






In recognition of Muir Tech's "cleanup" in track competition this year, the Class B and Class A squads will receive miniature gold track shoes for winning C. I. F. titles May 16 and 23. The Class B team won the Southern California championship, and the Class A squad, the State title. Eddie Arnold, who set a new "record" last week-end by winning the State championship in the broad jump, after capturing the Class B championship one week before, will receive two gold awards simultaneously, the first athlete in the history of Muir Tech to be honored in such a manner.

In the final junior high school intermediate and senior track meet, held at Washington Junior High School yetserday, Eddie Arnold of Washington set a new city record in the 220-yard dash by running to victory in 23 2-5 seconds, breaking the former record by 1-5 of a second. He also broke the city record in the high jump with a jump of 5 feet 7 3-4 inches. McKinley broke the intermediate eight-man 880-yard relay in the record time of 1:35 2-5, beating the former record by 1:38 1-5.

Lack of funds may prevent Muir Tech from sending of Mickey Anderson, sprinter, and Jack Robinson, broad jumper, to the state interscholastic California prep meet at Gridley next Saturday, it was learned last night.

However, if the Terrier representatives do go North, Seth Patten, executive secretary of the C. I. F., will be petitioned to allow the entry of Eddie Arnold as well. Arnold set a new Southern California record in the Class "B" broad jump last Saturday with a leap of 20 feet, 21 inches.

Class B Star Margin of Victory for Muir Tech

Al (Weary) Walton, coach of Muir Tech, has the Southern California C. I. F. to thank for his second State track and field championship in three years.

It was the C. I. F., Southern Section, that permitted dusky Eddie Ray Seares, high hurdler, ran only Arnold, who won the class B broad 120 yards the whole day, but also jump in the Southland meet at Stephens Field a week ago Saturday, to compete at Gridley Saturday. And it was Arnold who proved to be Muir Tech's margin of victory over John Gartner's Southern California championship squad from Wilson High. If Muir Tech had used the same team it did in the Southland classic Wilson would today be the State champion.

Arnold bettered 23 feet in the broad jump for the second time in his life to win the State title and give Muir Tech the five points it needed to beat the Bruins. He then substituted for Mickey Anderson, who became very ill after running a hard 220-yard dash, in the relay and enabled the Terrier quartet to take a surprise second for another four points. The Muir Tech relay team finished fifth in the Southern California meet, but was able to compete when Riverside withdrew its team.

It was Arnold who anchored the Muir Tech class B relay team, which scored a victory in that event to give the Pasadena school the Southern California B championship.

Anderson scored the other nine points by himself to give the Muir Tech squad 18 points to Wilson's second place total of 13. The Muir Tech sprinter was first in the 100yard dash and second in the furlong.

The Wilson athletes suffered from badly blistered feet from the hot track. The thermometer registered 95 degrees and it was considered a cool day for that section of the country.

After running a sensational quarter-mile race, which he won despite having to battle his way to the front from the fifteenth lane, George Gray ran his fourth of the relay, 220 yards, on the sorest pair trip the day before.

of feet Coach. Gartner has seen. suffered blistered feet.

In his preliminary heat of the high hurdles, Seares knocked over the first four hurdles and hit two others, but still finished fourth, which would have qualified him if he hadn't knocked over so many hurdles.

The home-made hurdles were made of 2x4's and were raised more than an inch on the sides, which bothered all the hurdlers in the meet that did not clear the barriers very high. Seares knocked all but one hurdle down with his heel.

Gene Putnam ran his fastest century this season when he was clocked in 9.8 seconds, one-tenth of a second slower than Anderson. He was given third, but according to Gartner, who was right on the finish line, he finished a strong second. Similarity in numbers enabled Brady of Gridley to get second place. He was No. 8, while Putnam was 82. Putnam's number was not pinned on tight and was folded over, which caused the numeral 2 to be covered, according to observers.

Dick Laughead missed 6 feet 2 inches by the decoration on his pants while Norm Standlee could not reach 50 feet. He had no snap. Of the group that went to Gridley, Laughead, Standlee, Seares and Burdette Gandy will be back next year. Standlee and Seares are only 16 years of age, while Laughead is 17.

The Muir Tech squad was the freshest of the Southland teams, having made the long 551-mile trip to Gridley Thursday. In 1934 when Pasadena won the State title at Berkeley the Terriers also made the trip on Thursday, gaining a day of rest before the meet. However, last year when Muir Tech was second at Fresno the team made the

Funds Raised, Muir To Enter **Gridley Meet**

Squad Of Five Men Will Leave For North

Civic-minded Pasadenans came to the rescue of Muir Tech's aspiring track team yesterday and sufficient money and gasoline was donated to enable five Terriers to compete in the California state meet at Gridley Saturday. The squad, in charge of Coach Al Walton, will leave this afternoon by automobile for the meet.

Four Events

Those who will compete in four events are Jack Robinson and Eddie Arnold in the broad jump; Mickey Anderson in the 100 and 220-yard dashes, and a relay quartet composed of Anderson, Kindel. George Sangster and Arnold. Arnold, Southern California 'B" broad jump record holder, was given permission yesterday to compete in the state meet by Seth Van Patten, executive secretary of the C. I. F. Since Riverside High School, fourth place winner in the recent Southland meet, will not be represented at Gridley, the way was paved for Muir's relay team to enter.

In tryouts yesterday, Arnold ran a furlong over a slow track and around a curve in 22:9 to beat out Fritz Anderson for a relay berth. Coach Walton believes that his new relay quartet has been considerably strengthened and may surprise in that event Saturday.

Long Beach Wilson High Unofficially Leads In Big Event

Showing unusual strength in eight track and field events, Woodrow Wilson High of Long Beach yester-day copped team and individual honors in the C. I. F. divisional qualifying meet held at Hoover High School, Glendale, but the beach team probably would not have topped other competitors had Bill Sangster. competed for the Terriers, Multi finished fourth in the point totals. Because Sangster became 20 years of age today, making him ineligible for further prep competition, he would not have been allowed to compete in the final meet at <u>comp</u> Beach next Saturday afternoon. In spite of the loss of its hurdling star, the Terriers did well. Bill Brock, high-jumper, tied for first with Keene of Glendale Hoover and Lippencott of <u>Long Beach</u> Poly at 6 feet, 1 3-4 inches, and Jack Robin-son won the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet, 11 3-4 inches on a poor runway against a stiff wind. Mickey Anderson ran two powerful races in the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes, coming in second by inches in both events. The Multi relay team came in fifth but was awarded fourth when Glendale was disqualified. In Class B the Terriers came in second to Bob Browne, South Pasa-dena sprinter, in the 100-yard dash in 10.4. The Multi Tech relay team suffered a setback in the 660-yard relay, placing second, by one yard, to Santa Monica when Ruffin, anchor man for Multi allegedly was fouled by the Samohi runner but since there was no judge at the final lowed. GRIDLEY, Cal., May 23. (U.P.)-John Muir Tech High School of Pasadena, won the 1936 California Intercollegiate Federation track and field meet from all comers before 4000 fans under a blazing sun here late today with 18 points, repeating the performance accomplished by Coach Al (Weary) Walton's Pasadenans in 1934.

The conquering Terriers entered a, kid brother of the California acesix-man team of Mickey Anderson, George, Eddie Arnold, George Sangster, Wally Kindel and Bill Brock, as alternate in the high jump.

Woodrow Wilson of Long Beach was second with 13, and Sacramento High tied with 12, Gridley High and Berkeley High were tied for fourth place with 9 points each. Fullerton High won the state crown in 1935.

ACES ADDED TO TERRIERS

Class B Jumper Joins Team

Wilson Outfit Has Hopes for Cinder Crown; Few Records Threatened


LONG BEACH, May 22. (Exclusive)—Addition of a 23ft. 2½in. broad jumper, a 6ft. 2in. high jumper and an 880-yard relay team capable of breaking 1m. 30s. today, made Coach Al (Weary) Walton's Muir Tech Terriers of Pasadena the dark horse to win the State interscholastic track and field championship at Gridley tomorrow.

Dusky Eddie Arnold, who set a new Southern California Class B record of 23ft. 2½in. to win the broad jump title here last Saturday, today was given permission to compete for the Muir Tech varsity.

ONE-MAN TEAM

Arnold, who captured the Southern California Class B championship almost single-handed for Muin Tech by winning the high fump and broad jump as well as anchoring the winning relay team, bettered the winning varsity mark by 1% in. here last week. Jack Robinson, another Muir Tech Negro, won the varsity division with a leap of 23ft. % in.

Since Arnold and Robinson were the only prep broad jumpers in the State to leap 23ft. in the sectional tryouts last week, they will be favored to finish one-two at Gr dley for 9 points.



Coach Otto Anderson and his Pasadena Junior College track and field varsity will gain two of Muin Tech's finest Negro athletes, stars of powerful Terrier aggregations, in Eddie Arnold and Jackie Robinson, both of whom plan to enroll at P. J. C for the spring semester, it was learned last night.

Arnold, the most versatile of the pair, is a six-foot high-jumper and a consistent 23-foot broad-jumper. Jackie, brother of Mack Robinson, Bulldog co-captain last year and second-place winner in the Olympic Games 200-meters, is another 23foot broad-jumper.

Great Performer

Arnold is Southern California Class "B" high jump and broad jump champion and California state Class "A" broad jump king. His marks are truly outstanding. He won the Southland "B" high jump crown with a six-foot oneinch jump although in winning the Foothill League title he leaped but 5 feet 11 inches. His Southland "B" broad jump effort was 23 feet 2 inches, while his state Class "A" mark is 23 feet 1 inch.

Young Robinson has great possibilities, but is not as steady as is his Muir mate, Arnold. Jackie won the Southland Class "A" broad jump title with a 23-foot 1-inch leap, but a week later failed to place in the state championships,

1936 - GRIDLEY HIGH SCHOOL; SATURDAY, MAY 23

The small town of Gridley, about 60 miles north of Sacramento, acted as host for the 22nd State Meet and once again no LA City schools would be entered. There would be plenty of Southern California schools in the competition, however, and the favorite was Wilson of Long Beach. They had won the Southern Section title last Saturday. The "dark horse" in the field appeared to be Muir Tech, mainly because of the addition to its team of one of their JV stars. Eddie Arnold set a new Southern California JV record of 23-2 1/2 in the broad jump title last week and he was given permission to compete in the State Meet for the Muir varsity. Jack Robinson, another Muir competitor, had won the varsity broad jump at 23-0 3/4, almost two inches less than Arnold! Since Arnold and Robinson were the only prep broad jumpers in the State to better 23 feet in the sectionals, tney were favored to finish one-two.

There were essentially no point scorers back from the 1935 meet with one exception. Les Steers, Palo Alto's fine high jumper, returned after winning last year at Fresno as a sophomore at 6-2. The only record thought to be seriously threatened was the pole vault, where Bodkin of Inglewood or Ono of Analy (Sebastopol) might beat the present standard of 13-0.

STATE MEET RECORDS

Only one new record was established which was probably due in large part to the weather. Jerry Lopes of Placer, Auburn ran the 880 in 1:57.1, beating the old record by half a second. Runnerup in the record run was Delapp of Montebello.

HIGHLIGHTS

There was no breeze during the meet and the temperature reached 90 in the shade. The 2,000 spectators seemed nearly as much affected by the heat as the 125 participants. Two sprinters shared high point honors at 9. Farmer Brady of host Gridley blazed the 220 in 21.6 to win over Mickey Anderson (Muir Tech). In the 100 the tables were turned, Anderson winning in 9.7 with Brady second. Brady scored all of Gridley's points.

Simon Scott of Tamalpais won the mile in 4:31.2, not bad considering the heat. Jack Russell (Fillmore) ran a good 24.2 to take the lows. Dave Bodkin (Inglewood) won the pole vault in 12-11 with Ono of Analy in a 3-way tie for second. Les Steers (Palo Alto) repeated in the high jump, the winning height only 6-0 3/4. Santa Monica won the relay in 1:29.3, second-fastest winning time in Meet history.

TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP (Meet scored 5-4-3-2-1)

Eddie Arnold's elevation from the JV team to the varsity proved to be the deciding factor in Muir's winning the State Meet with 18 points. Arnold won the broad jump with a great 23-1 3/4, Mickey Anderson got 9 points in the sprints, and Muir came in 2nd in the relay. For some reason, Jack Robinson did not score in the broad jump. Second in the Meet went to Wilson of Long Beach with 13 points, followed closely by Sacramento with 12. Doug Busby got 8 of Sacramento's points with a win in the highs (15.7) and a 3rd place in the lows. Finishing in a tie for 4th were Berkeley and Gridley at 9.



There are no official records of all the prelims in each event at the 1936 State CIF Track Meet. Jackie Robinson is listed in the printed State program as a participant in the broad jump and Eddie Arnold is not listed. It was not certain as to the request Seth Van Patton, CIF-SS Commissioner, made to the State officials, but needless to say Arnold jumped and probably Jackie did not. It would seem unfair to the other sections for the CIF-SS contingent to have an addition athlete in an event and I am sure Long Beach Wilson High School from the Southern Section would be upset. They were possible first place finishers based on their Championship the week before in the CIF-SS Finals and their finish as runner up to Muir in the Gridley Union High School State finals. Cost of travel (gas, money, etc.,) to the meet was a concern and Jackie would have added to those expenses. It appears that *Eddie* Arnold, the true hero of the State Meet, went to the State Championship as he had the superior length in the broad jump during the season over Jackie 23'2" to 23 $\frac{3}{4}$." Plus, Arnold ran the relay at State and Muir place second in that event. Jackie, with his multi-sport talents, was probably already engaged in another sport at the end of May 1936, tired of being referred to as "Dusty" in the press and time to move on.
