OXNARD'S DAVID LAWYER PICKED TOP C.I.F. "AAA" DIVISION BASKETBALL PLAYER FOR 1964

FOR MELEASE: TUESDAY AFTERNOON, MARCH 24th and Wednesday a.m.

A 11-Southern California Board of Baskettal, composed of sports journalists from throughout Southern California, cast a unanimous ballot for

Oxmard High School's David Lawyer as C.I.F. "AAA" Division basketball Player of the Year at the 27th annual meeting of this group at Helms Hall last week. Lawyer, star senior forward on coach Bill Gragg's Channel League champions, led his Yellowjacket teammates to the semi-finals of the playoffs in 1964. Oxmard dropped its semi-final engagement to Pius X, 75-59, and a subsequent consolation tiff with Pasadena, 67-60, but so impressive was Lawyer that he was acclaimed "Player of the Tournament". In five playoff battles — beating Magnolia 91-77, Mark Keppel 89-74, North Torrance 67-61, and losing to Pius and Pasadena -- Lawyer scored 146 points, 39 against Pasadena, for a phenomenal 29.2 average.

A top student, Lawyer is student body president at Oxnard and has already been accepted at Stanford University. He was league scoring champion and unanimous player of the year within his league. In 29 games this season, Lawyer accounted for 637 points and an even 22 point average

"AAA" Division C.I.F. Champion Long Beach Poly -- with playoff wins over Garden Grove 80-53, Western 52-39, Ventura 81-79, Pasadena 65-62 and Pius X 60-58 -was the only school to place more than one player on the three-team All-C.I.F. selections. Center Mel Reed on the first team and guard Billy Richard on the second were the champion Jackrabbits selected. Poly's '64 record was a fabulous 32-1.

This year's 30-man team is composed entirely of seniors, with the exception of first-team forward Lynn Shackelford of Burroughs High in Burbank, who is a junior. The second highest scorer in CIF Southern Section play this year, Lynn scored 675 points in 28 games for a 24.1 average. He and Crescenta Valley's Gene Sutherland, first-team guard pick, were co-players of the year in the Foothill Loop.

Other forwards to be named to the first team, a squad which stacks up as one of the most powerful ever assembled in the southland, were Plus High's Jim LaCour and San Bernardino's Ernest Powell. Powell, with 639 points in 26 games, accounted for the top average among members of the first ten, notching 24.6 points per contest.

Joe Chrisman of Ventura was named at the other center post along with Poly's Mel Reed. Ventura gave Poly all it wanted in the quarter-finals of the CIF playoffs, before going down by two points, 81-79. Chrisman was high for that game with 34 points, topping Mel Reed by eight.

Four outstanding guards received top backing by the Helms Board for 1964 team honors. Gene Sutherland, Crescenta Valley star whose brothers Darrell (1959 Player of Year) and Gary (1962 first team) were All-CIF selections, averaged close to 19 points per contest in 164. Nyal Leslie, reputed to be Orange High School's alltime best basketeer, matched Sutherland's average, while playing in three more ball games (28). Doug Westlake led Pomona High to the Montview League title while compiling an average of 19 points in 26 encounters. The Red Devils got to the second round of the playoffs before losing to Dominguez 76-62. Michael Maggard, who led Norwalk to the San Gabriel Valley League crown, rounds out the guard selections. Mike was among those who scored over the 600-point mark. Tall for the conventional guard spot at 6'5", Maggard was used extensively to bring the ball down court in pressing situations.

Other top players selected from league champion teams were Pasadena High's fine center Jim Marsh, 6⁵6" and 200 pounds, who led the foothill League runners-up to third place in the CIF playoffs, 67-60 over Ventura; Neville Saner, also named to a second team center post from Bay League co-champion Mira Costa High, at 6¹7" and 200 pounds, might well be the top rebounding center in the southland; Harry Jenkins, Redondo Migh guard, who led the Sea Hawks to a piece of the Bay Loop crown; Compton's Harvey Dillon, tops on the Coast League Champion team; Center-forward Alan Lepper, top player in Sky League action, from North TorranceHigh's league champion team; Gene Rodgers, Facific League Player of the Year, notched a second team forward berth after a great year leading Mark Keppel to the Pacific League crown.

Other league champion teams to place players on this year's all-star teams were Western High, Sunset League champs, with forward Julio Mendez; Foothill Loop winners Glendale, with senior guard Bill Paulsen; Citrus Belt League co-champion Redlands, with center Tom McCutcheon; and Sierra League kingpin Edgewood, with guard Mike Reed.

All players named for All-Star C.I.F. Team honors will be recipients of framed scroll awards at the 27th annual Basketball Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, April 4, at 10:30 a.m. Coaches and players, along with noted personalities from the field of basketball, will be on hand to take part in the festivities.

JERRY SHARMAN (CHARTER OAK) & ANDY HERRERA (SANTA CLARA) TOP CIF DIVISION TEAMS IN 64

Two of Southern California's finest small school basketball players, Jerry Sharman of Charter Oak High School and Andrew Herrera of Santa Clara High in Oxnard, were acclaimed "AA" and "A" Division C.I.F. Basketball Players of the Year respectively when members of the Helms Hall Board of selection met at Helms Hall last week to make their 27th annual round ball all-star team selections.

Coach Lee Powers speaks in glowing adjectives about his senior guard Jerry Sharman, son of the all-time great USC Trojan and Boston Celtics star who now coaches at L.A. State College. "I feel there is no better shooter in prep basketball. He has offensive moves that few can equal", is the manner in which coach Powers sums up Sharman's ability. Second in the Rio Hondo League to champ South Pasadena, Charter Oak went to the second round of the playoffs before dropping a stitch to Chino, playoff finalist, 78-62. Sharman scored 705 points in 27 games for a 26.1 average, the highest in C.I.F. Southern Section action this season.

Andy Herrera, now finds himself on the small school's team for the second year. As a senior guard he has performed for Lou Cvijanovich over the past three years, a period which has seen Santa Clara stretch its record to 70 straight Tri-Valley League wins and five of six CIF division basketball titles. Herrera, who led the Saints to the "A" Division CIF Football crown in 1963 and was named co-Player of the Year Division GIF Football crown in 1965 and was named co-riayer of the tear for his fine play, scored 581 points in 25 games this season for a 23.2 average. He scored 113 in four games for a 28.2 average in the playoffs, which saw Santa Clara defeat Bishop (64-40), Flintridge (92-66), Chadwick (71-53) and Alta Loma in the finale (71-46). Both Sharman and Herrera will be honored, along with those boys nemed for "AA" and "A" team honors, at the 27th annual All-Southern California Board of Bastetbell sugade program to be held at Helms Hall

Lasuen, winner of the "AA" Division title with wins over El Segundo (61-60), Righetti (65-55), Santa Paula (63-54), Victor Valley (55-45) and Chino in the finals (44-41) placed forward Dominic Healy on the first team. Runner-up Chino landed center Durel Carpenter on the No. 1 squad. Righetti High of Santa Maria, was the only school to place more than one performer on the "AA" teams. Forward Ken Heits was picked on the first team, while guard Stalley Kitagawa was placed on the second team. Kitagawa was on the third team in 1963, when three on the second team. Art Wilmore of Atascadero was a second team pick in 1963, while Kitagawa and Bell Gardens Karl Weide were third team picks one year ago. Lou Cvijanovich's Santa Clara Saints, perennial "A" Division

kingpins, placed three players on the all-star team, while Chadwick, Prep League champs landed two representatives. Herrera and center Jerry Tracy were named to the number one club, while junior guard Mike O'Brien, made the second team for the Saints. Chadwick is represented by Gary Horkey, center, and guard Dennis Shafer, both on the first team.

Repeaters on the "A" Division club are Herrera and Jim Wilsek. the latter from Bellarmine-Jefferson in Burbank was a second-team pick in 1963.



Walter Simon, guard on last year's All-Los Angeles City second team, hit the jackpot in 1964, being acclaimed "Player of the Year" when members of the Helms Board of selection met to name the top basketball players in high school play for 1964. Simon, who led all city scorers with a 30.1 point average, as Roosevelt High won the Eastern League title, wound up the "Most Valuable Player" in the recently concluded All-City Tournament. Roosevelt lost to Granada Hills in the finals, 71-68, but Simon was high point man for the game with 32 points and finished the four-game tourney with 94 points and a

big 23.5 average to lead all players. Simon was a unanimous choice as Los Angeles' slickest player

Simon was a unanimous choice as Los Angeles' slickest player for 1964 and it marked the first time a Roosevelt player has been se-lected for this honor since 1938, the year All-Southern California Board of Athletics was organized by Helms Athletic Foundation. The Roosevelt player to be nemed at that time was John Mandic. In leading Roosevelt High to the city finals, Walt Simon ac-counted for 94 points and added to his 301 in 10 league encounters, swelled his total in "official" action to 395 points. For 14 games, this figures to a 28.2 point average, classy in any league. For having been named the outstanding performer in Los Angeles High School Basketball for 1964, Walt Simon will be recipient of the Helms medal award and/will have his name engraved upon the Paul H. Helms perpetual trophy, permanently lodged in Helms Hall. The 27th annual Los Angeles City Awards Program will be held later this month at a site to be announced. It was Granada Hills which captured the most spots on this

At a site to be announced. It was Granada Hills which captured the most spots on this year's All-City Team. The title-winning Granada Five -- the first title for this team in basketball -- placed Vern Sorenson, West-Valley League "Player of the Year", on the first team and forwards Gary Kitch and Randy Strnad on the third squad. Granada Hills was undefeated in 12 league games and then ran through four tourney tiffs -- over Lin-coln (89-57), University (67-65), Taft (60-49) and Roosevelt (71-68)---on its way to the 1964 chempionship.

Jordan High, the only other team to go through its league schedule undefeated (10-), was the only team other than Granada Hills to place more than one performer on the three teams. Art Harris, Ma-rine League "Player of the Year" was a first-team pick, while Willie

Wilson nabbed a third-team guard post. Twelve Los Angeles High Schools are represented on this year's city team. Other league "Players of the Year" to be acclaimed on the '64 honor squads are LA's Steve Jennings (Southern), Donald Saffer of Westchester (Western), and Simon (Eastern) on the first team; with Ron Selim of Monroe (East-Valley) and Charles Thomas of Belmont (North-

ern) being picked for second-teem honors. Two players named to the 1964 first teem were named on last year's city squad. Roosevelt's Walt Simon was a second team pick in 1963, while Don Saffer was on the third. For the first time since 1954, all members of the three city teams are seniors.
