Fall Championships Review

The 2024 Fall Sports Championships for the CIF Southern Section have ended, and as always, there are great stories to tell, and many great memories made. This was the first year most of our team sports used the same season data and straight ranking to develop and seed our divisions. Overall, this new system proved to be a tremendous success and will only get better moving forward. Here is a summary of our fall sports championships.

Cross Country

Saturday, November 23rd, was the CIF Southern Section Ford Championship Finals for Cross Country, which took place at Mt. San Antonio College. Ten races involved five divisions each for the boys and the girls. After last year's rain course experience, where the finish of each race took place inside the stadium, the course for the Mt. SAC Invitational and the CIF Southern Section Championships changed to have the finish line in front of the home bleachers. Though the infamous "Poop Out Hill" is no longer an obstacle to be overcome, the hilly course remains a significant challenge to all who run it. Mt. SAC has a large video board inside the stadium, which displays each race by having cameras stationed along the course and a motorized cycle ahead of the race leaders provided by HD Runners. It proved to be an excellent experience for everyone in attendance.

Girls Flag Football

The inaugural Girls Flag Football Championship was an excellent event hosted at Fred Kelly Stadium located on the campus of El Modena High School. Girls Flag has been the fastest-growing sport these last two years, and it looks like there will be continued growth next year. It is exciting to watch, and if you think the sport is very similar to traditional football, think again. The strategy required to be successful in Girls Flag is quite different than conventional football. If you have not done so already, I strongly recommend you check out some games next year.

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144 teams in 5 Divisions began this year's playoffs, crowning five champions. Division 3 had Troy High School coming back from an early deficit to beat San Clemente 33-32 in an early morning thriller. Santa Monica defeated Fullerton 28-6 in the Division 4 matchup, and Antelope Valley took care of business against Northview 28-0 in Division 5. Some great games were played on these two days, concluding another excellent football tournament. Of the fourteen 11-person football divisions, three were won by private schools (Mater Dei - D1, Rio Hondo Prep - D7, and St. Pius X/St. Matthias Academy - D8), two were won by #1 Seeds (Mater Dei - D1 & Highland - D8), one was won by a #16 seed (Portola – D11).

Santa Margarita was the top team in the qualifying tournament and won the State Southern Regional Championship.
