DARRELL SUTHERLAND, STAR GLENDALE GUARD, SELECTED BEST IN 159 CIF "AAA" BASKETBALL

] arrell Sutherland from Glendale High School, in the words of his coach Gene Haas "A very outstanding high school player", was named CIF "AAA" basketball player of the year for 1959 by members of All-Southern Calif-

ornia Board of Athletics which met at Helms Hall last week to make its annual picks. Sutherland was a unanimous choice and won the honor on the first ballot.

Leading the Glendale Dynamiters to a 32-l season record, including CIF playoff victories over Glendora (58-44), Montebello (88-68), El Monte (45-43), Compton (69-46) and Fullerton in the finals, 59-49, Sutherland's 655 points in 32 ball games set a new school record. Glendale's one loss during the year came at the hands of Glendale Hoover in the finals of the Burbank Basketball Tournament. Basketball is not the only sport which Darrell Sutherland excells in, as he was a secondteam All-CIF baseball selection last year as a junior. He performed as a pitcher.

For having been named as the outstanding performer in CIF basketball play for 1959, Darrell Sutherland will receive his Helms Player of the Year medal award at the 22nd Annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, April 4 at 10:30 a.m. His name will also be engraved upon the Paul H. Helms perpetual trophy which is lodged permanently in Helms Hall.

Only champion Glendale placed more than one player on the two CIF "AAA" teams. Senior forward Tim Vezie was named along with Sutherland from the Dynamiters championship five. Vezie, who averaged better than 13 points per geme from his forward position, was hailed by his coach for his outstanding rebounding ability.

At guards on the first ten-man team selected by the board, are Tom Freese (Ventura), Joe Love (Centennial) and David Hayward (Downey) along with Sutherland. Freese, who led Ventura to a tie for the Channel League crown and into the quarterfinals of the "AAA" playoff before losing to Fullerton (66-62), was coach Bob Tuttle's top player. He averaged 17.3 points for 26 games and was named "Player of the Tournament" at Beverly Hills. Love led Centennial into the semi-finals of the large schools tournament (placed second to Compton in Coast League play) before dropping a one-point decission to Fullerton, 47-46. Joe Love is described by his coach, Bill Barnes, as "A fine competitor with no weaknesses." David Hayward of Downey, which finished third behind Compton and Centennial in the Coast League, was the league's top scorer averaging 24.6 points per game.

First team center selections are El Monte's Ken Strickland and Noel Smith of Mira Costa. Strickland, who carried El Monte into the third round of the playoffs only to lose a tight 45-43 battle to eventual champion Glendale in the quarterfinals, averaged 21 points for 25 ball games during the year, plus a fine 20 rebound average to boot. Noel Smith of Mira Costa's Bay League champs, led the Mustangs to a 26-4 season. Mira Costa, like El Monte, went to the quarter-finals of the playoffs only to lose a one-point heart-stopper to Compton, 63-62. Smith averaged 18 points for the full 30 games.

Four top forwards join the above six players on the first team. Kim Stewart (Huntington Beach), Ken Hubbs (Colton), Aron Carmichael (Long Beach Poly) and Fritz Zwick (Fullerton) are the boys named.

Kim Stewart led the Sunset League in conference scoring with a 24.4 average for 10 games, while averaging about 20 points for the over-all season. Fritz Zwick placed third in league scoring with a 17.5 average, accounting for about 15 points per game over the season. Colton's Kenny Hubbs led Citrus Belt scorers with a 15.4 average, which he upped to 17.4 aver the full year's play. Long Beach Poly's Aron Carmichael topped the Harry Moore League point producers with a 25.3 average for the league season. He had a 20 average for the 24-game season.

The second squad of ten CIF competitors is no less impossing than the first. At the two center posts are Gordon Martin of Hawthorne and Jerry Halterman of Grossmont. Both boys were players of the year within their own league and both took top scoring honors. Martin, who sustained a serious knee injury early in the season, came back to lead all Pioneer League scorers with a 29.3 average in eight games. Halterman, Metropolitan League standout, averaged 24.7 points for the 12-game league season and just about maintained this average throughout the year.

Arthur Williams, San Diego City League player of the year, also was his loop's top scorer. Art averaged 17.3 points. Phil Herman of Redondo, top player in the Bay circuit for 1959, topped scorers with an average of 22.3 points. Two other second team members, Bill Daniels of Compton and Wells Sloniger of Garden Grove wound up second in the Coast and Sunset League respectively.



High School in the final game, was the unanimous choice of the All-Southern California Board of Athletics selection committee as CIF Small Schools Basketball player of the year for 1959. The annual selections were made last week at Helms Hall in Los Angeles by a board of some twenty prep newspaper journalists from the Southern California area.

Sommers, one of two repeaters from last year's small schools team, scored 680 points in 28 games for the Titans this season. He won the final playoff game against Hart (64-59) virtually single handed, as he set a new CIF single-game scoring record of 43 points. In five playoff games, Sommers scored a total of 164 points to average 32.8, another phenomenal achievement.

The 6'5" senior center from San Marino is considered by his coach, Garland Lewis, to be one of the best players on the Pacific Coast right now. In four years of high school basketball, Sommers scored1,565 points in 93 games for a 16.8 average.

Santa Clara High School, which waded through four playoff opponents, upsetting Trona High in the finals 44-27, placed its star rebounder, Steve Miller on the first team at a forward position. Santa Clara defeated Mission, Bishop, Ramona and Trona in the finals to grab the "A" Section title. Both Trona and Hart, runners-up in the small schools playoffs, placed its star players on the first team.

Val McCallum, Trona's high scoring forward, and Hart's Don Wagoner were put on the first team. Artesia and Buena Park, semi-finalists in the "AA" Section playoffs also were represented on the first team. Ed Briscoe who, along with Sommers is the only repeater on the squad from last year, is the Buena Park entry, while Artesia's Joe Partain was also placed on the team at a guard spot.

The Twenty-Second annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Program will be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, April 4th at 10:30 a.m. Those players named for All-C.I.F. and All-los Angeles City basketball team honors for the 1959 season will receive special framed scroll awards at this time. Players of the Year, along with those coaches who directed their teams to championships in 1959, will be recipients of special awards. College and university coaches as well as past greats from the sport of basketball will be special invited guests on the morning of April 4th to help pay tribute to this year's teams.

F or the second straight year and for the fourth time in its twenty-two year history, All-Southern California Board of Basketball named co-

players of the year in Los Angeles City Basketball for the 1959 season. Fremont High School's Henry Johnson and Jack Hirsch from Van Nuys High were the players named for outstanding player honors. Both boys are seniors and both were top point producers for their respective teams. Johnson led Fremont to the Southern League title and the Los Angeles City Championship, as the Pathfinders won 18 straight ball games. Hirsch, the Valley loops top scorer with a 20.2 average, paced Van Nuys to a 12-2 league mark and into the quarter finals of the City playoff where Fremont won, 66-61. In this contest, however, Hirsch was high point man with 28 points and did a remarkable job on the boards.

Both Bill Thayer, coach at Fremont, and Jim Mercer, Van Nuys pilot, rate their stars most highly. Thayer rates Johnson the best all-around performer on his squad and one of the most polished ball players he has ever coached. Mercer calls Hirsch "The most effective high school player I have ever seen."

For having been named co-players of the year for 1959 by All-Southern California Board of Easketball Johnson and Hirsch will receive special Helms medal awards at the 22nd annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall in March. Both boys will have their names engraved upon the Paul H. Helms Trophy which is lodged permanently in Helms Hall. Johnson and Hirsch join an imposing list of former Los Angeles City High School basketball players who have been named for player of the year honors. The All-Los Angeles City first team is composed of six-footers and high scorers. All are seniors except Hollywood's Charles Zazzaro, who will be back for another season in 1960. Besides co-players of the year Johnson and Hirsch the first team is made up of Charles Zazzaro (Hollywood), James Rosvall (University), and Roger Head (North Hollywood).

Charles Zazzaro, 1959 City scoring champion, and James Rosvall, one of the two top scoring guards in action this past season, were named co-players of the year in Western League play for 1959. Johnson and Hirsch were named top players in their respective leagues, Southern and Valley.

A first team guard selection along with Rosvall is North Hollywood's Roger Head. Actually a center throughout the '59 campaign, Head, who directed the N.H. Huskies to the Valley crown with a 13-1 mark, was the spark in the championship game against Fremont. After helping his team to playoff victories over Banning (53-43), Westchester (48-43) and Fighterman Kinde Besteredflipped in 19 points in North Hollywood's losing effort against Fremont. The All-Los Angeles City second team is also one of good height and no little shooting ability. Three league scoring champions are listed among the five boys. Forwards Charles Shubin (Bell) the Eastern League's top point producer, and John Gregerson (Narbonne) who took the Marine League scoring title, and center Cecil Washington (Manual Arts) who nailed down the Southern League high point title.

Guards on the second team are Fremont's Huey Thomas and Larry Sharp, who for the past two seasons has been Northern League player of the year...in 1959 sharing the honor with Joe Quintana (Lincoln) third team member.

Thomas placed fifth among scorers in the high scoring Southern League. Thomas was particularly consistent in the playoffs and came through in several games when his scoring touch was needed the most. Larry Sharp, Verdugo Hills high scoring guard, placed second in Northern League scoring, and celebrates his second year on the All-City team. He is one of two City-Team repeaters, as both he and forward Charles Shubin were third team choices last year. Sharp has been an All-Northern League selection for the past three years.

The L.A. City third team is composed of forwards Bruce Milliamson (Jefferson), and Charles Kingsbury (Marshall), center Joe Quintana (Lincoln), and guards Jack Bogdanovich (San Pedro) and Gail Johnson (Van Nuys). Quintana, the Northern loop's top scorer with a 21.4 average, was named co-player of the year along with Verdugo Hills' Larry Sharp.

There was a junior named to each of the three teams, Charles Zazzaro (Hollywood) on the first, John Gregerson (Narbonne) on the second, and Bruce Williamson (Jefferson) on the third.

All players named for Los Angeles City Basketball team honors will be recipients of framed scroll awards to be presented at the 22nd annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Program in March. At this time all those boys named for honors will gather with a similar group from the C.I.F. to receive their awards. Players, coaches and guests will gather in the Helms Hall patio to salute the top performers of the past prep season. Coach Bill Thayer of Fremont will also be honord for his part in bringing the City title to his school.

CHARLES SHUBIN, TOP EASTERN LEAGUE SCORER FROM BELL, NAMED PLAYER OF YEAR FOR 1959

H elms All-Southern California Board of Basketball had no trouble picking the Eastern League's top player for the 1959 season. It was unanimous for Bell's

senior forward Charles Shubin, who was a first team selection in 1958 and a member of the All-City third team. Shubin led Bell to the Eastern title (9-1) as the league's top scorer. In 10 league games Charles averaged 19.7 points. John Schilling was the only other Bell player to make the Eastern League squad, placing at center on the second team.

Runner-up South Gate placed three of its players on the two teams -- Mike Ireland, senior forward on the first team, and George Miller and Marvin Cichy on the second squad. Danny Salazar, Roosevelt guard and Huntington Park center Dick Lincourt were picked for first team honors, both averaging 15.3 points for the league season. Garfield's Manuel Garduno, runner-up to Shubin in league scoring, with a 16.9 average, was the other forward selection on the first team.

Besides Shubin, there were two repeaters from last year's squad. Marvin Cichy was a first team member in '58, while Mike Ireland moved up from last season's second team.

U hable to choose between the fireball guard, Larry Sharp, and the hot-shooting center, Joe Quintana, All-Southern California Board of Basketball settled on co-players of the year in the Northern League for 1959. Both boys were outstanding on their respective teams, Sharp, top scoring guard in the city with an 18.6 average, led Verdugo Hills to a tie for the Northern Championship. Marshall also finihesed with a 9-1 mark. Quintana, the league's top scorer with a 21.4 average, wound up second in city scoring behind Hollywood's John Zazzaro, and had a phenomenal free throw shooting percentage of 88% - making 70 of 80 gift throws.

Amber and Charles Kingsbury. The other guard is Verdugo Hills' Jim Strand. This marks the twenty-second year that All-Southern California Board of Bas-

ketball has selected All-Los Angeles City League teams. Each player named for honors will receive a special Helms scroll award.

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H enry Johnson, best all-around player on the Fremont High School Basketball varsity, which went undefeated in 10 Southern League games, was a unanimous pick as player of the year when Helms All-Southern California Board of Athletcie gathered at Helms Hall to make its annual picks.

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Averaging 19.7 in Southern League play, Johnson fattened his average over 14 games, pulling it up to 23.9 points per game. Described by his coach Bill Thayer "as the best all-around player on the squad", Johnson played a forward-center spot for the Pathfinders over the 1959 season.
