COMMENTS: Bob Kloppenburg, Marshall, who shattered City League scoring records, with an average of 25.6 points per game in 10 contests, and Gordon Hein, Canoga Park, who averaged nearly 20 points per game in eight contests, were chosen forwards on the All-City team for 1945. Alan Sawyer, San Pedro, huge 6'4", 190 pounds, Junior, who averaged 20 points per game, and excelled with his all-around play, was given the center assignment on the All-City squad by the members of All-Southern California Board of Basketball. Sawyer scored 140 points in seven games.

Jack Stone, University's fine center, who stands 6'4" in height and weighs 200 was given a guard post, due to his brilliant defensive work. Jack, however, was an excellent shot and floor-man. He tallied 167 points in 12 skirmishes. Roger Joest, Huntington Park, nabbed the other guard berth on the All-City line up. Joest was an important factor in the success of the Huntington Park team, which was undefeated in Eastern League play, and which limited opposing squads to 264 points in ten contests. It was Joest's splendid defensive work which kept the opponents from scoring against the Spartans.

Gordon Hein was the only player on the All-City team who did not soar above the 6' mark. He stands 5'8" in height. Hein was fast and shifty, and was a clever floor-man. He handled the ball well and was an expert shot. Sawyer and Stone in addition to being exceptional shots were both defensive ace. Teaming with Roger Joest, Sawyer and Stone would give the All-City team a defensive set up which it would be almost impossible to get around.

Bob Kloppenburg, because of his great scoring record and general all-around play, was probably the standout player on the All-City squad, although the other four members of the All-Star team pressed him closely for foremost honors.

It is interesting to note that the total points scored by the five players who were chosen for the All-City team amounted to 790. On the basis of their scoring performances the five All-City team players, if grouped together as a team in a contest, would be able to tally an average of 84 points per game.

**BOB KLOPPENBURG PLAYER OF YEAR**

COMMENTS: Bob Kloppenburg, sensational Marshall High School forward who chalked up 256 points in ten games, and who played brilliantly in all departments of the game, was chosen Player of the Year in the Los Angeles City High School ranks by members of All-Southern California Board of Basketball.

Bob Kloppenburg will be presented with the Helms Athletic Foundation medal, in recognition of having been chosen Player of the Year, at a special program which is to be held at Marshall High School on February 22. At that time Bob will also be presented with Helms award, in recognition of having been chosen Southern California Athlete of the Month for January 1945.

COMMENTS: Jack Stone, high 6'4" University Center, who chalked up a total of 167 points in 12 games, and who played brilliantly on defense, was probably the standout player of the Western League. He was unanimously chosen for a place on the All-League team by coaches of the Western circuit. Neal Amsden, of Fairfax High School, who tallied 141 points, ran Stone a close race for foremost honors in the Western League. Like Stone, he was a fine all-around player. Orlen Whitson of Hamilton playing for a weak team, was so outstanding that he was named for a forward berth on the All-Star team. He was definitely a "Team" player.

Lanky Glen Abney, 6'4" University guard, was named for honors because of his ability to score, and to defend. Abney chalked up 110 points from his guard position. Georgian of Los Angeles, nabbed the other guard spot. His play was outstanding throughout the season.

Harline and Sawyer were the leading point-getters of the Marine League. Harline collected 141, while Sawyer averaged 140.

COMMENTS: Wally Midrod, Washington Center, was the only player in the Southern League to receive the votes of all of the coaches. He was a unanimous choice for the center position. Jim Brideweser, Washington forward, and Charles Tackett, Promont guard, followed in the balloting. Midrod was the highest scorer on the All-Southern line up. Vern Norwinton, forward, and Dick McFarland, guard, both of whom were Juniors at Manual arts, were the other Southern League players to capture berths on the All-Star team. Norwinton specialized as a floor-man, and was a load-oyz shot. In addition to being a stalwart on defense, McFarland was a clever long shot.

Tackett played a lot of speed and was a good shot. Jim Brideweser, Washington captain and center, was probably the most brilliant player in the Southern League but was handicapped by injuries.

Hoover Glendale's Charles Clustka was a high-scoring forward, tallying 272 points in 17 contests. He was also a fine defensive player. Clustka registered 26 points against Marshall High School, with Bob Kloppenburg as an opponent. Elmer Combs, Huntington Beach, who chalked up 262 points in 21 contests was a tower of strength for his team, which won 20 of the 21 games which were played.

Richard Barnes, Hoover, San Diego, was unanimous choice for the center berth. The big 6'5", 185 lb. pivot-man averaged 15 points per game, was chiefly responsible for his team's second consecutive Beverly Hills tournament championship.

Against Santa Monica, in the Beverly Hills tournament, Dick collected a total of 36 points. He registered 23 points in a semi-final contest, and scored 16 in the finals, against the strong Whittier team.

Compton's Eugene Wahl, excelled on defense, was a good rebound man, and was the high-scorer of his team. Although a guard, Wahl was runner-up in point scoring in League play. Bill Warren, Montebello's 6' guard, was a brilliant defensive player. He chiefly controlled the ball for his team, and led the Oilers through a very successful season. Warren was fast and aggressive.

Elmer Combs, and Eugene Wahl were Juniors in school. The other players chosen on the All-Southern California team were Seniors.

RICHARD BARNES, HOOVER, SAN DIEGO CENTER, CHOSEN PLAYER OF YEAR

Richard Barnes, Hoover San Diego's huge 6'5", 185 lb., center, was chosen Southern California High School (C.I.F.) Player of Year for 1945, by members of All-Southern California Board of Basketball composed of: Morry Kapp, Los Angeles Daily News; Ralph Alexander, Los Angeles Examiner; John de la Vega, Los Angeles Times; Loy Allen, Los Angeles Herald-Express; Bob Guild, Hollywood Citizen-News; Rube Samuelson, Pasadena Star-News; Bob Hall, Long Beach Press Telegram; Eddie West, Santa Ana Register; Robert Lantz, San Diego Union and W. R. (Bill) Schroeder, Helms Athletic Foundation.

Barnes was the spark of a Hoover team which lost but one game during the 1945 season; that to San Diego, 25-26. Hoover, due to Barnes' spectacular play later twice defeated San Diego, 39-28, and 29-24. In the Beverly Hills invitational tournament, which the Hoover team won, for the second consecutive year, Barnes was the standout player. He chalked up 73 points in three games, tallying 36 points against Santa Monica.

Dick Barnes will be presented with the Helms Athletic Foundation medal award, in recognition of having been chosen So. Calif. High School Player of Year.

COMMENTS: Joseph, of Compton; and Pickering, of Santa Ana, who were chosen for the forward positions, wore the leading point-getters for their squads. Both were excellent floor men, and excelled on defense. Joseph chalked up a total of 263 points in 24 games. He was the high-scorer of the Western States College Tournament, with a total of 61 points.

Morris Decker, Pasadena's huge 6 foot, 6 inch center, who averaged better than 15 points per game, who dominated the back court in most games, and who sparkled with his fine floor game, was given the center post, without opposition.

Pasadena's little Kenneth Meguiar, who was named Player of the Western States College Basketball Tournament, and who managed to keep opposing basket tossers away from his goal, despite his small stature, was unanimously selected for a guard assignment. The other guard berth was handed to Los Angeles Aaron Scandal, who was a tower of strength for the Cubs.

Morris Decker, Pasadena's tall pivot man, who scored and defended just a little bit better than any other player in the Southern California Junior College Conference, was named Player of the Year by the All-Southern California Board of Basketball, and will be presented with the Helms Athletic Foundation medal award, in recognition of that honor. Decker averaged better than 15 points per game, and controlled the ball for his team under both baskets. The Pasadena center, whose nickname is "Hank," was a standout in the Western States Tournament, and assisted greatly in his team's triumph in that tourney.

Players chosen for the All-Southern California Junior College Team will be presented with Helms Athletic Foundation awards.
