


# **BADMINTON IN THE CIF-SS**

Invented by British military officers in India in the mid-1800s, badminton soon spread to the rest of the world. Though badminton clubs sprouted up in the United States in the late 19th century, the sport never really took off on the competitive level, as it was overshadowed by the more popular racket sport, tennis. The game is named for Badminton, the country estate of the dukes of Beaufort in Gloucestershire, England, where it was first played about 1873. The roots of the sport can be traced to ancient Greece, China, and India, and it is closely related to the old children's game battledore and shuttlecock.

# The first mention of CIF-SS Badminton was in 1938 MONTHLY BULLEFIN Vol. 2 OCTOBER, 1938

10. Anaheim High School has been granted a sanction to hold a badminton tournament and asked that for this year the winner be declared the Southern California Badminton Champion.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Hamilton that the Anaheim Badminton Tournament winner be declared the Southern California Champion for this year provided the tournament is open to all C. I. F., Southern Section members on equal terms. Carried.

#### DECK SPORTS


With the changes being made in the athletic facilities, especially the new girls' athletic field, the schedule has also been expanded to include more activity in informal games. Archery became a popular sport during the year.

Ping pong and badminton have become the favorite deck sports. Of the two, badminton has been exciting more interest. There is no organized game schedule for these activities. Participation is absolutely voluntary. Equipment is available both at noon and after school.

Along with ping-pong and badminton, there are shuffle board, ring toss, darts and checkers to present a mild form of recreation. The first official CIF-SS CO-ED Badminton Championship was in 1972 on an individual basis and team wise in 1976 when Mira Costa High School defeated Los Altos 4-1. The coach for Mira Costa was Sylvia Holley. There was one division in 1976 and 1977. The Championships expanded to two divisions (4-A and 3-A) from 1978 to 1992. It continued a two division Championship titled Division 1 and Division 2 from 1993 to 1998. From 1999 to 2006 there was only one Division (1). Team Championships ended in 2006 when there were not enough team to compete (CIF-SS 3500.2 – 20% rule). Championship competition was held in Girl's Singles, Boys Singles, Girls Doubles, Boys Doubles and Mixed Doubles. Badminton was the only sport where girls and boys played together for a Championship starting in 1980.

Although Los Altos couldn't win the CIF badminton championship this season, it did produce the top individual player.

Eckman, a senior who has been the most valuable player in the Sierra League for three straight years, won the singles title in a tournament involving 32 top players.

Dale Ferber, assistant badminton coach, said Eckman is "one of the new breed of girls—an all-around athlete."

Ferber said Eckman is an outstanding volleyball player and also excell in softball, although she passed up that sport this year to concentrate on badminton.

Eckman led Los Altos to second place in CIF competition. Los Altos lost in the finals to Corona del Mar.

#### **CIF SOUTHERN SECTION BADMINTON HISTORY**

In 1972 the CIF Southern Section added the sport of girls badminton as part of their mission to increase the number of sports and opportunities for girls in high school sports. Badminton became the first, and still only, truly Co-Ed CIF sport in 1980. CIF Southern Section badminton maintained about 100 schools participating through the 1990s, when the numbers began to drop. Universities eliminated the sport and the opportunities for post high school play diminished.

Nonetheless, participation in badminton in California grew with the diversification of our population through migration from Asian countries. Even so, the Southern Section considered dropping badminton altogether. The sport thrived however in other sections throughout the state of California. One by one, other CIF Sections added the sport. Appealing to "a population that does not commonly receive CIF Championship opportunities," CIF State added badminton as a State Conference Championship sport in 2016. Qualifying players from the Southern Section play in the Southern California Regional Championships against players from as far south as San Diego and as far north as Fresno.

As a result, the number of high schools participating in CIF badminton competition in the Southern Section has been increasing, with a number of schools reviving old programs and others joining for the first time. Universities and Colleges have also increased their offering of the sport through organized clubs and club teams. The CCCAA (State of California Community Colleges) offer badminton as a Varsity Sport in the spring each year.

Over the years, the Southern Section has produced many USA junior and adult national champions and even a couple of Olympic Games participants. We look forward to this new era of growth and participation.

# **FREP BADMINTON** SOUTHERN SECTION DIVISION II CHAMPIONSHIP Katella's Revised Lineup Can't Stop Lakewood

CYPRESS—Katella's first loss of the season came in its last match of the season as the Knights were upset Thursday by third-seeded Lakewood, 11-8, in the Southern Section Division II badminton final.

Top-seeded Katella (19-1) had defeated Lakewood (16-2) earlier in the season, but this time the Lancers' depth was too much for the Knights. Katella Coach Dave Green shuffled his lineup in mixed doubles and the results were promising: the Knights took a 3-2 lead.

By splitting up his two top players Ying Chansawangpuvana and Ed Soetanto, Green hoped to strengthen his lineup.

Quoc Vuong and Chansawangpuvana had to go three games, but defeated Aileen Yumul and Sokhom Oum, 15-10, 8-15, 15-6. Soetanto and Cindy Duong had a tough match, but came out on top, 3-0, 14-15, 15-9.

"We did what we wanted in mixed doubles," Green said. "Our kids played well, but they just played better. We knew it was going to be close. If we played again next week, we might beat them."

Katella, which has relied upon Chansawangpuvana and Soetanto to carry them through the season, got the usual reliable play from the two, as they picked up the only victories in singles for Katella.

Chansawangpuvana, the Southern Section singles champion, finished off her senior season undefeated, without dropping a game. In Thursday's matches she swept by Yumul and Savinh Pouv, 11-1, 11-2, to close her high school career.

"We wouldn't have made it this far without Ying," Green said. "She is the main reason we are here." Soetanto, the Southern Section runner-up in singles, also swept his matches, but it didn't come easy. In his first match with Tony Meas, Soetanto dropped the first game, 15-10, before rallying to win Game 2. 15-14. In the final game, Meas, suffering from leg cramps, took an 8-1 lead, before Soetanto slowly chipped away at the score, winning 15-9.

A turning point for Lakewood came in boys' doubles, with the Lancers ahead, 7-6.

Lakewood's No. 2 doubles, Tin Vo and Borin Eam upset Katella's No. 1 Vuong and Toan Pham, 15-4, 15-8, putting the Lancers up, 8-6. Pham and Duong got the only victory for Katella in girls' doubles, beating Lakewood's No. 1, Tina Ouch and Poravam Mao. Pham and Duong took the first game in a tiebreaker at 18-12, then shutout Ouch and Poravam, 15-0, in the final game of the match.

# Villa Park Moves to Head of Badminton Class

Garden Grove's dominance in Orange County badminton officially came to an end Thursday when Villa Park beat the Argonauts, 10-9, in a nonleague match at Garden Grove.

It was the final match between Villa Park's Mike Chansawangpuvana and Garden Grove's Trong Nguyen in boys' singles that decided the outcome.

Chansawangpuvana, a freshman, battling through leg cramps, took the first game, 15-10, and then shut out Nguyen, 15-0, winning the only boys' match for Villa Park (5-0).

"That was so exciting," Villa Park Coach Sherry Smith said. "We knew it was going to come down to the very end."

The Villa Park girls' team won all eight of their matches in singles and doubles.

There was no chance in singles for the Argonauts (4-1), whose top player, Jamie Kong, was out with an injured Achilles' tendon. Amy Nguy and Bonnie Wong dropped only 10 points combined in singles for Villa Park. In girls' doubles, Cynthia Tran, last year's Times Orange County Player of the Year,

# David Freeman Wins Badminton Title

PASADENA, March 7. -(U.P.)-David Freeman 17-year-old schoolboy and son of a local minister, last night captured the California State badminton championship by upsetting Don Eversoll of Los Angeles, 13-15, 15-8, 15-6.

Women's singles honors were won by Mrs. Del Barkhuff of Seattle, the national champion, who feated Shirley Stuebgen of Berkeley, the defender, 11-16, 11-3.

# David Freeman; Badminton Great Became a Surgeon

Dr. David Freeman, an accomplished neurosurgeon who as a young man won eight championship badminton titles, has died. He was 80.

Diagnosed last April with Merkle cell carcinoma, Freeman died in San Diego Hospice on June 28.

Freeman maintained a successful neurosurgery practice in San Diego for more than 40 years, working out of his office across from Balboa Park.

"I always did operations a lot faster than the next guy," he told the San Diego Union in 1986. "I used to do 16-hour operations in 12 hours."

By the time he established his medical practice in the mid-1950s, those fast hands had already brought him an international reputation.

Raised in Pasadena, Freeman scored his first triumph with a racket in tennis. In his early teens, he won the national junior singles tennis championship. He was also a formidable squash and table tennis player before taking up badminton at age 13.

"Badminton was built for me," he once told an interviewer, "probably because I was quick more than anything else. I wasn't powerful. I wasn't fast—I couldn't run very fast, but I was quick and I had good [hand-eye] coordination." Freeman dominated men's badminton for 14 years. He won seven U.S. badminton championships-1339, 1940, 1941, 1942, 1947, 1948 and 1953—and in 1949 brought the country its first world championship, winning men's singles- at the prestigious All-England Championships. The England Championships. The England competition was considered the unofficial world title contest until 1977, when World Championships were instituted.

"His colorful style, darting and whirling around the court to feturn his opponent's shots," according to the Hickok Sports biography Web site, "has been described... as resembling a Comanche war dance."

Freeman was inaugurated into the International Badminton Fedri eration Hall of Fame in 1997, and the Breitbard Hall of Fame at the San Diego Hall of Champions in Balboa Park in 1958.

He was educated at Pasadena Junior College, Pomona College, where he was president of the student body, Harvard Medical-School and the University of Michigan. He served two years in the Army Medical Corps just after the end of World War II.

Freeman is survived by his wife of almost 60 years, Addie; a daughter, Diana Peterson of Rancho Santa Fe, Calif.; two sons, Reese of Roseburg, Ore., and Dave of Arcadia; and four grandchildren.

Services will be scheduled in September.
