-up Valhalla of the San Diego Section and defending state champ El Dorado of the Southern Section have a shot. Northern teams Oceana and 1982 state runner-up Bella Vista of the Sac-Joquin Section, will threaten.

But the team everyone will be watching is bound to be Clovis West.

"I think to this point we've proved to be a dominating team," Cowell said, "but strange things happen at a tournament like this. To get to this level, they're all capable of winning, or they wouldn't be here. We've got to stay both mentally up and try to shoot for the goal we've set for us."

That goal? Winning the state. It's one of two goals Cowell's team set this year.

The first was to win the Clovis Invitational, which the Golden Eagles did in style, setting a tourney scoring record. The route to the second goal will unfold tomorrow.

One down, one to go.



# Clovis West wrestlers dominate southern state regionals

SAN DIEGO — Clovis West High School's stable of thoroughbred wrestlers rolled a big seven Saturday in the concluding rounds of the first-ever Southern California Regional Wrestling tournament at Mira Mesa High School.

Golden Eagle Coach Lennis Cowell has held the hot dice for over three months now. Still, he was snaking his head in disbelief after Clovis West thundered to the team title and qualified seven members to next Saturday's state championships at Seland Arena.

Clovis West claimed individual titles with 148-pound Allen Kichburg and Todd Young (158) had runners-up in John Martin (123) and Barry Estes (298) and third-place finishers in Brian Lewis (136), Brad Zimmer (159) and Eric Campbell (171).

All registered, they rang up 108½ points,

more than double that of runner-up Valhalla (43½) of the San Diego Section.

"It is simply amazing that we pulled seven out of here," said Cowell.

Cowell, with justification, put emphasis on "here." The demanding Southern Regional comprised nearly two-thirds of the high schools in the state.

The competing Southern Section, itself has 485 schools, eight times that of the Central Section (valley).

The Southern Section, not surprisingly, dominated the victory stand, claiming 33 of the 52 medals. Four were issued in each of the 13 weight brackets. All those medalists earned tickets to Seland.

For all of the Southern Section flavor, however, the talk of the two-day event was the Cardinal and Gold Eagles of Clovis West.

As one wrestling follower noted Saturday, "Clovis West is a gonilla factory."

Vaughn Hitchcock, veteran wrestling coach of perennial power Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, offered this opinion:

"Clovis West is the best high school team I've seen in the past 10 years. They are representative in every way."

After the tournament, Clovis West's wrestlers were presented a huge championship team plaque and Cowell was honored with a stylish trophy for being the Southern Regional Coach of the Year.

Now it's on to Seland, where the Eagles will be an overwhelming favorite for the state title.

"My hope is that we will have the depth, the numbers to place, to win it (state)," said Cowell. "That's what the numbers can do, but they don't make it a cinch."

"Realistically, I was thinking we might pull five out of here, possibly three. Our kids just haven't got burned out because the

biggest thing we want to do is win the state."

Valley representatives earned 13 medals. Other than Clovis West's medalists, Foothill's unbeaten Darrell Nerve took first at 123 pounds, Washington's George Aguilar (116) placed second, Clovis' Greg Montoya (102) placed third, Monache's Bret Davis (142) and Madera's Ricky Salas (249) finished fourth.

Rounding out the top five team finishers behind Clovis West and Valhalla were El Dorado (38) of the Southern Section, Mt. Carmel (34) of the San Diego Section and Foothill (33) of Bakersfield and the Central Section. Clovis placed 14th with 24½ points.

Clovis West senior Richburg was one of the most impressive finalists, pouncing Southern Section champion Scott Young of Laora, 9-0, for the gold.

It was Richburg's 43rd victory against

one loss. Earlier, in the semifinals, he edged 1982 state runner-up Jeff Tripp of Yucapa on the ninth criterion (first takedown) after finishing in a tie in overtime.

Eagle senior Todd Young, 42-4, placed first by holding off Bakersfield High's Lenny Moore, 5-3. Young had also defeated him in the divisionals and the valley.

Although not finishing first, Martin probably came through with Clovis West's biggest win of the season, if not the year. In the semifinals, he stunned defending state champion Alfred Castro of Coachella Valley, 12-9. Entering the match, Castro No. 1 in the Southern Section, was 42-0 for the year and 82-0 in the last two seasons.

"That win helped us," said Cowell. "We definitely had carryover from that one. But if I had to put my money on someone for an upset like that, it would be Martin. He works so hard."

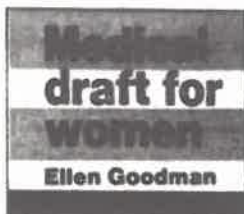

## Reagan urges extra Salvador military funds

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, declaring that U.S. security is at stake, proposed Thursday an additional \$110 million in military aid for El Salvador, including \$60 million that he said he would allocate from foreign-aid funds already approved.

## Cranston's warning on an aid hike

WASHINGTON — Sen. Alan Cranston said Thursday that President Reagan's proposal to increase military aid to El Salvador threatens to ignite "another Vietnam" that could "cost ... American blood."

But California's other senator, freshman Republican Pete Wilson, strongly backed the president's call for \$110 million in additional support for El Salvador's military government and said the United States must fight a communist threat "on our doorstep."

Their sharply conflicting views provide a dramatic summary of the debate already raging in Congress over President Reagan's plans to bolster the military government of the revolution-wracked Central American country.

"It looks more and more like Ronald Reagan is advocating steps that would turn El Salvador into another Vietnam," said Cranston, a Democratic presidential candidate.

It could lead to "horrendous cost in terms of dollars, but even greater cost in terms, conceivably, of

The long-awaited emergency program, part of a \$296 million aid package for Central America, is designed to meet a growing crisis in the Salvadoran guerrilla war and to ease congressional fears that a new Vietnam War is in the making. It appeared to be crafted to shift to Congress some of the burden of deciding how deeply the United States would become involved in Central America.

At the same time, Reagan, in a midday speech to the National Association of Manufacturers, firmly ruled out any direct U.S. involvement in combat, either with troops or advisers.

The aid package includes a total of \$110 million in military aid for El Salvador, much of it for training, and \$108 million in economic aid for El Salvador, Belize, Costa Rica and Honduras. An additional \$20 million in previously unrequested funds is earmarked as military aid for Honduras, Costa Rica and Panama.

"Are we going to send American soldiers into combat?" Reagan asked. "The answer is a flat no. Are we going to Americanize the war with a lot of U.S. combat advisers? Again the answer is no. Only Salvadorans can fight this war, just as only Salvadorans can decide El Salvador's future."

Anticipating a recurrent theme of critics in Congress, Reagan repeated the administration's view that a military solution was not the only answer in El Salvador and that, within limits, "negotiations are already a key part of our policy."

Reagan reiterated U.S. support of a negotiated regional peace initiative for El Salvador. He also reiterated the administration's endorsement of negotiations within El Salvador aimed at persuading the insurgents to take part in the presidential elections scheduled for next December.

"What we oppose," he said, "are negotiations that would be used as a cynical device for dividing up power behind the people's back."

## Shoreline eroding rapidly

LOS ANGELES — The tropical storms that swept scores of homes into the Pacific Ocean and

§ \$18 million damage to state highways, AP

closed parts of the scenic ocean-side highway this winter have fundamentally eroded long stretches of the California coast.

Some marine scientists say the state has entered a period of intense weather, confirmed and accelerated by this winter's storms, that will slice deeper and deeper into California's coastline of more than 1,000 miles until many beaches have been washed into the sea.

"We are on an eroding coastline," says Dr. Douglas L. Inman, director of the Center for Coastal Studies of Scripps Institute of Oceanography near San Diego and the leading proponent of the view that many California beaches are doomed.

Not all specialists in the field share his view, but most agree that the state's shoreline has been receding since 1973. And they say that over the last 30 years, when most development along its coast occurred, California was experiencing an atypical period of very mild weather. They say it is foolhardy for the federal government to foster home-building on the coast through subsidized flood insurance and low-interest disaster loans after storms.

For years, Easterners have joked that someday part of California would fall into the sea because of a giant earthquake. The long-predicted earthquake has not happened, but powerful waves, nibbling away at the coast with awesome energy, have accomplished much the same result since the weather turned in 1973.

The most severe damage this year was caused by a storm in January and another last week that hammered the shore with waves up to 16 feet high.

From San Diego to points north of San Francisco, beaches have disappeared, the sand carried into

the ocean by powerful tides. Roads and beach parking lots have been washed away. Piers that had stood for decades are gone.

On Thursday, residents of Big Sur, a coastal village about 125 miles south of San Francisco, were carefully watching a huge chunk of rain-soaked mountain that has shifted toward the sea.

The section of earth — a quarter-mile long, 300 feet wide and 100 feet high — moved about six feet Wednesday, dropping onto California Route 1, the Coastal

Highway. That scenic road, often closed by winter storms, is also blocked about 25 miles to the south. Geologists said it would be two or three days before they knew whether the piece of mountain had stabilized or posed a danger to nearby residents.

Thirty miles north of Big Sur, in Carmel, which has long boasted of having one of the most scenic white sand beaches in America, the beach is gone, covered by the sea.

In Del Mar, a town of 5,000 near

VMC Administrator Jerry Bosworth came in a closed executive session called by board Chairman Jeff Reich, whose district is served by St. Agnes Medical Center and Clovis Community Hospital.

Following public hearings, state health planners unanimously recommended Wednesday that both "certificate of need" applications for expansion be approved.

Attorneys said they thought Bosworth would testify that expansion of St. Agnes Medical Center and Clovis Community Hospital could hurt the financially unstable VMC.

During their public meetings Monday, Tuesday and early Wednesday, review panels of the Central California Health Systems Agency repeatedly asked for additional "third party" information about the possible effects to VMC by other hospital expansions. It never came.

The highly sought-after recommendation now goes to the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development, which will make final approval on both hospital expansions.

St. Agnes Medical Center is planning a \$50 million, 100-bed expansion at its Herndon and Millbrook avenues location. Clovis Community Hospital is also planning a \$30 million expansion and relocation to Herndon and Temperance avenues. Clovis Community, owned and operated by Fresno Community Hospital and Medical Center, wants to expand by

# Dry weather for weekend

The showers that dampened Fresno and other parts of the San Joaquin Valley last night are not expected to continue today, according to the National Weather Service.

However, last night's thundershowers, which were heavy in some areas, brought the seasonal rainfall to 17.53 inches.

The weather service reported .06 of an inch of rainfall at the Fresno Air Terminal. But .29 of an inch of rain was recorded at the NWS station atop The Bee Building in downtown Fresno.

In addition, Pacific Gas and Electric Co. officials said power outages caused by lighting affected about 350 customers. But as of last night, power had been restored in most instances.

Meanwhile, the weather service forecast calls for dry, partly cloudy conditions today and throughout the weekend, although increasing cloudiness is expected Saturday.

It should be partly cloudy today with patchy morning fog. Valley temperatures are expected to be in the upper 60s to low 70s today, dropping to the 50s at night.

In the Sierra, variable cloudiness is forecast for today. The Sierra cloud cover is expected to become thicker on Saturday.

Sierra temperatures should be around 55 in the afternoon, dipping to 35 at night. The snow level should be above 8,000 feet.

# State finals are a 'class act'

FRESNO — Maybe it wasn't the Greatest Show on Earth, but it could compete.

To the crowd of fans, parents, coaches, wrestlers and ex-wrestlers, the CIF state high school wrestling championships rate right up there with the Super Bowl, NBA championships and the World Series.

Coach Dave Long said it best as he walked out of the dark Selland Arena in Fresno, where a crowd of more than 3,000 people watched the matches that decided who'd go down in history as the top prep wrestlers in 1983.

He gazed over the audience from the top of the upper level stairway and looked at the two wrestlers battling it out on the blue and gold mat under the spotlights far below.

"You don't get things like this in any other high school sport," Long said as the rafters reverberated with the crowd's screams at a takedown. "You don't get this level of skill. There's nothing else like it."

Skill and showmanship. A class act all the way. That was the state high school wrestling championships.

There were some outstanding wrestlers and some outstanding performances.

There were showdowns between undefeated wrestlers. Of course, there was Lompoc High's Alonzo Harrison who finished with a blot on his record after dropping a heartbreaking 5-3 final decision to Derrick Adams of Castlemont of Oakland. Coming into the 130-pound match, Harrison had won 42 straight matters.

And there also were other excellent wrestlers.

There was Frank Trujillo, a

sophomore from Covina, who placed fourth at 98 pounds as a freshman last year. Wrestling in Fresno at 109 pounds, Trujillo lost the state championship and marred his undefeated season mark when he was pinned by San Ramon's Dale Ramos with a minute left in the match.

Ramos was a 98-pound champion last year. Trujillo will be back. You can bet on it, barring illness or injury. But it was a great match Saturday.

So was the victory of Anthony Palomino of Independence Palomino, along with his brother Rick, placed in the last two state tourneys. This year alone, he won the 136-pound title with a second-round pin of Clovis West's Brian Lewis.

Clovis West also was spectacular. The cheering section was. It seemed half the audience was from Clovis

West and the stands were dotted with yellow and maroon team colors. Maybe that helped the team to a sparkling 88-point performance — a 52-point margin over the team's nearest competitor.

The Eagles placed six wrestlers in the top five, three in second place and two in third. It was a record winning margin. They had no individual winners.

Eric Osbourne, a 171-pounder from South Hills, was probably the most spectacular individual record-wise. Osbourne won his second-straight state title with a 13-3 superior decision over Eric Campbell of Clovis West. Osbourne is undefeated in his last two state prep wrestling seasons and has 165-14 over record.

Another stunning performance was that of heavyweight Peter Barela of Barstow. He was responsi-

ble for putting Righetti heavyweight Curt Simmons out of the race for the top spot. Barela pinned Simmons in the semi-finals.

But not only were the performances exciting, the finals represented the highest plane of dramatics in high school athletics.

They began in a darkened arena overlooking the central single mat (four mats are used during the rest of the tournament). An ROTC color guard smartly marched the length of the floor, bathed in the spotlight. They stood at attention while the principal of Colvys High played the National Anthem on his trumpet.

Then the announcer introduced each wrestler before his match, as the wrestler warmed up in the spotlight. Before each match the top six place winners from the former weight division received their awards and were photographed

# Harrison second in finals

FRESNO — All flowers wither and die, sometime. Alonzo Harrison's did Saturday night at Selland Arena in Fresno.

Harrison lost the final match of the CIF state 131-pound championships to Derrick Adams of Castlemont High in Oakland. Both wrestlers were undefeated going into the match. Harrison had 42 wins, Adams had 30.

Both wrestlers started cautiously, to the disgust of the crowd of several thousand strong. The score after two periods was 0-0. In the third period, Harrison was down in the referee's position.

Twenty seconds into the period, Adams was penalized a point for stalling, giving Harrison a 1-0 lead. Harrison escaped almost immediately for a two-point advantage.

But with 45 seconds to go, Harrison dove for a leg take-down and Adams blocked the attempt and flipped Harrison to his back. Adams scored a three-point near-fall for a 5-2 lead.

Harrison worked off the mat, still on his back. He then escaped from the referee's position and attempted a take-down with two seconds left, but failed to score.

"I was being too cautious," Harrison said afterwards, evaluating

his performance. "I dove for the take-down and he locked those arms. I tried to ease out and he flipped me over. I should have just backed out of it."

Fernando Zubia of Cabrillo High made it to fourth place in the 142-pound division. He opened with a 2-1 upset of Arcata's Dennis Rider, the Northern Section's No. 1 seed, but lost an 11-1 second-round decision to Jeff Hockaday of Mt. Carmel High.

In the first consolation bracket, Zubia beat Bret Davis of Monache 6-2 in overtime but lost the third place match to Merced's Brad Meinert.

It was the best showing in years by the Northern League as a whole. Oscar Saucedo of Santa Maria took fourth in the 136-pound division. Righetti heavyweight Curt Simmons also placed fourth.

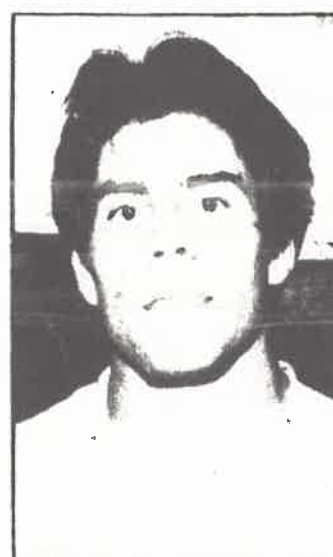
Harrison was strong all day, beating Rick Evans of Turlock 5-0 in his first match, and Edison's Arnold Alpert 4-3 in the semi-finals after being penalized two points.

Harrison, although disappointed with the loss of the state title, remained unmoved in his determination to go on to bigger and better things on the wrestling mat.

"Only because I lost is not a reason to stop wrestling," he said. "I'm going to work harder. This has been a good experience for me to lose. I just pray God that I will get recruited."

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# Warriors' Nunez third, Silva 4th in CIF state wrestling finals

SAN JOSE — Only two wrestlers in the state finished ahead of Righetti High School's Dan Nunez in the 126-pound weight class during the CIF finals Saturday at Independence High School.

Nunez, the Warriors' 126-pound senior, posted a 6-1 record during the two-day competition which concluded Saturday.

Meanwhile, Santa Maria High's Vince Silva gained a fourth place finish in the 141-pound class. The senior, who compiled a season mark of 37-4-1, took three of five matches over the weekend. The area's other competitor, Righetti's Curt Simmons, took 10th in the heavyweight class.

Nunez' most exciting win was Friday in his match with J.J. Gonsalvez of Beymer High in the San Joaquin Valley. The wrestlers tied, 13-13, during regulation time, before Nunez pinned his opponent just 44 seconds into overtime.

Nunez beat Rufino Velazquez of North Salinas High, 7-4; Joe Lang of Ft. Bragg High in the Monterey area, 16-6; Arnold Alpert of Edison High in Los Angeles, 8-2; Dave Love of Monterey High, 10-3, and in the battle for third, topped San Bernadino High's Rod Rodriguez, 10-4.

His only loss was to second-place finisher Glenn Martins of Poway High in northern San Diego County. Martins won, 10-0, but other than that, Nunez was perfect. Nunez' record on the year was 48-6, according to his coach, Greg Manosar.

Silva's coach, Raul Castillo, said his senior met a tough competitor in Yucaipa's Jeff Tripp. Tripp moved out to a 5-0 lead in the first period of a key match, and eventually hung on to beat Silva, 7-5.

Silva had already beaten Jeff Hazard of Sacramento's Cordova High, 4-0, and Allen Richburg of Clovis-West, 4-3. Then Tripp won, before Silva beat Aragon High's Rich Moss, 5-1, and lost to Hazard, in a rematch, 6-4.

Righetti's heavyweight, Curt Simmons, took 10th in the state. He won his first match, 6-4, over Mike McClung of Burney High, in Northern California. Then he lost to the eventual third-place finisher, Woody Woodburn, on a pin. His final match was a narrow 4-2 loss, on penalty points, to Barry Estes of Clovis-West.

Simmons is a junior, and helped Righetti finish in the top 25 in team points. El Dorado High of Los Angeles took top honors.

## Clovis West coasts to state mat crown

In its usual style of team — not individual — dominance, Clovis West High School flexed its muscles early Saturday and walked away with the state wrestling title at Seland Arena.

The major disappointment for the Golden Eagles of Coach Lemnis Cowell was not placing an individual champion. But Clovis West didn't need an individual title to leave runner-up Bella Vista of Fair Oaks far behind.

A crowd of about 3,000 watched Clovis West culminate an undefeated season with its first state title. The Golden Eagles, who are strong as a team but lack a dominant individual, wrapped it up by having all seven wrestlers who qualified place no worse than fifth.

It was all over by 4 o'clock — three hours before the finals started. Clovis West's John Martin (123), Brian Lewis (138) and Allen Richburg (149) laid the groundwork by reaching the championship bouts.

The Golden Eagles accumulated 89½ points, far ahead of Bella Vista's 40. Valhalla of the Southern Section was third with 32.

Bella Vista Coach Charlie Lee,

who saw his team finish second at the state meet for the third year in a row, thought Clovis West had won it before the meet even started.

"They had it wrapped up from the time they stepped on the mat," Lee said. "I have to take my hat off to Clovis West — they deserved it."

No team in state history has had seven wrestlers place in the top five. In addition to seconds by Martin, Lewis and Richburg, the Golden Eagles took two thirds and two fifths.

Clovis West's Todd Young (189) repeated his third-place state finish of last year by outdistancing Robert Hamilton of Red Bluff, 7-1. Teammate Barry Estes (249) then came back from a 5-3 deficit in the last 40 seconds to beat Curt Simmons of Righetti, 6-5. Estes was fifth in the state a year ago.

Martin, who had his picture on the state program and T-shirts, lost to undefeated Darrel Nerove of Foothill High in Bakersfield, 13-9. Nerove, 50-0, was second at 102 pounds a year ago.

Lewis suffered a gash on his nose in his first bout and wore a mask in the finale against Anthony Palomino of Independence High in San Jose. Palomino, who was third at 119 last year and fourth the year before,

# Lee, Gaudreau Win State Titles

FRESNO — David Lee of Bella Vista High School completed the second leg Saturday in his quest to become the first prep wrestler to win three state wrestling titles.

In doing so, Lee and teammate Ken Gaudreau, the state titlist at 98 pounds, combined to give Bella Vista its third consecutive second-place trophy at the state CIF championships at Selland Arena.

Lee, a junior at 155 pounds, staved off Brian Folsom of Kennedy of Los Angeles 7-6 for his title. Gaudreau beat Greg Montoya of Clovis 11-6.

Upset in the heavyweight finals was Rick DeFiorentino of Napa, who racked up 36 pins in his 42-0 season prior to meeting Pete Barela of Barstow.

Barela, with a record of 46-1 — 43 pins (the other three wins were by forfeit) — shucked off DeFiorentino and pressed the senior's shoulder blades to the mat in 1:24.

With only two wrestlers present, Bella Vista had little chance of winning the team title. The Broncos won second place for the third consecutive year with 40 points.

Clovis West of Fresno, with seven qualifiers, captured the team title with 88 points. Clovis West picked up three runner-up medals, two third-place and two fifth-place awards.

Other area wrestlers winning medals at the one-day tournament were Rick Sakurada, Yuba City, fourth at 155 and Rich Merrell, Napa, third at 167. Stuart Busbee of Chico captured second at 200.

Of the four defending state champions, only Alfred Castro of Coachella Valley failed to repeat.

Returning titlists were Bill Ramos of San Ramon Valley (Danville), 105 pounds, winner of 80 consecutive matches, 44 this season; Eric Osbourne of South Hills (Covina), 167, undefeated over two seasons; and Lee.

Ramos beat previously-undefeated Frank Trujillo of Covina, who took fourth last year, by pinning the sophomore in 1:02. Osbourne, one of the most sought-after college-bound wrestlers, racked up a 13-3 advantage over Cip Duncan of Valhalla (El Cajon) for his second title.

Gaudreau, a junior, viewed his championship as a "dream come

true."

"I've been looking forward to this all year," Gaudreau said. "I've been coming to state meets since I was eight or nine years old. I never thought of myself on the (awards) stand."

The Lee-Folsom match was a rematch that had similarities to their prior bout, including the outcome.

"I think the pressure got to him. He really didn't wrestle well," said Lee about Folsom, whom Lee beat 1-0 on a stalling penalty in last year's state semifinals. Lee led 7-2 in the third period, then gave up four points as he was called for stalling three times.

"Maybe he (referee) was in the mood to call them. It's just the way our styles clash," said Lee.

Tracy's Durben Lloren, who had two losses in 51 matches, one to Lee, won the 145 championship in 19 seconds. Lloren, second in state last year, grasped the knee of Allen Richburg of Clovis West for the quick pin.

"That psyched me up," said Lee, who is close friends with the senior even though he has handed Lloren two of his four losses over the past two years. "And I didn't have to wait five extra minutes for my match to start."

In the championship finals, a few tasted defeat for the first time. Some continued as they have the entire season.

Johnny Piccolotti of Oceana of Pacifica (top team at last week's Northern California Championships) extended his unblemished run to 51 matches with an 8-2 overtime win at 112 pounds over Greg Gascon of Western of Anaheim.

Darrell Nerove of Foothill (Bakersfield), a junior, defeated John Martin of Clovis West 13-9 to win the 123 class and improve his record to 50-0.

Derrick Adams of Castlemont became the first Oakland champ by winning the 126 class 5-3 over Alonzo Harrison of Lompoc. Adams, 31-0, picked up five points in the last period to hand Harrison his first setback in 44 matches.

Anthony Palomino of Independence (San Jose) pinned Brian Lew in 3:30 to win at 132. Palomino, 48-0, added the championship trophy to his third- and fourth-place awards won previously.



Schmidt lost his matches to Arnold Alpert of Edison, 8-1, and to Turlock's Rick Evans, 9-7.

NOTES: Bella Vista's David Lee, a 159-pounder, became the first sophomore and junior champion. He will go for three state titles next year. Other defending champions who repeated were San Ramon's Billy Ramos, a 109-pounder, and South Hill's Eric Osbourne, a 171-pounder. A crowd of 3,000 spectators were on hand for the finals at 6,800-se. Selland Arena in downtown Fresno.

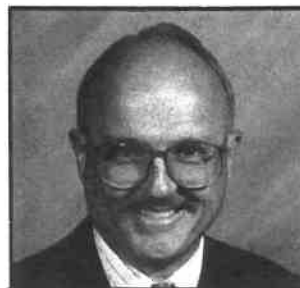
