President Elect, Dr. Alexis Barile, presented the changes in the State Federated Council weighted voting indicating the number of votes for the Section for the 2024-25 school year. The Sac-Joaquin section is receiving 2 additional votes due to an increase in both their number of schools and number of athletes to a total of 19 votes. The Southern Section is allocated to have twice as many votes as the next largest section. Therefore, the number of votes the Southern Section has at the Federated council increased from 34 to 38 for the 2024-2025 school year.

1. Article 350 Edits Regarding New Playoff System Language

President, Dr. Paula Hart Rodas, presented the proposal to update the language in Article 350 asking for updates to the language, bringing it in line with the playoff bylaw changes approved for this school year. The changes in the language addressed the first round seeding in the playoffs, wild card entries, league representatives and the entry deadline. There was an explanation as to why the wild card entry information in the language remained when irrelevant and was explained that it would remain in case it becomes relevant in the future. This proposal would take effect immediately after the Council vote on September 26. There was a motion and a second to approve the proposal. The motion carried 18-0-0.

Director of Marketing & Corporate Sponsorships, Jacquelyn Gibson, started her presentation with a review of the ceremony held at Angels Stadium this past Tuesday for the CIF Southern Section Players of the Year for baseball and softball for the 2024 season. Each player received a customized bat courtesy of Rawlings. Next was announced the signing of the official Flag Football ball with Wilson Sporting Goods, beginning in the 2025-26 school year. After a review of the numbers attending this year's Athletic Administrators Summit (almost 600), each member received the exclusive Summit gift of the new CIF Southern Section Planner. Kudos to Jacquelyn and especially her assistant, Brianna Sutrisna, for the creation of this planner that has been in the works for over two years.

Found this was a great time for networking, connecting with other states, and finding out what others are facing around the country. There is the sharing of best practices and hearing the highlights from other states. It is interesting to learn that things the other states are excited about or just now tackling with things our section already has procedures in place or have addressed in the past. Dr. Hart Rodas is proud of this body and the team in the office, both containing those who are forward thinkers with the best for our student-athletes in mind. Dr. Hart Rodas closed asking everyone to join us at the Champions for Character Dinner on Monday, the Athletic Administrators Summit on October 7, and the Hall of Fame/Distinguished Service Luncheon on October 16.

C. Commissioner's Report

Mike West

Commissioner of Athletics, Mike West, announced Jacquelyn Gibson's new title as Director of Marketing and Corporate Partnerships, which better reflects the nature of her position. He then reviewed the Area Placement process with the group and their role in that process. See the timeline sent to each school for more details. There was a question regarding adding an additional area and was answered that it could be brought forward with the rationale as to why an additional area was needed and that the proposal needs to go through the normal process and be voted on at Council. State CIF has created a commission on strategic priority. This group will be working on and creating goals for the next five years and beyond. A survey of the membership along with leadership will be forthcoming to help determine the needs of the sections and school that require attention now, two to three years from now, and five years and beyond. Areas of focus include sportsmanship, officials, mental health, athletic trainers, competitive equity, transfers, multi school agreements, and student representation. The Athletic Trainer title bill has made its way to the governor's desk for signature. This bill is to recognize certified athletic trainers with the proper title. He ended with the same reminders of the upcoming events and to RSVP to his assistant, Sharon Hodge, if planning to attend.

D. Executive Committee Member Reports

Small Schools Representative, David Parkes, discussed his experience at the Section 7 & 8 Conference. This was his first time being able to attend one of these meetings. It was great to see how much the NFHS supports the organizations. The community of the people in the room and willingness to help each other was evident and our student-athletes are in good hands.

President Elect, Dr. Alexis Barile discussed her experience at the Section 7 & 8 Conference. This was her first time being able to attend one of these meetings. She feels an overwhelming gratitude to serve in a leadership role and was reminded that there are people out there that are good for kids. The experience reinforced how awesome high school athletics is and the impact we have on lives now and in the future.

Past President, Jim Perry discussed his experience at the Section 7 & 8 Conference. The host state of Montana made great effort to bring their culture to the event. It was their association's goal to take a road trip to all 182 schools in the state association. The Arizona Association uses pre-determined tag lines and preprinted newspapers to add excitement to their championship events. One statement made that stuck was, "Do we deliver bad news or do we deliver good solutions." Elders from the Blackfoot Nation came and performed native dance and music. They were also football officials and felt it important to support the conference.

Commissioner of Athletics, Mike West, informed the Committee of the opportunity to purchase Purple Air monitors to assist in the determining of air quality. Montana has the worst air quality in the nation, and this is a platform Montana is using to evaluate Air Quality throughout their state.

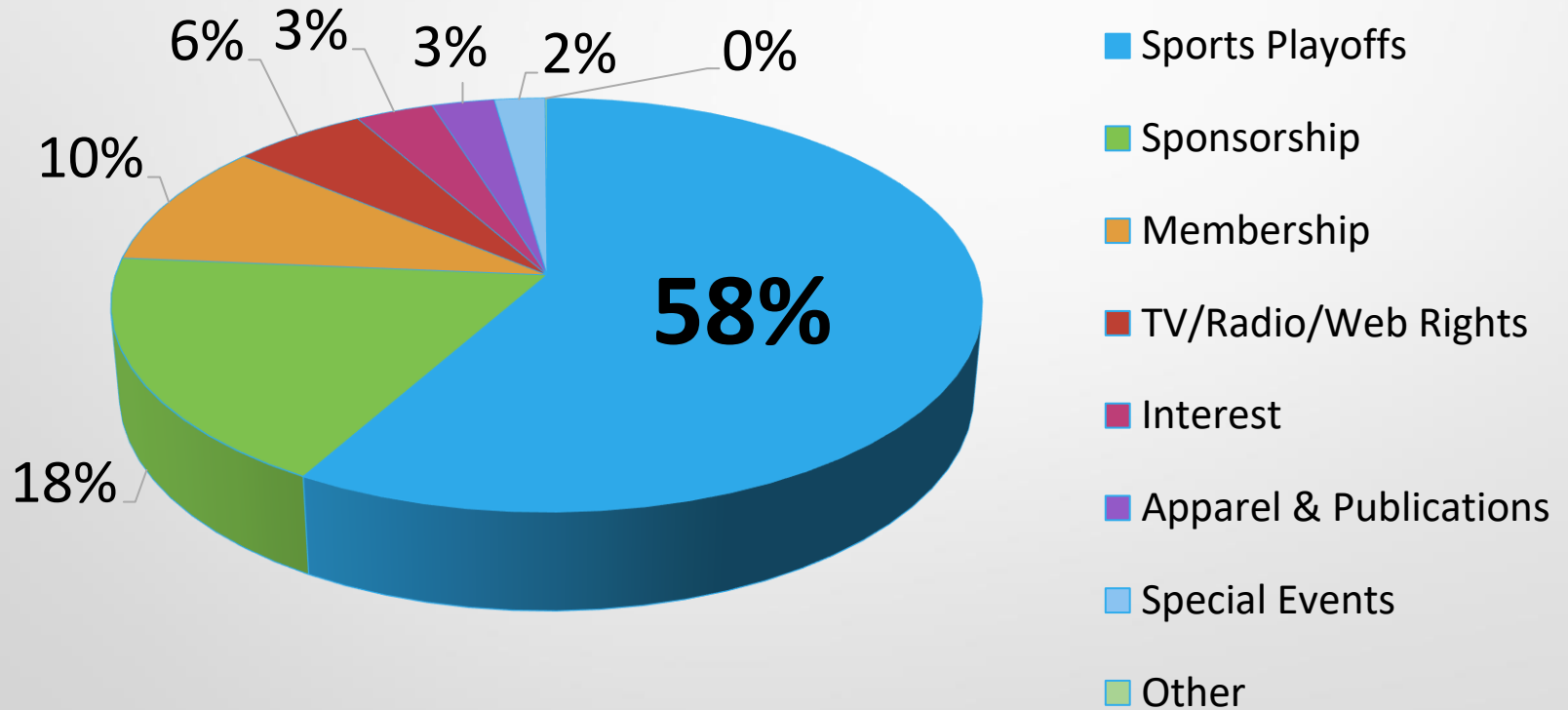

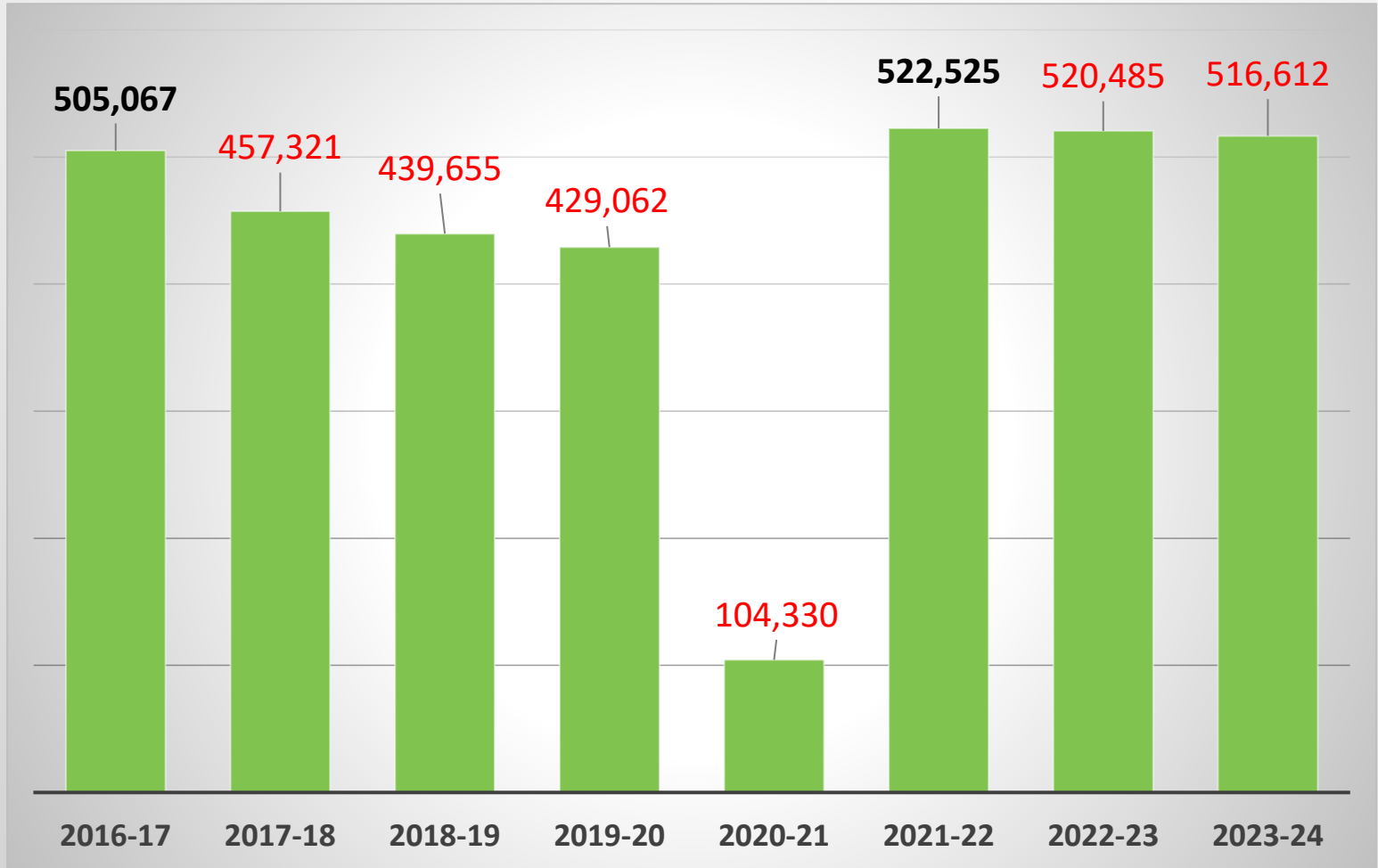

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70.B. Composition of the Executive Committee

- (1) Federated Council Officers — President, President-Elect and Past-President; AND
- (2) Six (6) additional members who are representatives of Sections/Allied Organizations with no more than one (1) member representing the group of Allied Organizations; AND
- (3) Four (4) at-large representatives who are directly accountable to, or a voting member of, a local board of education or school(s) governing body shall be selected in an effort to reflect both gender and ethnic representation of the state's student population.

C. Limitations of Membership on the Executive Committee

- (1) No Section shall have more than one (1) member eligible to be elected to the Executive Committee unless another committee member from the Section is an officer or at-large representative.
- (2) The group of Allied Organizations shall have no more than one (1) member eligible to be elected to the Executive Committee unless another Allied Organization representative is an officer or at-large representative on the Executive Committee.
- (3) No Section may have more than one (1) representative serving as an officer at any one time.
[See Article 7-70.G.(2)] for exception.
- (4) Only one (1) person from the group of Allied Organizations may serve as an officer at any one (1) time.

D. Terms of Office

- (1) The President-Elect will serve two (2) years before assuming the presidency. The President-Elect shall assume the office of President immediately following service in the office of President-Elect.
(Revised May 2002 Federated Council)
- (2) The President shall serve a two (2)-year term.
- (3) The Past-President shall serve a two (2)-year term immediately following service as President.
- (4) Other Executive Committee members shall be elected annually by the Federated Council to serve a two (2)-year term. An Executive Committee member may serve for two (2) consecutive terms of two (2) years each.
- (5) If there is a break of one (1) year in the service of an Executive Committee member, as a member of the committee, that member may be eligible for nomination, election and service for one (1) additional term of office as an Executive Committee member but no one shall be eligible to serve more than a total of six (6) years. on the committee.
- (6) Four (4) at-large representatives, in an effort to reflect both gender and ethnic representation of the state's student population, shall be appointed for a two (2)-year term. (See Note after G. below)
- (7) If in the second year of their term, an elected [see 70.B.(2)] Executive Committee member ceases to be a representative of their Section to the Federated Council, that Executive Committee member may remain as an additional representative of their Section until the end of that representative's prescribed term.
(Approved February 2022 Federated Council)

E. Nominations

- (1) Each year, the President shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of at least five (5) members. Members of the Nominating Committee shall be selected from among the Federated Council and may include no more than two (2) current members of the Executive Committee.
- (2) The Executive Director and the President shall be ex-officio members of the Nominating Committee.
- (3) Nominations for the Executive Committee shall be presented to the Federated Council at the meeting prior to the election.
- (4) Nominations for President-Elect will occur in even numbered years.
- (5) Each person nominated for an officer or other elected [see 70.B.(2)] Executive Committee seat must be a current member of the Federated Council at the time of nomination and election.
- (6) The Nominating Committee will name at least five (5) candidates for two (2)-year terms for the Executive Committee and at least two (2) candidates for President-Elect.
(Approved January 2020 Federated Council/Approved February 2022 Federated Council)
- (7) Nominations will also be accepted from the floor at the Federated Council meeting whereupon nominations are presented.
- (8) Nominations for the four (4) at-large representatives will be made by Executive Staff, in consultation with Sections and Allied Organizations, after the election of Executive Committee members. The Executive Committee, at its June meeting, will select four (4) candidates from among those nominations to serve as at-large representatives.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Staff is proposing the implementation of a CIF State Boys & Girls Soccer Championship to begin in the 2025-2026 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timeline for implementation of new events for consideration.

Fiscal Impact: The staff has conducted an audit of regional soccer events and calculated the possible travel expense for teams to compete.

Background: The CIF does not currently have a state championship in Soccer. This event would bring the top teams from each region to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section and regional championships. It's another opportunity for students to have state level competition in the sport of soccer, as currently offered to many other CIF sports participants. This championship event is proposed as a two-day event held one week after the Regional Championship.

- The CIF State will work with interested host communities to keep championship expenses in line with the projections and use additional marketing opportunities to supplement the budget.

- This event will run at a deficit, but Regional Soccer currently generates approximately \$170,000 in revenue annually, so even with a projected budget deficit for CIF State Soccer, annual revenues for soccer will be close to \$150,000 annually.

- Yes. The current CIF State Office staff is capable of managing this event.

7. Is there capable staff available to support the CIF State Office in the operation of this event?

- Yes. The State office staff currently has adequate resources to staff the event.

Philosophical Criteria for New Events:

- This event would bring the top teams from each region to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section and regional championships. It's another opportunity for boys and girls to have "state" level competition in the sport of Soccer as other sports currently do (Basketball, Volleyball, Football, etc).

Qualifying Participation Criterion for a Regional Championship:

1. Do 50% of all CIF sections participate in the sport in the same season?

- All 10 CIF Sections participate in the Winter.

Other Questions:

1. How will this event benefit participating schools and students?

- This event will give boys and girls the opportunity for post-region championship opportunities not currently available in Soccer.

2. Do the proposed dates conflict with state mandated testing?

- The proposed dates are currently used for playoff opportunities in other sports. No conflict with state testing is anticipated.

3. Does the event cause additional loss of instructional time? If so, has any thought been given to mitigating this loss (Saturdays, evenings, vacation time)?



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- The State event will follow a schedule similar to many of the other state level events. Depending on travel, there may be some loss of instructional time, but every effort will be made to minimize lost class time.
4. **How, specifically, will this event be a demonstration of the value of participation in high school athletics?**
 - All CIF events are conducted with the above in mind. This event can give CIF member schools another opportunity to demonstrate that competitions can be played fairly and with great sportsmanship. It is also an additional avenue for our member schools to promote the best values of educational athletics.
 5. **Will the proposed event lend itself to a partnership between the State CIF and a CIF Section? If so, the nature of the partnership must be detailed. What are the duties and responsibilities of the State and Section entities?**

CIF California State Cross Country Meet Qualification Proposal

Background

- Cross country is a team sport where school enrollment significantly impacts competitive equity.
- Current CIF Cross Country Divisional distribution shows a significant imbalance in enrollment at the Division I and Division IV levels. Schools with lower enrollments at the DI and DIV are at a competitive disadvantage relative to the larger schools in their respective divisions.
- In DI, schools of enrollment of 1,940 may compete against schools of 4,698 enrollment, a 2.4 differential in school size.
- In DIV, schools of enrollment of 601 may compete against schools of 1,480 enrollment, a differential of 2.5.
- At the DIV level, an actual differential of 879 students has a significant impact on competitive equity. Smaller schools allocate fewer students across multiple sports. Thus a 1,480 school team is more likely to have a larger (and better) team and chance for success than one with 601 students.
- This contrasts with DII and DIII with a differential of only 1.4 and 1.6, respectively.

History and Comparison to Other Sports and Cross Country in Other States

- CIF moved to five (5) divisions in cross country in 1995 but has not made any changes despite the increase in the number of schools and student enrollment.
 - In 1995, there were 1.464 million students enrolled in high school in California.
 - In 2023, there were 1.936 million students enrolled in high school in California.
 - This represents a 32% increase with no changes in the divisions.
- In California, Football (15), Basketball (7), and Volleyball (6) all have more divisions than Cross Country.
- Ten (10) states with significantly smaller populations have adopted a larger divisional structure for cross country (6 to 7 divisions).
- 30 states have fewer divisions than California (1 to 4 divisions).

Sectional Response

- California sections have reallocated the divisional enrollments to align with the Southern Section to be competitive and retain (or not lose) state meet berths.
- In 2016, NCS realigned to have fewer DI schools and upped the enrollment in DIV.
- In 2022, CCS realigned in a similar manner.
- In 2024, SDS is considering a similar proposal.
- See addendums for NCS and CCS.

Proposal: Expand to Six Divisions with Statewide Enrollment Caps While Allowing Sections Freedom to Place Teams Into Division for Section Competitions

- This proposal recommends expanding the number of divisions for the CIF State Championship from 5 to 6 and implementing divisional caps based on enrollment numbers.
 - Note: These caps can vary each year depending on the enrollment numbers.
- Sections may still place teams in divisions, to create equitable competition within their sections, as they see fit. However, teams qualifying for the state meet would be placed into divisions at the state meet that are equitable based on statewide enrollment data.
- This will create competitive equity by grouping teams with similar enrollments together, ensuring a more balanced competition for all schools at both the section and CIF level meets.
- This expansion will allow for a more nuanced breakdown of schools based on enrollment sizes, reducing the gap between larger and smaller schools within a division.

- This aligns the number of divisions with other team sports in California.

Principles that Guide Divisional Placement.

- The new division 6 will retain the same enrollment numbers as the old division 5. All schools smaller than 600 students will run in Division 6
- Each of the 5 remaining divisions should have roughly the same number of schools
 - The smaller divisions may have slightly more schools due to the fact that they are less likely to field complete teams.
- No school should have to compete against a school more than 2 times its size at the state championship (with the exception of Division 6, where this is impossible).

Qualification to the State Championship

- No changes would be made to the qualification process
- Teams qualifying out of their section meets would potentially be moved to a different division for the state meet
- Individuals qualifying out of their sections would remain in the same division that they race in at their section meet.

Impact on Sections

- The impact on sections is that they would not feel compelled to strip schools from their Division 1 races in order to make their lower divisions stronger
- For example, NCS currently has only 8 schools classified as Division 1 in order to more closely match the CBEDS of schools in the SS. If NCS felt that it was in their section's best interest to keep only 8 schools at the D1 Level, that would be their prerogative. However, schools larger than 2400 students that qualified out of NCS Division 2 would run Division 1 at the state meet.

Impact on State Meet

- The primary impact on the State Meet would be adding two more races.
- This would add up to 48 total teams (24 boys teams, 24 girls teams) and potential increased revenue for the City of Fresno and CIF with ticket and merchandise sales.
- The number of teams / individuals in each divisional race would vary slightly, as teams were moved up or moved down after their section meet.

Rationale for Proposal:	<p>Our goal as a federation is to support having as many students as possible participate in education-based athletics, recognizing “the powerful potential of sports as a positive vehicle for personal growth”(CIF Constitution, Article 1).</p> <p>When a child makes a mistake or a series of mistakes during a developmentally critical time of their life, often education-based athletics can be a place of consistency, redemption, and purpose.</p> <p>When student-athletes are in a position where they have been expelled or voluntarily withdraw in response to pending disciplinary action, they currently not only lose their school community but also the opportunity to start fresh somewhere else. In essence, they are doubly punished, and by a body that operates from very different rules and circumstances than individual schools.</p> <p>Recognizing there may yet be a desire on the part of the federation to have some disciplinary consequence on the athletic level in place when expulsions occur, our request is to amend the language of the bylaw to convey those circumstances that</p>

Proposal Summary: The CIF Commissioners Committee is proposing an amendment to Bylaw 503.M. which would increase the sanctions for adults (coaches and spectators) who are ejected from contests. Please see the attached proposal for the specific information regarding the increases in sanctions for adult ejections.

Fiscal Impact: None

Background: We continue to see inappropriate behavior from adult coaches and spectators at CIF contests. The current levels of sanctions do not appear to be having enough of an impact. This proposal to increase those sanctions will hopefully gain the attention of those adults who feel it is acceptable to act inappropriately at high school sporting events.

503.M. Statewide Sportsmanship and Ejection Policy

Player:

A player who is ejected from a contest (for reasons other than fighting or leaving the bench area during a fight) shall be ineligible to participate in the remainder of that contest (event) and his or her team's future contest (s) as outlined below:

- (1) First Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate in the team's next contest. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's next contest. If the ejection occurs in the last game of the season, the player would be ineligible for the team's first contest the following season. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for the first contest of their next season of sport.
- (2) Second Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate in the team's next three (3) contests. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's next three (3) contests. If the season concludes prior to the player serving the three (3) contests suspension, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for the team's following season. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for their next season of sport.
- (3) Third Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate for the remainder of that season. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's remaining contest that season. If there are six (6) or fewer contests remaining in the season, the player would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for the next season of sport as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

A player who is ejected from a contest for fighting or leaving the bench area during a fight shall be ineligible to participate in the remainder of that contest and his or her team's future contests as outlined below:

- (4) First Ejection: Player (Fighting/Assaultive Behavior/Gross Unsportsmanlike Conduct) is ineligible to participate in the team's next three (3) to six (6) contests as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the duration of the suspension. If the season concludes prior to the player serving the full suspension, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for the team's following season. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for their next season of sport.
- (5) Second Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate for the remainder of that season. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's remaining contests that season. If there are six (6) or fewer contests remaining in the season, the player would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for their next season of sport as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

Before a player may return to participate in a contest following a multiple game suspension for any of the above infractions, the school principal must inform the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter that they have met with the student-athlete, his or her parent/guardian/caregiver and coach to discuss future behavioral expectations.

Appeals Process for Multi-Game Ejections:

The school principal may appeal the penalties listed above in writing to the League Commissioner/President (for a regular season contest not including the final contest prior to Section playoffs) or CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter (for the final contest prior to Section playoffs and all playoff contests). The appeal must be received by the Section with 48 hours of the date of the ejection. Reasons for the appeal may only include misidentification of the ejected player or a misapplication of the rule. There will be no appeal regarding the judgment of an official.

Note: There is no appeal process for single game ejections.

Coach:

A coach who is ejected from a contest (for reasons other than fighting) shall be disqualified from participating in the remainder of that contest and his or her team's future contest (s) as outlined below:

- (6) First Ejection: Coach is disqualified from participating in the team's next **one (1) to three (3) contests as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter**. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for the team's next contest. If the ejection occurs in

the last game of the season, the coach would be ineligible for the team's first **one (1) to three (3)** contests the following season **as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.**

- (7) Second Ejection: Coach is disqualified from participating in the team's next ~~three (3)~~ to six (6) contests as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for the team's next ~~three (3)~~ to six (6) contests. If the ejection occurs in the last game of the season, the coach would be ineligible for the team's first ~~three (3)~~ to six (6) contests the following season.
- (8) Third Ejection: Coach is disqualified from participating in the remaining contests of that season. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for the remaining contests of that season. If there are six (6) or fewer contests remaining in the season, the coach would be disqualified from participating for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

A coach who is ejected from a contest for (Fighting/Assaultive Behavior/Gross Unsportsmanlike Conduct) shall be disqualified from participating in the remainder of that contest and his or her team's future contests as outlined below:

- (9) Ejection for (Fighting/Assaultive Behavior/Gross Unsportsmanlike Conduct): Coach is disqualified from participating for the remainder of that season. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for all of the team's remaining contests that season. If there are fewer than six (6) contests remaining in the season, the coach would be disqualified from participating for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

Before a coach may return to participate in a contest following a multiple contest disqualification, for any of the above infractions, the school principal must inform the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter that they have met with the coach to discuss future behavioral expectations.

Appeals Process for Multi-Game Ejections:

The school principal may appeal the penalties listed above in writing to the League Commissioner/President (for a regular season contest not including the final contest prior to Section playoffs) or CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter (for the final contest prior to Section playoffs and all playoff contests). The appeal must be received by the Section with 48 hours of the date of the ejection. Reasons for the appeal may only include misidentification of the ejected player or a misapplication of the rule. There will be no appeal regarding the judgment of an official.

Note: There is no appeal process for single game ejections.

Spectator:

If a spectator is ejected from a contest, it is the responsibility of the school to ensure that person does not attend that team's next **three (3)** contests. If the same spectator is ejected a second time, it is the responsibility of the school to ensure that person does not attend any of the remaining contests for that season.

Enforcement:

See Bylaw 503. M. and Article 22.C.(1)(2)(3)(4)

- (10) The Executive Director and/or Executive Committee or Section Commissioner and/or Section Board of Managers shall have power to suspend, to fine or otherwise penalize any member school for the violation of any CIF or Section rules and regulations or for just cause. The period of suspension or other penalty shall be left to the discretion of the CIF governing body that has jurisdiction of the matter where the penalty is not fixed.

Q: If an official disqualifies an athlete as prescribed by the NFHS rules for that sport, will a suspension be required?

A: If, in the review of the report filed by the official, it is determined by the Section Commissioner, or his/her designated representative, that the actions of the player do not involve unsportsmanlike conduct, a suspension may be waived.

Q: If it is determined by documented and/or video evidence that a player is disqualified from a contest erroneously, will a suspension be required for that player?

A: If, in the review of the report filed by the official, it is determined from the use of documentation and/or video evidence by the Section Commissioner or his/her designated representative, that the player has been misidentified or disqualified erroneously, a suspension may be waived.

Q: Sometimes an official will reverse their initial call at the conclusion of the contest. Can the official reverse his/her original call?

A: If, in the review of the report filed by the official, it is determined that he/she made an incorrect ruling, the official may rescind the initial ejection.
