LOY PETERSEN, ANAHEIM FORWARD, NAMED TOP C.I.F. "AAA" BASKETBALL PLAYER FOR 1963

A lthough co-Sunset League champion Anaheim did not progress any farther than the first round of the C.I.F. "AAA" Division playoffs, its star forward Loy Petersen was accorded "Player of the Year" honors in Southern California prep basketball, when members of All-Southern California Board of Basketball met at Helms Hall to make their annual round-ball selections. Five players were nominated for the top award, but when the vote was called for, Petersen won by a comfortable margin.

The 6:5", 175-pound Colonists' star led coach Don Liebhart's team to a 21-5 season record, scoring 565 points in 26 games for a 21.9 point average. A senior, Loy broke the Sunset League scoring record by 34 points this year, averaging 23.4 points in loop play. He averaged 18.9 rebounds per game and in pressing situations was used by coach Liebhart as a backcourt man. His coach calls Loy, "A fine floor general, who plays all phases of the game. He should be considered for "Player of the Year" honors." Obviously he was!

For having been selected the top performer in Southern California basketball for 1963, Loy will be presented with his "Player of the Year" medal award at the 26th annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, April 6, at 10:30 a.m. All players named for all-star team honors will be invited to attend the awards program along with their coaches.

The coveted center positions on the first all-CIF team went to Compton's Joe Davis and Ramona of Riverside's Larry Bunce. Both boys averaged over 15 points for the season, Davis winning "Player of the Tournament" laurels in the playoff tourney, while Bunce was credited with taking his team through a rough Citrus Belt League season and to the final game of the playoffs. Compton defeated Bellflower (47-40), Long Beach Jordan (73-66), Glendale Hoover (58-50), Pius X (64-49) and Ramona in the final, 52-38. Ramona came to the final game by defeating Azusa (69-43), La Habra (73-47), Montebello (71-51), West Covina (60-53), before meeting a determined Compton five in the finale.

San Diego's top point producer, and tops in the Southern California area for 1963, Larry Blum of Grawford High, was a umanimous selection on the first team at guard. Blum set a new San Diego County scoring record of 737 points, bettering by one the mark set by Tom Shaules of St. Augustines back in 1958. Shaules set his mark in 26 games, however, and stands number three on the all-time best season average list, with a 28.3 mark. Only Fred Goss (31.8) and John Rudometkin (30.2) rate above Shaules.

Right behind Blum in the scoring parade comes Jim DeLong of Long Beach Jordan, who landed a first team guard spot. DeLong averaged 23.3 points, winding up second to Blum average-wise among first-teamers. Only higher average on the three all-star teams belongs to San Diego High's Elbert Miller, who accounted for 689 points in 27 engagements for a healthy 25.5 mark. This puts him in 10th spot among all-time CIF point producers, average-wise, tied with Covina's Fred Crabtree. Blum's 737 points rates 8th spot among all-time scorers.

CALEXICO'S RAMON SANCHEZ HEADS C.I.F."AA-A" DIVISION BASKETBALL TEAMS FOR 63 SEASON

The pride of Imperial varies basketball, Ramon Sanchez of Calexico High School, was selected as Southern California's basketball "Player of the Year" for the 1963 season in the "AA-A" Division of the C.I.F., when mambers of the Helms Athletic Foundation's All-Southern California Board of Basketball met at Helms Hall to make their annual hardcourt selections. A unanimous choice as a first-team forward selection, Ramon received a majority of the votes for "Player of the Year" from the assembled Helms Board members.

Senchez led coach Julian Lopez's Calexico Bulldogs to a share

Senchez led coach Julian Lopez's Calexico Bulldogs to a share of the Imperial Valley League title with Brawley and El Centro and then through three playoff games, before falling to eventual "AA" chempion El Segundo in the semi-finals, 53-44. During a 21-geme regular and practice-geme season, Ramon scored 565 points and added 76 in three playoff games to bring his over-all season scoring to 641 points. His 26.7 average ranks with the best ever in CIF play over a complete season, with only five players -- Fred Goss (31.8), John Rudometkin (30.2 & 27.9), Tom Shaules (28.3), and Bob Bedell (26.8)--ranking above him. Ramon was a 2nd team CIF selection last year.

At 6'4" and 185 pounds, Sanchez is among the finest players to ever come out of the Imperial and Coachella Valleys. The Bulldogs downed Banning (75-46), Mater Dei (48-41) and then lost to El Segundo (53-44) with Sanchez scoring 35, 19, and 22 respectively. He averaged 25.3 in playoff competition, just slightly over a point less than he averaged all season long.

For having been named the Southland's outstanding "AA-A" Division basketball player for 1963, Ramon Sanchez will be presented with his Helms "Player of the Year" medal award at the 26th annual All-Southern California Board of Basketball Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, April 6, at 10:30 a.m. Ramon will also have his name engraved upon the Paul H. Helms perpetual trophy which is permanently lodged in Helms Hall in Los Angeles.

Two players named to the 2nd team last year are back as 1st team members this season. Banning's Ray Curtis at center and Laguna Beach's fine guard Ron Lutz are the repeaters. Ted Page of Yucaipa, a 3rd team forward in 1962, was selected on the 2nd team this year.

It seemed to be a season of fine guards in 1963 and the Helms Board selected its teams accordingly. Dan Deurwaarder, who piloted

Board selected its teams accordingly. Dan Deurwaarder, who piloted the El Segundo Eagles to the "AA" championship over Laguna Beach from his guard position where he operated all season, was named to the first team at forward. Jack Reilly, all-around athletic star from Culver City High School, which went to the quarter-finals of the "AA" playoffs before losing to Palmdale in a squeaker, 42-40, was another fine guard named at forward. Another good guard, Dick Fines of Alemany, which lost a first-round engagement to eventual champion El

Segundo, 77-74, was the third guard named to a forward post.

The four guards named to the first team are great ones and two of them are juniors. Andrew Herrera, floor general who led Santa Clara to the "A" Division title over Chadwick, 70-60, and Bruce Nelson of Palmdale, star of the team that lost to runner-up Laguna, 48-44, are the juniors on the first team. Ron Lutz, returning from last year's second team and Larry Kampmeier, reputed to be the finest athlete at Bonita since Glenn Davis, are the other guard selections.

Twenty-six schools are represented on the 1963 "AA-A" Division teams. Four schools, Culver City, Laguna Beach, Atascadero and Alemany landed two players each on the teams. There were two juniors named to the second team and three to the third.

This marks the 26th year that scroll and medal awards have been presented to deserving high school basketball athletes, through All-Southern California Board of Basketball. Coaches and players are honored each year following the close of the season, through the efforts of 18 newspaper sports journalists from throughout Southern California who meet at Helms Hall three times each year to select the All-Southern California athletic teams in football, basketbell, baseball and track and field,

E dgar Lacey, Jefferson High School's 6'7", 190-pound center who led coach Larry Hanson's Democrats to the Southern League title and a second-

This marks the 26th year that All-Ios Angeles City Basketball Team selections have been made by All-Southern California Board of Athletics.

lacey-led, the Jefferson Democrats breezed through an always-tough Southern League schedule winning 10 straight league games. In all, Jeff won four practice games and three tournament games, for an overall 17 games won. They dropped the finale to Fremont, as they did in 1962, by a score of 61-58. In league play, Edgar Lacey scored 322 points for a new City Basketball League record. In 14 games Lacey scored 418 points for an average of 29.9 points. For the four-game city tournament, Edgar scored 95 points for a 23.7 average. Over the full 18-game season the Jefferson star scored 513 points in 18 games for a 28.5 average.

Coach Larry Hanson calls his star center, who was named to the All-City first team last year as a junior, "the best all-around high school player in the United States." In the playoffs, Jefferson defeated Poly (69-41), Jordan (61-49), and Lincoln (82-56), before losing to Fremont in the finals, 61-58. Lacey is the only Jefferson representative to be named to this season's All-City team.

For having been named the outstanding performer in Los Angeles City basketball for 1963, Edgar Lacey will be recipient of the Helms Foundation medal award and will have his name engraved upon the Paul H. Helms Trophy which is permanently lodged in Helms Hall. The 26th annual Basketball Awards Program will be held later on during the month of February at a site to be announced within a few days.

Bill Theyer's Fremont Pathfinders, easy pickings for Jefferson during regular-season play, came back to haunt the Democrats in the finale of the 1963 playoffs, as they did last year. Unlike last year, when they didn't place one player on the first team, the Pathfinders landed center-forward Elzie Johnson and center Malkin Strong on the first five. Johnson was named to the All-City second team last year as a junior.

Fremont lost three games during regular season play in 1962-63, but swept through all opposition in the playoffs — Banning, 65-52; Cleveland, 76-41; University, 60-52 and Jefferson, 61-58. Last year the Pathfinders upset Jefferson 61-59 in the finals after Jeff had won 17 straight games.

With Fremont and Jefferson taking up three spots on the first All-City team as representatives of the Southern League, Eastern and Western League "players of the year" Dan Rodriquez of Garfield and John Galbraith of University round out the first unit at forward and guard respectively. All first-team performers are seniors.

The Helms Board named three forwards on the All-City second team for 1963, something which hadn't been done since 1955, when three forwards were picked on the third team. Herman Sonier, Lincoln forward and co-player of the year in the Northern League, Jim Kegley, Marine Loop top performer and University's Steve Eddy were the three front line players named for honors. George Geros, high-scoring Northern League co-player of the year with Sonier, was named at the center position, while Walter Simon and Leonard McElhannon, of Roosevelt and Los Angeles respectively, were the guard picks.

East and West-Valley League players of the year, Bob Potratz and Ronald Waterstreet, received third team recognition. Potratz led North Hollywood to the East-Valley League crown, while Ron Waterstreet led Cleveland to a tie with Taft for the West-Valley Loop crown. Randy Judd, Cleveland's fine center, was a third team pick, while Westchester's Don Saffer and Franklin's Wesley Jessup round out the third team.

Edgar lacey and Elzie Johnson are the only two repeaters from last year's teams, Lacey a first-team repeater and Johnson up from last season's second squad. Juniors who will have a chance to repeat on next season's teams are Jim Kegley of Narbonne, Walter Simon of Roosevelt and Don Saffer of Westchester.

Marbonne High School's Jim Kegley ran away with the Marine League scoring title this past season and with it recognition as the loop's top basketball player.
