ALL-C.I.F. 1950 BASKETBALL TEAM HONORS SHARED BY EL MONTE AND ALHAMBRA STARS

Talented El Monte Guard Mark Costello Named C.I.F. Basketball Player of Year

Meeting of Helms Athletic Foundation's All-Southern California Board of Basketball at Helms Hall on March 9 resulted in the selection of the top array of C.I.F. basketball players. As in 1949, the Board chose two ten-man teams. The Pacific League champions, the El Monte Lions, placed two men on the all-star squads: Mark Costello at a guard post on the First Team, and Warren Buoy at a forward spot on the Second Team. The runner-ups to El Monte in the Pacific League, the Alhambra Woors, matched their rivals in the selections by having center Ron Bane voted to the First Team, and forward Ron Livingston to the Second Team. Aside from that, the honor teams were featured by a good balance among the large and small schools in the vast group of 170 C.I.F. (Southern Section) high schools.

Highlight of the Helms Board meeting was the honoring of Mark Costello of El Monte as C.I.F. Basketball Player of the Year for 1950. Mark won the balloting in a sweep. His coach, George Pholps, openly praised him as the greatest player he has ever coached. On the record, he is the highest scorer in El Monte history. Prior to the beginning of the C.I.F. Basketball Tournament last March 3rd, Costello, from his guard position, had accounted for a season's total of 401 points, averaging 14.3 points per game. Proof of Mark Costello's outstanding basketball ability is the acclaim he has received for his all-around court play. His play-making and rebound work were the life of the sturdy El Monte drive this season.

However, fine as was the play of Costello, there were many other lads who deserved the plaudits of the experts and fons. Loyola's colorful, yet modest, Cary Griffin guided the Cubs to the championship of the Catholic League and the Beverly Hills Tournament. Not a hungry shooter, Griffin still managed to lead his team in scoring with 324 points in 27 games. Then, there were men who swished the basketball to new league scoring records. Tom Williams of Colton was one. He set a new Citrus Belt scoring mark of 175 points in 10 league games, a 17.3 avorage. And, unforgettable was the assortment of hook shots which Santa Ana's Bob Hopkins used to smash the Sunset League scoring record. Bob hit for 450 in 23 games. His coach, Lester McKnight, calls Bob one of the very best he has coached.

Four men set up a consistent pattern of scoring which led to the impressive "over-400" mark. Jerry Anderson, offective center for the Foothill League champions, Burbank, did the trick. Alhambra's gifted Ron Bane went over the top of 400. The offensive spark of Ventura's Pirates, center Jim Crockom, managed the feat. And, finally, as mentioned above, Costello landed in the select group.

The 1950 All-C.I.F. Basketball Teams include some hefty and rangy young men. For example, the First Team averages 6 feet 2 inches in height, and 177 pounds in weight. Ample for youngsters still growing. The talent is there, too. Many of the players are outstanding prospects for college basketball.

SAN PEDRO'S M. H. MC GILVERY SELECTED AS EASTERN-MARINE LEAGUE PLAYER OF YEAR

Members of the Helms All-Southern California Board of Basketball placed the laurel wreath around San Pedro's M.H. McGilvery as Eastern-Marine League Basketball Player of the Year. And a confident choice it was.

McGilvery was the net-tearing center of the fabulous San Pedro basketball team which established an all-time high by averaging 69.8 points per game. McGilvery wound up as the second highest scorer in Los Angeles City ranks with a total of 288 points in 13 league games, or 22.2 points per game average.

Of course, it was the triumphant San Pedro Pirates who nabbed the spotlight in the All-League selections. They placed four men on the First Team: forwards, Bill Stevens and Ben Hansen, center, M.H. McGilvery, and guard, Nick Trutanich. The very promising junior, and, currently, excellent basketballer, Danny Hood, of Riis, was niched in one of the guard posts on the First Team.

DICK KILLGORE, FAIRFAX FORWARD, HONORED AS WESTERN LEAGUE'S BEST FOR 1950

Dick Killgore of Fairfax received the praise of the Helms All-Southern California Board of Basketball as the Western League Basketball Player of the Year for 1949-1950. Appreciative fans of Western League basketball will happily second the choice of Killgore for this rich honor. He was an exceptional performer.

Killgore finished the season with the ranking of fourth highest scorer in the Los Angeles City Leagues. He bucketed 194 points in 12 league games, for an average of 18.2 points per contest. Much to his credit is the fact that in many of the games he faced an opponent's defense expecially designed to thwart his scoring efforts. He surmounted all these obstacles with surprising success. Even the championship Hollywood team could only hold him to 28 points in two games.

As was to be expected, the Hollywood Sheiks enjoyed the most success in placing men on the All-League teams. Dave Stewart, George Caras, and John Newcomb of Hollywood were listed on the First Team; and Alan Ludecke landed a forward berth on the Second Team.

Rollywood made a sweep of the Western League race for 1949-1950. The Sheiks rolled through 12 straight league engagements with nary a loss. Secret of their success was their defensive strength. They were outpointed by the Fairfax Colonials on offense, but on defense they held the opposition down to a mere 34 point-per-game average, low for the league.

LOS ANGELES CITY 1950 PLAYER OF YEAR HONORS GO TO L.A. POLY'S JIM POTELL

It was a difficult matter for members of the Helms Athletic Foundation's All Southern California Board of Basketball to finally single out one player who was entitled to the Los Angeles City High School Basketball Player of the Year award, for the 1950 season, so outstanding were other members of the All-City quintet, but when they finally did so, it was by unanimous approval that Polytechnic's James Powell was chosen.

Powell was the big 6-foot, 4-inch center of Poly's undefeated Northern League championship aggregation. Jim hooped in 289 points in 10 League skirmishes, for the phenomenal average of 28.9 points

scored per contest. In one game, Powell tossed in 43 points!

Flanking big Jim Powell, the City's leading scorer, with 289 points in 10 Northern League contests, at his center post on the All-Los Angeles City first team, were forwards M. H. McGilvery, of San Pedro, and Dick Killgore, of Fairfax; and guards Andy Johnson, of North Hollywood, and George Caras, of Hollywood.

McGilvery, who helped San Pedro breeze to the Eastern-Marine League titler registering 14 wins without a loss, and chalking up

League title; registering 14 wins without a loss, and chalking up a total of 907 points to opponents' 425, for a 70-33 average, was second highest scorer in the City, with 288 points -- just one behind Jim Powell's 289. McGilvery, whose M. H. initials stand for Million Harvest, stands 6 feet, 4 inches in height, and weighs 185. Dick Killgore, of Fairfax, was cited for honors because of his all-around play, and scoring ability. Dick, who stands 6-foot, 2-inches registered 194 points in 12 contests.

Both Killgore and McGilvery were chosen for All-City second-team honors a year ago, in 1949. Both deserved to be moved up to the

first team, this year. The All-City guards were rangy boys. Andy Johnson stood 6-feet, 3-inches tall, and weighed 185. Hollywood's George Caras weighed in at 160, and has a 6-foot, 1-inch frame. Johnson was one of the top scorers of the City, although a guard, chalking up 218 points in 12 conflicts. Caras, on the other hand, was noted for his sturdy defensive play. However, he was an accurate shot, peppering the basket for 84 digits.

Coach Guy Wrinkle's Hollywood Foothillers, champions of the Western League, gained three berths on the All-City squads. Caras nabbed a firstiteam post, Dave Stewart captured the second-team center assignment, while guard John Newcomb landed on the third team.
