#### January 18, 2025 9:30 a.m. Temecula Creek Inn, Temecula, CA Minutes

#### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

DISPOSITION

A. Call to order by Dr. Paula Hart Rodas, President of the Council

Meeting was called to order at 9:31 a.m. Dr. Paula Hart Rodas welcomed everyone to this weekend retreat. She acknowledged the fire disaster and the losses throughout our areas. Thankful to Mike and Ron for stepping up and trying to keep things as normal as possible for our student athletes.

#### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS

1. Proposed 2025-26 CIF State Budget

Non-Action

**STATE 673** 

President-Elect Alexis Barile reviewed the proposed 2025-26 school year budget for the State CIF. Highlights included a 5% staff salary increase to make salaries more competitive. They have presented a balanced budget. Mike West gave kudos to Bobbie Madsen for her hard work and dedication. Question – Will there be changes in revenue? There may be changes in sponsorship dollars; otherwise, there will be no other changes in revenue.

2. CIF State Executive Committee Nominations

Non-Action

**STATE 674** 

President-Elect Alexis Barile reviewed the nominations. There are no Southern Section nominations, so delegates will be sent uninstructed.

3. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 2702 –

Non-Action

**STATE 675** 

State Soccer Championship

President-Elect Alexis Barile reviewed the proposed revision to Bylaw 2702. This will align state soccer with state basketball in the same area on the same weekend and extend the season by one week. Football was moved to the south because of traditionally poor weather in the north, which is a concern for the soccer championships. This situation will be more feasible for keeping the State CIF staff together instead of splitting them.

4. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 1900 –

Non-Action

**STATE 676** 

**Cross Country Division** 

President-Elect Alexis Barile reviewed the proposed revision to Bylaw 1900. The additional division would allow other sections in the state to compete more readily against the traditionally larger schools in the Southern Section. This proposal does not align with Southern Section's competitive equity model. Southern Section schools may finish our championships without knowing immediately if they have advanced to the state event. No comment as of yet from our cross-country advisory committee. The Committee was encouraged to bring this information back to area their coaches and discuss it. This adds two more races to an already long event.

5. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 209.C –

Non-Action

**STATE 677** 

Disciplinary Transfer

President-Elect Alexis Barile reviewed the proposed revision to Bylaw 209.C. This proposal will create clarity as to what disciplinary action limits athletic participation. The proposal limits expellable offenses for transfer to the big five addressed in Ed Code 48915. This is a proposal from the Central Coast Section. There are differences between public and private school disciplinary actions, and this bylaw change may balance ineligibility due to disciplinary concerns among schools. Does this solve the problem, or are we boxing ourselves into expulsion actions rather than discipline? Should CIF be getting involved in school decisions on discipline? What about a kid in 12 fights but no bodily harm? Or intoxication? These are not covered in Ed Code 48915. Should not be able to transfer to avoid discipline. This would allow it in certain circumstances. Gives private schools assistance in sending students to new schools without unnecessary eligibility restrictions due to discipline.

#### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL NON-ACTION ITEMS (Cont.)

6. Proposed Revision to Bylaw 503.M -

Non-Action

**STATE 678** 

**Ejection Policy** 

President-Elect Alexis Barile reviewed the proposed revision to Bylaw 503.M. This allows the section office to assign one to three-game suspensions to coaches who are ejected from contests. Spectators would now receive an automatic three-game suspension for being ejected by an official. This would support our referees and bolster the current system for parent ejections. The spirit of the law would be that no games of any kind or level would be attended during the suspension. Referees must eject parent and file report. This provision as written would not apply when schools remove spectators on their own. However, schools could interrupt and leverage this rule if they wish. A Q&A needs to be created regarding how the rule affects being ejected from a game but having a sibling playing in the same season in any sport. Again, no games till the suspension is served for the sport, gender, and level the ejection took place.

Chief Financial Officer Mitch Carty presented the proposed Southern Section budget by distributing SS 679 and reviewing the information. Highlighted were a balanced budget and no increases in ticket prices or dues. Mitch Carty provided a reminder that the budget is dependent on ticket revenue and matchups. Some salary scales will be adjusted to be more competitive and attractive. Did matchups affect travel? The first round of football was Veteran's Day weekend. The Organization is in good financial health with investments. Inflation could have been a big factor as families struggle to make ends meet and do not have as much disposable income.

#### 2. Officials Fees Proposal

President Paula Hart Rodas reviewed the proposed officials' fees agreement for the 2025-2028 fee cycle. Reference was made to the documents in the agenda, and various items were highlighted. Assistant Commissioner Thom Simmons commended the committee for their work on this proposal. The proposal asks for a fee increase to schools over the next three years of \$2-\$1-\$1 to the rate. The committee met, developed the budget, and sent the proposed fee schedule to the President of each officials association for review. The final proposal was then presented to the committee. The soccer association president was excited with the numbers and felt the officials would be too. The San Diego and LA City sections also lined up with this proposal.

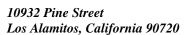

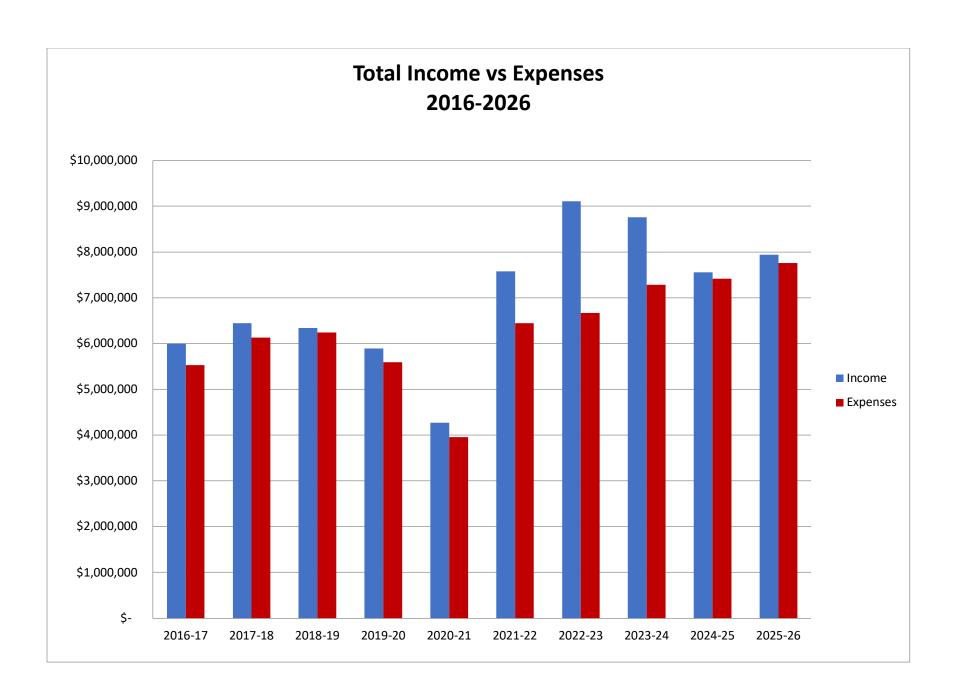
# CIF State Overview 2025-2026

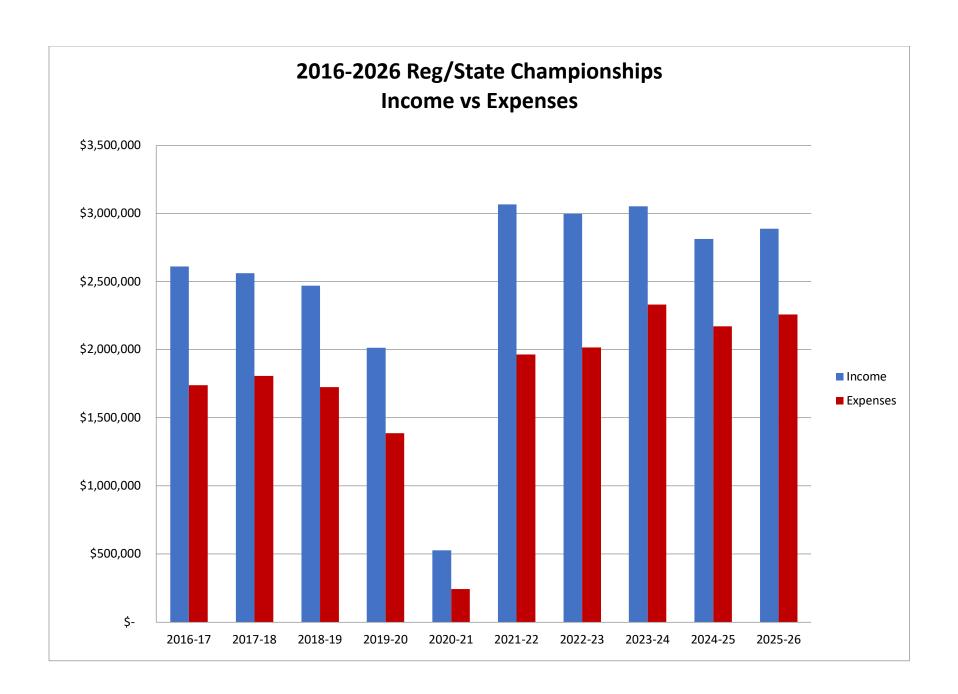

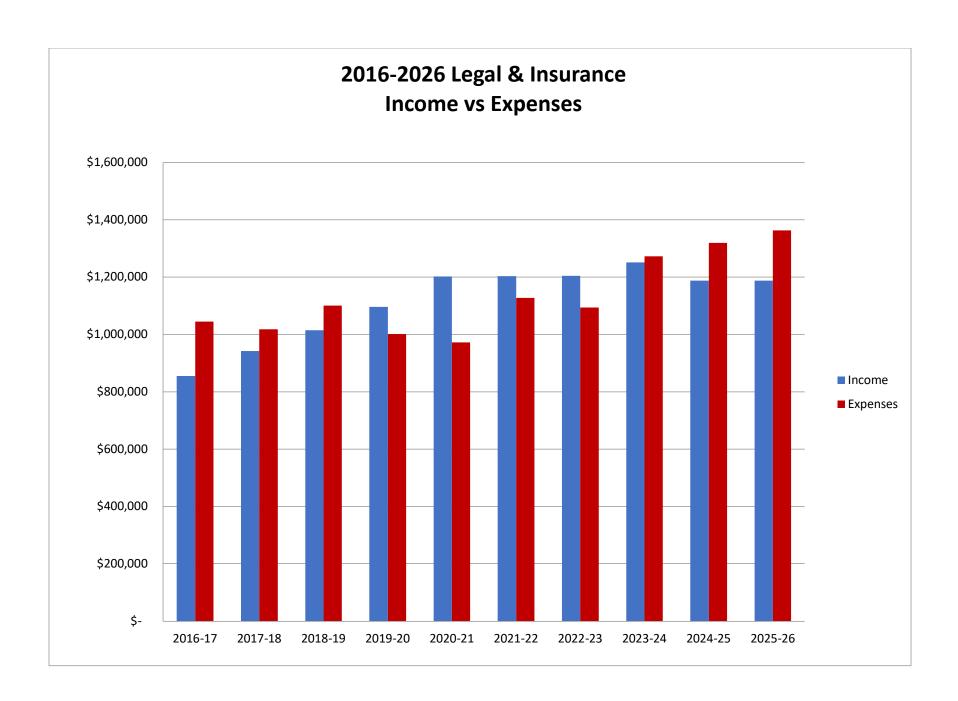
Continuing the same practice as last year's budget, we are proposing additional adjustments within the championships category as we have had multiple normal years in a row showing trends in both the income and expense columns to justify the changes.

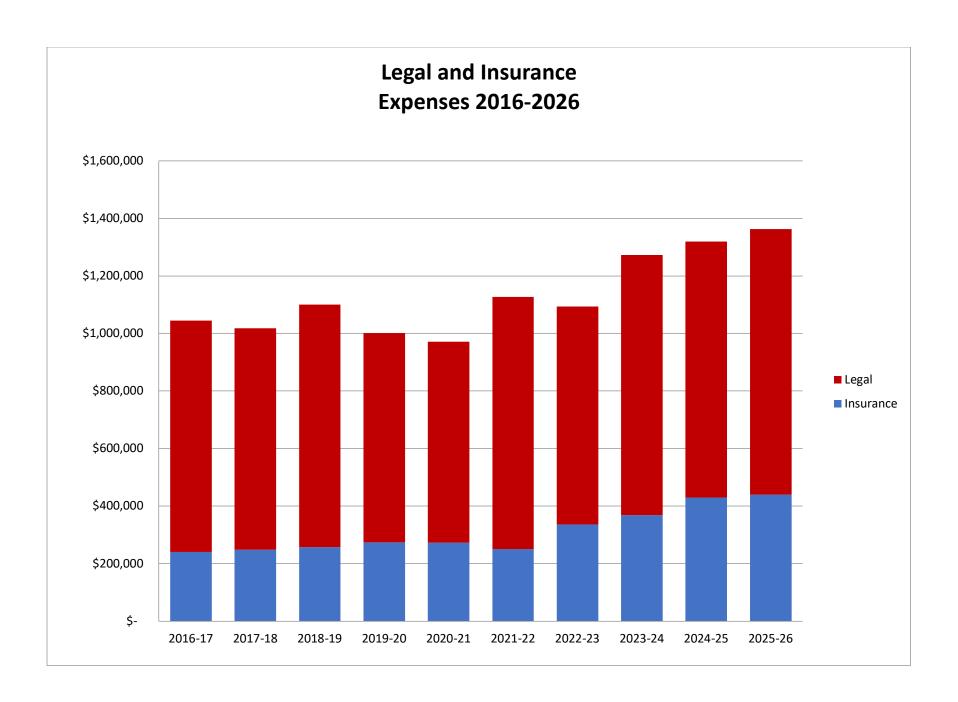
Our income continues to increase, and the proposed budget income is just under eight million dollars. This increase is due to championship events, our statewide corporate sponsorship contract, and year two of the approved dues increase.

We continue to monitor and adjust our legal, liability, and insurance costs. The insurance conditions and market risks are on an upward trend, leading to higher liabilities and increased premiums for coverages.











# Proposed Budget Summary 2025-2026

This budget proposal recommends adjustments to both income and expenses across multiple categories, with the majority of the modifications in championships based upon past years experiences. Additional changes include increases in marketing due to contract changes, a proposed 5% cost of living adjustment, mandatory CALPERS contribution increases, a projected 7% increase in medical insurance, and an increase in Federated Council expenses to account for the rising costs of meetings. All proposed recommendations for this budget are contained in the budget notes page of this workbook. The proposed budget indicates an end-of-year surplus of over \$176,000.

We are in year two of the dues increase that was approved by our Executive Committee last year for a \$.10 increase per year over the next four years. As a reminder, this increase was recommended and approved to offset the increasing costs of doing business, to anticipate any potential decreases in income levels, and provide future financial security for the organization.

Additionally, this budget includes two unfilled staff positions in the burden and salary figures. In the event these positions remain unfilled in the 2025-2026 school year, an additional surplus of \$275,000 may be realized.

#### **Income Overview**

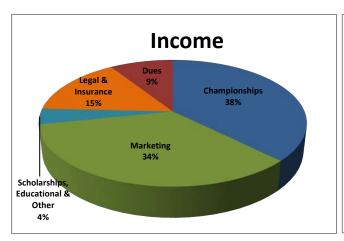
Income projections are based using a conservative approach forecasting a 5% increase in revenue streams to the organization, from \$7.55 million to \$7.93 million. As shown in the budget notes, we are recommending several changes in championship line-items to reflect more accurate figures for each of those sports.

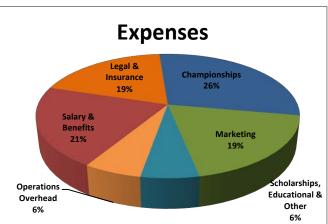
The major sources of income for the CIF are 1) championship events (38%), 2) marketing and corporate support (34%) and 3) legal assessment to schools (15%).

#### **Expenses Overview**

Expenses to the organization are projected to increase by approximately 4% based on the figures in the proposed budget, from \$7.41 million to \$7.76 million. Our projected expenses show a slight increase in sponsorship and marketing expenses due to contract adjustments, increased costs in championship events, increase costs in projected insurance expenses as well as governance and meeting expenditures.

The major expenses of the organization are 1) championship events (26%) with most of those funds being returned to schools to reimburse expenses for team travel and hosting fees, 2) salary and benefits for employees and retirees (21%), 3) marketing (19%) with most of these funds given directly to CIF Sections for their distribution share in state-wide marketing income, and 4) legal, liability, and insurance costs (19%).

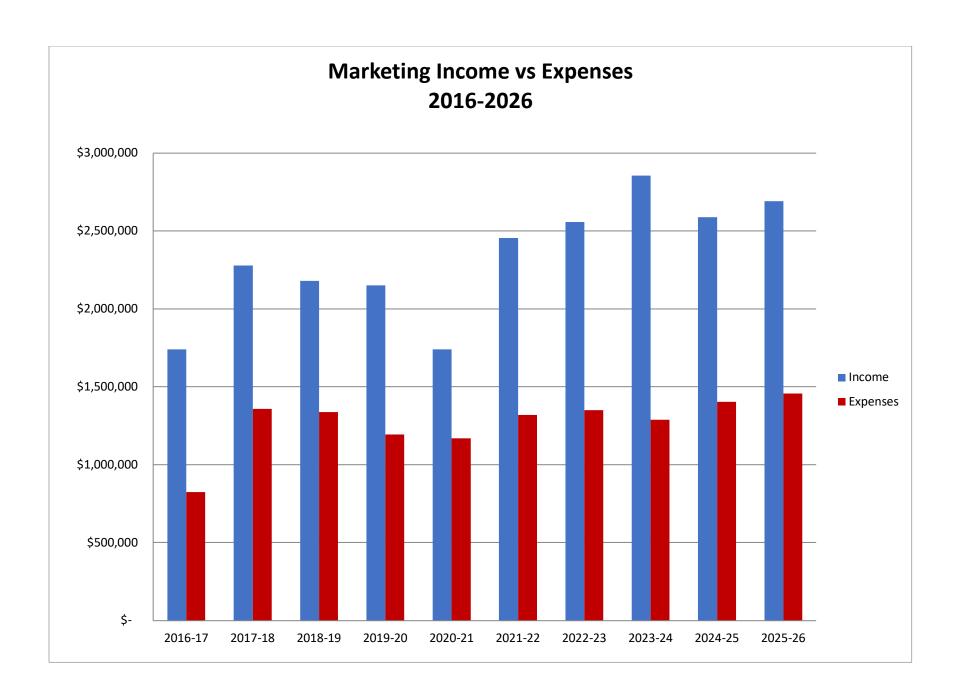

#### **Purpose of Report**

The CIF post-retirement medical plan pays medical insurance premiums for the eligible group of retirees. The purpose of this report is to determine the actuarial present value of future medical insurance premiums, and to review the adequacy of the reserve fund established to pay premiums.

#### **Covered Eligible Group**

The plan covers 16 people. In addition to the eight retirees and six spouses of retirees, the CIF Executive Committee approved another employee and his spouse to be eligible for lifetime medical insurance coverage when he attains retirement age 60. The eligible retirees are covered in the same medical insurance plan that covers active employees.

The average age of the 14 current beneficiaries is 78. The expected annual premium for this fiscal year is nearly \$117,000.

#### **Reserve Fund**

CIF has established a reserve fund to pay medical insurance premiums for the eligible group. CIF generally pays the insurance premiums during the year from its general funds, and then reimburses the general fund by withdrawing from the reserve account at fiscal yearend. In the prior three years, CIF decided not to reimburse the general fund. The reimbursement for the prior year would have been \$107,500.

The reserve fund's market value of investments grew from \$1,978,377 to \$2,235,076 during the twelve months ending July 31. The investment return was approximately 13% for those twelve months. The prior year's actuarial valuation assumed an investment return of 6%. The reserve fund gained \$138,000 more than we had assumed.

Adding the excess investment gain to the forgone premium reimbursement, the reserve fund is \$245,500 more than our prior year's projection.

The reserve fund's annualized investment return measured from 2012 is 6.8%, which supports our assumed long term investment return of 6% for this actuarial valuation.

#### **Results of Actuarial Valuation**

Medical premiums for the covered group increased more than 8% from the previous year. The actuarial valuation first starts with the current premiums and projects future medical insurance premiums using the health cost trend rates and mortality assumptions summarized in the Actuarial Assumptions section below.

The actuarial present value of future retiree medical premiums is the present value of the projected premiums discounted at the reserve fund's targeted return of 6.0% for the first twenty years, and decreasing to 3%. **The actuarial present value of future retiree medical premiums is \$2,029,000**. Compared to the \$2.2 million value of the reserve fund, the prior year's surplus assets have been eroded by the additional \$501,000 liability for the two new members.

To gauge the sensitivity of our estimate to our assumptions, the actuarial present value is recalculated by changing key assumptions. First, the future medical premium inflation was changed by +1.0% and -1.0%. Then valuations were also performed assuming future investment return of 5% instead of the targeted 6%. The results are summarized in the table below.

In all but the extreme scenario, the reserve fund's \$2.2 million is at least virtually equal to the present value of future premiums. In the extreme scenario (5% investment return and premium inflation of 1% over the base trend), the reserve fund is short by \$311,000. Should CIF continue for another three years to pay retirees' health insurance premiums from its operating funds instead of withdrawing from the reserve fund, that would erase much of the deficit under the extreme scenario.

#### **Appendix**

**Risk Analysis:** Although the scope of this Actuarial Report is stated in beginning, there are events and anomalies that are hereby identified to disclose risks associated with their impact on the plan. The assessment and disclosure of these risks and the actual future results may reasonably be expected to differ. These risks can impact plan obligations. Quantifying the impact on plan obligations is beyond the scope of this engagement.

<u>Investment risk</u> – As the return on the plan trust assets is subject to market return, should the actual rate of return be lower than the expected return the cost of the plan will rise and vice versa.

<u>Healthcare Insurance Premiums Rates</u> - The methodology in this Report assumes the premiums charged by insurance company represent an accurate cost of medical/dental/vision coverage. It also assumes no future changes in plan benefits or insurance company.

<u>Medical Cost Trends</u> – Higher inflation in future medical/dental/vision costs than the expected trends will increase plan obligations and vice versa.

<u>Asset/Liability mismatch risk</u> – The changes in assets are not tied to the changes in the value of plan obligations.

<u>Longevity/demographic risk</u> – Demographic experience will be different from expectations. Key demographic assumptions include mortality rates and future improvements in mortality, and retirement rates. If people live longer or retire earlier than expected then plan obligations will increase accordingly.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Staff is proposing the implementation of a CIF State Boys & Girls Soccer Championship to begin in the 2025-2026 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timeline for implementation of new events for consideration.

Fiscal Impact: The staff has conducted an audit of regional soccer events and calculated the possible travel expense for teams to compete.

Background: The CIF does not currently have a state championship in Soccer. This event would bring the top teams from each region to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section and regional championships. It's another opportunity for students to have state level competition in the sport of soccer, as currently offered to many other CIF sports participants. Addition of a sixth (6<sup>th</sup>) division at State CIF Cross Country Championships.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

#### **Rationale:**

To ensure that member schools qualifying for the Sate CIF cross country championships compete against schools more closely aligned by enrollment, this proposal, submitted by the Trans Valley League, adds language to the State CIF Bylaw 1900 (Cross Country), adding a sixth ( $6^{th}$ ) division for state championships.

#### 1900. STATE CHAMPIONSHIP DIVISIONAL PLACEMENT OF SCHOOLS

Each Section will determine the divisional placement for its schools who qualify for the State Cross Country Championships. CIF member schools will be required to participate in the division that has been established by their respective Section. Sections may use their own established criteria to determine placement of teams in the five (5) divisions based on the following guidelines:

# CIF California State Cross Country Meet Qualification Proposal Background

- Cross country is a team sport where school enrollment significantly impacts competitive equity.
- Current CIF Cross Country Divisional distribution shows a <u>significant imbalance</u> in enrollment at the Division I and Division IV levels. Schools with lower enrollments at the DI and DIV are at a <u>competitive disadvantage</u> relative to the larger schools in their respective divisions.
- In DI, schools of enrollment of 1,940 may compete against schools of 4,698 enrollment, a <u>2.4</u> differential in school size.
- In DIV, schools of enrollment of 601 may compete against schools of 1,480 enrollment, a differential of 2.5.
- At the DIV level, an actual differential of <u>879 students</u> has a significant impact on competitive
  equity. Smaller schools allocate fewer students across multiple sports. Thus a 1,480 school
  team is more likely to have a larger (and better) team and chance for success than one with 601
  students
- This contrasts with DII and DIII with a differential of only 1.4 and 1.6, respectively.

#### History and Comparison to Other Sports and Cross Country in Other States

- CIF moved to five (5) divisions in cross country in 1995 but has not made any changes despite the increase in the number of schools and student enrollment.
  - o In 1995, there were 1.464 million students enrolled in high school in California.
  - o In 2023, there were 1.936 million students enrolled in high school in California.
  - o This represents a 32% increase with no changes in the divisions.
- In California, Football (15), Basketball (7), and Volleyball (6) all have more divisions than Cross Country.
- Ten (10) states with significantly smaller populations have adopted a larger divisional structure for cross country (6 to 7 divisions).
- 30 states have fewer divisions than California (1 to 4 divisions).

#### Sectional Response

- California sections have reallocated the divisional enrollments to align with the Southern Section to be competitive and retain (or not lose) state meet berths.
- In 2016, NCS realigned to have fewer DI schools and upped the enrollment in DIV.
- In 2022, CCS realigned in a similar manner.
- In 2024, SDS is considering a similar proposal.
- See addendums for NCS and CCS.

# <u>Proposal: Expand to Six Divisions with Statewide Enrollment Caps While Allowing Sections Freedom to Place Teams Into Division for Section Competitions</u>

- This proposal recommends expanding the number of divisions for the CIF State Championship from 5 to 6 and implementing divisional caps based on enrollment numbers.
  - o Note: These caps can vary each year depending on the enrollment numbers.
- Sections may still place teams in divisions, to create equitable competition within their sections, as they see fit. However, teams qualifying for the state meet would be placed into divisions at the state meet that are equitable based on statewide enrollment data.
- This will create competitive equity by grouping teams with similar enrollments together, ensuring a more balanced competition for all schools at both the section and CIF level meets.
- This expansion will allow for a more nuanced breakdown of schools based on enrollment sizes, reducing the gap between larger and smaller schools within a division.

• This aligns the number of divisions with other team sports in California.

#### Principles that Guide Divisional Placement.

- The new division 6 will retain the same enrollment numbers as the old division 5. All schools smaller than 600 students will run in Division 6
- Each of the 5 remaining divisions should have roughly the same number of schools
  - The smaller divisions may have slightly more schools due to the fact that they are less likely to field complete teams.
- No school should have to compete against a school more than 2 times its size at the state championship (with the exception of Division 6, where this is impossible).

#### Qualification to the State Championship

- No changes would be made to the qualification process
- Teams qualifying out of their section meets would potentially be moved to a different division for the state meet
- Individuals qualifying out of their sections would remain in the same division that they race in at their section meet.

#### Impact on Sections

- The impact on sections is that they would not feel compelled to strip schools from their Division 1 races in order to make their lower divisions stronger
- For example, NCS currently has only 8 schools classified as Division 1 in order to more closely
  match the CBEDS of schools in the SS. If NCS felt that it was in their section's best interest to
  keep only 8 schools at the D1 Level, that would be their prerogative. However, schools larger
  than 2400 students that qualified out of NCS Division 2 would run Division 1 at the state meet.

#### Impact on State Meet

- The primary impact on the State Meet would be adding two more races.
- This would add up to 48 total teams (24 boys teams, 24 girls teams) and potential increased revenue for the City of Fresno and CIF with ticket and merchandise sales.
- The number of teams / individuals in each divisional race would vary slightly, as teams were moved up or moved down after their section meet.

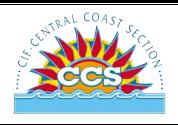

	C. Disciplinary Transfer  (1) If a student transfers from a public or private school when a disciplinary action is in place or pending, and the offense is specifically related to and/or listed in Education Code Section 48915, that student shall be ineligible for competition in all sports for one (1) year from the date of the transfer to the new school.
Rationale for Proposal:	Our goal as a federation is to support having as many students as possible participate in education-based athletics, recognizing "the powerful potential of sports as a positive vehicle for personal growth" (CIF Constitution, Article 1).  When a child makes a mistake or a series of mistakes during a developmentally critical time of their life, often education-based athletics can be a place of consistency, redemption, and purpose.  When student-athletes are in a position where they have been expelled or voluntarily withdraw in response to pending disciplinary action, they currently not only lose their school community but also the opportunity to start fresh somewhere else. In essence, they are doubly punished, and by a body that operates from very different rules and circumstances than individual schools.  Recognizing there may yet be a desire on the part of the federation to have some disciplinary consequence on the athletic level in place when expulsions occur, our request is to amend the language of the bylaw to convey those eircumptances that

	would result in expulsion from <b>any</b> high school - private or public - to ensure consistency in enforcement of both the language and spirit of the rule. Ed Code section 48915 covers code of conduct violations requiring mandatory expulsion.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Commissioners Committee is proposing an amendment to Bylaw 503.M. which would increase the sanctions for adults (coaches and spectators) who are ejected from contests. Please see the attached proposal for the specific information regarding the increases in sanctions for adult ejections.

Fiscal Impact: None

Background: We continue to see inappropriate behavior from adult coaches and spectators at CIF contests. The current levels of sanctions do not appear to be having enough of an impact. This proposal to increase those sanctions will hopefully gain the attention of those adults who feel it is acceptable to act inappropriately at high school sporting events.

#### 503.M. Statewide Sportsmanship and Ejection Policy

#### Player:

A player who is ejected from a contest (for reasons other than fighting or leaving the bench area during a fight) shall be ineligible to participate in the remainder of that contest (event) and his or her team's future contest (s) as outlined below:

- (1) First Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate in the team's next contest. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's next contest. If the ejection occurs in the last game of the season, the player would be ineligible for the team's first contest the following season. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for the first contest of their next season of sport.
- (2) Second Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate in the team's next three (3) contests. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's next three (3) contests. If the season concludes prior to the player serving the three (3) contests suspension, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for the team's following season. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for their next season of sport.
- (3) Third Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate for the remainder of that season. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's remaining contest that season. If there are six (6) or fewer contests remaining in the season, the player would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for the next season of sport as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

A player who is ejected from a contest for fighting or leaving the bench area during a fight shall be ineligible to participate in the remainder of that contest and his or her team's future contests as outlined below:

- (4) First Ejection: Player (Fighting/Assaultive Behavior/Gross Unsportsmanlike Conduct) is ineligible to participate in the team's next three (3) to six (6) contests as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the duration of the suspension. If the season concludes prior to the player serving the full suspension, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for the team's following season. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for the number of contests remaining on the suspension for their next season of sport.
- (5) Second Ejection: Player is ineligible to participate for the remainder of that season. Player may remain on the bench for the duration of that contest and may be on the bench in street clothes for the team's remaining contests that season. If there are six (6) or fewer contests remaining in the season, the player would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. If the player is a senior, he or she would be ineligible for up to six (6) contests for their next season of sport as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

Before a player may return to participate in a contest following a multiple game suspension for any of the above infractions, the school principal must inform the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter that they have met with the student-athlete, his or her parent/guardian/caregiver and coach to discuss future behavioral expectations.

#### **Appeals Process for Multi-Game Ejections:**

The school principal may appeal the penalties listed above in writing to the League Commissioner/President (for a regular season contest not including the final contest prior to Section playoffs) or CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter (for the final contest prior to Section playoffs and all playoff contests). The appeal must be received by the Section with 48 hours of the date of the ejection. Reasons for the appeal may only include misidentification of the ejected player or a misapplication of the rule. There will be no appeal regarding the judgment of an official.

Note: There is no appeal process for single game ejections.

#### Coach:

A coach who is ejected from a contest (for reasons other than fighting) shall be disqualified from participating in the remainder of that contest and his or her team's future contest (s) as outlined below:

First Ejection: Coach is disqualified from participating in the team's next one (1) to three (3) contests as (6)determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for the team's next contest. If the ejection occurs in

- the last game of the season, the coach would be ineligible for the team's first one (1) to three (3) contests the following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.
- (7) Second Ejection: Coach is disqualified from participating in the team's next three (3) to six (6) contests as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for the team's next three (3) to six (6) contests. If the ejection occurs in the last game of the season, the coach would be ineligible for the team's first three (3) to six (6) contests the following season.
- (8) Third Ejection: Coach is disqualified from participating in the remaining contests of that season. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for the remaining contests of that season. If there are six (6) or fewer contests remaining in the season, the coach would be disqualified from participating for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

A coach who is ejected from a contest for (Fighting/Assaultive Behavior/Gross Unsportsmanlike Conduct) shall be disqualified from participating in the remainder of that contest and his or her team's future contests as outlined below:

(9) Ejection for (Fighting/Assaultive Behavior/Gross Unsportsmanlike Conduct): Coach is disqualified from participating for the remainder of that season. Coach must immediately vacate the playing area and the vicinity in and around the contest and refrain from having any communication with the team or other coaches for the remainder of that contest and for all of the team's remaining contests that season. If there are fewer than six (6) contests remaining in the season, the coach would be disqualified from participating for up to six (6) contests for the team's following season as determined by the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter.

Before a coach may return to participate in a contest following a multiple contest disqualification, for any of the above infractions, the school principal must inform the CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter that they have met with the coach to discuss future behavioral expectations.

#### **Appeals Process for Multi-Game Ejections:**

The school principal may appeal the penalties listed above in writing to the League Commissioner/President (for a regular season contest not including the final contest prior to Section playoffs) or CIF Section Commissioner with jurisdiction in the matter (for the final contest prior to Section playoffs and all playoff contests). The appeal must be received by the Section with 48 hours of the date of the ejection. Reasons for the appeal may only include misidentification of the ejected player or a misapplication of the rule. There will be no appeal regarding the judgment of

Note: There is no appeal process for single game ejections.

#### Spectator:

If a spectator is ejected from a contest, it is the responsibility of the school to ensure that person does not attend that team's next three (3) contests. If the same spectator is ejected a second time, it is the responsibility of the school to ensure that person does not attend any of the remaining contests for that season.

#### **Enforcement:**

See Bylaw 503. M. and Article 22.C.(1)(2)(3)(4)

- The Executive Director and/or Executive Committee or Section Commissioner and/or Section Board of (10)Managers shall have power to suspend, to fine or otherwise penalize any member school for the violation of any CIF or Section rules and regulations or for just cause. The period of suspension or other penalty shall be left to the discretion of the CIF governing body that has jurisdiction of the matter where the penalty is not fixed.
- Q: If an official disqualifies an athlete as prescribed by the NFHS rules for that sport, will a suspension be required? A: If, in the review of the report filed by the official, it is determined by the Section Commissioner, or his/her designated representative, that the actions of the player do not involve unsportsmanlike conduct, a suspension may be waived.
- O: If it is determined by documented and/or video evidence that a player is disqualified from a contest erroneously, will a suspension be required for that player?
- A: If, in the review of the report filed by the official, it is determined from the use of documentation and/or video evidence by the Section Commissioner or his/her designated representative, that the player has been misidentified or disqualified erroneously, a suspension may be waived.
- Q: Sometimes an official will reverse their initial call at the conclusion of the contest. Can the official reverse his/her original call? A: If, in the review of the report filed by the official, it is determined that he/she made an incorrect ruling, the official may rescind the initial ejection.

# 2024-2025 CIF Southern Section Goals Recap Mike West, Commissioner of Athletics March 2025

The CIF Southern Section established goals at the beginning of the 2024-2025 school year to include the successful implementation of the same season data playoff system, implementation of the new health and safety bylaws, the establishment and oversight of the 2026-2030 releaguing cycle, successful completion of the officials fees negotiation process, the refinement and expansion of Unified Sports opportunities, providing opportunities for student-athletes to have a voice in CIF Southern Section issues, provide tools to schools to address poor crowd behavior, and increase the production and distribution of digital content.

#### Same Season Data Playoffs

The CIF Southern Section Championships have been successfully held for all fall and winter sports this school year. The Assistant Commissioners for each sport researched and selected the system appropriate to their sport in determining post-season team rankings. Each ranking system has been a proven success so far this year. Data shows that using these same season rankings to determine playoff divisions provided for closer games overall, demonstrating improved competitive equity. After each playoff season, the systems are being evaluated to determine if any minor adjustments are necessary to improve overall accuracy moving forward.

#### **Health and Safety Bylaws**

The new bylaws related to heat illness prevention and acclimatization, the air quality index protocol, emergency action plans, and AED protocols were implemented, and the member schools received considerable support. Acclimatization dates were established for every fall sport. Schools were placed in categories depending on their location. These categories were evaluated during the fall, and adjustments were made for schools that provided data supporting the need to change.

It was established that teams must postpone or cancel practice and/or games should the Air Quality Index reach 151 or higher.

Schools must now have written Emergency Action Plans (EAPs), which must be practiced at least once per season. Sample EAPs have been posted on the CIFSS website for schools to use as a model. Also, schools were required to purchase and place AEDs at their game and practice facilities to retrieve them within three minutes of a Sudden Cardiac Arrest. The CIF Southern Section provided 335 member schools with a free AED using grant money provided by the State.

#### Releaguing for 2026-2030

The first aspect of the releaguing process was completed on March 3, 2025, when the deadline for appeals to the Area Placement process passed without any submissions. Releaguing will continue into Spring 2025 with all areas in the section meeting and determining if any changes will be made. The deadline for area releaguing plans to be submitted to the CIF Southern Section office is June 19, 2025. If there are any appeals to area releaguing plans, they will be heard in the fall of 2025.

#### **Officials Fees**

The leaders of each CIF Southern Section Officials organization were allowed to meet at the Southern Section office along with the Officials Fees and Relations Committee on October 22, 2024. Those in attendance were provided information on the process for submitting and presenting their requests to

the committee and were allowed to ask questions about the process. On December 19, 2024, the Officials Fees Committee met and heard the presentations from each officials organization related to the increases in fees they requested. Following the presentations, the committee discussed each presentation and agreed on the increase each official's group would receive. This Officials Fees Proposal was voted on and approved by the committee and will be voted on by the CIF Southern Section Council on March 27, 2025.

#### **Unified Sports**

Unified Sports athletes and partners will continue participating in the CIF Southern Section Swim and Track & Field Championships. The Swimming Championships will have four divisions for Unified Teams who will swim in either the  $2 \times 50$  Yard Freestyle Relay or the  $4 \times 25$  Yard Freestyle Relay. Schools are asked to provide qualifying times for their Unified Teams to ensure there are not too many participants in a given division. Para Athletes will also be provided the opportunity to swim the 50 Yard Freestyle or the 100 Yard Freestyle.

Unified Track and Field is expanding to two divisions, Northern and Southern. The top two teams and the next four teams with the best qualifying marks will compete at the Masters Track and Field Meet to qualify for the State Championship.

The Unified Sports Committee is investigating possibly having a CIF SS-organized Unified Flag Football event sometime next year.

#### **Student-Athlete Advisory Council**

The CIF Southern Section office established a new Student-Athlete Advisory Council. This council will comprise student-athletes from member schools in all areas of the section. Four boys and four girls each from the Class of 2026 and 2027 will be selected for a two-year service and leadership opportunity with the CIF Southern Section. Students will meet with the Commissioner and other representatives from the office to discuss matters related to high school sports in the Southern California area. The application for Council membership is located on the CIF Southern Section website and is due March 7, 2025.

#### **Crowd Behavior**

A document titled "Recommendations for Addressing Discriminatory or Other Egregiously Disrespectful Behaviors at CIF Southern Section Athletic Contests" was developed and shared with member schools in the fall of 2024. It outlines procedures for how and why an athletic contest should be interrupted to address crowd behavior and help support member schools in addressing egregious behavior in the stands.

Members of the Activities Directors Advisory Committee and the Commissioner presented at the California Activities Directors Conference in San Diego on Sportsmanship and how to properly establish a student section at games.

#### **Digital Content**

The CIF Southern Section premiered Episode 1 of CIF-SS This Week on December 14, 2024. This one-of-a-kind state association produced and edited program provides 30 minutes of stories, highlights recaps and innovative programming showcasing the best education-based athletics in the nation. This example of the combination of new and conventional media is attempting to fill the hole created by the decrease in coverage by the traditional print media. We will have completed and aired four episodes on Spectrum Sports Net on Saturday, March 15 following the CIF State Boys Open Division Championship, intending to provide 10 shows by the end of the 2024-2025 school year.
